Prevent Parasitic Zoonotic Disease

Owning a pet can be a wonderful, rewarding experience for you and your family. However, pets can transmit diseases that may be harmful to humans - especially young children and people who are immunocompromized. These are called zoonotic diseases or zoonoses.

The three most common zoonotic internal parasites in pets are roundworms, hookworms, and tapeworms. Children can become infected by playing in soil, grass or sand that is contaminated with fecal matter and then putting their hands or contaminated objects in their mouths. Hookworm larvae can cause human gastrointestinal disease and blindness. Because intestinal parasite eggs and larvae are virtually everywhere in the environment, routine fecal exams, deworming of your pet and preventative steps are important. Protect you family and pets by:

- Parasite control given orally or applied to your pet monthly or as recommended by your veterinarian. This includes Revolution for cats, Heartgard Plus, Interceptor, Sentinel, or Advantage Multi for dogs. Use year round to remove intestinal parasites and prevent further contamination of the environment. Other strategic worm medications may be used based on fecal testing results.
- Practice good hygiene. Wash hands after handling pets or cleaning up pet waste.
- Remove pet droppings from your yard and clean cat litter boxes daily.
- Wash all fruits and vegetables thoroughly before eating.
- Keep pets flea-free. Ingestion of fleas can transmit tapeworms to animals and people.
- Do not allow children to go barefoot, sit or lie on playgrounds or in parks where they are exposed to animal feces.
- Have your pet's stool sample checked at regular intervals.

These recommendations follow the guidelines of the Companion Animal Parasite Counsel and the Center for Disease Control.

If you have an after hours or weekend emergency problem with your pet, please do not delay in calling the Columbus Veterinary Emergency Service (CVES) at 614-846-5800. Alternately, you may call the Capital Veterinary Referral and Emergency Center at 614-870-0480. Both are open 24 hours, 7 days a week. Questions for Suburban that need a return call the following day may be left at 614-276-5479. Please follow the prompts.



10 Situations That Require Immediate Veterinary Care

- 1. TRAUMA: Even if your pet is conscious, walking, and seems to be fine after a fall or heavy blow, unseen internal injures can be life threatening. Only a thorough exam can ensure that your pet is okay after trauma.
- 2. BLEEDING: Any bleeding from a cut, bite wound, puncture or orifice that continues, or can't be stopped by applying pressure, needs urgent attention.
- 3. BLOATING: A hard distended or bloated abdomen can signal a dangerous gastric condition. Seek care without DELAY!
- 4. DIFFICULT ELIMINATION: Inability to urinate or straining to eliminate can mean that your pet has a urinary blockage that needs immediate treatment.
- 5. VOMITING: Uncontrolled vomiting or continuous refusal to eat and drink can lead to serious dehydration, which needs to be treated promptly.
- 6. POISON: If you believe your pet has eaten a toxic substance such as rat poison, insecticide, medication or antifreeze, seek immediate help. Save the sample of the poison and its packaging, if possible.
- 7. SEIZURES: Prolonged convulsions, or those that occur repeatedly, need immediate attention.
- 8. BURNS/SHOCKS: All serious burns require medical care, as do electric shocks, such as from power cords.
- 9. SWELLING: Swelling in any part of the body, but particularly in the head, neck or eyes, should be checked at once.
- 10. DISORIENTATION: Sudden disorientation, lameness or unsteadiness on the feet are all trouble signs. If your pet displays any of these symptoms, call right away.
