





LWV Candidates Night Oct. 6

The League of Women Voters of Wayne County will host its annual Candidates Night on Oct. 6 at the Ohio State University's local College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences (formerly OARDC). The gathering will provide Wayne County voters the opportunity to get to know the candidates for public office, hear them speak about the issues, and ask questions.

Candidates Night will take place at 6:30 p.m. in the ballroom of the Arden Shisler Center for Education and Economic Development on the CFAES campus, 1680 Madison Ave., Wooster. The event is open to all, at no cost, and is expected to conclude by 8:30 p.m.

Candidates Night is the League's signature event, having been offered for many decades. Attending this year will be Jonathan Hofstetter and Karla DeMali, running for County Commissioner; Mark Gooch, candidate for State Representative; and Matthew Diemer, up for U.S. Congress. Invitations were sent in mid-July to all candidates, none of whom are endorsed by the League, which is strongly bipartisan.

Kathy Helmuth, who serves as President of the Wayne County League and has been co-chairing Candidates Night for 13 years, expressed disappointment that some candidates declined to attend and answer questions from everyday voters.

"The other candidates passed on the opportunity to participate in the event," she said. "We encourage the public to urge those candidates to appear."

This year's function, cochaired by Joi Hemphill, will differ from the debate style of past years. Attendees will be seated in large





groups, and the candidates will sit down to talk with each group in a rotating manner. This will facilitate a more informal atmosphere for talking and gaining insight into what kind of people the candidates are and how they would represent the voters if elected.

"Every person will get to hear every candidate," Helmuth said.

To help individuals further educate themselves before heading to the polls, the League provides a website of election information, VOTE411, at https://www.vote411.org. The site is easy to navigate and includes the issues on the ballot, a guide to the candidates, and guidance on checking your voter registration and finding out your polling location.

Additional useful information regarding the elections can be found on the websites for the Wayne County Ohio Board of Elections at https://www.waynecountyoh.gov and the Ohio

Secretary of State at www. sos.state.oh/elections. Election day this year is November 8, with early in-person voting beginning October 12 at the Board of Elections office in Wooster. Voters must be registered by October 11.





DeWine listens while Holmes County does the talking

Politicians generally like to talk.

This time around, the politician listened.

Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine made a stop in Holmes County this past week, where rather than speak, the governor listened and gleaned valuable information that he could take back with him to Columbus.

DeWine spoke with sev-

and other important area figures at Jitter's Coffee House in Millersburg Monday, Sept. 19, first as a way to stay in touch with Ohio constituents, secondly to perhaps find some gold nuggets of wisdom from a county that continues to thrive in the face of state and national struggles.

According to Holmes County commissioner Dave Hall, DeWine's visit was eral Holmes County officials about connecting with people

to gain insight from people to get a feel for what the needs and issues are.

"He just listened," Hall said. "He didn't talk politics at all. This was about listening to our possibilities and challenges. Having the governor in here to hear our ideas and hopes is refreshing."

Among the key county officials attending the visit were Holmes County commissioners Hall, Joe Miller, who emceed the event, and Ray Eyler, health commissioner Mike Derr. Economic Development Council director Mark Leininger, engineer Chris Young, Common Pleas Judge Sean Warner, EMA director Jason Troyer, Human resource director Misty Burns, Tracy Schlabach, commission planning director Arnie Oliver, commissioner's clerk Susan Schie, Karen Gotter representing Holmes

Soil & Water Conservation District, recorder Anita Hall, auditor Jackie McKey, business owner and Berlin trustee Dan Schlabach, Millersburg mayor Jeff Huebner. Chamber of Commerce & Tourism Bureau director Tiffany Gerber and Rob Hovis, Republican Party chair.

After thanking everyone for coming, DeWine said his main purpose for stopping was to get a sense of what was going on in the county and what concerns any of those in attendance wanted to discuss.

"I want to hear what you all have to share," DeWine said.

Miller began by talking about how the people of Holmes County drive the economic growth and success of the county, and not the county officials. He said the economy continues to thrive in the county and that is because of the entrepreneurial spirit of the people.

The focus then went to House Bill 377 that is seeing state investing \$500 million in the state's Appalachia country communities.

Derr then talked about public health and said he has appreciated the support DeWine and his office has given to county health departments during the pandemic.

"This is a time when public health can innovate and do thing a little differently," Derr said. "We can explore that data and we appreciate everything you've done to support our efforts to keep people safe and healthy."

Eyler noted that Holmes County sets the trends for Ohio in many various ways.

"I think a lot of counties look to us to see what we are doing," Eyler said, using as an example that rather than immediately spending the casino tax funds, the commissioners set aside that



money for special projects.

Gerber spoke about the growing tourism sector and how that has continued to bolster the economic growth of the county through sales tax from visitors.

Other topics included business growth, in particular finding people to fulfill the labor force needs, job creations, law enforcement concerns, education and creating and filling volunteer roles.

McKey said she is currently undergoing property appraisals in the county, telling the governor, "Our property values are skyrocketing right now. That's a big project for us right now as the state looks at all the data and says, 'what's going on in Holmes County? Why is your \$5,000 ag land selling for \$50,000 an acre?' It's been interesting and a challenge."

After listening to everyone's questions, statements and concerns, DeWine promoted his wife Fran's efforts to promote the Dolly Parton

that puts a new book into the hands of every child each month from birth to the age of 5-years old, he talked about how listening to people about the ideas of how successful counties in Ohio are thriving today is imperative.

"I'm a big believer in local." DeWine said. "We are a local state. We are focused on bringing business to Ohio. Look at intel business. One of the anecdotal things we have heard from intel people is that people want to come to Ohio, and as we bring more business here, it is going to be more attractive to intel companies."

DeWine said there are no magic solutions, only hard work and a willingness to listen and work together. He said Ohio has a strong business climate and the cost of doing business in the state is lower than many other states. He noted that Ohio has recently seen more than 50 large companies relocate to Ohio from the west coast.

"We have a lot of good things going on, and this is

Imagination Library Project really our time in history," DeWine said. "I am very optimistic about where we are going. We just need to make sure everyone has the opportunity to get the education they need and has the option to choose their dream."

> From the creativity of start-up businesses to working together and growing both business and educational development through building up community, Hall said DeWine recognizes that Holmes County has done some unique things that have been successful.

> "Governor DeWine has told me many times that he believes there are many things we do here in Holmes County that can be incorporated to the state level." Hall said. "I think he understands how strong Holmes County is and he wants to hear how it's being done firsthand."

> If his commitment to listen first rather than to speak at this meeting is any indication, DeWine should have plenty of quality information to take back home and discuss with his team.

head the nonprofit. Colon filed in February of 2020 and had her 501(c)(3)approval by April.

The groundbreaking for the facility took place in June of 2021. That was in the midst of a \$7 million capital campaign that started in 2020.

Things have stalled a little bit lately, Colon said, noting that the country went from the pandemic to a recession. People don't have as much to give now as at other times.

"It will depend on how the community continues to come around and supporting us," Colon said of whether the Playlab would hit the goal of a late-2023 opening. "We're really hoping."

Once it does become available to the public, the

facility will give its target audience of children in grades K-8 a place to cultivate dreams. Colon explained that between preschool, when kids are exposed to all sorts of potential futures, and high school and career centers, where they actually can act on those thoughts, there is little exposure.

"You're giving them that exposure," she said. "You're helping them to

dream and create. You're exposing them to opportunities they would maybe not be exposed to in Wayne County. There's a dino-dig and they can dream about being and archaeologist.

Things like that."

Rebuilding history in Ragersville

Ray Hisrich takes a lot of pride in his hometown of Ragersville. He's been the president of the Ragersville Historical Society for 37 years. and buzzes around in a golf cart overseeing the different properties they care for. He can tell you just how many of the buildings in its small village center were once log cabins.

The answer to that question is eight.

With the opening of Old Store Winery, Hisrich and fellow society members just secured their place in the town's history. Located in the former general store in the tiny hamlet south of Sugarcreek, the winery boasts an honest to goodness stone wine cellar tucked into bank behind the building. The top of that wine cellar was once a dance hall.

"What we did is purchase this building and the wine cellar four years ago. We wanted to save these buildings," said Hisrich. "We're working on putting this all together. It's come together slowly as funds became available. I may not see it all happen in my lifetime."

The Old Store Winery sits smack dab in downtown Ragersville, right next to the tavern. With eight flavors

of wine available at present and names like Rag Town's Mistake and Hang Town White Dry, they are aiming for the public's interest to be piqued enough to come try a glass and ask about their history.

"We came up with the idea for the winery. Then my wife got interested and it took nearly a year for her to get the license. We also had to get our wine labels state-approved," Hisrich said. "She did a lot of the footwork."

Nancy Rininger, a Ragersville local and member of the historical society, pours a crisp white wine into a glass as she stands behind the large, beautiful bar. Her and fellow members of the historical society, along with community members, have given much of their time into getting the operation going. Along with myriad tasks they undertook, they tracked down just the right vintage tables and



chairs throughout Northeast Ohio to add to the ambience. They want to make sure they get this newest venture in their hometown right.

"It started with the juice, which we got from Madison, Ohio," said Rininger, who has some experience making wine. "We had it hauled down by a local guy. We had some help from winemakers to start out and they guided us, but we finished it on our own."


"Our ancestors put in vineyards on Rocky Ridge just up the road when they moved here," Hisrich said.
"They had this excess of everything. There were once 13 cheese factories in Auburn Twp. Eckert had this store and put in the wine cellar. He made wine and cheese."

A historical tidbit that comes from a written history of the area reads "Where grapes were grown, wine was made. Auburn Township wine at one time enjoyed a fine reputation and found its way by the barrel to nearby cities. When Charles A. Eckert established his general store in Ragersville, he built a wine cellar into the side of the hill west of the store. On the 1870 Ragersville Business Directory, he was listed as: Dealer in pure Grape wine, Dry goods, Groceries, etc."

The operation does not plan to grow its own vine-

While the Ragersville Historical Society is a nonprofit organization, the Old Store Winery will be for profit. The money they make from selling wine they hope to put towards the upkeep of the buildings they have. The society operates off a major donation that was gifted to them in the 90s, plus donations from generous foundations, but Hisrich is quick to point out they've done it mostly themselves, with festivals and other events.

"If someone asks how many people live in Ragersville, I always tell them 99," he laughed. "The count was



Ohio Swiss Festival presents a nostalgic return to Swiss heritage

With any annual event that dates its beginning back to 1953, there is a certain amount of nostalgia that accompanies the yearly celebration.

For the Ohio Swiss Festival, which will take place in Sugarcreek Sept. 29 to Oct. 1, that bit of nostalgia includes Swiss cheese, yodeling, tossing around large rocks, polka music, apple fritters and many other events that harken back to the early days in Sugarcreek's highly anticipated three-day spectacle.

However, it's not as much the things in the weekend, but rather the experience of Swiss heritage and community that make the Ohio Swiss Festival so much of a reunion-like atmosphere.

"Not only do we as people living in Sugarcreek look forward to hosting this event, we have college kids and people who have lived in Sugarcreek coming back just for the weekend, and plenty of visitors from outside the community who circle this event and make it an annual pilgrimage each year," said Bev Keller, Ohio Swiss Festival director of marketing. "Over the decades, the Swiss Festival has remained committed to everything that people have come to love about the event."

Those events are time-honored and cherished Swiss activities like the power of Steinstossen, where men and women hoist huge rocks as far as they can.

Keller said former U.S.A. Olympian Jud Logan put this event on the map, participating many years and holding the record until Beau Lenarz bested it a few years ago. She went on to note that many locals have made this an annual effort, and the crowds who come to watch make it one of the most anticipated events of the weekend.

"Jud is part of the legacy of this great event," Keller said of the ex-Olympian and longtime Ashland University coach who died in January. "It's so unique and has such a wonderful following."

Then there is the Schwingfest, an unusual Swiss activity that sees its participants flinging each other around in outfits resembling large diapers with a barrel top. Keller said she has done extensive research on the event and found it surprising that back in the earlier days of the Swiss Festival, they invited the public to give it a try.

Today, the event is only done via demonstration by Garaway High School wrestling coach

Gregg Miller's wrestlers, for safety purposes. Miller worked closely with Dan's Hunting Gear to replicate the outfits several years ago.

"It's one of those charming Swiss heritage things that remains pretty true to the Swiss people," Keller said.

Then there is Joey Tomsick, who has routinely performed at the Swiss Festival for decades. Keller said the crooner and his band has been a part of the entertainment slate as far back as she can remember.

"Joey and the Swiss Festival go hand-in-hand," Keller said. "I can't imagine this event without him and there are probably many people who feel the same. He's been coming for about four decades, so he is ingrained in creating this incredible polka atmosphere we've been known for."

He may be the old hand, but joining the pavilion music venue this year is Aaron Dussing, who will add his band's polka skills to the fun.

Another Ohio Swiss Festival staple is the Swiss cheese, which has been the heartbeat of the event. When the Ohio Swiss Cheese Association disbanded in 2021, the festival committee dug in and found a new way to promote the cheese, teaming it up with another local staple, the wine-making community, to create the Wine and Cheese tasting event at the firehouse.

Keller said the Swiss cheese simply went a different direction, and partnering with wine seemed like the perfect fit.

"One of the things the Swiss Festival promotes is supporting our local vendors and businesses, and adding the wine to the cheese to create a new event is perfect," Keller said. "People can still get their fill of cheese, but in adding the wine, it takes it to a whole new level, and we have seen so much growth in our local wineries in recent years that we felt it was good to promote everything they are doing."

She said the wine and cheese tasting station has been a popular favorite among adults, who can enjoy the event while their children revel in the many rides and attractions throughout the festival setting.

In addition, festival food included fried cheese, plenty of fair food, and of course apple fritters, which have become a staple over the years.

"We are thankful for the Garaway High School Athletic Booster Club for taking the reins on the apple fritters," Keller said. "All of the proceeds from the fritters goes to the club, and they pour it right back into the community."

The Swiss Festival oozes with tradition, culminating in the grand parade, that sees the masses line up several people deep all up and down Main, Factory and Maple Streets.

Keller said the grand parade is the perfect way to put the wraps on the weekend that starts Thursday night with the queen and Little Swiss Miss contest and a performance by the Garaway marching band.

"It's family-friendly fun that continues to showcase Sugarcreek, the community, its people and our Swiss heritage," Keller said.



whether their current policy is up to today's standards in replacement costs.

"It can be devastating when a person's home is destroyed, and their policy hasn't changed in years. Suddenly, they can't replace the home they live in.'

Trover said that whether it is dealing with county disaster response teams or a family planning at home, one word makes all the difference, and that is communication.

"That's so key," Troyer said of communicating. "In a way, we have all of this incredible new technology that we think helps us communicate, but nothing can replace sitting face to face and talking through a plan. There's less chance of confusion, it promotes teamwork, and it is something that needs to takes place all the time to ensure plans are created and understood by everyone.'

county must get each part of its disaster response team on the same page, so too do families. "Whether it's the county or a family, getting together to discuss planning is critical because everyone at some point has to take ownership," Troyer said.

Troyer said one of the biggest dangers of homeowners is thinking "that will never happen to me." Then it does, and they aren't prepared.

Here are several focal points to help families approach preparedness:

Safe at home

Have a plan in place for household emergencies such as fire, gas leak, or any other situation which may require leaving your house abruptly.

Hold a family meeting every few months and discuss the plan. The plan should include where you will all meet after leaving the house, how to escape rooms other than through a door, to leave all belongings inside and never to go back into the home, even for pets, He said much like the until emergency personnel

give the all-clear. Practice the plan, which is especially important for parents with small children.

Minimum supplies on hand

Fire extinguisher, with at least one in the kitchen. One in the garage is a good plan as well. Smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are a must and should be placed strategically in the home for maximum alert.

First aid kits can be life-

savers, or at the very least pared is both a physical and comfort providers. Homeowners are advised to at least have one in the home and one in the car, making sure all items in it are dry, stocked and not expired. In addition, make sure each includes items for large wounds, burns, stings and allergic reactions.

Winter's car cache

With fall nearing, winter will be here soon enough, and now is the time to properly assemble an emergency kit for each automobile. That kit includes bottled water. a blanket, a well-stocked first aid kit, emergency breakdown kit including flares, reflective triangles and jumper cables, a phone charging pack, a flashlight with extra batteries, duct tape and a collapsible shovel and kitty litter that can be utilized to get a vehicle out of icy situations.

Troyer said being prepared is a mindset and it takes effort and planning to be prepared for emergencies. He added that being premental exercise, and in addition to preparing with the necessary plans and tools, one needs to also prepare mentally, whether it is dealing with an emergency four oneself or understanding what steps need to be taken when happening upon someone else's emergency.

'People need to take the time to be prepared and stay safe, because nobody knows when something might happen," Troyer said.

Exciting times now and in future for Triway schools

Exciting things are happening in the Triway Local Schools this year. Not as exciting as in a couple years, when the district opens its K-12 building, but exciting nonetheless.

Triway will join Waynedale as the final school districts in Wayne County to build new facilities. Like Waynedale, it will feature an all-in-one

school that Superintendent Nate Schindewolf says will increase the district's efficiency along with cutting costs.

"It's collaboration between staff," Schindewolf said. "It doesn't seem like it would be a big thing, but we have 97 square miles. We won't be operating four or five food services, cafeterias, maintenance departments, things like that. Things like mentoring programs, you'll be able to walk down the hall rather than get on a bus to travel from one elementary to another."

Though the new facility may not open until the fall of 2025 - it was originally slated for 2024 but a 250,000-squarefoot building doesn't go up overnight in the era of clogged supply chains things are being done now in anticipation.

That includes anything from building a new parking lot at the high school, since the school is being constructed on the old one, to moving sixth-graders from the two remaining elementaries — there were three up until three years ago — to the middle school in anticipation of the new building's format.

At the new facility, there will be three schools which will still operate as Triway Elementary, Triway Middle School and Triway High School, but now there will just be one electric bill.

Back in the present day, at the old schools, Schinde-

wolf beamed at how his district managed things during the pandemic and said the district emerged in good shape, though there are still some battles.

"I couldn't be prouder," he said. "It doesn't matter if we had somebody walking out of college into their first year of teaching or someone who was here for 35 years. Nobody was trained on how to handle it. But we all adapted. We had people that were driving by their (students') houses just to wave so they had that quick interaction.

"Graduation was very unique. It allowed us to really talk to every single family. I was proud of their creativity. They came up with some great ideas to engage their students. They want above and beyond and it says a lot about educators to face something like that and pull it off.'

A silver lining to emerge from the pandemic. Schindewolf said, was enhanced tech skills district-wide. Forced to go to Zoom classes in the early days of the pandemic, the superintendent said the faculty is now prepared to

Local Roots announces major plans to move, expand

The board of directors and staff at Local Roots Market & Cafe in down Wooster recently announced a planned move and expansion. Local Roots will be moving across the street to 146 W. South St. in Wooster. The property is currently owned and occupied by Ride On Wooster Bicycles.

The purchase is expected to take place in the fall of next year. Until that time, Ride On will continue to operate at its current location and capacity. Needed construction at the new address has a targeted completion date of fall of 2024.

Local Roots was created by a group of volunteers in

2009 as a year-round market where producers do not have to be on site to sell their goods. The area co-op offers seasonal, sustainable foods, artwork, and crafts of all kinds from over 200 local producers, as well as food and non-food staple items from environmentally and socially responsible businesses.

"It all started with a public interest meeting," said Local Roots executive director, Adam Schwieterman. "And we are

strong."

Schwieterman explained that over the past few years, the community's shopping patterns have shifted more and more toward a conscientious approach to where and how their money is being spent.

(Local Roots) is a special kind of store where small, local businesses can get their foot in the door to operate, and also where customers can go to find unique products they can't get just anywhere else," said Schwieterman.

As the business has grown, both the size and age of the current building has become a limiting factor. The search was on to

now over 2,700 members find something larger and newer in the same neighborhood. "The Ride On building turned out to be the perfect fit," Schwieterman said.

Once open, the new market will be an expanded version of the current Local Roots. Increased square footage will allow space for a larger positive community impact through the addition of new producers and services from existing co-op member farmers, bakers, chefs and artisans.

At the new location, Local Roots will also continue to host small, independent shops such as Boo Bears Brews coffee shop

The cost for rebuilding the new facility will be substantial. Local Roots has received a state grant as well as contributions from local supporters.

"We are very thankful, and there is no doubt we will need more support to complete this transformational project over the next two years," said Schwieterman, adding that the community can support the move by starting or continuing to shop at Local Roots.

Up, up and away

Local hot air balloonist has taken more than 500 flights

One cold winter day, a hot air balloon descended from a clear sky into a layer of wispy clouds, and the pilot found himself awestruck.

For a few minutes, he was surrounded by thousands of diamonds sparkling in the sunbeams shining through the mist. When he emerged from the bottom of the cloud layer, light snow was falling, and he knew he'd just witnessed something few people have - the freezing and crystallizing of moisture, the birth of snowflakes.

That pilot who witnessed snowflakes forming was Wooster psychiatrist Denny Helmuth. It all started when he read a picture book, as a third-grader, about a boy who floated on a magic carpet, enjoying the bird'seye view and escaping his troubles.

"I wanted to be that boy," Helmuth said. "Years later I came home to my wife one day and said, 'Kathy, I bought a hot air balloon.' I named it the Magic Carpet."

Thirty-one years later Helmuth has over 550 flights under his belt.

"Ballooning lives up to the magic carpet dream," he said. "It's a peaceful, beautiful experience."

Hot air balloons are taken up primarily on sunny days as they become difficult to control when rain cools and weighs them down. Helmuth lifts off from various places, depending on the wind speed and direction. He has a crew of at least three including his wife.

First, the balloon is laid out and attached to the basket, then tethered to the ground. An inflation fan partially fills the balloon with air, and then the pilot ignites the propane burners, which heat the air. The gas is stored in cylinders attached to the basket. Once the balloon is fully inflated and standing as a result of the rising hot air, the tether

and away.

Balloons generally soar as high as 1,000-3,000 feet and travel 3-10 miles for one to two hours. They journey whichever way the wind blows, as they cannot be steered. However, the pilot can move the craft up and down to find various wind directions and speeds. To navigate upward, the pilot increases the burner flame. To descend, a valve is opened to release air from the top of the envelope.

Ballooning is regulated by the FAA, and balloons must follow the same airtraffic regulations as other aircrafts. They are required to be equipped with an altimeter to measure the altitude, a vertical speed indicator and a pyrometer, which measures the temperature inside the balloon.

When it's time to land. the pilot must find a flat spot away from buildings, people, animals, crops and power lines, and the reactions of nearby people are great fun.

"Wherever we land. it becomes an instant party, with giggling kids and champagne toasts,' Helmuth said.

The crew, which has been chasing the balloon, then helps pack it back into the trailer and gives the occupants a lift back home.

Helmuth once ran low

is released, and it's up, up on fuel and had to ditch in the Allegheny National Forest. The state police helped his crew find him, as that was before cell phones.

"The next day a friendly farmer took us with his tractor to retrieve the aircraft," Helmuth said.

For six decades people have had the opportunity to witness many remarkable sights from the vantage point of a hot air balloon, but experiments with utilizing hot air to lift items began at least a couple thousand years ago. Around 220 AD, a military strategist in China's Shu Han empire developed a device to be used during wartime. He placed an oil lamp inside a paper bag. The apparatus, lifted by hot air from the lamp, was used to signal troops and confuse the enemy.

The first hot air balloon passengers were animals. The Montgolfier brothers of France sent a sheep, a rooster and a duck skyward in their paper and linen craft, heated from the ground, over the heads of Louis XVI and Marie Antoinette at Versailles in 1783. A physician then inspected the animals and determined they were well. For their brave expedition, they were declared heroes and invited to live out their lives in the royal menagerie.

For the next 160 years, balloons fueled by hydrogen gas were developed and used for transportation and sport. It wasn't until the 1950s that hot air was once again used for ballooning, when bush pilot and engineer Ed Yost developed an onboard heat source, propane gas, and made his first successful flight in Nebraska in 1960.

Yost also designed the teardrop shape of the modern balloon. The envelope, the part that holds the air, is constructed mainly from nylon, with the lower sections made from flame-retardant material. The basket is commonly made of woven wicker or cane, with a steel or aluminum frame. For those seeking even more of a thrill, glass-bottom baskets debuted in 2010.

There are several organizations and many festivals, glows and races that keep the flame of ballooning lit, and the pilots are a closeknit group. Helmuth takes it a step further and combines medical issues at balloon-

How much should a backpack weigh?

Backpacks are handy tools that carry an array of gear. Students rely on them to hold books, while hikers and campers utilize backpacks to carry items such as food and beverages that keep them safe on trails. Even office workers may turn to backpacks to carry laptops or other tools of the trade.

Backpacks are handy resources, but overstuffed backpacks may cause injury. Backpacks should only carry weight that people can handle, and there are guidelines that can help people safely utilize backpacks.

The weight of a backpack depends on the age of the person using it. Generally speaking, adults should not exceed 20 percent of total body mass when loading backpacks. That means a healthy person weighing 200 pounds should not carry more than 40 pounds in his or her backpack.

In regard to children, researchers indicate that a child's backpack should



weigh no more than 10 percent of what the student weighs. Therefore, if a child weighs 70 pounds, he or she should only carry up to 7 pounds in the backpack.

Individuals also should follow a few other backpack recommendations to alleviate injuries. It's not a good idea to wear a backpack hanging from only one shoulder. A backpack should be worn on both shoulders, and ideally with a lumbar strap. This will help to prevent muscular pains by providing well-rounded support.

A backpack with wide, padded straps can minimize pressure on the shoulders, back and collarbone. Backpacks made of lightweight material will not add much additional weight to what's

being carried. Another tip is for children and adults to pack the heaviest item carried in the backpack closest to the center of the back to minimize strain.

Failure to follow guidelines may result in pain and injuries and have negative effects on balance, which may increase the risk of falls or other injuries.

Whenever possible, individuals may want to use trolley backpacks, which are on wheels. They can be dragged, alleviating the need to carry heavy loads.



TFC Global Ohio Truck Show rolls into Amish Country Sept. 30

For many long-distance truck drivers, the idea of climbing into a big rig and getting behind the wheel day after day can lead to feelings of isolation and loneliness.

Those who anticipate the traveling truck show have built picnics, family gathering, barbecues and more around this event, setting up chairs or simply standing to watch as hundreds of large vehicles roll by, with horns blaring, drivers and passengers waving and plenty of love and gratitude for those who showed up to support the show.

'It's something that these drivers really look forward to each year," Wertz said. "It's nice to see so many people show up and support our drivers."

The event remains much like it has been the past number of years, although it the conga line's path will take a different shape this year.

It kicks off at Mt. Hope Event Center at 4 p.m. with hot dogs and hamburgers, with a chicken dinner available starting at 5 p.m. The dinners are available to the public and there will be take-out.

The truck drivers will begin to assemble their trucks and get for the parade, which will begin at 6 p.m. The show will slowly ebb out of the event center and hit the road, where the entire parade will head north on state Route 241 out of Mt. Hope, veering off on County Road 77 heading north to and heading north on Township Road 363. It will make its way through Kidron and continue east on County Road 79 and

then Township Road 80, arriving at state Route 94 South to Mt. Eaton. The parade will jog on to state Route 241 in Mt. Eaton for a short time before rolling south on County Road 37/186. It will connect with state Route 62 just outside of Winesburg and head through Bunker Hill and Berlin. In Berlin the parade heads west on state Route 39, moving through Berlin and connecting with County Road 201, where the procession heads north to Fryburg. The final leg heads east on state Route 241, arriving back at the event center.

Following the parade there will be a live auction along with live music and food, with it all being open to the public. At 7 p.m. there will be ice cream available. and the John Glick Family Singers will be performing from 7-9 p.m.

This event had been held during the summer for many years, but recently switched to the fall season because summer is so busy for drivers.

While it may be a bit cooler for fans, one big advantage will be that the sun will set far earlier than it did in July, meaning the lights will come on and shine brightly that much sooner, which is what many fans love.

'We get some daylight so people can see the trucks, and we get plenty of nighttime parade where people can see the trucks all lit up in the dark," Wertz said. "It's quite a spectacle and we know many people come to see the lights."

Wertz said over the years the trucking industry has changed, and currently there are many companies seeking drivers because

Dangers that go with AFib

Atrial fibrillation, commonly known as AFib, is a heart condition characterized by a quivering or irregular heartbeat, called arrhythmia. Millions of people across the globe currently live with AFib.

When a person has AFib, the heart's two upper chambers, known as the atria, beat chaotically and do not coordinate with the two lower chambers. AFib can cause heart palpitations, shortness of breath and weakness. AFib is not often life-threatening, and symptoms may come and go. However, side effects of the condition can be dangerous.

AFib often results in poor blood flow, which can cause pooling of blood in the atria. The AHA notes that the risks of clotting increase as blood pool. If a clots forms in the atria, it can be pumped out of the heart and reach the brain, potentially blocking off the blood supply to an artery in the brain. This is known as an embolic stroke.

AFib also can reduce the heart's pumping capacity. An otherwise healthy heart may be able to compensate for this reduction in efficiency. But those with damaged heart muscle or valves cannot. AFib can trigger breathlessness and exercise intolerance and potentially coronary artery disease. Other problems from poor pumping can cause blood to back up into the pulmonary veins, the vessels that return oxygenrich blood from the lungs to the heart. This can cause fluid in the lungs. Fluid also can build up in the feet, ankles and legs.

There are various potential causes for AFib, including the following conditions:

- —high blood pressure
- —abnormal heart valves
- -previous heart attack
- —congenital heart defects
- —overactive thyroid
- —exposure to stimulants



Atrial fibrillation can be scary, but it's manageable and the life-threatening side effects that may accompany it oftentimes can be



—previous heart surgery

—lung disease

Some people with AFib do not have any heart defects or damage, and the cause is unclear

Treatment goals for AFib include resetting the rhythm or controlling the rate of the atrial valves, known as cardioversion. This can be done electrically or through the use of drugs. Sometimes, other therapies to control atrial fibrillation do not work. In these cases, a doctor may recommend a procedure to destroy the area of heart tissue that's causing the erratic electrical signals and restore the heart to a normal rhythm. Medication to prevent blood clots and reduce the risk for stroke often are prescribed.

Childhood obesity risk factors

addition, the CDC advises against giving children sugary drinks, including fruit juices, which studies have increasingly indicated may be linked to obesity in some people.

Physical activity

A lack of physical activity is a significant risk factor for childhood obesity. Children who do not exercise are at risk of weight gain because they do not burn as many calories as children who exercise. Parents should encourage their children to exercise each day and

discourage their children from engaging in sedentary activities, like watching television or playing video games, for too long.

Family

The CDC notes that children who come from families of overweight people may be more likely to gain weight. That's especially true in households where high-calorie foods are always available and physical activity is not prioritized.

Psychological factors

Children who must confront personal, parental and family stress may be at an elevated risk of obesity than children who are shielded from such stress. That's because some children cope with stress by overeating. Parents also should avoid coping in that way, as such tendencies may be passed on to their children.

ADHD is a common condition across the globe. Seeking treatment for ADHD could have a profound and positive effect on individuals throughout their lives.

Effects of untreated ADHD

Attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder, often referred to as "ADHD," is more common than people may realize. According to the organization Children and Adults with Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (CHADD), a metaanalysis of 175 studies worldwide estimated that roughly 129 million children had ADHD at the time of the study.



Children aren't the only people with ADHD, which can continue into and throughout adulthood if left untreated. Untreated ADHD can have immediate consequences on children, as the American Psychiatric Association notes that the condition can make it difficult for students to focus on tasks in school and compromise their ability to listen to teachers in the classroom. Each of those side effects can adversely affect students' academic performance, potentially affecting their long-term futures as a result.

Untreated ADHD can produce some unpleasant and surprising consequences outside of the classroom as well.

Untreated ADHD and



substance abuse

A recent study found that stimulant therapy for patients being treated for ADHD lowered their risk for substance use disorder. People with untreated ADHD were three to four times more likely to develop substance abuse disorder than individuals who were receiving treatment for the condition.

Untreated ADHD and driving

Driving is a skill that requires drivers to be attentive and aware of their surroundings at all times. A study found that the stimulants used to treat ADHD can make people with the condition better drivers. Such medications were found to reduce inattention, distractibility and impulsiveness, each of which is a known characteristic of ADHD. Without such treatment, individuals with ADHD could be putting themselves, their passengers, fellow drivers, and pedestrians at risk each time they get behind the wheel.

Untreated ADHD and education

It's no secret that the earning potential of college graduates is significantly greater than that of individuals whose highest level of education is high school. One study found that adults who self-reported ADHD were far less likely to have graduated college than those who reported that they had been diagnosed with ADHD (19 percent compared to 26 percent).

Vital info women all need to know

A woman's reproductive system is unique. That system is capable of contributing half the genetic material to create a child, and then has the unique ability to provide the optimal environment for that child to grow. The gynecological system is a remarkable component of the body, but just as susceptible to the formation of cancer as other areas.

Gynecologic cancers begin in the reproductive organs of women. Cancer can affect the cervix, ovaries, uterus and endometrium, vagina, and vulva. More rarely, cancer can occur in the fallopian tubes.

There is currently only one screening test for gyne-cologic cancers, and that test detects the presence of cervical cancer. Women are urged to have a Pap test at regular intervals indicated by their doctors to detect cervical cancer early when treatment can be most effective. Other gynecologic cancers are only detected through the presence of symptoms, which include:

—abnormal vaginal bleeding or discharge

—pelvic pain

—urgent or frequent urination

—constipation

Among the gynecologic cancers, uterine (endometrial) cancer is the most common type. More than 49,500 Americans are diagnosed with this disease each year, and it tends to develop after menopause. Ovarian cancer is the second most common type of gynecologic cancer in the United States, affecting around one in 70 women. Cervical cancer used to be the most serious of cancers for women. However, thanks to screening, most people diagnosed with this illness




can now be cured.

There are various factors that put a person at increased risk for developing gynecologic cancer. Contraction of the human papillomavirus is one of them. Age (most patients are over age 50), genetics and exposure to diethylstilbestrol, a synthetic form of estrogen used between 1940 and 1971, are additional risk factors.

Imaging tests, screenings, conversations with doctors, and being cognizant of body changes are some ways to detect gynecologic cancers early. While there is no way to completely avoid cancers of the female reproductive system, identifying risks and seeking help as early as possible can make gynecologic cancers much more treatable.



between oral health and overall health:

-Endocarditis: When bacteria or other germs from the mouth or another part of the body spread through the bloodstream, they can attach to certain areas of the heart. This causes an infection in the inner lining of the heart chambers or valves.

-Pregnancy and birth complications: Periodontitis has been linked to low birth weight and premature birth.

Cardiovascular disease: While it's not fully understood why, clogged

arteries, stroke and heart disease may be linked to inflammation and infection caused by oral bacteria.

-Pneumonia: Bacteria in the mouth may be pulled into the lungs, where it can lead to respiratory illness, such as pneumonia.

It's a two-way street with health and the mouth. Certain diseases can lead to issues in the mouth. HIV/ AIDS may cause mucosal lesions in the mouth; those with osteoporosis may have weakened periodontal bone and tooth loss; and research has shown that diabetes puts gum health at risk.

Wolfpack: Knights' defense continues to come up big

When thinking about the West Holmes football team, what's the first thing that comes to mind?

For most people, it's probably the offense.

Well, people need to start paying closer attention to the other side of the ball because the Knights defense is quietly flying under the radar.

When West Holmes opened Ohio Cardinal Conference play with a 37-7 win over Mansfield Senior on Sept. 9, it was in large part due to its defense coming up with big-time stops in key situations.

It's been a team effort on defense this season for the Knights, who haven't allowed any of their first five opponents to score more than 14 points.

"We've been preaching the one of 11 approach out there," West Holmes coach Zach Gardner said. "There are 11 guys out there. Your story isn't long enough to list the amount of guys that are playing phenomenal on defense right now."

The game plan against the Tygers was simple — make them play lefthanded by taking away the things they do well. That started with the defensive staff watching film and ended with the players executing on the field.

"We did what we were taught," said senior linebacker Elisha Baldridge, an All-Ohio first-team selection in 2021. "We had a good game plan against them, and we just did what we had to do."

Mansfield had several promising drives in the second half that ended with West Holmes getting a stop when it needed it most. Keeping teams out of the end zone is something the defensive players take pride in, especially on their home field.

That was never more evident than when West

son scoreless in a 56-0 beatdown on Sept. 16. The defensive unit held the Rams offense to under 100 total yards, pitching its first shutout since beating Lexington 16-0 on Sept. 18, 2020.

Knights senior linebacker Owen Jeffries referred to their approach in the red zone as a "wolfpack scenario.'

"We know when they get down there, we're not going to let anybody in," he said.

For better or worse, both coaches said that has been her team's modus operandi for the season thus far.

"That's been the story of our season thus far." Garaway coach Jess Schwartz said. "We've had some really good moments early in games when we've done some really nice things, but then we've struggled to maintain that momentum and level of play. We've got to discover a way to maintain consistency."

Hiland coach Kelly Miller felt the same way about her team despite pulling out the three-set win.

"Well, that seems to be our MO a lot this year," she said. "We start every game down, then we have to battle back. I'm not sure how to get the girls to turn that around, but we need to figure it out because we don't want to keep falling behind like that."

It hasn't often cost the Lady Hawks, who have routinely found ways to come back. Hiland is currently 11-2 overall and is tied atop the Inter-Valley Conference big school league with just one conference loss.





Foundation being laid for rebuild of WH boys soccer program

Josh Wengerd knows a thing or two about rebuilding a high school soccer program.

He took over the West Holmes girls program in 2008, inheriting a team that won one game the vear before.

The Knights won five games his first year in charge, six his second and seven his third.

By that point the founda-

bunches — followed over the next five seasons until he stepped down in 2015.

Wengerd is hoping the knowledge he gained from that previous experience will help him perform a similar turnaround with the West Holmes boys program, which he took over this past offseason after the Knights went 2-15 last season.

with teams in our confer- away four years of experience," said Wengerd, whose team entered the week of Sept. 19 with an 0-8 overall record and 0-4 league mark. "The Ohio Cardinal Conference is pretty stacked when it comes to soccer. It has some very good teams in Wooster and Lexington and Madison. I think everybody we play has a lot of kids who play club soccer. We don't have that in Holmes County. We don't have the accessibility that a lot of the other schools do, so we're kind of behind the 8-ball there.

"Losing so many seniors last year and replacing them with freshmen, you take

ence with kids who have very little if any experience. We find it hard to score goals. We're still learning to play together because we've got guys who have never played (together before). That's been a challenge.'

to games. Each day, though, they're seeing more and

more of the big picture.
"Our main focus right now is let's just get a little better each time we take the field," Wengerd said. "Let's do that by working hard at practice and trying to understand that what we do at practice translates to the game. It's like, 'Coach, why are we doing this drill where we're in a tiny little space and we only get two touches?' Well, it's because when you're playing on a big field, you should feel more comfortable with the big space and be used to getting rid of the ball quickly.





Watch your step, there may be a lesson to be learned

The asphalt parking lot of a local drug store is not typically the place where one would go to encounter wildlife. But as I've written many times, if you keep your eyes open and aware you just never know when but I've also spotted a lot nature is going leap out and offer you an opportunity to

As a lifelong watcher of the sky I've often been accused by my wife of leading myself into peril at ground level. If I had a dollar for every time Kristin's told me to watch where I'm going, I could probably hire a personal navigator to lead me around so I could spend all my time looking up. Sure, I've stumbled into some dubious situations,

This fixation with the sky makes it all the more unusual that I would spot a couple of mating bumblebees on the pavement directly under what would have been my very next step. I nearly did a flip over the pair as I pulled my foot away at the last second.

Although I've spent a considerable amount of time in the incidental presence of bumblebees, I'd never encountered this circumstance. I took a moment to snap a photo, then gently nudged the two out of the main traffic corridor to a spot less likely to see them both meet their end under foot or tire. Duly inspired by the chance encounter, I

went home to research what I'd seen.

While bumblebees are social insects that live together in small colonies, they do not go to the extreme efforts of honeybees to ensure that a number of their population makes it through the winter. Instead, the bumblebee colony places the entire fate of the next generation on the shoulders of a virgin queen that emerges in late summer from the nest (typically a tree stump, rock outcrop or simple hole in the ground) to find a mate.

Males of the species have already prepared a plan for luring the queen to within their reach as they've plotted out various "picnic spots" nearby, marking them with pheromones that act as an attractant to the new queen. When she stops for a visit, the male makes his move, and in what is typical of many insect species, the more successful he is in mating, the more likely

it is that it'll be his very last act.

What I encountered in the parking lot appeared to be just such a success. The pair were solidly conjoined, and for a male bumblebee that's a one-way ticket to the great beyond, as the endgame will see the queen flying off with important parts of the male still attached. The thinking half of the male remains on the ground to ponder the seeming inequity of the whole encounter as his life slowly drains away.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Bumblebee heads off on an eat-


ing binge to fortify her body against the winter ahead, gathering as much pollen and nectar as possible to build fat stores within her body. Finally, she seeks out a hibernation site that will remain cool, dry and undetected until a point months later the earth warms and blossoms become available once again for nutrition.

In the spring the new queen forges a new colony by depositing just a dozen or so eggs, fertilized the previous fall by her doomed suitor, into a honeycomb that she has created from her own secretions. Thus the tale begins anew.

Flu vaccines that are recommended for older adults

Dear Savvy Senior,

I just turned 65 and would like to learn more about the stronger flu shots I see advertised for older adults. What can you tell me about them and how are they covered by Medicare?

Senior Novice

Dear Novice,

There are actually three different types of senior-specific flu shots — you only need one - the CDC is now recommending to people age 65 and older. These FDA-approved annual vaccines are designed to offer extra protection beyond what a standard flu shot provides, which is important for older adults who have weaker immune defenses and have a greater risk of developing dangerous flu complications. Here's more information on these three vaccines.

Fluzone High-Dose Quadrivalent

Approved for U.S. use in 2009, the Fluzone High-Dose is a high-potency vaccine that contains four times the amount of antigen as a regular flu shot



does, which creates a stronger immune response for better protection. According to a study published in the New England Journal of Medicine, this vaccine was proven 24% more effective than the regular dose shot at preventing flu in seniors.

Fluad Quadrivalent

First available in the U.S. in 2016, this adjuvanted vaccine contains an added ingredient called adjuvant MF59, which also helps create a stronger immune response. In a 2013 observational study, Fluad was found 51% more effective in preventing flu-related hospitalizations for older patients than a standard flu shot.

You also need to be aware both the Fluzone High-Dose and Fluad vaccines can cause more of the mild side effects that can occur with a standard-dose flu shot, like pain or tenderness where you got the shot, muscle aches, headache, or fatigue. And neither vaccine is recommended for seniors who are allergic to chicken eggs or those who have had a severe reaction to a flu vaccine in the past.

Also note the CDC does not recommend one vaccination over the other.

FluBlok Quadrivalent

For older adults who are allergic to eggs, FluBlok, which is a recombinant vaccine that does not use chicken eggs in its manufacturing process, is your best option. This vaccine is proven to be 30% more effective than a standard-dose influenza vaccine in preventing flu in people age 50 and older.

All of these vaccines are covered 100% by Medicare Part B as long as your doctor, health clinic or pharmacy agrees not to charge you more than Medicare pays.

Pneumonia vaccines

Another important vaccination the CDC recommends to seniors, especially this time of year, are the pneumococcal vaccines for pneumonia. Around 1.5 million Americans visit medical emergency departments each year because of pneumonia, and about 50,000 people die from it.

The CDC recently updated its recommendations for the pneumococcal vaccine and now recommends everyone 65 and older who has not previously received any pneumococcal vaccine should get either PCV20 (Prevnar 20) or PCV15 (Vaxneu-

vance). If PCV15 is used, this should be followed by a dose of PPSV23 (Pneumovax23) at least one year later.

Or if you've previously received a PPSV23 shot, you should get one dose of PCV15 or PCV20 at least one year later.

Medicare Part B also covers two different pneumococcal shots — the first shot at any time and a different, second shot if it's given at least one year after the first shot.

COVID booster

If you haven't already done so, you also should get a COVID-19 booster shot this fall. Both Moderna and Pfizer have developed new bivalent booster vaccines that add an Omicron BA 4/5 component to the old formula, which provides better protection.

And those coaches need to communicate to their players how to do that.


The Browns wouldn't say specifically who missed his assignment, but according to reports safety Grant Delpit didn't realize they were supposed to be in a

Raising voices in service to something way bigger

With apologies to Rodgers and Hammerstein, in my elementary school, the halls were alive with the sound of music.

That's halls, not hills. Just wanted to make sure you got the pun.

We sang in church ... we sang in class ... we sang in the cafeteria ... once, we even sang on the playground. This was on the Monday morning after "Hey Jude" premiered on



national – or was it global? – television, and four of us gathered around the trash barrel down by the horses' hitching post and blended our voices in the now immortal and epic, "Na-na-na-na-na, na-na-

na" coda

That was 1968. By then, we'd already been singing for five years.

I fear, perhaps, that over the course of the 30-plus years these epistles have been appearing in print, that I might have given a slightly exaggerated impression of parochial discipline, that my descriptions of nuns and their steel rulers rapping knuckles and priests and their impossibly strict standards for altar boys may have been, well, a trifle over the top in terms of journalistic accuracy.

Then again, there's an oldfashioned newspaper saying that goes something like, "Never let facts get in the way of a good story."

Let's face it.

No one wants to read something boring. That's death. Writers would rather scribble shopping lists than have their words ignored.

We live in a new landscape these days and I understand its shifting terrain and fully comprehend the click-bait mentality that foments the hairpulling anxieties that plague big-time bosses everywhere.

But I will stake my reputation on this simple, unshakeable truth: If your writing can't attract readers, you'd be better off selling ads.

Lower-case "catholic," to get us back to school, means universal and that's how I remember my days as a student. We learned a lot about everything, including theology, but that was only a part of it.

Take physical education. We didn't have gym class, per se, probably because we didn't have a gym, but that didn't preclude our exposure to strengthening our bodies. There were no organized team sports, either, but there were recesses at 10:15 and after lunch, which meant that we were always involved in some kind of competition – football or kickball or some variant of baseball – and those games were played on asphalt, meaning that it could hurt.

A lot.

Sometimes, if the weather was benign and the teacher was in a good mood, we'd be released for another 10 minutes or so in the afternoon, which was another chance to run off some energy.

And then there was something called isometrics. It was a late-Sixties fad, akin to fondue parties, with the goal of exercising without any equipment, just various parts of the body.

Here's an example you can try right now: Press your palms together, with your fingers touching your wrists, in sort of an inverse prayer position. Push them against each other for a minute, keeping up the pressure, then relax. After 30 seconds, do it again.

And again ... and again.

But what we did mostly was sing. I don't recall anything resembling tryouts. It was just assumed everyone could do it.

That was an assumption bordering on the miraculous, I suppose, but as a school func-

tion, it helped define the word "universal."

We attended Mass every morning without fail and that served as a kind of vocal tune-up for whatever lay in store for the rest of the day. Sometimes, we got ready for a visit from some distinguished guest, an alumna who had gone into the nunnery, for example.

I still remember the words we learned:

"You're as welcome as the flowers in May,

and we love you in the same old way.

We've been waiting for you day by day:

You're as welcome as the flowers in May."

Add in some background harmonies and some echoed phrases and we were ready to sign a record deal on the spot.
