235-238 AD brass sestertius of Maximinus, a Thracian giant and general who became emperor Obv: his laureate and cuirassed bust Rev: goddess of the soldier's loyalty, holding legionary standards Raw EF, flan not round, as struck \$377. Another VF, heavy, rough patina \$197. Another, Pax reverse VF/ Fine rough surfaces \$127.

235-238 AD brass sestertius of Maximus Caesar, son and heir of Maximinus Obv: bare headed, draped bust of the youth Rev: Maximus standing near standards, holding scepter and spear. Raw EF, slightly rough black patina \$775.

269 AD bronze double denarius of the emperor general Victorinus, Gallic mint Obv: his radiate and cuirassed bust Rev: Pietas standing ANACS EF 40 \$97. NGC XF \$97.

270-275 AD silvered double denarius of Aurelian Obv: his radiate and cuirassed bust Rev: Victory presenting wreath to Aurelian ICG MS 61 sale \$127.

276-282 AD billon (silvered) double denarius of Probus Obv: his radiate and draped bust Rev: Jupiter presenting Victory to Probus ICG MS 62 \$197.

283-284 AD bronze double denarius of Numerian NGC VF \$97.

307-337 AD bronze reduced nummus of Constantine I the Great, Lugdunum mint Obv: his laureate and cuirassed bust Rev: radiate Sol, the sun god, standing, holding globe NGC AU \$97.

612-621 AD gold tremissis of Sisebut, Visigothic king in Spain. Seville mint Typical Dark Ages engraving. Abt Unc, slight planchet distractions. \$777.

685-695 AD gold solidus of Justinian II at Constantinople, his first reign, when the first portrait of Christ on a coin appears Obv: long haired and bearded European bust of Christ Rev: Justinian standing, holding long cross NGC CH AU \$9700.

737-758 AD silver sceat of king Eadberht of Northumbria, pre Viking conquest of York. Obv: Archbishop Ecgberht standing, holding long cross Rev: Eadberht's name around cross. NGC MS 64 amazing condition, possibly finest known. \$3977.

810-841 AD bronze sceat of Eanred of Northumbria, England, York mint, moneyer Vilheah. Interesting Dark Ages coinage, pre Viking conquest of this area. NGC AU 50 on sale \$297.

c 900 AD Middle Age bronze cross from the Balkans, decorated with the Slavic Christ Crucified. With loop ready for wearing. \$247.

1279-1307 silver penny of Edward I of England, scarce York mint Obv: his facing bust Rev: long cross VF \$277.

1422c AD gold ducat of the Crusaders in the Levant, imitative of Venetian doge Danolo. Obv: Christ in Heaven Rev: doge kneeling before St Mark ANACS AU 55 \$677.

1478-1485 silver half lira, or Marcello from Venice, Italy Obv: Christ enthroned Rev: doge Giovanni Mocenigo kneeling before St. Mark VF, slight irregular \$377.

1493 silver bartroschen of Fridrich III of Saxony. Boldly dated to sides of helmet on reverse. Obv: bust of the Elector, raw Fine or better \$297.

1553M silver teston of Henry II of France Obv: his bust Rev: coat of arms NGC VF 20 even orig tone \$775.

Brass 10 cash, (45mm) or 1 candreen cast by Prince Gui, 1642-1662 AD, of the southern Ming rebels. After Peking fell to the invading Manchu, or Qing in 1644, the Ming royalty fled south to Canton and Yunnan. A haven in Burma was denied, and the Burmese turned Gui over to be executed by the Qing troops. EF, sometimes light earthen deposits \$97.

1645 silver 2 mark from Denmark King Christian IV. Obv: his crowned monogram Rev: tetragrammaton, Justus Judex VF, neat hole for suspension \$477.

Brass 10 cash, Hsing Chao, c. 1645 of the Southern Ming rebels EF \$97.

Brass 5 cash (36mm) of Prince Gui EF, as cast by mint, superb originality \$97.

1782-1799 AD tiny gold fanam of Tipu Sultan, "the lion of Mysore" in northwest India and Pakistan. This Muslim ruler committed many atrocities against Christians during 4 wars which gave the British problems. Aided by French engineers, Tipu was an early user of solid fuel rockets in battle.
