15-26 AD bronze prutah of Valerius Gratus, as procurator of **Judaea**, appointed by Tiberius Caesar of Rome. Obv: barley stalk Rev: Tib case monogram in wreath. NGC fine, sand patina \$67.

14-37 AD silver denarius of the 3rd of the 12. Obv: laureate bust of Tiberius Rev: his mother Livia enthroned. Also famous as the "**Tribute Penny**" of the Bible. NGC Fine \$477. NGC Ch VF pg \$977. NGC VF \$700. Raw VF, slight defects \$497.

14-37 AD gold aureus of Tiberius, the so called "**Tribute penny in gold**" featuring the exact designs of the silver coin most commonly described as a "Tribute penny". He is also the Third of the Twelve Caesars NGC Ch XF, edge marks \$4977.

24AD silver **half shekel** of Tyre, the exact amount due the temple in Jerusalem as annual payment from every male Jew. One of the reasons there were money changers in the temple. NGC Ch VF \$775, another Raw 76-75 BC superb Abt Unc \$1977.

29-30 AD silver shekel of Tyre, or "**thirty pieces of silver**" type paid to Judas for the Betrayal. Dated to the year of his crucifixion. NGC ch VF uncleaned \$2700. Another, c 90 BC big flan Tyre mint raw VF \$877. Another c 26 AD VG/VF \$477.

37-44 AD bronze prutah of Herod Agrippa, Roman appointed king of Judaea Obv: 3 barley ears Rev: royal umbrella. The New Testament describes his public appearance in silver or mirrored robes, proclaiming his divinity. An **angel of the Lord** struck him down, and he died 3 days later for his affront to God. VF \$57.

54-68 AD silver tetradrachm from Antioch, in the Roman East Obv: laureate bust of the infamous **Nero** Rev: eagle on thunderbolt raw VF+ \$297.

68 AD silver denarius of **Galba** Obv: his bare head Rev: accolades in wreath ANACS VF 30 old toning \$1775.

79-81 AD brass sestertius of Titus, **destroyer of Jerusalem**, Rome mint, Obv: his laureate bust Rev: PAX Fine, full letters, patchy patina \$277.

81-96 AD silver denarius of **Domitian**, as Caesar Obv: his laureate bust Rev: flaming altar with garland NGC AU \$477. Another denarius, Rev: helmet on altar NGC XF \$297.

97 AD brass sestertius of Nerva, **96-98 AD**, first of the Adoptive emperors. Obv: his laureate bust in fine style Rev: Libertas standing. NGC CH VF", wonderful smooth **jade green patina**, which is a lot rarer than many Roman collectors realize, due to the huge number of tooled and repatinated with epoxy sesterces coming from Bulgaria. \$3277.

96-98 AD gold aureus of Nerva Obv: his aged, laureate bust Rev: clasped hands in front of legion standards, celebrating Nerva's accord with the military NGC Ch XF fine style \$29,700.

96-98 AD silver cistophorus (3 denarii) of **Nerva**, Ephesus mint in Asia Minor Obv: his laureate bust Rev: Nerva in temple being crowned by goddess NGC Ch VF \$1977

98-117 AD gold aureus of **Trajan**, 2nd of the Adoptive Emperors. Rome mint, 107 AD Obv: his laureate and draped bust Rev: Ceres standing, holding grain ears and long torch. ANACS EF 45 \$7750.

98-117 AD silver denarius of Trajan Obv: his bust Rev: his column celebrating his Dacian war victories, which still stands in the forum today in Rome Raw Fine+ \$277.

177-192 AD brass sestertius of **Commodus**, anti-hero of the movie "Gladiator" Obv: his laureate bust Rev: Victory advancing, carrying trophy of armour Raw VF+ nice brown surfaces \$397.

190 AD silver drachm of Osroes II, Parthian king controlling the Silk Road to China Obv: his crowned bust Rev: Arsaces I seated, holding bow. Crude style NGC Ch AU \$377.

100-500 AD large well made silver fibula, ie, toga pin worn by Romans at their shoulder. \$977.

208-228 AD silver drachm of Vologases VI Obv: his bust with huge crown Rev: Arsaces holding bow NGC Mint State \$977

235-238 AD brass sestertius of Maximinus, a **Thracian giant** and general who became emperor Obv: his laureate and cuirassed bust Rev: goddess of the soldier's loyalty, holding legionary standards Raw EF, flan not round, as struck \$377. Another VF, heavy, rough patina \$197. Another, Pax reverse VF/ Fine rough surfaces \$127.

Silver denarius of Maximinus I NGC MS \$977.

235-238 AD brass sestertius of Maximus Caesar, son and heir of Maximinus Obv: bare headed, draped bust of the youth Rev: Maximus standing near standards, holding scepter and spear. Raw EF, slightly rough black patina \$775.

244-249 AD silver double denarius of Philip I Obv: his radiate bust Rev: Philip on horseback NGC AU \$177.

269 AD bronze double denarius of the emperor general victrinus, Gallic mint Obv: his radiate and cuirassed bust Rev: Pietas standing ANACS EF 40 \$97. NGC XF \$97.

270-275 AD silvered double denarius of Aurelian Obv: his radiate and cuirassed bust Rev: Victory presenting wreath to Aurelian ICG MS 61 sale \$127.

276-282 AD billon (silvered) double denarius of Probus Obv: his radiate and draped bust Rev: Jupiter presenting Victory to Probus ICG MS 62 \$197.

283-284 AD bronze double denarius of Numerian NGC VF \$97.

283-285 AD bronze double denarius of Magna Urbica, wife and empress of Carinus, sister in law of Numerian Obv: her diademed, draped bust Rev: Venus Victrix Rare, EF dark patina \$577.

307-337 AD bronze reduced nummus of Constantine I the Great, Lugdunum mint Obv: his laureate and cuirassed bust Rev: radiate Sol, the sun god, standing, holding globe NGC AU \$97.

393-423 AD gold solidus of Honorius, Milan mint Obv: his diademed and robed bust Rev: his foot on a barbarian ICG AU 58 \$1477.

400-450 AD, time of King Arthur. These cut down good silver siliqua of the previous Roman occupation in Britain have the old noman cut off. Only found in Britain, these are the closest possible coins of the round table in Camelot. EF \$187. VF \$127. Abt Unc \$277.

450-457 AD gold solidus of Marcian, Constantinople mint Obv: his armoured and helmeted bust facing, spear over shoulder Rev: angel holding long cross NGC Ch Unc \$1977.

457-474 AD gold solidus of Leo I, Constantinople mint Obv: his armoured and helmeted facing bust, spear over shoulder Rev: angel holding long cross NGC MS \$1775.

518-527 AD gold solidus of Justin I, Constantinople mint. Obv: his helmeted, armoured bust facing, spear over shoulder Rev: angel holding long cross and globus cruciger NGC MS scarce grade, scarce ruler \$1775.
