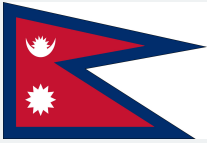


TPS HOLDERS FROM HONDURAS AND NEPAL **REMAIN IN STATUS**

On May 10, 2019, DHS issued a notice in the Federal Register that implemented a court approved settlement extending TPS status and work permission from June 24, 2019 **through March 24, 2020 for TPS holders from Nepal**. TPS holders challenged the termination of TPS for Honduras and Nepal in the lawsuit *Bhattarai v. Nielsen*. A settlement in that lawsuit protects TPS holders from these 2 countries whose status and work authorization would otherwise expire.

This Federal Register Notice does not impact Honduran TPS holders who remain in status until January 5, 2020.

Timeline: What happens next?



For Nepalese TPS Holders:

- Current expiration: March 24, 2020
- The May 10, 2019 Federal Register Notice grants a 9-month **auto-extension** of TPS status and work authorization **through March 24, 2020**. **No application or filing fee is required.**



For Honduran TPS Holders:

- Current expiration: January 5, 2020
- DHS will issue a Federal Register Notice by November 21, 2019 granting a 9-month extension of TPS status and work authorization for Honduran TPS holders – **through October 5, 2020**.

Extensions for Honduras and Nepal assume that there is no final decision in another TPS lawsuit involving 4 other TPS designated countries, *Ramos v. Nielsen*. We will provide more information on TPS extensions after the court rules in the appeal on the *Ramos v. Nielsen* case.

Other things TPS holders from Nepal should know and do:

01 Carry proof of TPS status

It's important to keep proof that you have TPS status with you. Keep a copy of your employment authorization card and the May 10 Federal Register Notice with you. You can download a copy at iAmerica.org/tps

02 Talk to your union rep if you have one

If you belong to a union, talk to your union rep to help you with employer questions about work authorization.

03 Find out if you qualify for another type of immigration status.

Many TPS holders have been in the U.S. for years and may be eligible for other types of immigration status and benefits. To see a partial list of possible immigration options use the checklist at iAmerica.org/TPS and then consult with a reputable immigration attorney or legal services organization. 04 Know Your Rights! You have rights under the U.S. Constitution

05 Get reputable legal help.

Find reputable immigration attorneys and legal services organizations at iAmerica.org/legalhelp. Avoid scammers who claim to be able to help you.

06 Take action and make your voice heard!
