Chronic Renal (kidney)
Disease (CRD)
is a common problem in older cats. Once

started, kidneys do not regenerate and the disease progresses.

The most telling symptoms associated with kidney disease are increased thirst and urination, As the condition progresses, your cat may experience loss of appetite, vomiting, and weight loss. It is important to know that kidney disease starts some time before symptoms appear.

In CRD, the kidneys scar and become smaller and less efficient at filtering toxins from the blood and preserving water balance for the body.

This is why our annual Wellness Blood & Urine Profiles are so important. They can detect kidney disease even before outward signs exist.

Our goals for treatment are to maintain water and mineral balance, keep blood waste product levels down, prevent anemia, and control secondary infections.

Diet, fluid therapy, and mineral balance all play a role in how well the cat does. In advanced cases, we may suggest IV-fluid therapy in the hospital as an initial treatment.

We will also teach owners to treat at home with fluids under the skin for ongoing care.

We will monitor blood values such as potassium, calcium, and phosphorus to

ensure that they stay at optimal levels. Hormones, antacids, appetite stimulants, and antibiotics may also be used in a patient with CRD. The goal of our therapy is to help our cats live an extended but happy

and comfortable life, even with advancing kidney disease.

Early recognition is the key to the best outcomes. Our Wellness Blood & Urine profiles are the best way to detect CRD early.
