Edibles



Our society's experimentation with marijuana, both medical and recreational, has

resulted in some unwanted problems with our pets as well as children.

Edibles are food substances that are infused with the active ingredients in marijuana, known as cannabinoids. Most edibles are dessert-like treats such as brownies, candy, or lollipops that dogs find very attractive. The problem is that dogs can easily eat multiple treats resulting in doses that are well beyond toxic. Chocolate can also be toxic to dogs, so they may present with both issues at once.

Affected dogs are generally very lethargic but may be agitated, dribble urine, and often cannot walk. Seizures or coma can be seen.

Treatment for such dogs includes induction of vomiting or stomach pumping if the ingestion was recent, activated charcoal to absorb toxins from the intestines, IV fluids to help the elimination of toxins and support organ function, and close monitoring of heart rate, blood pressure, etc. At times, advanced procedures like intravenous emulsified lipids or intubation and assisted ventilation may be required.

If there are edibles in your household, please be sure that they are stored and treated like the serious medication that they are.
