

'The Doddfather' ready for next chapter in life

West Holmes High School band director Brian Dodd has been a staple at the school for the better part of three decades. During that time the man tabbed "Doddfather" after Don Corleone's famous character in the movie, "The Godfather," has touched the lives of thousands of students and community members.

This winter Dodd officially announced his retirement after 38 years of teaching, a stint that included 14 years at East Knox High School before he made his way to WHHS, where he has gained state-wide notoriety including his work as director of the Ohio State Fair band, where he worked with the most gifted high school musicians throughout Ohio.

Before telling the community, Dodd felt his first step in announcing his retirement needed to be with his students. That day brought many tears, such is the relationship and bond he has built with his students.

"One phase of life ends; another begins," Dodd said of his retirement. "I love this job. This has been my dream job. But I also know a smart man knows when it's time to move on to the next phase of life, and that time has come."

Dodd said he hopes to spend more time with his mother and grandchildren, with his eldest grandchild becoming a marching band member in Mapleton. An avid bicyclist and active outdoorsman, as well as someone who enjoys volunteering to help others, Dodd said while he doesn't yet know what the future holds, it will easily get filled with the things for which he holds a passion.

"I've always been one to tell others to make sure to set aside time for themselves, and I think it's time to heed my own advice," Dodd said.

While he is retiring as WHHS band director and teacher, Dodd ference in said that part of his life won't cease Dodd said.

to exist. He said he will continue to do work with universities and find ways to work with young people. One of those ways will be to continue his work with the state fair band.

"I'll get to continue to do work with kids from all over the state of Ohio, which has always been a joy to me," Dodd said. "It's not like Brian Dodd's no longer going to be a director. The way I presented it to the kids was that they graduate eventually. In this case I'm graduating after just 38 years."

All through his high school years as a student, Dodd had his sight set on going into medicine. He was involved with band, but he felt called to the medical field. That changed his senior year when he switched gears toward becoming a music educator.

For East Knox and West Holmes students and communities, it was the best outcome possible.

"I had some great teacher role models in my life, and from the beginning, I knew I wanted to carry on the idea of making a difference in young people's lives," Dodd said.

His initial foray into teaching music began at East Knox in 1986 when he was invited to interview for the band director role. He began the program with 28 students, and 14 years later, he had 115 band members, nearly half the high school population.

He interviewed with West Holmes in 1999, and then Superintendent Gary Gehm and thenband director Roger Wheeler were instrumental in bringing him on board.

"I wouldn't be here if it weren't for Roger," Dodd said. "I owe Roger my career. I initially didn't take the job because my father had health issues. The next year the job came up again, and Roger came to me and invited me back."

With West Holmes in the process of building its new and current high school, Gehm and Dodd walked around the unfinished building.

"There was a pond where the pit is right now," Dodd said.

He knew when he left that day, he was taking the job, and the rest is history.

Dodd took over the Knights' band program and built it into one that has been emulated throughout the state. His innovation and commitment to developing growth in individuals in the marching band, pep band, concert band and more has inspired countless young people to invest in an instrument.

Now each day, each event and every moment that has been commonplace for Dodd becomes the last one. That list includes 13 band trips to Florida, two to Washington D.C., numerous trips to the state fair, parades, half-time performances, football and basketball events and many more.

He said he will cherish each moment as the days to retirement tick down.

"I am so thankful for the people and communities of West Holmes and East Knox," Dodd said. "I loved my time here. There are times when I wish I didn't love my job so much because maybe then it would be easier to step down. Knight Nation has been tremendous. The support they give our kids is second to none."

Now he and his wife Lori will begin a new adventure, and where it leads this beloved instructor is yet to be seen, but he's excited about where the path may lead.

"I know there's a plan out there for me, and I know it is going to include continuing to be a positive role model for young people," Dodd said. "I'm retiring, but I'm not ready to give up being that person."

## Charm ping pong tourney a path to giving

On Saturday, March 4, the Oasis Center near Charm will be filled with the sounds of pinging and ponging during the annual Pine Pallet Ping Pong Tournament that has developed a reputation of bringing in not only the finest amateur players in the area, but also some top-quality players from all around the state.

The tournament, now in year seven, brings ping pong enthusiasts together for not only a fun time, but also a great cause. Intertwined with the cacophony of play on close to two dozen tables will be the overriding goal of raising money for a local family struggling with medical bills.

This year's recipient will be the Matt and Joanna Yoder family, whose infant son Cohen Wayne was born with gastroschisis, a birth defect where there is a hole in the abdominal wall beside the belly button. The baby's intestines are located outside of the baby's body, exiting through the hole.

"It's a heart-breaking situation," Yoder said. "They've experienced a lengthy stay in the hospital, but it is inspiring to see their love and the compassion of the community come to their aid. That's really what this tournament is all about."






## Ag Success group increases efforts to save farmland

By Dan Starcher

What began in 2004 with a group of farmers meeting each month to help grow the local farming community and strengthen Wayne County's agriculturerelated economy has evolved into a group trying to save farmland.

The Agricultural Success Team will host an informational meeting on March 7 from 5-8 p.m. at the Buckeye Agricultural Museum and Education Center, 877 W. Old Lincoln Way, Wooster, to discuss issues that plague local farmers. Anyone interested in helping shape the future of Wayne County's economy and agricultural landscape can register to attend by calling event coordinator Jessica Eikleberry at 330-347-7183 or by emailing jessica.eikleberry@ gmail.com by Feb. 20.

According to a study published in 2022 by the United States Department of Agriculture, the number of farms in 2021 was estimated at 2,012,050 down 6,950 farms from the previous year. Total 2021 farmland of 895,300,000 acres decreased by 1,300,000 acres from 2020.

"Agriculture accounts for 21%

of our economy," Wayne County commissioner Sue Smail said. "We were recently told by the American Farmland Trust that our farmland is 81% nationally significant. This means that we have some of the best farmland in the nation, and it is best suited for long-term production of crops."

To stress the importance of the local agricultural economy, the American Farmland Trust points to an Ohio State study that used

the North American Industry Classification System to determine the percentage agriculture contributed to each sector and concluded Wayne County's agricultural industry infuses roughly \$1.2 billion into the local economy. "That is a significant number,"

Smail said. "It is our responsibility to determine a path forward given these difficult circumstances.'

The landscape of modern agriculture is rapidly changing.

aspiring to operate a farm and the value of farmland at a record high is putting the agricultural industry on edge.

'There is a huge financial incentive to sell land to developers," Smail said. "We are starting to see some concern from active farmers about how it will impact the county's future."

As the population grows, food production will need to increase to meet the demand. But with less farmland and fewer farmers, there is a growing uneasiness about the future of agriculture in general.

Frank Becker of Ohio State University Extension has observed the writing on the wall.

Becker said it is challenging to ask a person who is being offered \$3 or \$4 million for their farm to keep living off of their Social Security check because their land is needed for agricultural use, especially if the family's next generation isn't interested in taking over the operation.

"Once that farmland is gone, we won't get it back; it is gone

The combination of fewer people don't know how to drive that point home to people outside the agricultural community. They aren't making new farmland."

According to AFT statistics, between 2001 and 2016, 11 million acres of farmland were converted to urban use across the nation

"When farmland becomes this expensive, it has a two-sided effect on agriculture," AFT senior program advisor Julia Freedgood said during the meeting. "It is tough to expand an existing farm. and it is tempting to sell because you can make so much money."

Farmland acreage is shrinking, and nationally, farms are losing topsoil at an alarming rate. The AFT's mission is to protect farmland, promote sound farming practices and keep farmers on the

"We don't want to sound like alarmists," Smail said. "But we must protect our local agricultural industry by discovering the issues farmers face and facilitate solutions to those issues."

## Poll workers needed for upcoming Wayne primary

Poll worker volunteers are needed in Wayne County for the upcoming primary election to be held May 4.

'Without poll workers, elections would not be possible," said Meredith Holder, election operations manager with the Wavne County Board of Elections. "Our office only has four full-time staff members and one part-time employee. We couldn't implement an election without people from the community stepping up to volunteer."

It takes a minimum of 268 volunteers for each election. A poll worker is paid \$123 for working on election day and receives an additional \$30 for the mandatory three-hour training to be held March 16. Election workers set up and tear down the voting equipment, check in voters as they come in to vote and staff a polling place all day on election day.

The time commitment

includes about an hour the ty while others only wish afternoon or evening before the election to help set up the polling location. Election day hours are from 5 a.m. to around 8:30 p.m. or until the machines are packed up.

Volunteers may stipulate where and how far they are willing to travel on the day of the election. "Some people are willing to work anywhere in Wayne Coun-

to work 15 minutes from home or in their usual polling place," Holder said.

Anyone who is a registered voter in Wayne County may volunteer. Seventeen-year-olds who are residents of Wayne County also may work at the polls. Some employers may allow an employee to take a day off to volunteer.

Holder anticipates the upcoming primary will be a slower election day for the workers. Volunteers are encouraged to bring reading, crossword puzzles, knitting, et cetera, to pass the time when there are no voters in the building. For those interested in participating as a volunteer in the next presidential election, this primary will be important practice.

Anyone wanting to find out more about volunteering is encouraged to call the board of elections at 330-287-5480 to sign up or email wayne@ohiosos.gov. The deadline to sign up to be a poll worker is March 3.

There also is a need for

volunteers to be leaders at their polling places. "Each precinct has one leader." Holder said. "So that means

that we need 67 leaders for every election.

'A lot of poll workers enjoy helping their neighbors and friends while working on election day. Many also appreciate the opportunity to be a part of history by implementing elections. Some of our volunteers like to meet new people and have developed lasting friendships with other volunteers."

## Wooster Twp. Fire Dept. Pancake Day is March 4

It's that time of year again — spring is just hinting at its arrival as the coffee starts brewing and the pancakes are ready to be flipped. On Saturday, March 4, it's the Wooster Township Fire Department annual Pancake Day.

For the fundraiser the fire department serves unlimited pancakes and sausage. applesauce and beverages and has the annual raffle. Dine-in, take-out and drivethru options will be offered, and signs will direct community members to the correct areas for either parking or drive-thru service.

The first Pancake Day was held in 1986.

"It started as a way to help offset the cost of needed equipment for the fire department without using tax dollars," Fire Chief Dallas Terrell said.

He said after that first year, recipes were tweaked and perfected, and the department now uses the

same products and recipes that have been used since the second Pancake Day.

In 1986 about 600 people were served. The number of meals served grew to 2,725 in 2022, a record for the event. Approximately 10,000 pancakes were flipped last year.

The annual event is an all-day affair. Terrell said many people come to the event more than once during the day.

"Lots of people will join us for multiple meals throughout the day," he said. "Pancakes and sausage are great for breakfast, but breakfast food is great for supper too."

Every year a cash prize raffle is held along with the pancake meal.

"A lot of times people are very generous with their winnings and will even donate that back to us as another way for them to show their support and to help the cause," Terrell said.

This year the funds will

The Wooster Township Fire Department was formed in 1940.

"The department is an integral part of the community and endeavors to protect life and property of the citizens," Terrell said. "The department provides fire-suppression operations, advanced life-support services and water-rescue operations to the community. In addition, the department provides fire-prevention education to schools and community groups and fire-inspection services to businesses."

The department consists of eight full-time and approximately 35 volunteers who serve as firefighters and emergency medical technicians or paramedics.

## Workshop addresses area poverty, some fixes for it

Poverty is often hidden in the community, and few realize how many people are impacted and to what extent. In mid-January community members came together in a poverty workshop to identify small actions to make a difference in Wayne County.

The duo of Cassie Shaum and Olufemi Olugbemiro started offering these poverty workshops four or five years ago while both were working at Community Action Wayne/Medina. Shaum said she often gets asked how poverty can exist with so many job openings in the county.

This workshop was her answer to the question — a way to show the multitude of complex drivers of poverty.

Also for Shaum, the issue is personal.

"My mom had me when she was 15 and my sister when she was 18. My mother came from generational poverty," said Shaum, who was able to break the cycle.

She currently is the social service manager at CAW/M and runs its Head Start program, which targets preschool-aged children and their families.

"We realized that there is a need for building a bridge between the different sides of the tracks. That bridge will allow different groups to understand what other groups are going through," Olugbemiro said.

Olugbemiro's moment of clarity came from teaching a Getting Ahead program to women in a local domestic violence shelter. The program provides workforce development, soft skills and coaching.

'(Through teaching that program), I came to the realization that there are a lot of working poor in the community, and it debunked the myth that poor people are lazy," Olugbemiro said. "Today all 10 graduated, and nine of them got better jobs and are doing well. And I link that to the support that they got through Community Action and other agencies

in the county. That showed four making \$27,750 or less me that something can be done; we can lift people out of poverty, even if one at a time."

### Addressing poverty locally

The Addressing Poverty Workshop, co-sponsored by CAW/M, United Way of Wayne and Holmes Counties, and the Mental Health Recovery Board of Wayne & Holmes County, was hosted by the Wooster Community Hospital.

Workshop participants started with definitions: Poverty is a lack of ability to meet your basic needs. One can measure it using the poverty index, which for Wayne County means a family of

each year. In Wayne County a little less than one of every 10 people live in poverty.

Three barriers were discussed in the workshop. Lack of transportation is an issue in the county, and even those who do own a car may find they cannot afford gas or the necessary repairs for their vehicle.

Lack of time is a big challenge for everyone but can be especially burdensome for those who work hourly jobs and are too busy to get the support they need.

One participant who works with the Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children

Disaster Aid Ohio reaching beyond the Buckeye State

## By Dave Mast

The name Disaster Aid Ohio ■ might imply the group of volunteers is willing to roll up their sleeves and lend a hand any time a disaster of great magnitude hits Ohio.

However, the love and compassion are so great that Ohio's borders can't contain this group from reaching out to other areas of the nation that are beset by

Disaster Aid Ohio is currently sending volunteer teams to both Texas and Louisiana to help with the cleanup and rebuilding process, following hurricanes that took place last fall.

According to Gid Yoder, director of the DAO projects, the organization has been sending teams south every two weeks, an effort that began last November and continues today.

"We're sending about 48 people every two weeks," Yoder said.

One location receiving aid from DAO is in Lake Charles. Louisiana, which continues to struggle in its recovery from two major hurricanes over the past two years. The second area is in Magellan, Texas, where they are building housing structures that will be home for immigrants for anywhere from two weeks to two months, until they can find proper entry into the United States.

According to Yoder, the primary goal is to help clean, build, paint and assist in the building and rebuilding of structures.

The DAO season begins in early November and ends in late

build new homes or do repair work, depending on how devastating the disaster was," Yoder said.

Yoder said the group is careful not to step on the toes of local contractors and compete for their work. He said DAO only works with families who can't afford to hire contractors.

"Our aim is to help those in need who can't help themselves because they can't afford to hire a contractor," Yoder said.

He also said when DAO does venture into an area to aid, they try to purchase materials at the local level to help support those communities in need.

Yoder said the effort through DAO has been ongoing for close to a decade, and the organization has a lengthy list of volunteers willing to head south for two weeks to lend their skills to the project.

He said oftentimes volunteers will serve multiple weeks, with many of them coming back year after year to continue to serve others. He said this season they will have had around 500 total volunteers serving in the two sites, meaning there will be approximately 1.7 million hours of donated time during that stretch.

Yoder said while the organization is faith-based, when they travel to a site to work, they don't push their faith on people and simply let their faith grow out of them organically as the weeks

We definitely don't push anything on anyone when we go, but it always seems that eventually people will connect with us and bring up the idea of faith and why we do what we do," Yoder said. "I think when we make connections like that, they will almost naturally open up and want to learn more about you. That certainly is a benefit of what we do in addition to building.'

Those relationships have prov-"Depending on the need, we en to be long-lasting and valuable as the group rebuilds lives following disasters.

He said watching each project progress is inspiring, seeing how God's hand and their faith can

Yoder said at Lake Charles DAO was struggling with funds

for enough material to make a big dent, but once the area began connecting with them, donations from those who could help throughout the area began pouring in and materials were purchased.

In the midst of serving others, Yoder said the rewards and benefits don't stop with the people being blessed by these volunteers.

Our community gains more than anybody else because of the way we are blessed in serving others," Yoder said. "Our youth volunteers get to see different cultures and see how much of a blessing serving others can be."

In addition to the work down south, there's a new Mennonite Disaster Services warehouse in Holmes County, an appropriate place for the warehouse to exist due to the vast amount of support the organization receives from Holmes County.

After a lengthy time of trying to find the right fit, Mennonite Disaster Services and Disaster Aid Ohio dedicated a new warehouse near Berlin on Sunday, Jan.

The dream to build a new warehouse began in August 2021, and after finding the necessary land, MDS broke ground last June.

Amid rising costs for material, MDS was able to forge ahead with the project and completed it recently. The warehouse is now up and running, and the dream has become a reality that will help keep volunteers well-supplied in



noted a challenge facing the populations she serves: "We service people 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and people work 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. People are too busy to get into our clinic."

"Mental health is another barrier," Shaum said. "They may be struggling to get the mental healthcare they need while in crisis.

"What makes people successful? What takes people from these dire straits and puts them in opportunity? It's often things like mentorship, stability and increased ability to attend to our basic needs."

The participants identified more support to mentorship programs in Wayne County as being an immediate solution to work on.

"For me, one key takeaway was the proven importance of mentorship, for both adults and kids living in poverty. Knowing that someone cares and is there to help them navigate the resources and options available can really make a difference," said Melanie Garcia, workshop participant and executive director of the Wayne County Community Foundation. "Luckily, we have mentoring programs in place in our community — they just need more volunteers to serve all the kids waiting for mentors."

A recent solution CAW/M is starting to explore is unrestricted funds for safety net issues for stability. Shaum said these new funds cover needs outside of the normal ser-

vices offered by the organization.

There's a gradually shifting perspective in the social services community that only those in poverty can fully understand their own circumstances and needs. Shaum used an analogy of a pyramid that no longer has the base to keep it stable. That's what those living in poverty often face when they lose a job at no notice or have an urgent medical need.

"That's what is really cool about this new unrestricted fund that James Fox, our CEO, developed," Shaum said. "We are putting that pillar back in to give that individual stability when they most need it. We can't stop poverty. But we can aid the symptoms of poverty."


Police Chief Kevin Kaser gave a year-end report for 2022. Police responded to 3,388 calls for service, and total telephone calls were 4,800.



# Finding JOY in the JOURNEY

Miller's trek to weight loss and running inspiring for all ages

For Crist Miller, hurdles are only obstacles on the path to success.

A few years ago, Miller never dreamed about running at all, let alone running competitively.

However, one step led to another, and overcoming one obstacle opened the door for him to give running a try.

Since then he has grown passionate about running, and it all began with the shedding of pounds.



For a middle-aged man who had zero experience running, Miller's journey serves as an inspiring story that anyone, no matter the age or physical condition, can accomplish great things if he or she is willing to commit and remain determined.

"Running is a joy for me, but the one thing I want to do more than anything is to inspire others to commit to working at getting healthier," Miller said.

Several years ago Miller's wife Rosanna Miller was utilizing a weight-loss plan and had experienced success. She wanted to continue, but due to the cost of the plan, she couldn't afford to proceed and was forced to seek an alternate solution.

In 2015 the couple happened upon Total Life Changes, an allnatural supplement weight-loss plan that was identical to what Rosanna was doing but at a fraction of the cost.

Seeing his wife lose weight inspired Miller, who said at the time he didn't feel like he needed to lose much weight.

Then reality sunk in, and he quickly realized he was incorrect.

"Once I got started, I knew I had no idea where I was truly at with my weight," Miller said. "I ended up losing 40 pounds. I never realized how overweight I was."

Like everyone who loses a good deal of weight, the weightloss challenge is only the beginning of the process. The task of keeping the weight off is the true challenge, and Miller immediately began to consider different ways he would best keep the weight off.

'Money was tight, so I started looking into different things and felt the cheapest way I could invest in keeping the weight off was buying a pair of running shoes and start running," Miller said.

His first endeavor into the running world didn't last long. He made it one-quarter mile and was whipped, but it was a starting point, and Miller was determined not to let his weight-loss effort go to waste

Every couple of days, he went out and went a little further. Eventually, his 2-mile journeys were peppered with stretches of running coupled with walking. By the end of two weeks, he was running the full 2 miles.

"It took a little time to get to the point where I really enjoyed running because I was so out of shape. but once I settled in, it became a passion," Miller said. "With-

out that weight loss, it probably wouldn't have ever happened."

He said one large factor in his running journey, one that can trap people hopeful to get into running, was it was OK to simply slow things down and take his time to build up his stamina.

Then came Miller's big break. His son's friend was the head cross country coach at Norwayne High School. He gave Miller the

number, and a 15-minute conver-

sation taught Miller many of the tricks of the trade when it comes to running, including conserving energy and proper form.

Techniques included correct arm swing, upper-body form and the importance of creating a pendulum swing with your arms that works as a counterbalance with the legs.

Suddenly, all of these parts of running came together, and Miller knew existed.

"I think the biggest thing he taught me was that when you run, you want to let your arms control your speed," Miller said.
Six weeks after he ran 2 miles

for the first time, he began running 10 miles. The technique enhancement and confidence were paying off, and at 46 years old, Miller was starting to get excited about the possibilities.

He began entering 5k races, where he found immediate success, winning his division.

Miller was hooked.

This past summer Miller tackled the Akron Marathon, his first effort to run a marathon.

His goal was to come in under four hours. His time was 3:59.15.

"I was thrilled," Miller said.

While this year's schedule of races includes another run in the Akron Marathon, the Indianapolis Marathon, the local Amish Country Half-Marathon and others, his goal is to qualify for the acme of running events, the Boston Mara-

Miller said diet and exercise go hand in hand when losing weight, and when people lose weight, they will be amazed at how energetic they will feel. He said that energy opened the door for him to invest in running as a way to maintain the weight loss.

Not only that, running in the early morning has created a perfect time to provide mental and spiritual solitude for Miller, helpwas running in a style he never ing him set the stage for each day.



That statement is especially true for the Wayne County Care Center.


For more than 170 years, the facility has been adapting to the community's needs and has established a reputation for service throughout its history.







# What regenerative ag is, and what it means to us

tion, reports that adding more carbon dioxide to the environment is causing global temperatures to rise. In fact, observations from the NOAA Global Monitoring Lab in 2021 revealed that carbon dioxide alone was responsible for about two-thirds of the total heating influence of all human-produced greenhouse gases. GreenAmerica® reports that, at scale, regenerative agriculture could help to reverse the climate crisis by drawing down atmospheric carbon dioxide.

Another reason to consider regenerative agriculture is its connection to topsoil. GreenAmerica® reports that the world is on the cusp of running out of topsoil, which is vital to growing food. Regenerative agriculture rebuilds topsoil, which can lead to greater food security across the globe.



## How labor shortages are impacting agriculture

The agricultural workforce is shrinking, and has been for some time. The American Farm Bureau Federation estimates there are roughly 2.4 million farm jobs that need to be filled annually, but there has been a drastic decline in workers each year.

There are a number of reasons for the shortages. The AFBF says more than 73 percent of farm workers

are immigrants from South America and Mexico. While the United States' H2-A visa program, which allows employers who meet specific requirements to bring foreign laborers

in for temporary work, has increased the number of accepted applications for immigrants to 250,000, this number is still just a drop in the bucket in terms of labor needs.

Another factor is a career in agriculture isn't always easy or lucrative. According to the U.S Department of Agriculture, for every dollar spent on food, a farmer receives only 7.6 cents. Farmers were predicted to lose 9.7 percent of total net income in 2021.

Declining interest in the field has also affected the number of farm workers. As more farm operators reach retirement age, fewer young farmers are replacing them due to volatile pricing, high real estate and land costs, steep initial machinery investment costs, and other factors. The physical demand of the industry also takes its toll. So what does this mean for the agricultural industry?

Many with knowledge of

the industry indicate sweeping changes are warranted. Ellen Poeschi, the project director for the National Association of Agricultural Educators Teach Ag campaign, has said that a lack of agricultural education is contributing to the problem. Increasing availability of ag education courses across the country could build interest in the industry. Connecting students to internships or mentors may help, too.

Another option is to rally for greater economic opportunities in agriculture. The ag industry in general

needs to find ways to make the economic benefits more competitive to other industries, and improve the working conditions and job flexibility. Agricultural industries currently average only 60 percent of what other industries offer in salaries. Farm wages have been rising due to the H-2A program, which requires farm worker pay to be higher than the state/federal minimum wage. More change is needed, but this may have to come at the federal level or be sparked by efforts on the part of agricultural advo-

cacy groups.

Additional strategies farm operators can employ to combat shortages are: scaling back farm operations; integrating ag technology to reduce labor burdens; pivoting to crops that require fewer laborers; leasing portions of land to have extra money; employing temporary guest workers; and moving operations abroad.

Worker shortages continue to be problematic for the agricultural industry. A greater focus on remedying the issue is needed on a grand scale.

## How rising food demand is having an effect on farming

The population is growing and so is its demand for food to fuel those extra bodies. The global population has quadrupled over the last century. It's predicted that, by 2050, the population will exceed nine billion people. The world is not able to

feed all of its inhabitants. There are more than one billion people who are estimated to lack sufficient food, and two billion who do not receive adequate nutrition. Researchers concluded that, to feed the world by 2030, yields on maize, rice, wheat, and sovbeans will have to rise by 60 to 110 percent. At the start of 2023, projections show them only increasing by 45 to 60 percent. There are a few reasons why food supply may not meet up with demand.

-Climate change: Climate change is predicted to cause issues to crop yields, especially in portions of the world where the population is growing the fastest. For example, a recent NASA study published in the journal Nature predicts that high greenhouse gas emissions may cause corn output to decline as early as 2030, but wheat output would increase. Farmers may need to roll with the punches and shift operations to cope with the environmental changes.

-Decreased commercial farming interest: Fewer people are working in farming. Land prices for expansion, new government mandates and regulations, and the impact of immigration



and trade policies have made farming less attractive than it once was. Fewer commercial operations result in a diminished food commodity output.

-Consumer waste: Food loss and waste (FLW) is a widespread issue, posing a challenge to food security. The World Bank estimates 30 percent of all food across the globe is wasted, amounting to 1.3 billion tons of food per year. The average global household wastes 74 kg of food each year, according to the United Nations Environment Programme's 2021 Food Waste Index. Food waste is an issue that needs a solution as the world looks for ways to feed an expanding population in the decades to come.

In order to improve output, farmers have to make some changes. These can include investment in tools and technologies that enable farmers to apply nutrients more precisely and at lower cost. Seeds that need less water and fewer nutrients, as well as new fertilizers that are less likely to be lost to air and water, are some additional ideas. Farmers also may want to employ green practices, such as hydroponics and drip irrigation, if they haven't already, to improve efficiency and cut costs. The public also may need to petition their lawmakers to make it easier for farm workers arriving on working visas to man the fields.

Food demand continues to rise, and it has become challenging for agricultural operations to keep up.

## Steps farmers can take to combat climate change

Climate change is a challenge the world must confront together. Though people from all walks of life and in all corners of the world will be affected by rising global temperatures and the ripple effects of such increases, the impact of climate change on the agricultural sector figures to be especially significant.

Farmers have been on the front lines in the fight against climate change for decades. When storms strike and climate patterns shift,



farmers must find ways to adapt or potentially lose their livelihoods. Experts warn that the planet is warming at a pace that could prove devastating. The California Climate & Agriculture Networks notes that more than half of the state's agricultural emissions come from livestock in the form of methane. The nonprofit organization Foodwise reports that holistic, pasture-based livestock management utilizing practices like rotational grazing can help mitigate methane emissions from livestock

use of fertilizers. The EEA recommends efficient use of fertilizers as another means to reduce agricultural greenhouse gas emissions. The National Institute of Food and Agriculture at the U.S. Department of Agriculture notes that the greatest efficiency typically comes from the first increment of added fertilizer/nutrients, with each additional increment thereafter resulting in lower efficiency. Making every effort to make the most of initial applications can save farmers money and reduce the impact on the environment.

—Participate in and help promote local farmers markets. Foodwise notes that food in the United States travels an average of 1,500 miles before it ends up on consumers' plates. Transporting foods that far contributes to more greenhouse gas emissions. Farmers who can sell to local farmers markets can help reduce such emissions. Promoting those

## Green farming is growing as it helps environment

Farmers have been pressured to increase production to meet the demand of a growing population. This may require employing more efficient measures to ensure maximum output. Unfortunately, efficiency doesn't always mesh with sustainability, so commercial operations have had to make some modifications to find a balance between serving the public and protecting the planet.



Green farming utilizes different technology and practices in order to decrease detrimental impact on the environment. According to the farming resource NuFarming, agricultural opera-

tions have a significant benefits when solar comimpact on climate change. Simply adopting some new practices can lessen that impact.

#### Solar power

Growing plants are not the only thing on a farm that can benefit from the sun. Farmers can convert a portion or all of their power needs to solar. According to the U.S. Department of Energy, there are

panies and farmers work together. Solar developers reduce installation costs and upfront risk by placing solar modules on previously tilled agricultural land. Vegetation under modules also can contribute to lower soil temperatures and increased solar performance. Solar is not the only renewable energy option. Farmers can incorporate wind and hydroelectric power as well.

#### **Crop rotation**

Farmers reduce the chances for pests and diseases becoming problems in the soil because frequent crop changes prevent invaders from gaining a foothold. Farmers use fewer fertilizers and pesticides as a result.

#### Hydroponic and aquaponic strategies

Farmers can improve productivity while also reducing environmental impact with these two growing methods. NuEnergy states that hydroponic systems grow plants in mineral solutions or

Drip irrigation methods deliver water to the roots of plants through a series of pipes or tubes. Because water is not being sprayed into the air through sprinklers and other methods, less is lost to evaporation, and less water overall may be needed to provide for crops.

#### **Plasticulture**

Plastic seems like it may not have a purpose on the farm, but recycled in materials like perlite plastic, which is used in

or gravel. Aquaponics plastic mulch, can help produce plentiful crops with less water. Plastic mulches raise soil temperatures and insulate against evaporation so plants can grow faster and mature sooner. Invasive weeds also may be less likely to take root in plastic mulch or when crops are grown on black plastic.

#### Natural pesticides

Farmers can introduce plants that pests tend not to like to reduce reliance on chemical pesticides. For example, interspersing crops with natural bug repellants, such as basil, lavender and lemongrass, may keep insects at bay. Alliums, chrysanthemums, marigolds, and other flowers planted nearby also may deter bugs.

Green farming is something more agricultural operations may want to adopt.

Scrapyard Wrestling Club at 38 seconds for his lone victory. Fellow state qualifier Finn McClintock (sixth, 150) had a tough day, posting a 0-2 record.

The Attack Team finished 31st in the 97-team field with 31 points. Louisville (183.5) won the team title over Barberton Purple (133.5).

The state tournament wrapped up a very successful season for the Attack Team, which finished 12-0 during the OYWA Mid-Ohio Division dual meet season, won its division varsity tournament, qualified 17 wres-

tlers from sectionals to districts while snaring the sectional team title, advanced four of the district qualifiers to the state tournament and finished the season with two state placers.

#### Leyda becomes third Knight to qualify for junior high state tournament

West Holmes Middle School wrestler Colton Leyda qualified for the Ohio Athletic Committee Junior High State Championships after posting a fifth-place finish at the OAC State Championships District Qualifier at New Lexington High School on Sunday, Feb. 19.

Just missing out on a state berth was eighth-grader Jordan Gerber, who will be a state alternate after finishing seventh at 154. Christopher Williams (eighth, 138) placed eighth and will be a state second alternate. For several other middle school Knights wrestlers, their seasons ended.

"I was very proud of our boys," Knights coach Justin Wilcox said. "Keeping in mind that this is the offseason and everything at this stage is optional, we came out with aggression, intensity and focus. As a whole we definitely did our best wrestling of the year."

Leyda (eighth, 164) received an opening-round bye, scored a 9-0 major decision win over Hoyt Gore (Unattached) and then pinned Maguire Werntz (Unattached) at 1:59 to reach the championship semifinals and sew up a top six qualifying spot. Leyda (3-2, two falls) dropped by fall at 2:53 to Nolan Dietrich (Massillon Perry) in the semifinals to drop into the consolation bracket. Leyda then fell by a 4-2 decision to Tanner Bankes (McConnelsville Morgan) in the consolation semifinals but rebounded in the fifth-place match, scoring a 3-2 decision victory over Carter Sherman (Cardington-Lincoln).

## Bears, Knights lead area postseason mat charge

Benjamin Franklin famously said, "Nothing can be certain, except death and taxes."

Area wrestling fans know something else to be guaranteed: Waynedale and West Holmes will be the top local mat teams.

The Golden Bears won their 12th straight Wayne County Athletic League title and 16th in the last 17 years on Feb. 18 while West Holmes placed third in a highly competitive Ohio Cardinal Conference Meet.

The conference meets started the time of the year high school wrestlers, coaches and fans live for. The month-long gauntlet of league meets, sectionals, districts and the state tournament are when years of hard work can pay off.

Waynedale was led by WCAL individual champions Stephen Patterson (106 pounds), Ashton Kauf (126), Caden Schmeltzer (132), Cole Lewis (144) and

Robert McCrork (150) as it racked up 197 points.

The Bears graduated eight seniors including six state qualifiers from last season's team but once again reloaded.

"We put a little bit of pressure on the kids returning in the spring because we lost a really good senior class," Waynedale coach Louie Stanley said. "We told them that we're gonna be vulnerable to lose our title because we knew Chippewa was gonna be peaking out with a really good team, Dalton has been really solid and Northwestern has come back on the scene.

"We just had a really good spring and challenged the kids in our offseason, weightlifting and open mats. We had seven new kids in the lineup Saturday that weren't there last year, but everyone wrestled well."

Host Dalton edged Chippewa 150.5-150 for second, led by champions Bram

McCourt (157), Greyson Valuable Wrestler. Riggen-Siders (165) and Cohen Riggenbach (285).

Siders, who's ranked third in Josh Lowe's annual State Tournament Predictions Report, had been battling a knee injury. He pinned Rittman's Justin Matheny late in their title bout and was named Most bach's pin of Waynedale's Brayden Kidd boosted the Bulldogs into second.

McCrork's 5-2 decision over Dalton's 11th-ranked Kaden Russell was a key swing match for the Bears.

Epitomizing the reload was senior Ashton Kauf's title at 126. He lost a wrestle-off last year and wasn't in the WCAL lineup, but his perseverance was rewarded in a big way.

"I just put in a lot of work in the offseason because being on varsity last year and then getting kicked out at the end just sucked." Kauf said. "I wanted to make this last year of high school count and make it my best one, and it definitely worked out. Winning the team championship for a fourth year in a row for us seniors and then having almost all of our guys place felt great."

Seventh-ranked Schmeltzer (26-1) and No. 14 Patterson (33-7) are the highest ranked Bears.

Area Div. III teams will compete at the Northwestern Sectional this weekend. In a new twist, they'll go to the Lake County Perry District instead of Garfield Heights.

#### **Knight moves**

West Holmes had four individual OCC champions but placed third behind Mount Vernon and Ashland in a loaded Ohio Cardinal Conference Meet.

Winning titles for West Holmes were Mason Taylor (113), Grady Toye (120), Loudon Dixon (138) and Elisha Baldridge (285).

Wooster placed fifth, led by third-place finishers Dylan Hudson (150) and Jayson Deeds (285).

"I thought we had a chance to possibly win it if the stars all aligned, but Mt. Vernon has a really tough team," West Holmes coach Scott Vaughn said.

The top-ranked Baldridge (34-1) pinned Madison's Jaxin Stancombe in the finals for his 100th career win.

"Elisha doesn't look at the rankings," Vaughn said of Baldridge, who went 1-2 at 215 at state last year. "I truly believe he just looks at one match at a time.



## What goes up must come down, consequences vary

Seldom do I delve into world events in my writing, but last week the overlap of global and local events seemed so ironic I just couldn't leave the subject alone.

In our little corner of the world, it's not always a given folks are aware of the latest national headlines. Twitter isn't a daily staple for a good portion of my readership here in Ohio's Amish Country, so I'll just take a moment to bring folks up to speed on one of the more unusual goingson of the past couple of weeks: Balloons were all over the news. Yes, that's right — balloons.

The giant "weather balloon" that dominated the news cycle from the time the water-tower-sized monstrosity was spotted over Montana until it was shot down just off the coast of South Carolina piqued the interest of millions of Americans, and rightfully so.



While its owners haven't fully fessed up to just exactly what their intent was, it seems clear they weren't merely interested in the amount of snow cover on our western mountains. Dubious or not, the U.S. military dropped it in the pond, and it was "duly retrieved and reduced to possession" as we say in the duck hunting world. Kudos to the retrievers. Balloons launched by Americans are almost never retrieved and instead go on to create problems for our nonhuman neighbors all across the planet.

If you're wondering how I ever landed on this comparison of a high-altitude spy balloon and the toy balloons we love to float at birthdays, weddings, football games and just about any other occasion one can think of, I can tell you I literally stumbled upon the idea.

One of the things my wife and I do at this time of year is pick up litter as we hike. It's easy to spot and comparatively easy to get to with the undergrowth of the forest at its lowest annual ebb. This weekend it seemed one of the more visibly dominant items of trash were those fancy Mylar balloons that outlast the holiday for which they were intended by about a thousand lifetimes.

We retrieved the few we could, but another tangled in a high tree top is likely to be there for as long as the tree. Mylar balloons, made from nylon plastic with a metallic coating, never degrade. Latex balloons, made from rubber, may fall to dust after four years or so but carry the

potential in the meantime to do an awful lot of damage as well.

entangled in the ribbon or string to which the balloon was tethered. Marine

Balloons are the No. 1 plastic hazard to seabirds, which mistake the colorful, deflated carcasses for food. After ingesting them, the birds either slowly starve or become

entangled in the ribbon or string to which the balloon was tethered. Marine mammals and fish are similarly imperiled by wayward balloons. Here in Central Ohio, song birds in search of nestbuilding materials, small mammals, and various critters of forest and farm can die in just as cruel of a manner.

In addition to the mortal danger to wildlife, thousands of Americans find themselves left temporarily in the dark each year when someone's celebration flown awry ends up short-circuiting power lines. That shiny metallic coating turns out to be a wonderful conductor of electricity and can tangle in power lines, causing a fault or even float into a substation to wreak havoc on a much greater level.

Beyond potential catastrophe, "free range" balloons rank right up there with single-use plastic grocery bags as one of the most visible forms of pollution across the countryside. I won't begrudge a kid his toy balloon, but please make sure it doesn't sail off into the world to cause an incident — international or otherwise.



Just like 4-Hers are required to do in order to exhibit their projects at the fair, our staff will be evaluated on our efforts. Our creations will be on display during the fair in Building 10, which houses all nonlivestock projects.

We are working on our projects on our own time but have scheduled lunch meetings so we can hear how everyone is progressing. At our first update, we learned some are still in the research stage and others have begun to complete activities.

Extension agriculture and natural resource educator Frank Becker got an early start on his entomology project when he organized a field trip for our office staff to the United Titanium Bug Zoo at the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center in December.

As the former integrated pest management coordinator for OSU Extension, Becker knows a thing or two about bugs, but the guided tour of the Bug Zoo, he said, allowed him to experience entomology from a different perspective.

In his role of scouting crop fields for farmers, he decides which bugs to kill

and which ones to protect. Learning about insects such as the hissing cockroach and glittering fireflies at the Bug Zoo made him think about how to utilize entomology to interact with the public and educate people about how insects function and the many careers in this field.

August of the last summer I lived back home, a tornado roared through the heart of the town, uprooting trees, downing power lines, shattering storefront windows and ripping the roofs off houses that had the misfortune to stand in its way.

You'd think I'd have spent that scary interlude hunkered down in the basement of the old red-brick house my fiancée and I rented, one that came with a walk-in refrigerator, a sort of combination fallout shelter/panic room, but it was always locked.

I've always felt a strong attraction to thunderstorms the more violent, the better — and when a nasty one's bearing down, you're more likely than not to find me outside, sometimes not alone.

I remember a stormy night a few short weeks before my college graduation and the way my girlfriend and I danced around in the

On a Sunday night in howling wind and driving rain, in some sort of blissful rapture, totally unafraid of the jagged lightning and the booming thunder.

Part of it was being young, part of it was because we had just watched "Easy Rider" and needed an escape valve to release the pent-up anger the movie's ending created and part of it was no doubt the fifth of Lynchburg's finest we passed back and forth.

The night of the tornado found me on the front porch, listening to the oldies station on my transistor radio, unaware that less than a mile to the west, a funnel cloud had touched down and was, with no exaggeration, heading right for our neighborhood. Fortunately and in keeping with ridiculously capricious nature of storms like that, it hopped up and sped by, sparing us and those who lived near.

In the morning we were on TV, and so we rode our bikes into town.

Our destination, once we

eased through the destruction and all the emergency personnel, was the cemetery. It seemed important to me that I get a firsthand look at the site where my parents were buried, knowing a centuriesold oak tree stood silent vigil quite nearby.

That place of quiet reflection resembled a war zone, like something out of "Apocalypse Now," but I was relieved to see that aside from a few branches scattered like jackstraws, everything was intact in the grassy expanse that, just nine months before, had been the site where we had gathered to witness my father's burial service, one that included the folded-flag presentation and a 21-gun salute.

In the years that have followed my leaving home, the cemetery has always been among my first stops. I understand Mom and Dad remain alive in my heart and soul and memories, but there's something reassuring about visiting that little uncommon.

Iguana mania swept through my town like a raging, green wildfire, and I was every bit prepared to strike my own match and join the conflagration. Not only did I carry a burning desire to house a lizard of my own, but also I had the financial wherewithal



— compliments of my newspaper route — to make the purchase outright. I also knew how to build stuff and could easily construct my own cage, complete with various iguanafriendly features and accessories, in the time it would take my mail-order reptile to arrive.

The only thing that stood between me and lizard Nirvana was a smallish, middle-aged woman with a strong desire to maintain order in her household. Mom caught on to my plan after I'd innocently asked for a stamp and an envelope while holding the order form I'd cut from the back page of Boy's Life magazine. And with that the iguana wildfire was extinguished in a single puff.

"No lizards will enter this house as long as I'm living here!" Mother proclaimed dramatically. "They carry ticks, and ticks burrow under your skin and suck your blood!"

Despite the endless days I'd spent stomping my way through weed-covered fields in pursuit of field mice, crawling through the thick of the forest in hunts for everything from chipmunks to raccoon kits, and slogging through the muck of wetland and wallow chasing frogs, snakes and turtles, I had never seen a single tick.

Mom was unflinching in her edict. The closest I was going to get to an iguana was at my best friend Chris' house, where his older brother David, master of all things weird and wild, housed a 3-foot-long specimen in a cage in the corner of his bedroom. We marveled over the beast as the rar-



est of all creatures — a living descendent of the dinosaur — complete with a coiled tongue capable of zapping unwitting crickets from a foot away and a scaly tail that could draw a welt on the arm of a young boy like the crack of a bull whip.

"My mom said I can't have an iguana because they have ticks," I said as Chris and I watched David handle the beast during a feeding. "Heck, I don't even know what a tick looks like."

With that the elder boy

picked up a set of tweezers lying beside the cage, carefully tugged at a small black lump on the side of his lizard and held the catch momentarily in front of our awestruck faces, then he flicked it at us with an evil hiss. "It looks just like this!"

There's no telling where that tick actually landed, but the psychological damage had been done. I fled the house feeling every itch I'd ever experienced while simultaneously vividly visualizing the insect burrowing under my skin to begin its blood feast.

My dreams of reptile husbandry were done. If life with lizards meant risking a tick, then I was out. Period! But while iguanas were gone from my life for good, the terror of ticks would somehow find a way, decades later, to seek me out for further torment. More on that next time around.




Sometimes setbacks can
