If your closet is stuffed to the max yet you have nothing to wear, it's time to give Lovely. a try. The new boutique in Uhrichsville, opened this year by longtime friends Betty Quillen and Amanda McDaniel, both of Gnadenhutten, focuses on helping their customers build a versatile capsule wardrobe.

Capsule wardrobes are described as small, clutter-free wardrobes of comfortable pieces that can be mixed or matched to make many different outfits. The basic pieces are ones that never go out of style. Lovely. also has added a line of flair pieces to pair with the basic pieces that are more in line with current trends.

The two women had separately been thinking about opening a clothing store when they connected on a phone call on March 2. Quillen had been considering going into the clothing business for at least a year

"I could tell that she was thinking of something new, and she's like, well, a boutique of sorts. I was like shut up. We need to have a conversation. We got on the phone that night," Quillen

The two discovered their ideas for a boutique business were the same.

"It was just very obvious to us that God was bringing those two dreams together. Because as often as we talk and see each other, we never talked about a boutique until that night," Quillen said.

Their phone call occurred March 2, and by March 17 they were signing a lease.

"We just jumped in," Quillen said.

They had their first online clothing launch on April 18. Customers can choose to come into the store during certain hours for pickup or have their order shipped.

Plans are to open the store for regular hours in October when they've had a chance to build up their inventory.

The two women said they've been fortunate with getting quality clothing into the store.

"It's challenging when you're buying, especially if it's your first experience with a brand. It's kind of sight unseen," Quillen said. 'We will eventually start going to shows where we can get to know the vendors a little better, but we've had really good luck so far."

For the capsule pieces, items need to be high-quality, longer lasting pieces, and the women are happy with what they've found.

"It's all about reusing those everyday basics in new and creative ways. When you can vary, you get a lot more wear out of your clothing. It's more of an investment," McDaniel said. "Whenever you are doing a capsule wardrobe, a lot of times you're going to pay a little bit more for the jeans. You're going to pay a little bit more for the jacket and the T-shirt because it's a better quality. It's something that you're going to keep reincorporating in new and fun ways."

Another plus of having a capsule wardrobe is it's a time-saver.

"When you go into your closet, everything goes together, so it makes getting dressed a lot easier and less time-consuming," Quillen

While many add to their wardrobes when the mood strikes, it's better to plan what you want to buy so all the pieces complement each

other.
"That's really the ultimate goal," McDaniel said. "I think I used to be somebody who would just kind of buy things very sporadically, randomly, and then I would get it home and it would sit there."

The women do Facebook Live one Monday evening each month to launch their capsule pieces. Then the other Mondays, they launch flair pieces.

'The flair is going to be kind of the personality of your closet. A lot of people, when they think of a capsule wardrobe, they think that's boring," Quillen said. "The flair is what makes your capsule really come alive. And so that's where vou come in with a little bit of color or a fun T-shirt or graphic T or a trendier top that you might only wear for a season or two, but it's what really makes that basic blazer stand out. It pulls

everything together and personalizes it.'

Lovely. has gotten a lot of positive feedback from people who aren't familiar with a capsule wardrobe or others who like some of the individual pieces. They heard from one customer in particular who took a leap of faith based on their advice.

Until they open for regular hours in October, they intend to have some pop-up openings throughout the summer. Watch their Facebook page for more information. For the month of September, they will have clothing available at a new venue, the Yellow Brick on 39, which is near the Norma Johnson Center.

On their Facebook Live shows, the women show different ways to wear pieces and dress them up or down. Since they began selling online, Lovely. has customers from as far away as Wisconsin. Others have ordered from Pennsylvania and Illinois.

Lovely, and another business, Command Wellness, share a location to save on costs as they couldn't have afforded to rent the space by themselves. Lovely. is located 202 E. Third St. in Uhrichsville.

Gnadenhutten Fireworks Festival moves downtown

This is the last year for Fireworks Festival organizer Hope Johnson and most of her committee to put on the yearly July festival. They are looking for new committee members to continue the tradition and grow the event.

Unfortunately, that wasn't the biggest news about this year's festival, which is set for July 1-2. Additional activities are scheduled June 29 at 7 p.m. when the festival queen, Jr. Miss Firecracker, and Little Miss Firecracker contest is held at Indian Valley

High School and on July 3 when a community church service will be held at the town hall at 10:30 a.m.

A derecho storm brought sustained straight-line winds devastating the area in the early hours of Tuesday June 14 and changed everything. The winds of a derecho travel at least 58 miles per hour and have been recorded as a fast as 130 miles per hour, which is as much as a tornado.

Still, organizers wanted the Fireworks Festival to go on because there was one important thing to remember.

"We're really working hard to organize the festival to the square because we have something to celebrate. No one was hurt or killed." Johnson said.

With the move though the car show will not be held this year.

After 19 years of helping to organize the festival, it was an accident at her home where Johnson injured her arm that caused her to step down.

"It was the final decision. I need to hand this off. We need new ideas, new ways to make money. It'll be fine," Johnson said. "There are lot of people out there in Gnaden that can do this. It's just my time."

Johnson is willing to help a new committee get started. She will still also remain active in the Lion's Club and their activities in the village. Anyone interested in serving on the committee can call 740-254-9530. The committee is a total volunteer organization.

In moving this year's festival to the square, changes had to be made. Bingo will be held on the lawn of the town hall and the chicken barbecue will take place on the porch of the Community Savings Bank.

One of the things, Johnson is looking forward to is the auction. Karen Westhafer created a quilt made of T-shirts from all the Fireworks Festival shirts since the event began. Also, for sale at the auction will be crocks with a sunflower design by Jane Donahue, and some pottery items and bowls donated by artist Tom Radca.

With the change in location for the Fireworks Festival, the parade will now begin at Indian Valley High School on Walnut Street, it will turn onto Tuscarawas, then turn right on Lindon and turn left onto Main Street. The parade will

Village administrator Jeff Crites is the grand marshal of the parade this year. He is well known to Gnadenhutten residents and keeps them updated on projects in the village via social media.

"He does a lot for our community," Johnson said.

The parade entry fee is \$20, which goes to support the festival.

Funding for this year's festival has been good and new sponsors have been added.

"The monies have just come in and we're very appreciative," Johnson said.

"I honestly think people are realizing the importance of small communities and how fun this is. When people come in, and I say this is my last year, they're sad," Johnson said. "It's just that people look forward to this so much."

Trey Burke Skills Camp offered to kids

Dundee resident Keith Green knows it's rare for youth basketball players in rural areas like Tuscarawas, Carroll or Holmes counties to get the chance to meet an NBA player.

It's even more unlikely those kids will get to talk with and learn from a pro.

With that in mind, Green has organized the Trey Burke Skills Camp, which will be held at the Eastern Ohio Sports Complex in Sherrodsville July 9. The camp is for boys and girls who will enter fifth through ninth grade and runs from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The cost is \$95 per player and will include a T-shirt and lunch.

"I wanted to do this for the community," said Green, a Columbus native. "The kids around here have probably never seen a player like Trey Burke come through. I want the kids to get the experience of learning from an NBA player like Trey, who's also a great person. We will also have some great coaches on hand to work with the kids."

The 6-foot Burke is a point guard who recently completed his ninth season in the NBA, averaging 9.0 points a game and 3.1

assists. Burke played for school days in the 1980s. the Dallas Mavericks for the past three seasons, but versity player Trey Lewis, was traded to the Houston Rockets last week. He's also played for the Utah Jazz, Washington Wizards and New York Knicks.

As a collegian, Burke led Michigan to an NCAA Tournament runner-up finish in 2012-13 and earned NCAA Player of the Year honors. He was Ohio's Mr. Basketball in 2011 after his senior year at Columbus Northland High School.

Green also attended and played at Northland. He's been friends with Trey's dad, Benji, since their high

Former Louisville Unia Garfield Heights product who's been an international pro, will also be a guest speaker and instructor. Numerous coaches from area high schools will be on hand to help.

Green is doing a lot more for area youth than just setting up one basketball camp through his KEG Group LLC. He's active with Authentic Church, 201 Stonecreek Rd. NW, New Philadelphia and the operations manager for the Authentic Community sports program.

"We believe the church should be used all week, not just Sundays," Green said. "We have professional batting cages and a weight room in the church and have kids coming in Monday through Saturday.

"We're giving the youth and their families more opportunities to bring Christ into their lives."

Green is expecting a good turnout for the Trey Burke Skills Camp and said he would like to hold similar sports camps every summer.

"We really looking forward to the kids getting to meet Trey Burke," Green said. "Maybe next year we'll do a football camp with an NFL player. We'll try to bring one of the Browns' players down."



Art community comes together to complete new mural

Starlight Enterprises Inc. artists are learning much about painting as they work as part of a group on a new mural in downtown New Philadelphia. They are learning painting is not about perfection, but about working together.

SEI artist Stacy Urban was concerned she accidentally got a little paint outside the area she was working on.

According to SEI life coach art partner highlighted the Kelly McMullen, Urban lives to work on the mural projects.

Local artist Jon Stucky told her not to worry, and he came over to show her a few mistakes he had made by accidentally dripping paint on another spot.

purpose of the grant that was received to create the mural.

The grant was received from the Ohio Arts Council, and prior to receiving it, the Tuscarawas County Center for the Arts was invited to apply.

"They said only the most compelling applications would be considered. So they invited us to write a full grant application, which I was thrilled to do," said

Jeannine Kennedy, executive director of the TCCA. "They could fund either \$5,000, \$10,000 or \$15,000. I asked for \$15,000, and they fully funded us because they found value in the grant application. I think that it was the partnership between the arts community, volunteers and artists with special needs. The grant would be able to fund the total project. We also had the community's involvement because we had to get a business to offer us the wall."

The new mural is the south side of a storage building behind Mustard's Restaurant, which is owned by Tony and Rachel Montero.

"The county commissioners said that we could display the movable panels that we created as a mock-up for the large artwork here in their public spaces and other public spaces. So it was everybody — the community volunteers of all ages, an artists group and artists with special needs. The whole thing came together, and it's being done in the county seat, which is important for Tuscarawas County," Kennedy said.

Kennedy was thrilled to get the grant.

"All of the money is being spent either on paying the artists to do the work, buying some supplies to support Star-

light's Arts Initiative and then the materials to actually do the project," Kennedy said.

Kennedy stopped by recently to view the progress the artists had made.

"I think the project is coming together beautifully. I love the vibrancy of it. I love the fact that Starlight created all of the florals," Kennedy said. "Then Jon Stucky, who is the lead artist on this project, has been extremely valuable in his partnership with Starlight and the past projects that he's been able to do."

er pay for kids classes, to buy materials for kids classes, and then other things that the art center needs," Kennedy said.

Roehrenbeck was happy with the state of the arts in Tuscarawas County. He said other larger cities, like Cleveland and Columbus, do not have anything like the TCCA.

"They have galleries. They have museums, but they don't have community art centers in that they can host for guilds in the community, like the writers guild, the art guild, the fiber guild and the photography guild. They all meet there," Kennedy said. "The different kinds of grassroots support that we get from not only places like the Arts Council, but local businesses, foundations, corporations, our members, nickel and dime contributions, and large contributions — the people in our community have really stepped forward and supported this art center for the last 20 years."

Kennedy has been the executive director of the TCCA for most of that time.

"I've just been so blessed to be part of something that I know that is so good for our community," Kennedy said.



"We've not been able to have them in the past, because most of them by themselves don't have the staffing or the volunteers to come out for the entire festival. And we've not allowed someone to just come in for the day, or for a couple of hours; we wanted people to be there the entire festival," Croft said. "They will have the opportunity to talk to festivalgoers."

The two new activities are something Croft has wanted to do for a long time.

"Even if they're not there all the time, they'll have their information out," Croft said of using the festival as a way to help the community and as a way to

"To give the organizations a venue of opportunity to be able to talk to people that they might not otherwise get the chance to talk with and give the public the chance to talk with them because they're there and it's convenient. So, we're trying it this year. We're hoping hoping it works out," Croft said.

Skin cancer can be hereditary

Dear Savvy Senior.

Is skin cancer hereditary? My 63-year-old brother died of melanoma last year, and I'm wondering if I'm at higher risk.

Younger Sister Dear Younger,

While long-term sun exposure and sun burns are the biggest risk factors for melanoma — the deadliest form of skin cancer having a sibling or parent with melanoma does indeed increase your risk, according to the Skin Cancer Foundation.

Each year around 100,000 Americans are diagnosed with melanoma, and about 7,500 people will die from it. While anyone can get it, those most often diagnosed are Caucasians age 50 and older. And those with the highest risk are people with red or blond hair, blue or green eyes, fair skin, freckles, moles, a family history of skin cancer, and those who had blistering sun burns in their youth.

Skin exams

The best way you can guard against melanoma and other skin cancers basal and squamous cell carcinomas — is to protect yourself from the sun, and if you're over age 50, get a full-body skin exam done by a dermatologist every year, especially if you're high risk.

Self-examinations done every month or so also are a smart way to detect early problems. Using mirrors, check the front and back side of your entire body including the tops and under sides of your arms and hands. between your toes and the soles of your feet, your neck, scalp, and buttocks.

Be on the lookout for new growths, moles that have changed or sores that don't heal and follow the ABCDE rule when examining suspicious moles:

-Asymmetry: One half of a mole doesn't match the other. Border: The border is blurred or ragged.

-Color: The mole has uneven colors, often shades of brown, tan or black with patches of pink, red, white guarduv.com. You can even



—Diameter: The lesion is new or at least a quarter inch in diameter.

-Evolving: The mole is changing in size, shape or color.

For more self-examination tips and actual pictures of what to look for, visit www.SpotSkinCancer. org or use a skin cancer detection app like www. Miiskin.com, www. MoleMapper.org or www. SkinVision.com.

In the spring and summer, there are a variety of places that offer free skin cancer screenings, like the American Academy of Dermatology (www.spotskincancer.org) and the American Society for Dermatologic Surgery (www.asds. net/skincancerscreening. aspx), which offer screenings done by volunteer dermatologists across the U.S.

Sun protection

Even though you can't change your skin or family history, there are some proven strategies that can help you protect yourself.

For starters, when you go outside, put on broadspectrum SPF 30, waterresistant sunscreen, on both sunny and cloudy days. If you don't like the rub-on lotions, try the continuous spray-on sunscreens that are easier to apply and re-apply and less messy. Also, seek the shade when rays are most intense — between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.


You also can protect your skin by wearing a wide-brimmed hat and long sleeves and pants when possible. The best clothing options are tightly woven fabrics that help prevent the sun's rays from reaching your skin, or you can wash in an invisible shield sun protection into your clothes with SunGuard laundry additive. See www.sunclothing and hats that offer maximum UV protection in their fabric: www.Coolibar. com and www.SunPrecautions.com are two good sites that offer these products.

Treatments

If caught early, melanoma is nearly 100% curable. But if it's not, the cancer can advance and spread to other parts of the body where it becomes hard


