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Pair honored at Child Abuse Prevention event

For the first time in two years, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Wayne County Children Services Board and Voices for Children Committee returned to Grace Church to hold their 28th annual Child Abuse Prevention Luncheon in person.

The event, held each April during Child Abuse Prevention Month, brings awareness of the need for families and the community to work cohesively to prevent child abuse.

"There are three things we know about child abuse," Wayne County Children Services Executive Director Deanna Nichols-Stika said in her opening remarks. "First, it is preventable. Second, we know that child abuse happens in Wayne County. Third, we know there continues to be much more we need to do to ensure children are growing up safe in our community.'

Stika presented some statistics to nearly 400 people in attendance.

'In 2021, WCCS investigated 988 child abuse and neglect cases," she said. "These cases are more complex and denser with chal-

lenges than ever before. On the Year. March 31 of this year, there were 217 children receiving services from our agency including 28 children in our permanent custody awaiting their forever home."

Accepting awards for their work to prevent child abuse were detective Juan McCloud of the Wooster Police Department for the 2021 Law Enforcement Officer of the Year and Mental Health and Recovery Board Executive Director Judy Wortham Wood for the 2021 Child Advocate of

Charlie Hardman, retired sheriff department captain and Wooster Exchange Club member, introduced McCloud as an exceptional interviewer of adult suspects.

According to Hardman, he led an investigation involving a child with multiple broken bones. He also collected and combed through hundreds of pages of evidence, which ultimately led to charges being filed against the parents for the abuse.

The good news is that comprehensive behavioral the infant has fully recovered from the injuries and is doing fine," McCloud said. "I do this for those children that are unable to protect themselves. This is a team effort, and without this team in Wayne County, we wouldn't be able to accomplish what we have."

McCloud previously earned the award in 2004.

Wood has experience in the public and private sectors, being the deputy director of the Ohio Department of Mental Health and the chief executive of a system.

"I would like to thank you, but not just from me," Wood said. "I want to thank you on behalf of the people that work in the system of care across the multisystems. I appreciate all of them. This is one of the greatest honors that I have ever received because it is about the children who really, really need help. This system does such a wonderful job of saving lives."

As a federally funded and supported program, CAW/M's goal is to provide these services and opportunities to thousands of low-income individuals and families to improve their lives and generate a positive impact in Wayne, Medina and surrounding communities.

'Community Action offers many programs designed to support children and their caregivers even before a child is born,' CAW/M CEO James Fox said. "The Early Head Start program for children up to age 3 actually begins by working with mothers-to-be right in their homes, offering general parenting and wrap-around focus of help- a traditional preschool ment arrangement with nities." For all of the cur-

CAW/M staff members are able to work with parents and children and recognize and address any physical, social or emotional deficits before Head Start begins.

Head Start, the federally funded preschool program for children ages 3-5, ensures children have the skills they need to succeed before they transition to kindergarten.

program," Fox said. "Programs run from August through May, a traditional school year, with yearround programs offered in some instances.

As CEO of CAW/M, extended childcare and flexible options for families is one of Fox's priority initiatives.

"We have five-star ratings at all of our eight Head Start locations," Fox said. "This is a difficult achievement and something we are very proud of. Over 750 children and families are supported by these programs every year, but we know that we can do more to help families in need of childcare."

Early Head Start and Head Start are just the beginning of the programs and services available to the community at CAW/M. Economic assistance, housing assistance, home repairs and weatherization are all available for those who are eligible.

"Programs like the Home Energy Assistance Program assists with energy bills, and the Percentage of Income Payment Plus

'Whether it's your job, seeking healthcare or getting groceries, if you can't get there, you can't get the help you need," Fox said. "We have mechanics who work with us and help with car repairs so people can work and get where they need to go. Transportation is essential."

Fox would like to develop a transportation program that would get people anywhere around the greater area they need to be.

'People often don't seek help outside their immediate circle due to lack of transportation," Fox said.

WEDC chief: County economic outlook promising

The news is filled with information on rising prices, supply-chain disruptions and the labor shortage. However, the outlook for economic development in Wayne County is promising, according to Wayne Economic Development Council's new president, Maribeth Burns.

Wayne County's diversified economy has long been a factor in the county's economic resilience. But successful economic development does not usually happen without planning and strategic investment. WEDC has a history of success in incentivizing private investment in the county and encouraging public-private partner-

In June 2022 the WEDC board hired Burns, who previously was at the J.M. Smucker Company, where she rose to the level of vice president of public, state and local affairs.

"I was at Smuckers for over 30 years in various roles, starting with HR, corporate communications and most recently with government relations, and I focused on both state and local affairs," Burns said. "I served on the WEDC

board many years ago and came back on four years ago and was part of the executive committee. I always was involved in WEDC and had a fondness for the organization."

One of Burns' first priorities was building her team. First, Burns hired Cassie Slansky as director of economic development. Slansky most recently came from City of Cleveland in its department of economic development, and before that she focused on community development in Barberton.

Then Traci Carmony joined the team as the marketing expert. Carmony was manager of community relations for nearly 17 years at University of Akron Wayne College and then spent one year at OSU Mansfield before joining WEDC.

"I think that 2022 has really started off with a bang for Wayne County. We're going strong with the business community, and we have several expansion projects that are already on the way and have several others in the pipeline that will be announced soon," Burns recent interest in the Rit-

tman Industrial Park and the Wooster Innovation Park. And there are some new housing initiatives under way to address the issue of lack of housing supply in Wayne County."

Another story that has garnered media attention across Ohio is the Intel announcement about its upcoming \$20 billion investment for the semiconductor plant in Licksaid. "We have had a lot of ing County. Many have reached out to WEDC to

see if the Intel investment could be potential competition for Wayne County.

"Many see Intel as a potential competition with Wayne County, but we see it as an opportunity," Burns said. "We've had some inquiries about the Wayne County mega site, which is over 1,000 acres on Route 71 in West Salem, and we have been contacted by Intel suppliers about potential use of that site. Plus, we may

have businesses that could be a supplier to Intel or a supplier to a supplier."

Burns said filling open job vacancies does continue to be a challenge for businesses in Wayne County, and WEDC is developing multiple strategies to support businesses with workforce retention and attraction.

'We do want to keep the workforce that we can in Wayne County," she said. "That's the numberone thing that has been an issue with our business community — that there are so many positions open that employers can't fill."

The first step toward addressing that need is to revamp the Work in Wayne website, which is an online resource for employees considering moving to Wayne County. Burns' goal is to have a complete database on the Work in Wayne website that links to Wayne County jobs on the OhioMeansJobs website. The website also will provide information on business sectors and quality of life in the county.

Burns also has worked with her team to implement tools in the economic development tool kit still early in the process,' that have been previously

underutilized, a key example being the Community Reinvestment Area.

Mayor Dennis Finley of Dalton said the village received significant help from WEDC and the county on getting the CRA established for Dalton earlier this year.

"I believe we are the first CRA in any Wayne County village. We already have an auto parts store, bank, newspaper, and we have some decent businesses that are already here. We were looking for a way to incentivize new businesses to come in and complement our existing businesses," Finley said.

Finley said with a CRA, if a new or existing business in the region designated as the CRA were to make improvements to the building that increase the property value, that business gets a 50% tax abatement for 10 years on the net increase. The boundaries on Dalton's CRA are along the village main street and then along Mill Street.

Keeping car clean not just cosmetic

The first things to come to mind when many people ponder vehicle maintenance are oil changes and routine tune-ups. Though each of those things are vital components of automotive maintenance, it's important that drivers recognize the value of a thorough car wash as well.

routine car washes is they can prevent damage related to seasonal issues. For example, individuals who live in regions where winter snowfall is common may routinely drive on roads that have been salted. Deicing the roads makes driving safer, but salt can accumulate on the undercarriage of the vehicle and contribute to corrosion. Winter may not be a time many drivers visit the car wash, but it's important to do so after snow has melted and salt on the roadways has been washed away by rain. Most car washes now offer high-pressure undercarriage treatments that can wash off salt and prevent corrosion and the formation of rust.

But it's not just the exterior of the car that can benefit from routine washing. When taking their cars to get washed, many motorists pay a little extra to have their vehicle interiors cleaned. Sometimes referred to as "interior detailing," cleaning the

cabin of the car helps to maintain the interior so it looks new longer. Routine interior cleaning also can remove dust and other particles that can serve as irritants if allowed to build up over time.

Resale and trade-in value is another factor to consider. The average transaction price for a used vehicle in the second quarter of 2021 was \$25,410, which marks a 21 percent increase over the year prior. Much has been made of the microchip issues that have compromised auto manufacturers' ability to produce new automobiles, and that led many motorists to the preowned vehicle market. Dealerships also offered incentives to drivers willing to trade in their late model cars. By taking care of a vehicle's interior, drivers are putting themselves in position to capitalize on the increased reliance on the preowned market. Prospective buyers, whether they're private citizens or dealerships, will see more value in a vehicle with a well-maintained interior than one with a cabin that's seen much better days.

Downtown Wooster Farmers' Market opens May 14

Community. "That's a word I really associate with Main Street Wooster and our beautiful downtown," Main Street Wooster program manager Guinevere Steensen said.

Along with managing the Main Street Music series and Second Saturday, Steensen is the new manager of the Downtown Wooster Farmers' Market.

A Wooster tradition for 20 years, the farmers market will open for the season on Saturday, May 14. The downtown Saturday gathering is all about community — an opportunity for residents to meet, greet and socialize. It also provides a regular marketplace for local farmers and food producers to showcase and sell their wares.

"Eating locally and supporting local farmers supports our local economy and strengthens the community," Steensen said.

This year the market roster thus far boasts 24 vendors. The market will include naturally grown and certified organic vegetables, flowers that are both edible and decorative, herbs, goat milk, skin care, teas, breads, bagels, keto-friendly and regular baked goods, berries, lavender products, honey, hot sauce, mushrooms, dog treats, meats, and poultry and eggs. There also will be live music weekly at the markets, provided by an array of local musicians.

Second Saturdays will occur on the second Saturday of the month, beginning in June. On these dates market hours will be extended to include local artisan vendors and wine tastings with local wineries.

Steensen said there are numerous downtown coffee shops within a few blocks of the market. "We want people coming down to support these businesses," she

said. "It's the same reasoning with food trucks. We have so many great restaurants."

Steensen said the summer also will bring the Main Street Music series to downtown Wooster. According to Steensen, on most Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays, there will be free music underneath

the pavilion on the square beginning at 6 p.m.

"I'm booking a variety of musicians so everyone will be able to find something they like," she said. "I love giving local talent a stage to share their music. Get some takeout from one of our downtown restaurants, a DORA beverage, and grab a seat for

some good tunes."

The Downtown Wooster Farmers' Market runs weekly, rain or shine, on the northeast corner of the square in downtown Wooster on Saturdays through Oct. 8. Hours on the second Saturday of the month are 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. All other Saturdays are 8 a.m. to noon. On May 21 and Oct. 1, the market moves to South Walnut Street between Liberty and West South Street due to other downtown events.

The Downtown Wooster Farmers' Market is presented by Main Street Wooster with the support of primary sponsor E&H Ace Hardware, along with Smile Doctors and Briggs Financial Group.

All music presented downtown is provided in partnership with the City of Wooster.

"To me downtown Wooster really is the heart of this beautiful place we call home," Steensen said.



Work on SR 83 will mean lane closures


State Route 83, from just south of U.S. 30 to Wooster's Milltown Road, will have daily lane closures for the removal and replacement of all existing full-depth pavement, shoulder widening, and ramp improvements, and the roadway curvature on state Route 83 northbound, south of state Route 3 interchange, will be modified to improve sight distance.

The state Route 3/83 northbound exit ramp to state Route 3 (Cleveland Road) will be closed for 45 days, starting May 2, to rebuild the ramp with full-depth concrete pavement removal and replacement. The detour route for northbound motorists will be to continue north on state Route 3/83 to state Route 604, east on state Route 604 to state Route 3, and



south on state Route 3. The estimated completion date is June 16.

Traffic will be maintained in one lane in each direction at all times. The state Route 3 southbound ramp to state Route 83 south is closed, but traffic will still be able to turn right at the stop sign located at the end of the straight-legged portion of the ramp and will be able to continue southbound on state Route 83. Motorists are still able to go northbound or southbound onto state Route 83 from the state Route 3 entrance



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How to prepare your landscapes

New plants can add much to a landscape. Whether they're replacing plants that are no longer thriving or being added to supplement an existing landscape, new plants are an affordable way to give a home's exterior a whole new look.

Much consideration is given to which plants to add to a landscape. That's understandable, as homeowners want to choose plants that will thrive and won't compromise the health of surrounding plants and trees. Before planting or even choosing plants, it's important to plan for new additions to a landscape. Preparing the landscape can inform homeowners about which plants to purchase and can ensure they thrive after planting.

Document sunlight exposure

Plants have different needs, and one of the biggest differences between species is the amount of sunlight they need to thrive. Plants characterized as "full sun" require six or more hours of sunlight per day while those considered "partial sun" need between four and six hours of sunlight per day. Plants designated as "partial shade" need two to four hours of sun per day while "shade" plants need less than two hours of sunlight a day.

Documenting sunlight exposure in advance gives homeowners an idea of which plants should be



planted and where they should be planted. Jot down these observations in a journal over several weeks and then choose plants that will thrive in each area.

Test the soil

A soil pH test is a simple and quick way to determine the acidity of soil. Soil pH levels will indicate how likely a plant is to thrive in a given spot. High levels won't necessarily mean an area should be avoided, as some plants thrive in acidic soils. Additional soil tests can determine other characteristics such as the nutrient levels of soil and the amount of organic matter it contains. Each of these variables can help homeowners make the right choices as they introduce new plants to their properties.

Consider local wildlife

If local wildlife makes its presence known on a property, homeowners may want to take proactive steps prior to planting anything new. A new fence might prevent animals like deer from getting in, but that likely won't do much to repel smaller animals like squirrels, rabbits or foxes. If wildlife is a concern, homeowners can seek advice at

their local garden center about which plants certain animals are likely to ignore. Homeowners who want to attract wildlife can do the same in reverse, choosing plants wildlife will be drawn to. Homeowners who want to deter wildlife should erect fencing or other barriers prior to planting.

Clear space if necessary

Plants grow up and out, and cramped quarters can make it hard for new plants to thrive. Some may thrive but only at the expense of other plants. If necessary, clear space prior to planting to ensure plants have ample space to grow.

Some preplanting landscape preparation can ensure new plants thrive.

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3-D printer lending library a hands-on opportunity

Under the auspices of The Romich Foundation, a new lending library has been formed to loan 3-D printers to Wayne County residents of all ages who are interested in a hands-on opportunity to learn more about the printers and how they work.

Izabel Meshew, a sophomore at Norwayne High School, is managing the new program. After becoming more and more involved in the STEAM program at her school, Meshew met Barry Romich on a school trip late in 2021 to look at a laser engraver in use at Smithville High School.

We got to chatting, and he gave me his business card," Meshew said.

In January she reached out to Romich to discuss the work he does with 3-D printing and laser engraving. "We chatted about my future," Meshew said, "and on the way home, I realized that I had just gotten a job."

Romich knew of 80 laptop computers that were about to be recycled at the PRC-Saltillo Company in Wooster and decided he and Meshew could repurpose the outdated gear for use with 3-D printers and the new lending library was born.

'The idea of the library,"

Meshew said, "is for adults as well as kids to be able to explore the world of 3-D printing. Anyone can get a chance to use the software and materials at no cost."

She said the library provides a beginning experience one that can potentially lead an individual on a path toward a new hobby or career.

Romich created the first prototype of the 3-D printer kits the library now lends and gave it to Meshew to try. "I was the guinea pig," she said. "From there we created a user manual that's now included in every kit."

The manual takes users through the entire process of using the printer.

Each kit contains everything needed to set up and create 3-D printed items either original creations or using templates that can be found online. Included among the items in the complete kit are two stands, one for the computer and one for filament. These were designed by Romich using PVC pipe. Students in the multihandicapped classroom at Norwayne High School then helped by assembling all the stands.

"We heard they had a blast," Meshew said.

Right now the library is looking for hosts — places

that will be clearing houses for connecting interested community members with a kit to borrow. A host site may be anywhere, from a school, to a library, to a historical society or makerspace. The options are open. Currently, Meshew is reaching out to all the middle schools in Wayne County to determine their interest in hosting.

Host sites will be tasked with locating individuals interested in borrowing a kit, checking out the materials, and then cleaning and prepping returned kits to be loaned out again. Each kit is valued at \$370, and those checking one out are required to sign

a waiver taking on financial responsibility for any lost or

So Rupp came up with the idea of making earrings on a 3-D printer. He found a paw print pattern online that fit with the Norwayne mascot and made a few pairs. With the help of social media, the earrings have been selling, and Rupp has become a 3-D printer entrepreneur.

"Ultimately, it started with Barry," Melissa Rupp said, "with Mason being exposed to learning how to use the printer."

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Meech leaving Smithville with his character intact

A few thoughts from the week in sports ...

Senior Luke Meech was on pace to become one of the best two-sport athletes in recent memory at Smith-

The 6-foot-3 Meech scored seven touchdowns in football as a sophomore and then averaged 15 points a game in basketball.

Meech had it all — size, speed, athleticism, smarts and good genetics. His dad Scott and mom Lorah (Way) were both basketball players at The College of Wooster.

No one could have known 10th grade would be the athletic high point for Meech, who would go on to tear the ACL in his knees three times.

Counting a torn ACL suffered playing AAU basketball in eighth grade and a torn meniscus as a freshman, Meech had five knee surgeries. Those are statistics I hope no one would wish for their worst enemy.

Meech's final ACL tear came this past July while working out with a trainer. It cost him his entire senior year of athletics.

However, the character that was revealed in how Meech responded left many in the Smithville community in awe.

"Luke tore his ACL four different times (three times on left knee) during his high school career," said Corey Kauffman, who coached the Smithies basketball team this past winter. "Luke never complained in practice or made the situation about himself.

"During each period of rehab, his medical team always remarked about his toughness and drive. His persistence, selflessness and maturity have been a model for each of our players."

Kauffman said, "Luke made the Smithies a better



team and strengthened our culture even without him on the floor."

Despite not playing a single play in football or a minute in basketball, Meech was selected to earn one of the Roy Bates Foundation's eight prestigious \$2,500 scholarships.

The award is based on character, academics and athletics and was founded by legendary coach and broadcaster Roy Bates, who died at age 88 in 2004. The scholarship fund he set up has doled out approximately \$430,000 in its 29 years.

I'm proud to be a longtime member of the Bates Scholarship committee. Meech may be the first of the 200-plus scholarship winners who didn't play a sport as a senior, but in learning his story, the committee felt he was a deserving award winner.

Meech excelled in the classroom with a 3.8 GPA, which ranked 12th in a class of 84. He's been accepted into the University of Cincinnati's prestigious mechanical engineering

The manner in which Meech bounced back after each surgery, both physically and mentally, was arguably more impressive than anything he could have done on the field or court.

Meech helped in any way he could during basketball practices and sat on the bench during games.

During the football season, he made regular appearances at practices and during games helped lead the student section cheering from the stands.

"Luke had great physical attributes, but his smarts really set him apart as a football player," Smithies head football coach Phil Olsen said. "A lot of guys might have become bitter after all he went through and maybe not come around the team much, but Luke still really supported us.

"I know it must have been humbling for him to sit in the stands, but that really meant a lot to the team and me to have him as a mainstay leading the cheers."

There will always be some sadness thinking about missed opportunities, but Meech is long past wondering "why me?"

"The last injury hurt the most because I realized I'd miss my senior year, but the best way to deal with it was staying around my teammates," Meech said. One of my physical therapists said he'd been through a similar injury. He told me, 'If you isolate yourself, that's how you become really down.' I've actually come to realize some blessings from it."

Five knee surgeries and Meech sees blessings?

"During my junior year when I tore my ACL, my younger brother, Aaron, actually tore his in the exact same week," Meech said. "We went through that together, and I was able to help him through the rehab.

'When it came to academics, I really made it a priority to get into an elite college program. I'm excited to be going into chemical engineering at Cincinnati. I don't think I'd have been able to do that if I'd been playing two sports all along.

Meech had all of his surgeries at the Crystal Clinic in Akron and rehabbed each time at Wooster's Health-

"My family and I discussed switching doctors or physical therapists, but even though I kept having recurring injuries, we didn't think it was anything they were doing wrong," Meech

"My mom and dad were always there for me and never pushed me to try to come back," Meech said. "They always said it was my decision.'

Meech hopes to recover his knees to the point where he can shoot hoops and play in some intramural games in college.

Here's hoping Meech's knees will hold up so he can have some fun again on the court. No one's worried about his character; it's as strong as they come.

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


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He is one of a kind, and now the last of his line

On its surface, Jordan Baker's analysis, taken from the third chapter of what many believe remains the Great American Novel. rings a little false or, at least, runs contrary to common sense.

But I think I understand her logic.

Big gatherings — wedding receptions and class reunions, for example carry with them the promise of secluded corners where, far from prying eyes and busy ears, there exists something akin to the "Cone of Silence." a device made famous in TV's "Get Smart "

Designed to guarantee absolute privacy, the seethrough plastic invention usually malfunctions, often with hilarious results, my favorite of which has Agent 86 and Chief unable to hear



each other while their conversation is quite audible to those outside the bubble.

There is a tenuous connection to be drawn between that and Hamlet's soliloquies, but I'm not up for any more heavy lifting.

I just want to get back to the party.

Over the years, in another lifetime it seems, I used to go to parties every now and then.

In high school they were usually clandestine affairs. news of which was transmitted via sotto voce communiqués, a clique-driven and word-of-mouth jungledrum grapevine aimed at excluding those deemed unworthy of inclusion, a privilege reserved for the popular, with the hoi polloi kept in ignorance.

That, most of the time,

included me.

In college, though, owing to a combination of Notre Dame's time-honored rejection of a fraternity/sorority system and its daunting 7-to-1 men-towomen enrollment ratio, the rules changed.

Suddenly, any excuse for a party was a good one.

Some, like the day we beat Southern Cal to become the top-ranked football team in America, were self-explanatory. Others, including the release of the new Patti Smith album, were less obvious.

At their pulsing heart, however, was the possibility of meeting someone special, someone who might change your life. When you're hundreds of miles from home, certain alliances grew less reliable and, given the circumstances, anyone might be tempted.

That, most of the time, included me.

I remember a dorm party well, to be accurate, a Saturday night second-floor

section party — at which I removed my girlfriend's class ring from my little finger and tucked it into the pocket of my jeans because there was something in the air and not just weed.

Not to put too fine a point on it, but I was not the best boyfriend.

But that's what can happen at parties, especially big ones. Intimacy, even shared over the sprawling brawl of Blue Ovster Cult's sonic assault, can provide a lingering, invisible curtain behind which are shared secrets large and small, connections so electric as to be

When this happens and trust me, it isn't often the obvious move is to escape the throng in favor of something more private, less observable, a place that offers another, better, soundtrack.

Bruce Springsteen, say, or Neil Young, even Jackson Browne.

But what about the vast occurred a handful of times majority of parties that don't result in seismic interpersonal shifts, the ones that you go to because you're in the mood to get out and about, the ones that celebrate a lunar eclipse or invite you to "Come as Your Favorite Dead Celebrity?

What happens then?

Well, I'll tell you. If vou're like me - and Lord knows I wouldn't wish that fate on anyone — you'll find yourself staying well past the expiration hour, hanging around until you're the last one standing, someone whose capacity for small talk and large libation intake makes him the one willing to help clean up after the rest have left.

This altruistic tendency carries with it a heavy price tag, especially if the person with whom you arrived was ready — even eager to bolt before most of the guests had arrived. I wish I could tell you this only

and that I learned early on that when you're with the woman you love, you listen to her.

My wife — once my date, then my girlfriend, then my fiancée — has had to put up with my last-guyto-leave proclivity for more than 30 years now, and it's a tribute to her that we're still happy together.

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




