



NowClinic expands to offer more

he NowClinic offers a wide variety of convenient, nonemergency medical care services to people over the age of 18 months - without having to make an appointment.

On Monday, July 24, the NowClinic moved to a larger space with improved patient access, said Diana Everage, chief operating officer of Bloomington Medical Services LLC, a Wooster Community Hospital affiliate that operates the clinic. The NowClinic, previously located at the HealthPoint campus on Friendsville Road, moved to the 128 Milltown Professional Building, Suite 102, on East Milltown Road.

"It's just a walk across the parking lot from the old location to the new location," Everage said.

The walk-in clinic provides acute care for conditions like:

Earache

Sore throat

- Cough
- Stitches and other treatments for minor injuries
- Cold or flu symptoms
- COVID-19 symptoms
- Aches and pains
- · Sports physicals
- School/employment physicals
- Audiology testing
- Shingles vaccine

The clinic also offers occupational health services for employers such as:

- Workers' compensation
- Breath alcohol testing
- Drug testing
- Pulmonary function testing
- Employment vaccinations
- Flu shots and TB testing

"As a full-service occupational health clinic, we can do things like (Department of Transportation) physicals and drug testing of all types, including urine, hair and oral fluid tests," Kelley said. "We can tailor our services to

whatever a company's needs are. For example, we just had a group ask whether we could do audiograms for 15 employees. Absolutely. We accommodate a business' specific needs."

Everage said the NowClinic's extended hours make access community healthcare convenient.

through Friday from 6a - 6p and weekends from 8a - 2p.

"People can just walk in, or they can go online at the Wooster Community Hospital website and schedule an appointment," Everage said. "That way they can reserve a spot and possibly save some

"We are open seven days a week, so typically people can be seen when their primary care physician or pediatrician isn't available to get them in or if they need to be seen before or after work," she explained.

The NowClinic plays an important role in the health and wellness of the Wooster community "because it allows people to get needed care without going to the emergency room," Everage explained. "It provides a

The clinic is open Monday community service because it allows people to get in and out before work or school. That hopefully helps people, if they don't have something contagious, to avoid missing a day of work. It also is a convenient place to be seen on the weekends, which may give people an option where they don't have to take time off from work for things that are not emergencies. The clinic is overseen by a physician that is our medical director, but he's not onsite. It is staffed by physician assistants and nurse practitioners. We also have indidrug and BAT testing, which Everage said. is breath alcohol testing."

Everage said the NowClinic is not equipped to address critical, life-threatening medical emergencies. A person should visit the emergenshe experiences conditions







BeYou Livestock Show inspiring for all

our years ago Kylie Ramirez was a student at West Holmes High School with big dreams of developing a fair show that would allow people with developmental disabilities to enjoy the thrill of showing animals in the ring in front of a big crowd.

Today, BeYou Livestock Show has grown into something special.

This year's BeYou Livestock Show will take place Saturday, Aug. 12 at noon in the show arena in the expo center at Harvest Ridge with 14 exhibitors and as many mentors set to put on a show.

"Even after five years, I still get emotional watching the show," Ramirez said. "It's such an incredible feeling that it's hard to explain to parents what it's like. You almost have to just come and experience it to understand how incredible this event is to the participants and their families. Most importantly, we want people with special needs to see there are no limits on what they can do, and that includes exhibiting livestock at shows."

Ramirez, who is going into her senior year at the Ohio State University, where she is pursuing a degree in agricultural communication with a minor in agricultural business, said this passion project has helped her grow in many ways including developing some lasting friendships, and it also has impacted the exhibitors who would not otherwise get a chance to experience showing animals and being around them. She said for individuals with developmental disabilities, working with and being around the various animals is a great form of therapy, and it uplifts their spirits.

"You start this and you hope it happens, but you never know and you follow your heart and see where it takes you," Ramirez said. "This event was designed with a purpose, and it's been exciting to see so many people get behind it and support it."

Going into its fifth year, BeYou has developed into a fun and meaningful part of the Holmes County Fair, drawing not only exhibitors from in and around Holmes County, but also bringing in mentors from several hours away, young people who want to help develop the show while enhancing their own leadership skills.

While the show is designed for those with developmental disabilities, one byproduct of the show has been what it has meant to the mentors. Becoming a mentor isn't as easy as simply showing up one day. Ramirez conducts interviews for prospective mentors. BeYou has allowed them to grow alongside the exhibitors. The mentors are young people from age 9-21 who show a desire to gain leadership skills and enjoy helping

"Not only do they get to share their passion for the animals and the agricultural industry, they also get practice interviewing, which is a big part of 4-H and FFA," Ramirez said.

She said one main question she always asks each mentor is why they want to be a mentor.

She said the answers always give her chills of excitement.

"Many of them share the same passion in wanting to go into a field where they are working with people with developmental disabilities, and most of them say that they want to find ways to serve others," Ramirez said. "Then you see them come in and dive right in and get comfortable, and you know they are going to be great mentors and that is super-excit-

Ramirez said BeYou has gained

coming in from across the state to participate.

As for the show, a total of 14 exhibitors, the most ever to participate in the show, will take center stage and work with a host of animals including pygmy goats, meat goats, rabbits, sheep and pigs. Each participant can show one or all the animals.

Ramirez said in preparation for BeYou, there was a kick-off meeting introducing exhibitors to their mentors, who worked diligently with the exhibitors during five practice sessions where they learned about each species of animal and some of the techniques in showing them. Ramirez said showmanship is a neat way for the exhibitors to learn more about the animals

While the early years saw animals with no placement, she

enough notoriety that mentors are said last year they began having judges participate to present placement awards to make it a little more competitive, something she said is good for the exhibitors to experience.

> For a show that touches the lives of the exhibitors, their families, the mentors and anyone who comes to watch, Ramirez said the growth she has experienced is something special.

"I love the purpose and the execution of the planning and implementation of this event," Ramirez said. "It's taught me a lot about leadership, and it has prepared me to work with individuals with developmental disabilities. I've gotten so much out of this, and my hope is that those who attend will feel the same emotions of joy and excitement that our exhibitors show. I hope we have BeYou focus on just showing the a huge turnout because BeYou is such a heartwarming event."





Saturday, Aug. 12 marks the final day of Holmes County Fair week, and H15 Teen Center Ministries in Millersburg wants to send people to the fair with plenty of great food in their stomachs, so before people hit the fair, they should hit H15 Teen Center for a pancake and sausage breakfast fundraiser.

The third annual H15 Pancake Breakfast Fundraiser will take place at H15 Teen Center at 34 E. Jackson St. on Saturday, Aug. 12 from 8-11 a.m. Cost is by donation, and Director Andy Schafer said the fun and fellowship is absolutely free.

"We've had such a great time at this event, and we've gotten wonderful feedback from people about how much fun they had and how incredible the food was," Schafer said.

The pancakes will be made from scratch and served with locally made sausage links and real maple syrup and coffee and juice.

In addition, patrons are welcome to check out the teen center and to learn where the ministry is and where it hopes to get to in the coming months.

Schafer said while the breakfast food always takes center stage, one important aspect of the event is to introduce those who visit the center to everything it has to offer youth and share the vision of the effort to complete stage two, an effort that will include a full kitchen, dining area and more.

"That's an important part of the morning," Schafer said. "We've had so many people who have come in here never having seen the inside of the facility. It's always surprising to see their whole outlook on the ministry change once they catch the vision of what we're doing. Our building is just that, a building. The center isn't the ministry, but what is the ministry is the relationships that we continue to grow and develop with the youth and our volunteers. We've seen lives changed, and our building is

to invite teens in to share their lives and to develop a relationship with us and with Christ.'

All proceeds from the breakfast will go to help the teen center pay for the new roof that was a big part of phase two of the building process.

According to Schafer, the early portion of 2023 saw the ministry able to install a new roof on the western portion of the property in Historic Downtown Millersburg, which provided for a dry area for the first time since H15 purchased the property.

However, with the rising cost of building material, Schafer said they found themselves short of having the funds to pay off the contractor for the work done to build the roof.

"We ended up being \$14,000 short of being able to pay it in full," Schafer said. "But our contractor was very gracious in extending us however much time we needed to get it paid.'

Obviously, the hope of the contractor is that day comes sooner than later, and Schafer said that while they are once again humbled by the gracious offer, they too would like to get the rest of the funds paid off in a timely manner, which is where this pancake breakfast fundraiser comes into play.

"Wouldn't it be great to pay it all in full from this fundraiser?" Schafer said. "Having that debt always weighs heavily on me. I don't like having that out there, even though our builder has continued to stress there is no rush. That's why we are inviting everyone to reach out into their church. their community or wherever they are and invite people to come join us. It's a wonderful opportunity to have a great breakfast, to experience everything that H15 Ministries is doing, and to support the youth in our community who have found a great, safe place to fellowship and grow. We have had so much fun with this breakfast, and I'm eager to

Board of DD adds new elements to community playground area

ne of Holmes County's better kept secrets keeps getting bigger and better, and the hope is it will be a secret no more.

On Friday, July 28, the Holmes County Board of Developmental Disabilities celebrated a dedication of its newest addition to the growing playground area on the north side of the building, gathering with employees, friends and neighbors who helped make the playground extension a reality.

The idea of adding a second area to the playground was something former BDD Principal Rhoda Mast had before retiring. She said as her gift to the center, she would like to do the fundraising and get out into the community to drum up support of the \$130,000 addition.

True to her word, Mast found plenty of people willing to give to the project and paved the way for the project to take shape.

"This was her parting gift to us," said Marianne Mader, HCBDD superintendent. "She did all the work and made a point of trying to not use the same people that donated to the other playground"

With the old playground having outlived its usefulness, the HCBDD tore down the aging portion of the playground, moved some dirt and created a sloping hill that will be a grassy area.

Mader said the new equipment doesn't have the same handicap accessibility as does the former addition that was designed specifically with children with disabilities in mind. However, there are several of the pieces of equipment that can be used by those with disabilities.

The new HCBDD Early Childhood Playground presents a different type of play area that centers around younger children, rather than providing handicappedaccessible equipment.

According to Mader, the idea with the addition was to create a more comprehensive playground area that would suit the entire community.

In dedicating the new play area, Mader was overflowing with gratitude for a community that continues to invest in everything the BDD is doing.

"I'm always — underlined, capitalized, exclamation point — amazed by Holmes County folks and business owners who continually come through to help their fellow citizens and the organizations that benefit the people of Holmes County," Mader said.

"The one thing we want to continue to reiterate is that this play-ground area is for the entire community and anyone who wants to use it. It is accessible 24/7 and presents a safe place for families to come and enjoy a day out."

With the playground, a large grass area for outdoor games, a half-mile walking path and a pavilion with plenty of picnic tables, she said the playground area is perfect for outings, especially for families with younger children.

"With everything here, families can shoot hoops, ride bikes on the trail, walk, play in the play area and spend a day here just enjoying everything that is available to them," Mader said.

She said the best way to enter the playground is to park on the west side of the building and walk around behind it to the playground

Mader said Tri-County ESC, children in their preschool program and elementary school, and the early childhood program have already gotten strong usage out of the play area.

She said there are already talks of adding some additions to the area including a bocce ball court. In addition, the HCBDD is in the mix with the ongoing Appalachian

grant funding that could eventually connect Holmes County Railsto-Trails with the center, which would provide an easier route for Amish families in particular to go from the trail to the center.

Mader said the hope is one day that will happen, and they would like to create a sensory garden along the way with a variety of different plants with canopy and seating.

That is in the future. For now

they will cherish the new playground addition and be grateful to the community for its neverending support.

"This was a really neat addition to our facility, and again, our hope is that the people of the county and even beyond take advantage of everything here," Mader said. "It's a wonderful and free way to celebrate some family time. This is county property, and it all belongs to the county residents."

A new sign will feature the many donors who made the playground possible. That list includes Alan and Elaine Hand, Darrick Hummel, Harvest Thrift Store, Holmes County Association for Handicapped Children, Holmes Conservation and Beagle Club, Holmes County Board of Developmental Disabilities, Holmes-Wayne Electric Cooperative, Hummel Group, Jon and Rhoda Mast, Karen Hummel Troyer, Keim, Kerry and Danell Taylor, Mennonite Mutual Insurance, Millersburg Eagles Aerie 2418, ProVia, Richard and Tammy Koser, Walnut Creek Planing, and anonymous donors.

Mader said one of the donors even provided labor to complete the project in addition to their monetary donation.

Chamber and Tourism Bureau eager to grow county

When Tiffany Gerber first became the executive director of the Holmes County Chamber of Commerce and Tourism Bureau in 2019, she had some big dreams.

Nothing has changed over the past four years.

On Monday, July 31, Gerber met with the Holmes County commissioners and discussed everything the chamber has done to promote the county over the past year, and she shared her lengthy list of goals as the chamber speeds through the summer and into what is always a very busy autumn tourist season.

Gerber recently presented her list of possibilities to the chamber board.

"I gave them a list of about 25 ideas, and they said, 'How about five?'" Gerber

From connecting schools and students to the workforce and supporting and promoting area golf to continuing the business retention program with in-person visits, Gerber and her staff are finding new ways to promote Holmes County growth.

"I've been charged by my board to get out and take the temperature of the businesses," Gerber said. "That's

part of our regular member types of areas for specific maintenance."

She said another step will be to initiate a small business incubator program.

She said the chamber building in Millersburg has a great deal of space, and it could serve as a perfect place to help grow smaller servicebased and retail businesses.

She said one other area that is her passion is to create and support a commercial test kitchen for entrepreneurs in the area who are growing and making food out of their homes or in limited space.

"I'd love to help those folks have a safe industrial kitchen," Gerber said, "people who make salsa or pastries. In the long-term it gives them an opportunity to role that over into a Holmes County food product."

Gerber said there is a model for that program in Athens, Ohio, one that has been successful.

Commissioner Dave Hall said there is federal funding for that type of program. The sticking point is finding a place to house it.

The one in Nelsonville has been great for start-up businesses, and it's a good program that has created a lot of businesses," Hall said.

He said they have a building that blocks off different they have identified West

Gerber said the final area she wants to pursue growth is to increase marketing cooperation and collaboration to create synergy within the

"That's very much in line with the chamber's mission," Gerber said. "We are invested."

She moved on to the tourism side of the ledger, and she told the commissioners they have a traditional budget of \$430,000.

Some of the new additions include a branded walkin trailer that will serve as a traveling billboard and a convenient place for people to stop in and discover more about Holmes County when the chamber is on the road.

They also have created a partnership with Behalt, where the organization has set up a small tourist information center inside Behalt in Berlin.

That partnership made sense to us," Gerber said.
"We're excited about that."

The chamber will monitor the effectiveness of the tourism billboard campaign in Columbus, and it also has ramped up TV advertising through PBS in Northeast Ohio and Pennsylvania.

In addition, Gerber said

Virginia as a lucrative tourism market and will invest dollars into that area.

'It's inexpensive to market in that area, so we're excited about that area," Gerber said.

She said they have run a year-long ad campaign in Ohio Magazine, have done some sports marketing including with the Cleveland Guardians and are looking to delve into the Columbus Bluejackets.

The chamber also created a small merchant council budget so area businesses can apply for marketing dollars.

"We're really trying to get the word out so it can be utilized better," Gerber said.
Another big move will

be to have an after-hours and weekend information center at the chamber office in Millersburg, where visitors can get access to information even when the staff isn't in the office.

She said they already have blueprints from Tekton, and they will remodel the chamber building to create a secure and open area that will allow patrons to visit at any hour.

The chamber also has gone to great lengths to enhance its technology capa-

SRO Kauffman receives state award

Wayne County sheriff's deputy Jodi Kauffman, a school resource officer at Triway, was one of two SROs in Ohio to receive the Stand Out Award from Gov. Mike DeWine recently during the Ohio School Safety Summit in Columbus. The district nominated her for her dedication to keeping Triway students safe.

SROs are specially trained law-enforcement officers who work in educational environments to maintain order, deter crime, and keep students and staff safe. They work closely with school administration to create a safe learning environment. Often, an SRO provides educational programs on various student-related topics and focuses on keeping students on track academically.

'I am very active in the schools," Kauffman said. "One of the more successful events was when we hosted an out-of-state student

that had a lung transplant because of his addiction to vaping. That spawned a vape education effort where businesses donated incentives like \$100 gift cards and large-screen TVs for kids to stop vaping."

Kauffman has served as an SRO since 2018 and has initiated a student safety day, a distracted driving mock crash and trial, shop with a hero, a vape buyback program, and organized a kickball tournament to promote kicking the habit of drugs.

"Keeping the kids safe is my motivation in this role," she said. "I started working with kids in 2000, and I want to see them graduate and make good life decisions?

A successful SRO must earn the respect of students by establishing open lines of communication so they feel comfortable expressing concerns or safety issues they face. An SRO is depended upon to provide solutions to complex situations.

"Mentoring students is very rewarding to me," Kauffman said. "On Mondays kids will come up to me and tell me about their weekend. They trust me as a role model, and I take that trust very seriously. I am always there for them to approach."

Beyond her role as an SRO, Kauffman also is the primary liaison between social services and mental health organizations to address issues that impact students' well-being.

Kauffman focuses her efforts on current topics facing students.

"This year we will focus on bullying," she said. "In the past I have focused on the dangers of drinking and driving, vaping, and suicide awareness. So this year it will be about choosing words carefully and the impact they may have on others.'

Art, hospital a natural fit for Artist Exhibition Program

Beginning as a journalist, he moved into the world of designing and developing computer systems. "For nearly 10 years, I was involved with military systems design before I moved into banking and managed bank operations for banks here in the U.S., Kuwait and New Zealand,'

When he was 60, Stephan found himself going through a box of old photos when he found one of his parents happily seated in a newly purchased car. He thought how nice it would be to have a painting of the old, dusty picture.

"But I did not know how to find anyone who could do something like that," he said. "After I thought it over for a few days, I decided I would try myself. After all, it was in black and white. How hard could it be?"

Stephan gave it a try, and when the result was

Weiss presents county with rare photo of Old Jail Building

For many years local Holmes County resident and longtime banker, historian and Holmes County Lions Club member David Weiss has been one of Holmes County's most industrious collectors of area antiquities.

However, Weiss' white whale has been an old photo of the Holmes County Jail, which was built in 1879. The photo shows three men standing in front of what is now the front entrance to the nearly completed jail building.

Because the jail now serves as the Holmes County commissioners' meeting facility, Weiss felt it would be neat to retrieve the small postcard photo and have Tope Printing make a larger one and present it to the commissioners.

The only problem was he was having trouble tracking the original down.

Weiss said he had been trying to retrieve the old post- last year, the Dewitt family card photo from his friends, invited Weiss to come out Mike and Miriam Dewitt, to the homestead and search

who owned a store in Millersburg and Miriam worked in the auditor's office.

"I've been trying to get this for 20-some years," Weiss said. "I saw it, and they never said no but they never said yes when it came to giving it to me. I said, 'Miriam, is there any way I can get that image?' She agreed it should be preserved."

After she passed away

through the garage for the image. A lengthy and fruitless search took place, and after scouring every inch of the garage, they were ready to cease the search.

One of the Dewitt clan decided to take one final look and found the image tucked away in the bottom of a box.

"I have probably the largest collection of memorabilia in the county, but this was the one I wanted the most because I felt it should find a home here in the Old Jail,"

Weiss said. "I haven't seen it anywhere else."

He had Tope Printing do some work in enlarging the image, and on Monday, July 31, he brought it into the Holmes County commissioners' meeting and presented the framed photo to the commissioners to place in the Old Jail building.

Weiss did so in honor of Harry R. Weiss and Darryl D. Weiss, both of whom served as Holmes County sheriffs and had offices and residences in the building. Darryl Weiss was actually the last sheriff to reside in the building in 1976 before the existing jail was built near Holmesville.

In presenting the photo to the commissioners, Weiss said he was honored to be able to offer such a unique find.

"I thought it should be placed in this building forever, so I am donating this to the commissioners on behalf of my uncles," Weiss said to the commissioners. "I've been wanting to do this for 20 years."

"That's very kind of you,"

commissioner Joe Miller said. "You finally got it."

In order to verify the age of the photograph, Weiss did plenty of research and was able to nail down a time line, thanks in large part to the variety of construction material located around the jail building at the time.

Weiss said the contract for the erection of the jail

building was handed out in 1876. It took more than two years to build it, and that was why Weiss said the image was 144 years old. Also in the rare photo was a corner of the former courthouse building that stood where the current statue is in the courtyard.

"It's just a really neat





"Between our staff of 10, we have a total of 132 years of service with the adult probation department. I am very fortunate, and it is an honor to work with them. This team is considered leaders in the field of community corrections."



How to help students balance academics, athletics

The rigors of academia demand every student's utmost devotion. For some, the challenges in the classroom are accompanied by the thrill of competition on the playing fields. Multitasking may be most associated with modern professionals, but many might have learned how to balance multiple responsibilities at once during their days as student-athletes.

Student-athletes typical-

According to guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, teenagers between the ages of 13 and 18 should sleep eight to 10 hours each

—Avoid distractions. Student-athletes who are finding it hard to get at least eight hours of sleep each night might be too distracted during the day to get everything done so they can go to bed at a reasonable hour. Smartphones ensure distractions are never too far away, but student-athletes can take a proactive approach and turn


off app notifications once a new school year and season begins. In addition, pick a quiet homework/study room in the house without distractions like a television or the hum of outside noise.

-Set academic and athletic goals. Coaches typically establish goals for players before the season and then again during endof-season exit interviews. Such goals can help athletes maintain their motivation, and a similar strategy can be employed in the classroom. Parents and student-athletes can meet with teachers to establish study goals to keep them striving toward academic achievement. Clearly defined goals can improve student-athletes' focus, and that can make it easier to balance their responsibilities.

How to be involved at school

Parents can make every effort to encourage children to make the most of the school experience, including academics and extracurricular activities. Though students' level of engagement is ultimately up to them, parental involvement at school can be crucial for students' success.

Picking the right backpack

Students need many different supplies to help them move to the head of the class. Teachers frequently post lists online before school begins or advise students in the early days of the new year. Therefore, parents may want to wait to go back-to-school shopping until they learn what's needed. There is one piece of gear, however, that students will definitely need: a backpack.


Backpacks have been helping students transport books and other materials to and from school for decades. Backpacks are not a new invention, and they actually predate school. Ötzi, a man whose mummified remains have been traced to the Copper Age, carried an animal fur rucksack during his travels. American Čivil War soldiers carried bindles, and Henry Miriam developed one of the first knapsacks for the U.S military in 1877. It wasn't until the late 1940s that kids started using backpacks for school, as more materials were available to make these bags after World War II. Backpacks are now ubiquitous on school campuses around the world.

Backpacks are available in many different sizes and



styles. Not all of them are created equal, and some may be better and safer for students than others.

Here are some considerations.



-Pass up backpacks with frayed fabric edges that could unravel, says Consumer Reports.

Opt for backpacks with zippers that have fabric flaps over them to keep water and other elements out of the backpack, helping prolong its life span.

-Consider a synthetic material, which will be lighter to carry and more resistant to water.

-Choose a backpack with lots of compartments that can spread the weight of gear out across the bag.

—Look for bags that have padded backs and straps. The padding should be ventilated, so the back-

pack will not get very hot when the child is using it.

-Karena Wu, a physical therapist and owner of ActiveCare Physical Therapy in New York, encourages parents to choose backpacks with tapered straps that will conform better to their children's bodies. A waist strap can help keep the backpack centered on the child's torso to help disperse the load.

-If the school allows it, a rolling bag is a great way to prevent strain on the back. Verywell Family says children should carry no more than 15 percent of their bodyweight in the backpack. That means a 60-pound child shouldn't carry more than 9 pounds.

-Select a backpack that is sized accordingly to the child. It may be tempting to buy the largest one around, but that can be cumbersome and the student may over-

-Many students now use laptops or tablets for school. It is a good idea to buy a backpack that has a padded pocket for tech devices to protect them during transport.

Although it may not seem trendy to do so, backpacks should always be worn with all straps in place to distribute weight evenly; otherwise, strain may be placed on one shoulder or side of the body. This, in addition to choosing the right backpack, can keep students comfortable and


Coding and programming: Students can learn the basics of writing code and building computer applications or websites.



NAMI offering family education and support groups


National Alliance on Mental Illness Wavne and Holmes Counties is mindful approximately one in five adults in the United States experiences a mental illness. That's over 50 million people.

Providing resources and support to individuals affected by mental health concerns and their families is a core focus of NAMI Wayne and Holmes Counties. One of the approaches to achieve this is offering family education and support to those in the communities NAMI serves.

A family support group is offered monthly to help adult family members who have a relative with a mental illness gain insight, information and understanding.

'When a family member was diagnosed with a serious mental illness and was hospitalized, we really needed to hear from other people who actually understood mental illness," one participant said.

Another member said, "You may have to step out of your comfort zone. But it is worth it. Recovery is a journey, and we are still on the journey. But being in the family support group helps us.

offered twice a year. The Familyto-Family education program is an eight-week course that is led by trained family members of individuals with a mental health diagnosis.

During the course of the program, a variety of topics are discussed. Some of those topics include problem solving and communication, dealing with diagnosis and crisis periods, the impact of mental illness on the entire family, and local services and supports.

It is sometimes difficult for those who are in most need of the program to be able to make the commitment to an eight-week program.

"People come in at the first session, and they are fatigued and discouraged," Messner said. "It is a process that takes time. By the third or fourth session, the discouragement starts to dissipate. They realize they are not alone."

An integral part of the program is the peer support it creates when family members realize there are other people in the same situation. As one participant said, "You learn so much from the other attendees, in addition to the class information."

Joseph Messner, a NAMI Wayne vided by NAMI Wayne and Holmes Counties at no cost to the participant. Transportation also is available for the education classes at no cost to residents of Wayne and Holmes counties. United Way of Wayne and Holmes Counties helps to fund this program.

Rare book expert helps find gems for annual sale

Kiwanis' Book Sale will be the 66th year for the event - considered the largest fall used book sale in Ohio with over 45,000 books.

Past sales have featured a special selection of vintage or collectible books that has grown in the last few years and will be expanded again this year. This growth is largely due to the contribution of one volunteer. Peter Roberts, a self-taught rare book expert.

The value of a used book is generally dependent on three factors: rarity, demand and condition. Just because a book is old doesn't mean it is valuable," Roberts said. "Most of the books we put into the vintage or collectible category were printed before 1930 but not always. We have had books printed in the 19th century which aren't particularly valuable because so many were published. McGuffey's Readers, for that enhance a book's value

> "At the other end of the rarity scale, we recently received a large number of specialized books on chemistry. Most wouldn't be considered old, but because they deal with a narrow area of the field and were printed in smaller quantities, some are fairly valuable."

> Roberts explained how demand is another indicator of a book's value, but the key to demand is finding the right buyer for a specific book. Two years ago the book sale received a fairly new book containing the genealogy records of the Moravian community in Ohio. It turned out one of the sale volunteers had relatives with ties to the Moravian settlements in Northern Ohio, and a buyer was found.

the author or a first edition. A first-edition copy of "The Great Gatsby" with its original dust cover sold at auction for over \$100,000 not too long ago. Identifying first editions can be recalled a copy of "To Kill book, making it impossible a Mockingbird," which the donor thought was a first edition, but it turned out to be a book club first edition with little worth monetarily.

Finally, the condition also is critical in calculating the value of a book. The copy of "The Great Gatsby" was probably listed as in fine condition, meaning no signs of damage or wear. A very good rating indicates some evidence of damage or wear, although it may be quite minor. Most of the books the fall book sale receives are neither fine nor very good after sitting on a bookshelf for, in some cases, years. That in itself can cause damage that reduces value.

Setting the price for a used book based on its condition is frequently a judgement call. Roberts avoids looking at Amazon or other general merchandise sellers online because they don't include a complete description of the condition of the to establish a reasonable comparable price for a book in similar condition.

The AAUW Kiwanis sale is unique in that it works best as a live sale and not online.

"If we sold books online, we would have to carry our book inventory until they sold, which could take several months or even years," Roberts said. "Our goal at the sale is to sell as many of the books collected since the previous sale during a short fiveday period. Keeping the sale to five days (also) allows us to avoid charging sales tax.

"We have also developed a following of book dealers from as far away as New York and Minnesota who come to our sale because we offer a wide selection at dealer-friendly prices. We also give very deep discounts the last two days of the sale, (and) any books left over at the end of the sale are donated to local Goodwill stores.'

The 1 p.m. program is free and open to the public and will be held at the historic Shreve Presbyterian Church, 343 N. Market St., Shreve

At the start of the Civil War, the economy catalyzed a shortage in the United States of gold and silver. Coins were hoarded, and small change began disappearing.

Stamps were used as money in a number of different ways. Civil War tokens and governmentissued factional currency were created out of merchants' needs to make change. Before this there was no government-issued In addition, the U.S. mint

paper currency. Paper tickets and bills were frequently substituted, but the scarcity was so great that Congress authorized the issuance of postage stamps as a temporary fractional currency.

In 1864 Congress passed two acts: The first authorized the minting of bronze 1 and 2 cent pieces, and the second officially criminalized the issuing of private tokens for use as coins. started making the new 1 and 2 cent coins in substantial numbers so there would be plenty of small change in circulation.

Leichty has collected for 50 years and is a charter member of the Fractional Currency Collectors Board. He has worked as a machinist, retired as a business owner and is a current member of the Kidron Community Historical Society, of which he served as president for over 30 years.



Holmes Park District receives \$5 million in grant funding

Keeping a project as encompassing as the Holmes County Rails-to-Trails project in pristine shape comes with a lot of dedication, work and plenty of cost.

Holmes County has the people in place to do the work, and now the Rails-to-Trails board has the funding in place to continue to make repairs and improvements.

Recently, the organization received more than \$5 million in grant funding that will go toward repairs on the trail and keep bikers, buggies and exercise fans rolling along smoothly for years to come.

According to Jeffrey Shaner of the Ohio Department of Transportation, considerable time and effort was spent reviewing each application for its transportation need, costs and benefits to the local community. ODOT found the Holmes County Trail Repair Project from Millersburg to Killbuck perfectly defined what the Transportation Alternative Program grant was designed to support.

board member of Holmes County Rails-to-Trails Coalition, said the organization submitted a pair of grant applications, both of which were accepted.

She said the ODOT grant provided 80% of the eligible costs in federal funds through the Transportation Alternatives Program. This year the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law allows TAP projects to be funded using 80% federal TAP funding matched with 20% federal safety funding. The Holmes County Trail Repair Project, Millersburg to Killbuck has been awarded \$882,306 in federal

Cash crops have always been a staple in the area

Holmes County and Wayne County have always been agricultural counties. In the beginning of their culture, most places were, but many have since made the transition to industrialization.

When white settlers first came to Ohio, it was covered with trees. It is estimated 95% of Ohio's land was forested. Much of that



had to be cleared to make way for food crops. The wood was used to build houses, barns and shops and even laid to make highways more passable. Today, roughly one-third of the state remains forested, and lumber is still a major crop

in both Holmes and Wayne counties.

Vernon Miller of Fredericksburg has been in the lumber industry for nearly 45 years. He said there are more trees available for harvest than there were 100 years ago due to successful forestry management practices.

Holmes County and Wayne County lie within a strip of hardwood forest, from Michigan through the Carolinas, resulting in lumber for the area, for the rest of Ohio, the nation and even the world.

Once enough land was cleared to plant, some of the first crops were buckwheat and flax. Both grow well on unimproved, nutrient-poor land and provided early farmers with cash crops to grow their families and farms. Although not a true grain, buckwheat is processed into a flour that mimics flour from grains. Flax was used to produce fine fiber for early linen.

One of the earliest crops grown for profit in Wayne County was tobacco. By the time Swiss immigrant Jacob Gish purchased his farm near Rittman in 1831, tobacco was a well-established cash crop all across Ohio, and it became his primary crop. He became one of the largest producers of tobacco in Ohio.

The type of tobacco being grown was often Eastern Ohio Export, a type of Maryland tobacco. It was exported to Europe and sold to wholesalers and cigar manufacturers across the state and country. By 1895 there were over 40,000 cigar factories in the United States. Wooster had one located on North Street named the Wooster Cigar & Stogie Company. After World War I, cigarettes became more popular than cigars and dried up the market for Eastern Ohio Export tobacco.

cheap labor, large corporate onion and celery farms dotted the Wayne County landscape. East of Orrville, on what is now Burton City Road, the Horr & Warner Company operated a muck farm, growing mostly onions. In Creston several muck farms operated including Jordon Brothers and the Lee Sigler Onion Farm

Many acres were devoted to the growing of onions and celery. Much of the labor for these farms were children who plucked weeds on their hands and knees for 10 cents per hour. When they were grown enough to push a hand cultivator, they were paid 15 cents, a highly desirable 50% increase in pay. The child laborers were locally referred to as muck angels.

Also, around 1900, cucumbers were a profitable crop for farmers. Lutz Pickling & Preserving operated out of Creston.

Orrville. Smuckers purchased Wooster Preserving in the 1960s, eventually closing it down. The old Wooster Preserving factory still stands on Spruce Street, across from Hard Hat Cafe.

Fruit has always been an important crop. Some farms were dedicated to fruit production, selling their products to the general public for a profit. Of course, today there are fruit and vegetable farms and markets, but nothing approaching the size of the fruit farms of the 1800s. According to the 1875 Caldwell Atlas of Holmes County, John Hughes owned a 400-acre fruit farm in Ripley Township. There he grew apples, peaches and pears. He also grew multiple varieties of grapes, as well as raspberries and blackberries.

Today's crops are all about efficiency of land use, as modern farmers get more out of an acre of land than John Hughes could have ever dreamed of. Modern equipment, fertilizers and pest-management solutions have turned agriculture into a high-tech industry.

Village Network opening new residential treatment center

The Village Network will open a new residential treatment center on its Wooster residential campus. The building will help youth facing severe psychological and behavioral issues who require intensive treatment in a short-term residential setting including individual, group and family therapy; psychiatric treatment; nursing care; and expressive therapies. It also will provide education through onsite schooling or tutoring, encouraging children to learn daily skills and thrive in a healthy social setting.

The installation is nearly complete. All that is left to do is to install the doors and fence.

"At The Village Network, we are resolutely pursuing our mission and collaborating with local and state authorities to combat this crisis effectively," said Rich Graziano, president and CEO of The Village Network.

The new facility will be home to The Village Net-



work's highest level of care to spend days in emergency and add to its continuum of care. The building and program were born out of the mission "to work in partnerships to empower youth and their families to build brighter futures."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, adolescent mental health disorders are surging. In recent years the number of teens reported having a major depressive episode has increased by 60%.

Similarly, suicide rates among teens have jumped by nearly 60%. The child welfare and mental health systems are overwhelmed. Across the state stories are heard of children suffering from mental illness having rooms or in children's services offices. The Village Network, in fulfilling its mission, is partnering with local and state officials and stepping up to be a part of the solution to this crisis.

Many of the children who will be served in this new program will be experiencing developmental trauma. Developmental trauma begins at a very young age while the child's brain is still developing and perpetrated by someone the child is living with. Consequently, these children are becoming adolescents with little capacity to self-regulate, control their impulses, delay gratification, manage their emotions and even be in safe, trusting relationships. They are easily overwhelmed, sometimes by the most routine tasks and interventions.

In response to this, The Village Network has adopted clinical models that help these children develop the capacity to selfregulate — to control their impulses, self-soothe and manage their emotions: the Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics and the Collaborative Problem Solving Approach.

'In Ohio and across the United States, there is an alarming rise in mental health issues among children," Graziano said. "Sadly, approximately 140 young people with complex behavioral health requirements in Ohio alone are in out-of-state treatment facilities.

"To address this issue, we are constructing a unique

Wayne and Holmes counties facility that will offer round-the-clock psychiatric care. This will be the first of its kind in the area, and we hope it will positively impact the community."



Cruise sign-ups are due now for trip to Southern Caribbean

The 2023 Tuscarawas County Senior Center cruise to the Southern Caribbean will be one of the easiest ways to the islands. Travelers will leave by bus from the senior center in Dover and travel to Baltimore, Maryland to meet the Royal Caribbean's Vision of the Seas for a 13-day, 12-night trip.

Guests will get all the amenities on the ship to and from five stops including St. Croix in the U.S. Virgin Islands, a tropical oasis of white sand beaches; Philipsburg in St. Maarten, which offers more beaches, landscapes and shopping; St. Johns in Antigua with beaches, sailing and nature; Bridgetown in Barbados, a musical place with natural wonders; and Basseterre, St. Kitts and Nevis, which features dormant volcanoes. golden sand beaches and green hills.

The trip is scheduled Jan. 27 through Feb. 8. The cruise will conclude in Baltimore, where travelers will board a bus to return to Dover.

Reservations are needed now. With the increase in people who want to travel this year, it's become almost a first come, first served situation for travelers.

"Because the first cruise that we had scheduled with a different touring company, they sold out right away, and our cruise was canceled," said Vicki Yates, activity director at the TCSC. "It was something the touring company hadn't seen in the 30 years they have been in business. Since COVID, everybody is so anxious to get out and cruise."

"It's a whole new era," said Peggy Robb, senior center travel coordinator.

A deposit of \$250 is required to hold a reservation, with the final trip payment due Oct. 15. Costs are variable depending on the preference of the traveler and range from \$1,999 per person for an inside cabin to \$2,399 per person for an outside cabin. Rooms for a single person also are available starting at \$3,049 for an inside room and up to \$3,699 for an outside cabin. Balcony cabin pricing also is available.

Included in the price are the cruise, cabin, shipboard meals, port charges, taxes, and motor coach transportation to and from the Baltimore Pier. Travel insurance is available and recommended for an added charge. Travelers must be

age 18 and up to register for this trip, and travelers do not have to be a county resident or senior center member.

A passport book is required for this trip. Anyone who would like to go and does not already have a passport needs to apply as soon as possible.

Yates and Robb recommend those who are planning to go get registered and get their deposit in immediately. Call them at the senior center at 330-364-6611.

The trips organized by the Tuscarawas County Senior Center are highly recommended. This will be the third cruise organized by the center. They previously traveled to the Bahamas and Alaska.

"People are already asking when we are going back to Alaska," Robb said.

Rennicker said. "I love to sit on the balcony with a good book. I won't go unless there's a balcony."

The couple have used other travel agencies, but they now prefer to travel through the senior center.

"We had a blast," Gary Rennicker said. "These guys make it great."

Cindi Harriman of Sugarcreek enjoys the senior center cruises. She said as a single traveler, she finds there are always others on the trip she can enjoy activities with, and there also are plenty of activities she can do on her own.

"Someone else is making all the reservations," Harriman said of one of the main reasons she enjoys traveling with the senior center.

For single travelers wanting to save money over a private cabin, Yates and Robb are willing to help find a roommate for the trip and have the travelers meet prior at the senior center

to determine if they are a good fit.

Robb and Yates will travel with the group and are available to help if any issues arise. They also will have emergency contact and medical information available. The information is required to travel but is deleted after the trip is completed for privacy.

There also will be a predeparture meeting two weeks before the trip at the senior center so everyone knows what to expect.

Trips through the senior center are planned a year in advance. In addition to longer trips like the cruises, they also plan four extended trips of two to three days and a number of day trips.




The top results were as follows:



Miller said. "We have high expectations on leading the league again this year."

Loudonville

The Redbirds posted an outstanding 12-1 record last season, but they are in a bit of a rebuild entering this season after losing four of their top five players that played in sectional and district rounds last year.



Looking back, with mixed feelings, on a journalism career

I was driving my wife to a doctor's appointment the other day and happened to pass the building that used to house the newspaper operation I left home to become part of in November 2000.

It was absolutely abandoned, not a sign of life, seemingly empty.

All the bleak scene needed was tumbleweeds skittering past.

Since then I've had some time to reflect on what's happened to small-town journalism, and honestly, I don't see any reason not to believe the worst is yet to come, though I hope I'm wrong.

There was a time — not that long ago, really — when the very idea of a town without its own newspaper, be it daily or weekly, was inconceivable, something along the lines of a baseball game with a pitch clock or an election being challenged simply because you lost.

So much for things you could count on, right?

When I was growing up
— and you have to under-



stand we weren't a wealthy family, though my parents were quite well educated — no fewer than four newspapers were a basic part of life.

There was the local paper, delivered to our door six days a week.

Then there was the major metro publication, which arrived every morning, not including Sunday, just in time for breakfast.

Sunday was reserved for the big paper out of the state capital, published in the city where my mother was born and raised.

And finally, we received the South Bend Tribune, two or three days late, usually, but that was for my father, who was a native of that Indiana city, one that was home to my future alma mater and a place that was like a second home to our family as I grew up. It never once occurred to me there was anything unusual about the fact newspapers arrived every day of the week, every day of the year, except, well, Christmas and the occasional snowstorm, which could cause delays in the delivery of the local publication.

Newspapers were an essential ingredient in our daily lives, something that — even as children — we understood to be important, right up there with going to church and getting good grades.

It was that understanding, that appreciation, that played a role in my decision to begin a career in journalism directly out of college, though an argument could be made that had it not been for my ability on the softball diamond, I might never have gotten a chance.

But that's another story for another time.

Most of you have never spent much time in a newspaper office, unless it's to place an ad, pay a bill or register a complaint about what a certain

long-haired columnist had written about whatever was on his mind when he sat down to share his thoughts with you.

Let me assure you that behind the scenes, there was very little ordinary to be found there. From the newsroom to the press room, composition areas to the circulation offices, the loading dock to the photo lab, there was nothing like the buzz and hum of those places.

Everyone had energy, everyone worked hard and everyone loved it.

Well, OK, there were exceptions to the rule, but they were rare.

Most of the time, the folks who showed up every day wanted to be there because, basically, they were doing jobs that really mattered.

If that sounds a bit conceited, well, tough. We were very special.

So when did it all start to change? What happened to the pride? Why did the value of our skills suddenly become so irrelevant?

I could sit here and type

for hours, drawing on my three-plus decades of experience in small-town journalism, and not begin to convey the complexity of an industry's decisions to adapt to a changing economic landscape that's still in a state a flux. I could write about monetizing on multiple platforms, the shrinking ad base, the consolidation of publications and the fact that only a handful of behemoth corporations control most of the outlets.

What good would that do? If you're still reading

my words, however, all this way into my ramblings, then you're proving my point, which is that as long as writers continue to do their best, there will still be a place for them.

Again, if that sounds a bit egocentric, so be it, but the fact remains there are seriously talented people who maintain the belief readers will always be there, if they find something good in your work. They might never take the time to tell you that, but it's true.

The first time I had my

words printed in a forum meant for public consumption, I was in eighth grade, and I wrote about the Smothers Brothers and the unfair manner that CBS was censoring them. I was 13 years old then, and the school paper was mimeographed.

Since then, I've written for the Youth Page, the high school paper, the Notre Dame daily, my hometown newspaper, its sister publication in the neighboring county and the one in New Bern, the one whose offices are currently vacant. I'm lucky to still have had my columns available to readers back home for the last 20 years.

So thanks to all of you who continue to make me feel necessary.

Strolling Through the Garden: death cap mushrooms

A few years ago, a reader sent me an email about identifying a mushroom in his lawn. These mushrooms were popping up on his lawn in clusters, as I had in my yard a few weeks ago.

The reader said there was originally a forest in his subdivision. If this forest was anything like mine, it would have had several oak trees. Oak trees are wonderful plants in many ways, but this mushroom is associated directly with this tree. Foraging for anything deserves caution.

Let's identify the problem as the first step in the solution. When I looked at the mushroom, I saw a white stalk and a large, round bulb at the base. It also had a little collar around the stalk that was somewhat ruffled.

The top of the cap was about 3 inches on the more mature mushrooms and was a whitish color. I did not see any tree where the mushroom could have been attached, but they were all over the yard.

From the variety of maturity levels of the mushrooms, I saw them almost egg-like in appearance. The younger mushrooms resembled a rounded umbrella,



and as the mushrooms matured, they looked more like an open umbrella and smooth on the top of the cap.

The gills were white under the cap and were very crowded, and the gills terminated randomly. The spores under the cap were white. These mushrooms smelled like rose petals. For myself, I felt fairly confident in saying these mushrooms are death cap mushrooms or Amanita phalloides.

Thirty grams or 1 ounce is strong enough to kill a human in 48 hours if untreated. In 2006 a family of three from Poland died. Survivors normally require liver transplants, and experts recommend you don't place other mushrooms in contact with this mushroom and don't touch these killers with your bare hands.

They can kill your dogs. Initial exposure to these mushrooms will cause the victim to vomit and have severe diarrhea. Death caps are believed to be the most poisonous mushroom on the planet. This sort of poisoning demands hospitalization quickly.

Removing this mushroom from your yard will be a challenge. Each cluster should be removed by hand as best as possible while wearing your gloves. Each cluster of these mushrooms must be removed early before the little umbrella opens.

Mushrooms thrive in dense soil with shade and moisture.

Pesticides don't work. From general knowledge, mushrooms do well in poor soil, so normal nitrogen fertilizing discourages more mushrooms.

As I recall, the lawn of the people with the question generally looked fairly good. You will need to fertilize your lawn for some time or 1 pound per 1,000 square feet.

I've also read ½ ounce of iron sulfate per gallon per square yard also goes a long way in controlling mushrooms and

aerating your lawn so that the environment for the mushroom is less than ideal.

If you also mow your lawn as low as you can as the new clusters appear, this also will help control the death caps if you don't let any of the caps begin to show. Otherwise, you have just compounded the problem. Mowing caps releasing their spores will extend the mushroom's control even further. The alternative is very dramatic.

There is a source below the

soil. We don't really know how deep, but I can't imagine it's more than a few feet. Therefore, each spot would have to be opened, and you would have to find each source.

As you might imagine, each source must be removed to really get rid of the death cap, so you need to dig with a fork or trowel and drill out each source of the mushroom cluster.

Grilling fruits, veggies adds taste, color

I still remember the first time my husband added some asparagus from our garden to the grill. We marveled at the taste, and it gave us a new reason to love the nutrientrich vegetable.

It remains our favorite way to cook it.

We drizzle the asparagus with a little olive oil, add some seasoning, then place it in a grill basket, preferably with some other vegetables, and we have a quick dish for a summertime meal.

Grilling fruits and vegetables is



a great way to add taste and color to your meals and an easy way to incorporate more fruits and vegetables into your meals. At this point in the season, many fruits and vegetables are plentiful, so it's easy to get your recommended daily amount.

Choose firmer vegetables for

grilling like corn, peppers, zucchini, squash, mushrooms, onions, potatoes and summer squash.

Just about any fruit can go on the grill as long as it's fairly firm and not overripe. Peaches, melons, pineapple, pears, tomatoes, bananas and mangos are just some of the fresh fruits that will hold their shape over the coals.

Using wooden skewers is a great way to grill vegetables and even fruit.

In an article for the USDA's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Education Program, registered dietitian

Business, finance, life in general with Paul Weaver

I sat down with Paul Weaver at his house, and what a time we had. He owned Weaver Leather among other businesses and started Lodestar Guidance, a leadership and character program aimed to help businesses. He is coming out with a book soon: "Culture Battles, Victor or Victim, Your Choice." He invited me over to his house, and we had a great conversation about business, finances and life in general.

Q: Who do you think of when you hear the word successful?

I just marvel at David Greene, who was the CEO of Hobby Lobby. He gave his entire company away. Weaver Leather would sell to them, but it was so hard to sell to them. The reason was because Greene had established whole villages overseas making products for Hobby Lobby. This meant he was eradicating poverty there, and then he managed them with Christian believers, so he was evangelizing to them through the managers. Just like Lodestar, his business became a ministry.

Q: What is the best financial advice you have ever been given?

Luke 6:38: "Give, and it will be given to you. Good



measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured back to you." Period.

Then get out of debt and stay out of debt, numero uno. I was in the home building business during the Jimmy Carter era and prime rate was 22%. How many loans were given?

I was shocked because I have seen interest rates go from 2.5%-7% and I thought that was terrible. If I take this approach, I can be thankful that it is not 22%.

Q: Did you learn most of your financial wisdom from your parents, school, real life or a mix?

Dad never made a major move without counsel. Whenever someone would try to sell him something, his answer was always "I am not going to buy it today." That means he never bought out of impulse. The keys I see in business is a great accountant and a great attorney can make or break you and your business.

Personally, I have noticed this with a great accountant, and I have talked about it before. It does not need to be business; it can be personal. Just make sure your accountant is doing the best job possible for your specific situation.

Q: What are the top two qualities/qualifications when looking for a great investment?

I have a good financial advisor who knows my heart on single company stocks. If a company does not align with my values, he doesn't even ask me.

With real estate — I love real estate — it comes down to location, stability and return on investment.

When I look at a business, I want it to be a good fit. We do not want to make wheelbarrows in the leather industry. Even then, I want to look at the plant and see the people and culture.

Q: What do you personally believe in business that is often found as contradictory to what is taught?

Bankers and private equity firms will want to look at the three- to five-year profit and

Set kids up for success by packing lunches with a purpose

It is that time of year again to think about packing school lunches. The best lunch for school-age kids is not the hot one, the low-fat one or the most expensive. The best lunch is the one that will be eaten.

There are many suggestions to ensure the consumption of a school lunch. The first thing to remember is the child who packs their own lunch is learning responsibility, independence and organization. Empower the kids to pack their own lunch. They are more likely to eat food they packed themselves.

Go to the grocery store together to purchase items that need to be included in a daily lunchbox. Make space in the refrigerator or pantry for items that are for lunches only. Speaking of lunchboxes, buy one they are proud to own.



Have the correct type and size of containers available. A reusable ice pack avoids lukewarm lunch rejection. Utensils and storage dishes that are reusable reduce waste.

Set your kiddos up for success by teaching them how to proportion food into individual servings. Clean and cut vegetables and fruit in advance. Freeze servings of leftovers that can thaw and be eaten cold at lunchtime.

Keep a list of potential lunch items updated weekly. This list will help the kids to remember what to pack. Include one serving of a protein food: a sandwich with sliced meat, chicken or cheese; hard cooked eggs; peanut or other nut butter; or hummus, bean salad, a burrito or tofu, to suggest a few options.

Pack at least one fruit or vegetable that has been washed, rinsed, peeled and cut for quick and easy eating during a limited period. Expecting a 7-year-old to peel and section an orange at school during lunch is a stretch. Taking knives to school to cut up a melon or pare a mango

is against school policy. Keep the child consider how much or draw a picture on a napit simple.

Pretzels, pasta, bread, crackers, chips or a granola bar add needed energy in the form of carbohydrates. These are easy sources of concentration power for young brains. Cookies and snack cakes are great treats to add.

Start by making time to prepare lunches and show your student how to make a sandwich, fill small containers and create a balanced meal. Have he needs to eat so he can begin to understand serving sizes. Parents may need to help with this process for a while until it becomes routine.

Encourage fun by designating a weekly theme or a Wacky Wednesday. Let your child pack only things that are green or pink or even a leftover from their favorite meal or restaurant such as cold pizza. Encourage your kiddo to write a note to themselves kin. Challenge them to pack something new each week.

The key is not only to reduce time, energy and cost of home-packed lunches, but also to encourage the consumption of healthy nutrition during the lunch period. The best lunch is the one eaten.

Wendy Beckman suggests grilling strawberries by placing them on a wooden skewer and brushing on a mixture of lemon juice and honey. Grill for about 10-12 minutes, turning once in the middle of the grilling time. Pineapple also can be grilled in the same way, she wrote. You can cut up vegetables and grill them on wooden skewers as well.

Fruit kabobs cooked on the grill make a tasty and healthy dessert. Here is the recipe from SNAP-Ed's Celebrate Your Plate:

Ingredients

1 cup pineapple chunks 1 peach, cubed 1 banana, sliced

Directions

Place fruit chunks on skewer to make kabobs. Grill or broil on low heat until the fruit is hot and slightly golden. If using wooden skewers, thoroughly soak skewers in water (about 30 minutes) prior to using to prevent burning.

When grilling fruits and vegetables, there are a few things to keep in mind:

-Marinating vegetables is a great way to infuse flavor and moisture into your vegetables before cooking

on the grill — but never use leftover marinade that has been used for raw meat, poultry or seafood items.

-While fruits and vegetables may not have to reach a safe minimum internal temperature the same way meat, poultry and seafood do, different fruits and vegetables will have different cooking times. Thicker cut fruits and vegetables and denser vegetables such as potatoes will take longer to cook. Because of the high heat of the grill, this can result in a thoroughly cooked outside but an uncooked inside of the fruit or vegetable. For more even cooking, cut fruits and vegetables into smaller pieces and use a medium to low grill temperature. For thinner sliced fruits and vegetables, turn them often and pay attention to when they may be done so you don't end up with burnt fruits and veggies.

There are plenty of summer days left. If you haven't grilled fruits and vegetables, give them a try. You'll find them tasty and, best of all, nutritious.

Eye on the sky for birds of both nature and man

A dedicated birder keeps one eye on the sky in nearly every situation. The same can be said of folks interested in aviation. I lived an eye-on-the-sky double-whammy last week when I traveled with fam- to be had when you cram ily to Oshkosh, Wisconsin to experience the world's largest airshow. My pilot son-in-law was our inspiration and tour guide for the trip where nearly 700,000 people from all over the world converge to immerse themselves in all things aircraft.

As one might imagine, accommodations nearby are booked years in advance, but we were happy to land in a little two-room cabin next to a shallow lake about 45 minutes from the festivities. Four adults, three big dogs and two little boys make for pretty tight company in a two-room cabin, but if we do it again, we'll likely do it the very same way. There's a lot of fun



three generations and a mess of mutts into such a tight space.

While I could go on forever about the airshow proper, this particular space belongs to thoughts on nature. Fortunately, Mother Nature offered me a little airshow of her own as I walked the lake shore with my grandson. Purple martins, eastern kingbirds and various other insect eaters swirled above our heads while ducks, geese and the occasional coot cruised the lily pads offshore. A dazzlingly white great egret winged its way overhead, and I thought the 3-year-old would burst from excitement.

Far beyond the shore, we saw a group of several

dozen white dots on the line where the water transitioned to sky. I figured it to be a grouping of egrets or perhaps even a gathering of swans. I made it a point to bring my telephoto lens down to the water on our next walk.

Within a few hours, we were back at the water's edge to find one of our "distant white dots" had made its way right into our bay to slowly float among the lilies and stab at the finned shadows below. I'd never seen a pelican on the water before, but I've seen plenty of brown pelicans in flight along the East Coast. What was a curiosity to me was an all-out spectacle to James. Can you imagine how fantastical a bird with a wingspan three times bigger than the full stretch of your own arms could be to a little boy? And one that could eat an entire foot-long fish in one gulp?

With my own curiosity

piqued, I dug in to find the American white pelican has been enjoying a huge and successful resurgence in numbers, along with an unprecedented expansion in range over the past 30 years. Researchers in Wisconsin, where the bird had been largely gunned off the map by 1870, noted

just two nests in 1993 both located in the state's Horicon Marsh National Wildlife Refuge. Within 20 years the number of nests statewide had increased to over 4,000 — and with no direct human intervention. For comparison's sake, in Ohio it took 40 years and endless amounts of advocacy for bald eagle numbers to grow from just four nests in 1979 to 707 active nesting sites in 2020.

Wildlife biologists believe the pelican's range is expanding due to less favorable conditions in traditional breeding areas in the Canadian Prairie Provinces. Fortunately, the bird seems to have been able to rapidly adapt to conditions further south and east. That means if the expansion continues, there may well be white pelicans in our future here in Ohio. If you spot a white bird with a 9-foot wingspan and a yellow bill the length of your thigh, you'll know they've arrived!

Joey Votto's viral rant has a Wooster connection

A few thoughts from the week in sports ...

Anyone who follows Major League Baseball closely should know the name Joey Votto.

The Cincinnati Reds' sixtime All-Star and Gold Glove winner is an outstanding player, with a personality and sense of humor to match.

Votto recently delivered a hilarious rant to commentator Chris Russo on MLB Network's "High Heat" program, which ended with a reference to an obscure player who was born in Wooster in 1891.

Votto brought up a comment made by Russo in May in which he said Votto and Royals pitcher Zach Greinke were more deserving of being inducted into the Hall of Very Good, instead of the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown.

"A couple of months ago, you said that Zack Greinke and I are Hall of Very Good ballplayers," Votto told Russo. "I think Zack and I would agree. You may be right, but I get the gist of what's going on here."

Then Votto proceeded to roast Russo.

"You're looking down on us," Votto said. "A couple small-market, Midwest ballplayers just because we're not big city just like you.

"Mr. New York City, Sirius XM Radio star, Mr. National Television, ESPN star, with your Fifth Avenue ties and your crisp pocket squares, your tailored suits and your polished shoes, and your hair, your perfectly coiffed, Broadway hair. Must be nice to sit atop that Madison Avenue ivory tower, looking down on us with those luscious locks. Not everyone can be the next Roger Peckinpaugh, Mad Dog! You should be ashamed of yourself! You're a disgrace!"

Russo could barely contain his laughter while cohost Alana Reza looked on in disbelief.



No doubt many curious fans across the country Googled the name Roger Peckinpaugh. "Who's that?" they had to wonder.

Anyone who researched Peckinpaugh quickly learned he was born in Wooster in 1891.

I had a reader contact me and mention the Votto interview and ask what I knew about Peckinpaugh. As a longtime Wayne County Sports Hall of Fame trustee, I've had a couple people over the years ask, "Why is Roger Peckinpaugh not in the Wayne County Sports Hall of Fame?"

For those who don't know the name Roger Peckinpaugh, he played shortstop for the Cleveland Naps (1910, 1912-13), New York Yankees (1913-21), Washington Senators (1922-26) and Chicago White Sox (1927). He was the AL MVP in 1925 and later managed the Yankees and Indians.

Peckinpaugh was indeed a very good but not great player. He collected 1,876 career hits with a .259 batting average and was a bizarre name for Votto to mention but somehow perfect for his rant.

Although Peckinpaugh was born in Wooster, his family moved when he was very young, and he wound up going to East High School in Cleveland. He died in Cleveland at age 86 in 1977.

Peckinpaugh's name has come up a few times in WCSHOF discussions, but since he didn't spend much time here, didn't go to high school here, it would make no sense to put him in the local HOF.

That would be like putting Steph Curry into a Summit County Sports Hall of Fame just because he was born in Akron, but he grew up in Charlotte, North Carolina.

I've loved learning about baseball history from a young age, and it's always interesting when names or interesting statistics from the past come up. I certainly hope Votto becomes a TV announcer when his playing days are done because he always has something interesting to say and is clearly a student of the game.

Big leaguers born in Wayne County

If you research Major League Baseball players born in Wayne County who played from 1900 forward, there are several. Members of the WCSHOF who played big league baseball are as follows:

—Bob "Dusty" Rhoads (born in Wooster 1879, played from 1902-09).

-Kaiser Wilhelm (born in Wooster 1874, played from 1903-21).

-Denny Galehouse (born in Marshallville 1911, went to Doylestown High School and played from 1934-49).

-Dean Chance (born in Wooster 1941, went to Northwestern H.S. and played from 1961-71).

-Mike Birkbeck (born in Orrville 1961, went to Orrville H.S. and played from 1986-95).

The biggest accomplishments among those players were Chance winning the 1964 Cy Young Award for the Los Angeles Angels and Galehouse pitching in the 1948 World Series against the Indians (he lost game seven).

Wilhelm attended Wooster H.S., but the school didn't have a baseball team yet.

Post-1900 big leaguers also from Wayne County are Scotty Alcock (born 1885, played in 1914) and Ginger Clark (born in Wooster 1879, played 1902).
