Election

3 to pick from for Jefferson Twp. trustee

Name: Mark Prager

Previous experience: I am currently serving my 4-year term as a trustee for Jefferson Township and seeking re-election. Prior to being a trustee, I have served my community for 31 years via the military and civil service as a firefighter and fire marshall. Serving my community has been an integral part of my adult life.

Why are you running for this position? I want to keep my community rich in its agricultural heritage and be a voice to what my community wants to see for itself. I also want to see our long-standing local small businesses thrive.

What will you bring to the position? During my first 4-year term, we upgraded the township house with internet and secured a tractor through a state equipment buying program to replace an outdated tractor needed for road work. I was also instrumental in hiring a part-time road worker to work under the road supervisor who maintains 39 miles of township roads. The hiring of this worker has led to the roads being maintained and repaired with more efficiency and safety. I was a key player in getting a resolution approved for the township to receive a 3 percent bed tax which will produce approximately \$35,000-40,000

extra income, which increases the township's revenue to improve all areas of the community. The approved resolution does not cost the local tax payers anything. My track record is indicative that I am a man of action.

What are your plans/ **goals if elected?** Short-term: My immediate goals are to continue to procure better work programs for our road crews, continue our safety training program for our road crews, and initiate a road-grid system to maintain township roads promptly, safely, and more efficiently. Long-term: My longterm goals are to replace one dilapidated township building and to implement a road grader replacement plan. The current road grader requires constant maintenance which utilizes monetary resources that could be better spent elsewhere.

Bladensburg center gives hope to those battling food insecurities

through the rolling hills of southeastern Knox County, among freshly harvested fields and spectacular foliage brings many thoughts to mind. Phrases like 'food desert' and 'food insecurity' are probably the last ones most people would think about. Those words are a day-to-day reality for many people, who live in small towns and villages that dot rural Ohio.

Center of Hope in Knox County opened its doors in Bladensburg in 2019, with the idea of serving this all-too-often overlooked population. The Center of Hope, located in the back half of the old Bladensburg School, is specially geared to serve the unique needs of the surrounding rural population. Along with Knox County, Center of Hope's Bladensburg location is ideal to serve 16 counties and is only a few minutes' drive from Licking, Coshocton, Muskingum and Holmes counties.

"When we got out here, one of the things we heard from the local population is, 'We're rural and we're forgotten," said Bladensburg Center of Hope CEO Dawnel Volzke. "In our service territory, you have the Bladensburgs and the Martinsburgs, where you might only have 100 or 200 households. So, it doesn't look like there's a whole lot of people, but you start to add all those rural areas together and, next thing you know, there are thousands and thousands of people that need help and there's nothing available for them out here."

The Bladensburg Center of Hope, opened in 2019, received donations from partners to rehabilitate and retool the back portion of the old Bladensburg School building, which they are leasing. The old school needed plenty of work from top to bottom to make it a true Center of Hope.

"This building had floor tiles The idea of a scenic fall drive that were coming out and ceiling tiles that were bad," Volzke said, "There were old lockers. There was lots of stuff, everywhere. It took a ton of volunteer hours. We had churches, carpenters and specialists come from over an hour away to help us. They donated time and materials. Storyside

Church out of Bellville helped. A concrete company helped us finish stripping the floors with their equipment. Volunteers, including college students, helped me finish the floors."

The concrete floors are spotlessly finished, and the interior has been given a facelift, allowing Volzke to take on more projects.

In April of 2023, in partnership with Mid-Ohio Food Collective, Center of Hope opened the first Mid-Ohio Market serving rural Ohio. Mid-Ohio Market is a nocost grocery store that takes a fresh approach to the concept of food pantries. The focus is on helping those in need to have access to fresh, nutritious produce. The market is a bright and cheerful place that would remind to make the trip to Bladensburg

one of a local grocery store.

That is only one of the projects that Center of Hope will be launching in the converted school building.

"Several local funders matched with a significant donation from the US Department of Agriculture," said Volzke. "We have been able to put over half a million dollars into this part of the building."

Across the hall from the market, a kitchen is under construction. The new range hood, suspended from the ceiling, represents hours of work by electricians and a \$50,000 donation from the USDA.

'We were looking for a building with a commercial kitchen," said Volzke. "We knew that chronic food insecurity and lacking fresh foods was one of the biggest priorities in this part of rural Ohio. We looked for a place with a commercial kitchen so we could do a project, where people could buy a box of lightly prepared foods, which would bring in income. Then, we could give boxes of food out in rural areas, especially to some of our seniors, who might need lightly prepared foods."

In the back of the building is a modern commercial-size cold room to store food. There are already plans underway to build a second one, along with a backup generator.

"That's next on the fundraising list," said Volzke. "One step at a time."

As Center of Hope grows, they will take on another problem - the lack of services in rural areas. The center will soon open a farm shop, where local growers can bring their produce to sell, like a regular store, so anybody can buy fresh produce.

'We found that we were having local farmers come to us looking for assistance because they were losing money, trying to bring their food to market," Volzke said. "There isn't a close market, and we want to help with that. So, we are growing to become a traditional food hub to provide help for some of our local growers."

Plans are in the works to start a small deli or café. Now that the center has WiFi, they are looking to add some tables and chairs to make a friendly, welcoming environment for people to gather, talk

on their own, there are transportation services in various counties, like Knox Area Transit, that will give seniors a ride to and from the center if they set it up in advance.

"They can work with friends to bring them," Volzke said. "They can have people shop for them, but that is why we do mobile distributions, to get out in rural areas, helping those who can't travel."

With the holidays approaching, the need is now at its greatest. The center is gearing up for Season of Hope when they do many more food distributions. The holidays bring a higher traffic volume at the center than usual. People can register to get food for the holidays to take home.

'The next three months are going to be exciting," Volzke said. "We bring in a much higher volume of food. We will need more volunteers. We need sponsors. We need churches that are looking to make sure that everyone gets a turkey for Thanksgiving. Meat is very hard for us to get and very expensive. So, when we need 500 or 600 hams, those are things that the community can come alongside. We can't do individual

donations, but it could come from a licensed, commercial facility. People can donate money toward giving people holiday food."

The Center of Hope is becoming an oasis for people in places like Nellie, Warsaw, Frazeysburg, Utica, Alexandria and Johnstown, as well as from around Knox County. Volzke is reaching out to rural Ohioans.

"The whole area has been economically depressed for a long time," said Volzke. "Now, we are seeing great stuff coming. There are great corporations like Intel coming, however for some people out here, that will increase the cost of living. A lot of families and seniors are stretched and struggling because the cost of living is rising. The good news is that these companies will be giving back in the community. So, that will help us build resources. We hope that we can keep growing with support from businesses and corporations – both financial and people support."

continue to look at grant opportunities to supplement our current tax funding to update our facilities and operations.



In conditions more fitting for ducks or pigs, the Danville Blue Devils were able to escape with a 14-12 overtime victory over visiting East Knox in the annual Devil-Dog contest.

A steady rain throughout most of the evening turned the football field at Tough Street Stadium into a mudpit early. That, and the hard hitting always expected in this rivalry made things very tough on both offenses in the Knox-Morrow Athletic Conference tilt.

Neither team was able to mount much offensively in the first quarter, but the big plays soon broke out in the second.

Danville scored the opening touchdown midway through the second quarter on a 1-yard run by Walker Weckesser. That touchdown was set up by a 49-yard pass from Weckesser to Carson Proper. The sophomore receiver was wide open on the play, but tracked down by East Knox near the goal line.

conversion run fell short, and nearly ended up costing the Blue Devils (10-0 overall, 7-0 KMAC).

The Bulldogs had some fireworks of their own as the second quarter wound

On a fourth down play at the 45-yard line, East Knox receiver Bracen Davis was able to get behind the Danville defense and quarter-

Both the Fredericktown and Centerburg boys' teams qualified for regionals, as did the Fredericktown girls'

The Freddies won their Division III meet with a total team effort. All five of the scorers for Fredericktown finished between 13th and 20th. Brandon Hogg was first at 13th in 17:02.07, followed closely behind by Josh Alexander (14th, 17:04.07) and Aiden McManis (15th, 17:06.07). Kaleb Randall was 19th and Noah Smith

As citizens, we all want to base our voting decisions on our values and on facts. Unfortunately, several people have recently written against Issue 1 using false fear-based arguments. Below are facts about Issue 1.

First, Issue 1 is "The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety." The proposed Constitutional Amendment is solely focused on the right and freedom for women to make reproductive decisions for themselves. Changing one's gender is NOT a decision about reproduction, so this argument is irrelevant.

Second, the opposition would like you to believe that parents will no longer have a say in decisions related to reproductive medical care of their children. This is also wrong. In fact, Ohio law strongly protects parental rights regarding medical treatment for their children. You can find these rights delineated by the Ohio Bar Association. Issue 1 does not change these laws. And this is as it should be.

Here's an analogy: the first amendment of the U.S. Constitution guarantees the right to free speech. How-



ever, that right comes with restrictions. For example, we can't yell 'fire' in a crowded theatre. Issue 1 does guarantee the right to reproductive care. But for girls under 18, they would still need parental permission to receive that treatment.


As Knox County citizens, surely, we can respect each other enough to accept differences in our beliefs and values around abortion and other reproductive care. As we vote on Issue 1,

We took to the water on opening day of his 13th year, and Rex aptly boated a drake wood duck I'd dropped into a deep pool not far off the bow. He shook off all over me and the boat, but he just couldn't seem to get warm again. Minutes later I gunned a mallard into the cattails, and Rex watched

it fall, but that was it. He looked at me as if to simply say, "Nope, I'm done."

I took off my coat, wrapped it around him and then waded in after the bird myself. We called it a morning and went home to build a fire. He spent the rest of the season warming beside that hearth, a privilege well-earned through a lifetime's toil

This story, however, isn't only about the growth of a man through the lessons of an aging dog. It's also about succession and the opportunity for the young to finally rise. Indy, our little mutt, had waited years as an unlikely understudy. Imagine the lead role in "The Black Stallion" being played by a miniature donkey. That's what Indy was up against — big shoes to fill, but enthusiastic little feet ever willing to give it a shot.

The next outing I took to the swamp with Indy riding the bow like the carved figurehead of an 18th century



schooner. Our launch was witnessed by a smattering of skeptics who clearly mistook the size of the dog in the hunt for the size of the hunt in the dog, but Indy's mettle was proven outright when he launched from his perch as I cartwheeled a mallard into the drink. The little mutt paddled out to the

bird and took it to mouth. Then while he made way back to the boat, it was as if the duck carcass was being propelled by some unseen force as the diminutive dog was completely hidden behind the body of the bird.

Indy was drawn aboard to a hero's welcome with bird still in mouth. He spent the next two hours clutching that dead duck like a winning lottery ticket, never loosening his grip until we debarked at the shore and he found it difficult to sniff for rabbits with a mouth full of feathers.

The torch had been passed and with it another lesson learned. A dog's life is short because each of a man's best friends carries their own unique message. Indy's was to rise to the moment and never let go of that dream.
