Miller's creation of Timothy's Gift is a Christmas miracle

ne might wonder what a prisoner in a jail cell thinks about when Christmas season arrives.

Is there joy, or does sorrow and regret smother any possible glad tidings?

Thanks to the organization Timothy's Gift, people in prison are being given a new lease on life, a chance for forgiveness and a reason to look forward to life outside of the bars that currently hold them back, and this Christmas they are being presented with a Christmas program that has changed many lives over the past year.

Through Timothy's Gift, a prison ministry began with the compassion of one man who felt led to make a difference.

That man was Holmes County native Ron Miller, and a moment touched by God has led to an organization sweeping through prisons to celebrate Christmas with the message of faith and hope shared with prisoners.

Watching television, Miller, who now lives in Nashville, Tennessee, was mesmerized by a story on NBC Dateline about a young boy, Timothy Kane.

Kane was one of several juveniles who invaded a home to rob it. In the process the two other older boys killed the wife of the home while a frightened 14-year-old boy hid under a table. Despite having never touched the women, Kane was sentenced for murder as an adult and given a life sentence for his involvement.

Miller eventually met Kane and built a relationship. Miller said his initial assessment of Kane was this was a young man with a spirit of humility and hope, even in the face of his circumstances.

An idea began to percolate in Miller's mind, and a prison ministry was born. A ministry team

Timothy's Gift began making an impact. Today, more than 35,000 prisoners have heard the word of God and the message of hope.

"Tim's story touched my heart, and I felt led to look into a ministry that would touch the lives of

"What I've done the past 14 years through Timothy's Gift has far exceeded anything I've ever done," Miller said. "We're seeing lives transformed and hope being instilled in people's lives in ways that we never imagined."

The ministry has evolved over the years and gone from sharing the gospel to adding plenty of music from talented professionals.

"Being from Nashville, it made sense to implement the music side of worship into what we were initially doing with the prison ministry," Miller said. "We put together a 90-minute program where we played everything from pop, country and Motown to R&B for the first half. Then we transitioned to gospel and faith-based music, and it became a real blessing throughout our tours."

The message the ministry hopes to share is simple: Not only does God love each person, but also there are people willing to love these prisoners as who they are and the future they can have and not judge them on what they have done.

Lawson said when he was placed in prison, he became angry with God, praying to him every night with one plea. "I asked that God not let me wake up in the morning," he said.

Then came a visit from Timothy's Gift. Lawson wasn't going to attend, but the old inmate in the bed next to his implored him to do so

"He physically pulled me off the bunk and made me get in line with him," Lawson said. "I had no

idea who Timothy was or what his gift was."

It was then the music and the message started knocking on Lawson's heart and the hardness began to crack.

"It was everything I could do to fight back the tears that were coming," Lawson said. "I didn't want these guys to see me crying."

But the tears came, and the message was received.

"By the grace of God, I was standing in front of Ron Miller," Lawson said. "I expected humiliation in return. Instead, he looked me straight in the eyes with a look I hadn't seen for six months. I had been looked at with disgust, pity, sorrow, but never with absolute love. He looked me right in the eyes and treated me like a real person. Then he reached out and hugged me. That hug was like my moment of communion. I experienced the love of God through Ron at my worst point in life."

That moment changed the trajectory of Lawson's life. Hope re-entered his heart and mind, and he became a new man. He began a journey that led him through prison and back into the ministry with Timothy's Gift.





Outside the BOX

Welcome to H15's Cardboard Café

ver the centuries an age-old Conundrum has caused many an adult to pause and try to figure out an answer to one simple question.

What to do with these enormous cardboard boxes once the item on the inside is removed?

Andy Schafer, director of H15 Ministries Teen Center in Millersburg, found a way to put multiple big boxes to good use.

While it may be makeshift for the moment until the real thing arrives in the future, Phase II of the buildings now boasts the Cardboard Café, a unique model of what the cafe will become once the funding comes in and the building takes place.

"I mentioned a while back about

making a cardboard model of our plans for the cafe area in Phase II," Schafer said. "We have had a blast doing this, and even though I have invested a fair amount of time into building these and arranging them, it has been extremely helpful as we have worked to get things figured

Schafer said the purpose of building Cardboard Café came about because of the need to have a visual representation of what they were trying to do.

"I felt like I personally could do a pretty good job of laying things out on paper from my mental pictures without needing this, but for the sake of my wife and others who would be involved, I decided to take the time to do it," he said. "Now that we are getting it put together, I have come to realize that I needed it just as much as anyone else."

As the group worked to set up the cafe, they arranged the makeshift cardboard appliance and seating, rearranged it and then rerearranged it again.

"I have become so very thankful that we did this," Schafer said. "Having a life-size model to walk through has shown me many problems with the plan that seemed to be so easy to see in my head. We haven't quite finalized everything yet, but we are definitely getting closer. Each time we move things around it feels better and better. As I see this taking shape, I am getting more and more excited as well."

Not only will the cafe provide food for visiting teens, but it will also eventually be a place in which they can work.

He said as they laid out the home economics portion of the kitchen, they were excited by the thought of teens learning to cook and bake.

"I am picturing using the big open space to do some 'family meals in the kitchen' with the teens and the fun and laughter that goes along with everyone joining together to share a meal together,' Schafer said. "I can't wait to see this all get moving forward."

Settling on the layout of everything is an important decision because once they get the blueprints drawn and start construction, this will be a permanent step,



Dog registration is running through end of January

Holmes County auditor Jackie McKee said a license is a lost dog's ticket home and the law, and dogs are required to wear their current license.

The annual dog registration, required by the State of Ohio, began Dec. 1 and is running through the end of January. It is a service designed to benefit the animal, its owner and the community. The license tag has an assigned identification number that identifies the owner should the dog become lost or separated from its owner.

Ohio law (955.01 ORC) says all dogs more than 3 months of age must be licensed each year no later than Jan. 31. The fee is \$17 per dog. After the Jan. 31 deadline, the fee is \$34 per dog. You must be 18 or older to apply for a dog license.

If you have not licensed your dog in the past, there is no penalty to license your pet for the new year. If you already license your dog, a new license form will be mailed by Dec. 1 along with the return envelope for your convenience.

purchasing 2024 dog licenses. Return the entire application in the provided envelope with the proper fee and the auditor's office will mail your tag back to you.

Licenses also may be purchased online. For more information visit the dog license website at holmescountydoglicense.com.

Licenses may be purchased at

the auditor's office, 75 E. Clinton St., Millersburg, or at the Holmes County Dog Warden's Department, 5387 County Road 349, Millersburg. Both of these locations can accept debit/credit card payments.

There are many satellite locations throughout the county that also will sell 2024 licenses: Becks Mills General Store, Becks Mills; Farmerstown General Store, Farmerstown; Buckeye Deli, Nashville; Orme Hardware of Berlin; Wolfcreek Veterinary Clinic, Millersburg; Whitmer's Store, Winesburg; Kauffman Country Market, Holmesville; Killbuck Country Market, Killbuck; Mt. Hope Hardware, Mt. Hope; E & H Hardware, Millersburg; Keim Lumber, Charm; and East Holmes Vet Clinic, Berlin.

The above agents may collect an administrative fee of 75 cents per dog in addition to the license fee.

Bring your license form with you when purchasing your new tag. Multiyear dog tags are available in addition to the annual tag option. Three-year and lifetime

the auditor's office, 75 E. Clinton St., Millersburg, or at the Holmes County Dog Warden's Depart-tor's Office only.

A kennel license is available at a fee of \$85 for owners engaged in the business of breeding dogs for sale. A tag must be purchased for each dog in a kennel that is over the age of 3 months. The kennel license will be sold with five tags; additional tags will be \$1 per tag. A kennel license can only be purchased at the auditor's office or at the dog warden's department. Large-volume breeders must purchase a license through the Ohio Department of Agriculture and the tags through the auditor's office.

"When you consider how much pet owners invest to keep their pets healthy, happy and safe, the license fee is a small price to pay for another year's peace of mind," McKee said.

All license revenue goes toward the operation of the Holmes County Dog Warden's Department & Adoption Center. The department is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

in Millersburg on Wednesday, Nov. 22 was special for another reason.


This dedication marked the 40th home Holmes County Habitat has built, and HCHH Executive Director Mary Neutzling was excited as the organization reached a new milestone.

Mike Whitman said they are more than ready to assume ownership of the home, and Neutzling said the Whitmans went above and beyond in putting in their sweat equity, working on the home whenever they could.

"The whole thing went by really quickly," Whitman said. "I know the boys are very excited about finally getting into the house, and we're grateful to the people who helped make it hap-

Habitat for Humanity partner families purchase their homes from Habitat on the closing date, which is shortly after they move in. The homes are sold to the families at no profit to Habitat and with no interest charged. Their mortgage payments go into a revolving Fund for Humanity, which is used to build more houses.

Holmes County Habitat for Humanity families \$40,000 annually combined in property taxes on their homes. They invest many hours of their own labor into building their homes and the homes of others.

"Each home has been a huge blessing for many people, but especially for the families," said Pete Hilty, construction supervisor from Schlabach Builders, which has recently built many of the Habitat homes. "These families and the community put a lot of hard work into making these homes a reality, and while it might be easy to see this as a handout, it isn't. This is a hand-up where we require families to make an investment.'

Dog warden Beam talks 2023, looks ahead with commissioners

Holmes County dog warden Jonathan Beam met with the Holmes County commissioners Monday, Nov. 27 at the Old Jail in Millersburg to discuss the past year, including the budget, and what lies ahead in the future.

Beam said the office raised its tag fees last year, which helped the department stay solid financially in 2023.

"Our license tag fees have gradually continued to go up the

past couple of years, and we kind of leveled off in our numbers in the kennels, and I think we could continue to see that again next year as people continue to get out of the (dog industry) business," Beam said to the commissioners. "But even with that (drop), we aren't going to see much of a decrease or change (financially)."

The department creates income through adoption fees, fines from citations, tag and license sales and impound fees while relying heavily on donations.

In his report to the Holmes County commissioners, dog warden Jonathan Beam said that although the department faces rising costs of medical care for dogs, it had medical donations of \$11,449, much of that coming through fundraising efforts where people can discover more about everything the dog warden office does.

One major expense the department took on this year was hiring a technician/deputy dog warden, Jess McConville, who has stepped into the role and become an invaluable part of the team

Beam said she also serves as event coordinator, and her efforts to create and conduct several fundraising events this year were hugely successful.

"We've been blessed to have Jess on board," Beam said.

The department also raised all of its kennel fences this past year due to several dogs scaling the former wall to get outside. Beam added that the dogs that escaped weren't aggressive or bad dogs, just simply very athletic.

Other additions in 2023 included recoating the kennel floor, adding a foster program and improvements in the playground

'The foster program was huge," Beam said. "People were able to take dogs home and foster them until we had space to bring them back in. Others fostered dogs to adopt to see how things went."

A community member who passed away this year left the department money to improve the facility, and Beam said they continue to use that to add equipment to the playground area where the dogs can run and play freely.

"We want to put that in memory of her," Beam said of the

He said they didn't experience any significant expenses, but they did have one deputy leave the department, so they will hire a new team member in 2024.

One major concern facing the department is the rising cost of medical care for the dogs. Beam said costs are rising across the board, including veterinarian services and having animals spayed and neutered.

"Everything just costs more now," Beam said. "We've been seeing more dogs come in with medical problems that need to be

Fortunately, the department had medical donations of \$11,449, much of that coming through its fundraising efforts where people can discover more about everything the dog warden office does.

Much of the discussion for 2024 revolved around the ongoing talks about expanding the dog kennel facility, something that is in the infant stages of discussion.

One thing that Beam said would be beneficial is finding a better way to improve the expedi-

He suggested exploring the use of Alter Care Clinic in Massillon as a possible option. The company partners with county dog warden offices and utilizes a traveling transport to visit sites and provide transportation in a large bus that takes animals back to their facility for a day to be spayed and neutered.

With spay and neutering costs ranging between \$200 to \$350, he said this provides one more financially viable option. He said the department would like to begin early in 2024 and would set up stops once a month.

The commissioners also discussed the possibility of having a local veterinarian come to the facility regularly.

Beam said they have also discussed opening up the playground area to the community after hours, allowing people to bring their dogs in to exercise and play with them on the equipment. Beam said they would offer the facility free to the community.

The commissioners suggested looking into liability issues before

while and quickly realized that she missed the caring quality of people who are abundant in Holmes County.



Holmes County wage survey provides key insight

Ask just about any business owner about what chal-

lenges their company faces that are the most pivotal, and many of them will respond that the difficulties in hiring and keeping quality employees rank as one of the biggest challenges they face.

Mark Leininger, executive director of the Holmes County Economic Development Council, has been hard at work developing a survey that may well provide insight into the travails or complications owners face in hiring today.

According to Leininger, many local business owners cite difficulties in hiring and retaining workers as the biggest challenge facing their businesses in today's business climate.

As a result, owners have requested wage information to help inform their compensation offerings and ensure that they can remain competitive in a tight labor market, and Leininger was more than ready to create an avenue that would not only explore the various challenges in hiring but would also initiate a survey that will provide valuable infor-

mation and resources for the survey's participants.

The Holmes County Economic Development Council partnered with the economic development professionals at The Ohio State University to create a wage and benefit survey. The survey is designed

to elicit compensation information in connection with 40 different employment positions. The wage and benefit information gleaned from the survey will be analyzed and presented in a written report that could serve as a valuable service for business owners

seeking to hire.

The businesses targeted are in the realm of construction, production, maintenance, retail, hospitality and food services, and while all questions may not be pertinent to each company, participants can opt to answer only the questions that pertain to them.

"This is the third wages survey I've done, and we try to improve it each time we offer one, and in working with The Ohio State University, they have the software available for the survey, and we try to include relevant positions," Leininger said. "We ask for feedback in ways to improve, and that allows us to add questions pertaining to vital positions people want to know more about.

"Without this type of gathered information, it's kind of a guessing game as to what our wage and benefits look like in a given

industry. It's all word-of-mouth and conjecture what people think is competitive. This can give us real, hard facts about what it really looks like."

He added that they tried to simplify the survey to make it quick and easy to fill out.

This new edition has seen them streamline the survey even further, and Leininger said the idea is to provide business owners with information that helps them create competitive compensation for their employ-

"So many people are telling us the single biggest challenge is hiring people," Leininger said. "To be able to evaluate what wages and benefits should be is a remarkable tool to have at their disposal."

Leininger said that all survey responses are maintained by the HCEDC and OSU in strict confidence and will not be disclosed to any other parties. For purposes of preparing the survey report, all data will be aggregated, so that no individual business information will be identifiable or ascertainable from the report.

As is the case in any survey, the more responses Leininger receives, the more valuable the information becomes.

"The more responses we receive, the greater the reliability and accuracy of the survey report," he said. "By participating in the survey, people can help ensure that local business owners get the information they need to remain competitive in the world of hiring and keeping employees.'

All participants will be entitled to receive an advance copy of the report, free of charge.

Not only did Leininger send out the survey to past participants and those businesses he works with, but he also teamed up with the Holmes County Chamber of Commerce and Tourism partners as well as members of


the Ohio Hardwood Association.

And earlier still, the worn years of the Civil et, "a man of sorrows, and



War brought these immortal lines that echo the grief that came with the death of Abraham Lincoln, by poet Edwin Markham: "He went down as when a lordly cedar, green with boughs, goes down with a great shout upon the hills and leaves a lonesome place against the sky. His shout is still upon the hills, and his place still an empty one against the sky."

And harking back still further, from the psalms of David: "Mine eye is consumed because of grief ... For my life Is spent with grief.'

And of Christ himself, our great redeemer, as grief-worn, the death- told by Isaiah the prophacquainted with grief."

And for us who have lost our loved ones, they left us in Markham's words 'with a great shout upon the hills" and left "a lonesome place" in our memories at our Thanksgiving tables.

And we are mindful, too, of the likeness of grief that befalls the many who have lost loved ones on the battlefields and the footpaths of the earth trodden by the many displaced persons.

Surely, we do well to pause in grief with our hearts at half-mast, too, as we remember the grief, the loss that came to many with the accident on Interstate Highway 70 involving a Pioneer Trails bus. And surely, these are times that try our hearts, for as the song favorite from times past goes, "The dark skies are weeping with dew drops

These seven tips can help.

1. Purchase clear, similarly sized storage bins and shelving racks, hanging them where you plan to keep the decorations. Most people prefer an out-of-the-way spot, such as in the garage, attic or basement. Label each bin by holiday and put the bins in chronological order to make finding items more convenient. Uniform bin



sizes make it easier to stack and store.

2. Store smaller items inside larger decor items. Decorative baskets or wrapped boxes brought out for Christmas or Chanukah are ideal places to keep smaller tchotchkes like ceramics, dreidels, candlestick holders, or mantel hooks. Delicate items can be tucked into Christmas stockings or wrapped and stored in a fluffy tree skirt. Egg cartons can be used to keep small items safe as well.

- 3. Label everything so you will not need to dig through boxes or bins to know what is inside. This might be a good year to ask for a label maker for the holidays!
- 4. Use overhead or wall storage for holiday decor.

Overhead spaces in the garage or basement walls can be good spaces to keep holiday decorations. Always keep bins and boxes off the floor so they are not vulnerable to damage related to leaks or floods.

- 5. Garment bags can protect larger decorations, such as wreaths, artificial trees or signs. If you have a large number of mechanical, illuminated or inflatable lawn ornaments, consider investing in a small shed where these items can be safely kept. Wrap the extension cords and any bracing stakes or strings used with the decorations so it's easy to find.
- 6. Utilize pieces of cardboard as well as toilet paper or paper towel tubes to keep lights and wires tidy. Tuck cords into the toilet paper tubes, and wrap lights around the cardboard to avoid tangles.
- 7. Each year, take inventory of your decoration collection and toss out anything that is damaged or has seen better days.

sioner, Official Representative for the purpose of voting at the annual meeting of the County Commissioner's Association of Ohio for 2024.

—Susan Schie, Holmes County commissioner clerk, County Prevailing Wage officer; and County HIPPA Privacy officer.

Brad Conn, Holmes County Juvenile Court officer, agreed to continue his role as a member of the County Law Library Resource Board. His term will expire Dec. 31, 2028.

In other commissioner news, a resolution was passed accepting the contract for residential treatment services between Warren County and Holmes County. This agreement executes an agreement between the two counties for Warren County to host juveniles from Holmes County in the amount of \$200 per day during 2024.

The agreement is through Mary Haven Youth Center, a division of the Warren County Juvenile Court, which is willing to provide this service. The residents will participate in the Response Ability Pathways Program, which encourages individualized treatment for each juvenile. Programming includes cognitive behavior modification, education, recreation and religious opportunities. Treatment available to residents includes counseling, sex offender treatment, trauma and grief component treatment for adolescents and substance abuse treatment.

"Their beds have gone from \$175 to \$200 this year," Schie told the commissioners.

"According to Dan Jackson (Holmes County Department of Job & Family Services director), that is normal cost of inflation," Hall added.

A force account resolution with the Holmes County engineer was passed resolving that the health, welfare and safety of the general public can best and most efficiently be served by force account in matters pertaining to maintenance,

With numerous government items either obsolete or unneeded in 2024, the commissioners passed a resolution for the purpose of expressing the board's intent to conduct an internet auction for the sale of unneeded, obsolete or unfit county personal property.

"It's so we can put items on govdeals.com," Schie said.

Troyer said he and Holmes EMA assistant director Jordan Tschiegg have met with a half dozen area churches willing to serve in that capacity, noting that the Chamber of Commerce and Commissioner's building could also be utilized under dangerous weather circumstances. "Our goal is to have at least five warming and cooling stations open in the county when it is affected,"

Tschiegg added that he is wrapping up work on creating a resource book for Holmes County that includes all emergency contact numbers.

A resolution was passed authorizing the establishment of the Department of Development Grant to be included in the county budgetary system.

This newly requested fund will be line-item money used for the purpose of expenses for the Cherry Ridge water line extension project.

"I was three recently, and they are coming along nicely," Hall said of the Cherry Ridge work.

The commissioners also made numerous transfers within a fund, something that Hall said was typical line-item juggling by departments that are normal for departments at yearend where departments are moving money around to balance out their budgets.

CVB talks free tix to local attractions



CERT class is ready, willing to help

In times of crisis and emergencies, having a well-prepared and coordinated response team is crucial for the safety and well-being of a community. Helping that effort is Community Emergency Response Team. CERT is a program that trains volunteers to become an essential part of the emergency response system.

CERT teams are comprised of everyday individuals passionate about making a difference and ensuring the resilience of their neighborhood. The concept was born out of the recognition that during a major disaster, first responders might be overwhelmed by the sheer scale of the situation. By having trained community members ready to assist, the burden on emergency services is lightened, and critical help can be promptly provided to those in need.

According to local CERT founder, retired Wayne

County Sheriff's Office Capt. Doug Hunter, the training is rigorous because the volunteers may be called into action at any time.

"I started this initiative before I retired from the sheriff's office," Hunter said. "It took a while to get the moving parts into place."

According to Hunter, volunteers must pass a 12-hour online course

administered by the University of Utah before participating in the hands-on portion of the training. Hunter recommends even private individuals take the training. He said you never know when you might be the first responder.

In addition to possibly saving a life someday, volunteers play a critical role in emergency response by taking care of minor issues while full-time first responders focus on critical issues.


"There is a shortage of first responders right now; being involved with CERT allows me to help the community in situations where first responders are needed," Alex Angus of Green Fox Plastics said. "My role would be to help free them up so they can respond to more severe needs."

Angus also plans to put his CERT training to use at his job if the need arises.

"We work with heavy machinery, so (accidents) could be an issue," he said about his training. "This training is very valuable; it is a little different from what you read in the book when you perform some handson tasks. For example, the book doesn't tell you to be prepared for the recoil from the fire extinguisher, but now that is committed to memory."



"The auction industry is big around here, and I know it will be a slow growth, but I respect that and want to put in the time necessary to do this the right way," Pennell said. "I'm willing to do the work."

He also has created Sidetrack Hunting Apparel, an online outdoor gear line that Pennell said focuses on the pure meaning of hunting. He started the apparel business this past spring, and it too has blossomed quickly.

"I'm all online with the apparel," Pennell said.

He said in creating the company, he built it around the mantra "When ethics become tactics." Pennell grew up hunting, and his dad taught him the way to hunt was to hunt for meat and not the commercial

"I'm not a fan of the commercial side of hunting," Pennell said. "I wanted to bring the hunt-

Pennell Auction Service ing industry back to having good ethics and have meat as the main goal."

Rather than selling camouflage gear, Sidetrack focuses on inspirational and motivational sweatshirts, T-shirts, and other apparel and gear that are military green style.

Each item has Christianbased slogans that promote the pure purpose for hunt-

"I've tried to link hunting and faith together," Pennell said.

His apparel continues to sell well in Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia.

While he is working on creating a website, Pennell said his presence thus far has been social media driven on Facebook and YouTube.

The success has been inspiring to Pennell, and he said being a member of an FFA group that is very driven to build character and leadership was instrumental in shaping his work ethic.

"FFA was one of the leading reasons I wanted to work for the general public," Pennell said. "I love this community and knew I wanted to come back here. It's a great community, and it gives people opportunities to take a leap of faith. I think FFA set me up for that before I ever even thought about this type of endeavor."

He said his FFA experience provided him with more confidence, and Chenevey pushed him to want to pursue success and to work hard to do so.

"If I had never entered her class, I don't know where I'd be right now, but she helped set me up for success," Pennell said. "I have to give credit where credit is due, and there were a lot of people in the community who helped encourage and guide me."

Pennell's story is not unique to the success of the hardworking members of the local FFA. His story serves as an inspiration to the many young people who are driven to pour themselves into a trade and work toward their goals.



Fireplace safety is important during holiday season

Gatherings with family and friends are an integral component of the holiday season. Certain rooms in the house are on display more than others, with kitchens, dining rooms and living areas serving as popular places to congregate. Of course, fireplaces also serve as popular gathering spots in homes that feature them.

Lighting a fire in the hearth can make any space



more cozy, but doing so comes with some hazards. Consider these fireplace safety tips in advance of the holiday entertaining season.

—Have the fireplace inspected and swept profes-

sionally. Prior to lighting the first fire of the season, ensure that a professional inspects the fireplace, chimney and venting to ensure everything is in good condition. The chimney also should be swept to remove excess debris and buildup that could pose a fire hazard.

—Keep items away from the fireplace. Wrapping paper, rugs, clothing, maga-

zines, and the like should be kept at least three feet away from the flames, suggests the American Red Cross. Also, make sure decorations are hung securely and a safe distance away from the fire.

—Check your smoke alarms. Be sure the home has working smoke alarms on every level of the house. And keep a fire extinguisher close to the fireplace.

—Never burn wrapping paper. Wrapping paper contains additives, like dyes, that make it burn extremely hot. Do not think of discarding wrapping paper by burning it in the fireplace.

—Keep the tree a safe distance away. Although it makes for the perfect Christmas photo backdrop, Christmas trees and fireplaces should not be near each other. Also, the Christmas tree is not safe to burn in the fireplace after the season, as the wood has not been properly dried or seasoned.

—Use a screen on the fireplace. Make sure the

Cookies are a tradition passed down through the ages. In medieval Europe, small, spiced cookies were exchanged as treats, and people still bake and share gingerbread cookies today.

Cut cookies are some of the most popular cookies to make during the holiday season. Some families may have their share of favorite cookie cutter shapes and dough recipes. Certain techniques can make holiday baking sessions easier and ensure consistent results.

-Work on a lightly floured, cool surface, such as a cutting board or stone counter top. Never work on a warm surface, which can cause dough to spread and

-Dip cookie cutters into flour with each cut. Work from the center and move out to the edges when cutting out your designs. Try to maximize space and avoid scraps and rerolling.

-Some expert bakers say that metal cookie cutters cut cleaner than plastic ones. Whichever cutter you use, cut the cookie by

pressing straight down; try not to twist or jiggle the cookie cutter when using it. Doughs with a high butter content can help, as the extra grease helps separate the dough from the cutters.

-If cut cookies have gotten warmer, place them in the freezer for a few minutes to firm up again and then cook. This will guarantee the cookies will not spread or distort while baking.



Extra steps may seem like they will take a lot of time. However, the extra effort and attention to detail will help produce cookies that win rave reviews.

Senior offensive lineman Jake Miller, junior kicker Anderson Colon and senior defensive lineman Wyatt Hershberger all earned honorable mention accolades.



If there's one word to describe college football right now, it's this: chaos.

And, I'm not just talking about a College Football Playoff committee that snubbed 13-0 Florida State from its four-team playoff.

The transfer portal in college football has my head spinning a lot more. With the season still underway for bowl teams, the oddly timed FBS transfer window that runs from Dec. 4 to Jan. 2, 2024 figures to be busier than the MLB hot stove season. More than 1,000 players nationwide entered the portal.



Do not be fooled by a fake package delivery scam

Online purchases and package deliveries skyrocket during the holiday season, and scammers use this opportunity to trick busy shoppers into giving out their personal information.

Here is what you should know about a new twist on delivery scams:

How the scam works

You receive a text mes-



sage from what appears to be a delivery driver looking for your home. It says something like this: "Hi! My name is Tony. I work for FedEx, and I'm trying to find your house.

Please call me." If the er reports, the callers are without double-checking. message seems a little strange to you, trust your gut. It is a scam.

If you call the number, the scammer will ask you to confirm your personal details including your name, address and possibly even your credit card information. If you do not remember ordering anything that needs to be delivered, the caller may try to convince you the package is a gift from a friend or relative. According to BBB Scam Track-

often friendly and professional, making the scam harder to spot. Also, look out for text or email messages that ask you to reschedule a

delivery or pay a small delivery fee. These messages often look legitimate — containing official logos and using professional language. But if you click, you may download malware onto your computer that gives con artists access to personal information and passwords.

In either case the package does not exist. If you give up your personal information, it will be in the hands of con artists, and you will be at risk of identity theft.

How to avoid delivery scams

—Keep track of your deliveries. Scammers hope you will just assume they are talking about a pack-

It will be much harder for them to fool you if you know what packages you are expecting, from what companies and when.

Know delivery company policies: Delivery companies will never contact you with unsolicited calls or texts. Depending on how you signed up for notifications, messages usually are posted within a secure online portal. Be leery of unsolicited messages, especially if you never signed up for text alerts.

-Never give sensitive personal information to strangers. If an unsolicited caller asks you for personal information, even if they claim to represent a company you trust, hang up and call the company using the official customer service number. Calling the company yourself is the best way to determine if the inquiry is legitimate

A reader contacted me concerning the availability of pasteurized eggs. I recommended this treatment for eggs since the frosting recipe is not heated to a safe temperature. She had trouble finding pasteurized eggs at the grocery store.

All liquid eggs are pasteurized. They are usually purchased in a frozen milk-like container. This is a common method used to eliminate or reduce the number of viable, possibly harmful bacteria. It is a process in which liquid egg products are heated at below boiling to kill vegetative microbial cells.

Pasteurized liquid eggs go through similar processes as raw milk. These eggs are safe to consume without cooking. Let me

Liquid eggs can be used instead of whole eggs in almost any recipe. The conversion is three to four tablespoons to one large egg. There is the equivalent of one and a half dozen eggs in a two-pound car-

Some varieties include only egg whites, and some are a mixture of both whites and yolks. Frozen egg products became popular in the 1970s when cholesterol from saturated animal fats was considered the ultimate bad guy in the fight against heart disease. Research now reports different findings.

In the past, it seemed

logical that eggs would add to the recommended be harmful because of the cholesterol in the egg yolk. Scientists at Harvard University state that a daily egg, either shell or liquid. does not increase your risk of a heart attack, stroke or any other type of cardiovascular disease.


It has been discovered that most of the cholesterol in our body is made by the liver. It does not come from the cholesterol we consume. Our liver is stimulated to make cholesterol from all the saturated and trans fats we eat, not dietary cholesterol.

A large egg contains very little saturated fat, about one and a half grams. On the other hand, research has confirmed that eggs contain many healthy nutrients. Antioxidants found in carotenoids, lutein and zeaxanthin help to protect the eyes. Choline is good for the brain and nerves. Various vitamins, A, B and D, daily allowance. And these are just a few benefits. One egg also contains about six grams of protein and just 72 calories.

The American Heart Association reports that those who ate an average of one egg per day had a 28% lower risk of death from stroke and an 18% lower risk of death from heart disease. One explanation might be that eggs also contain heart-healthy nutrients, such as folate and omega-3 fatty acids.

Common ways of cooking eggs include boiling, poaching, scrambling or frying. Liquid pasteurized eggs from a carton can be added to smoothies or eggnog without the risk of a foodborne illness. Email me if you want my frosting

A memorable Christmas tradition that's really gone out of fashion

"Kramer vs. Kramer," released in 1979, isn't commonly thought of as a Christmas movie, but you could make an argument

Sure, its main theme is the effect that a couple's deteriorating marriage has on a child and how a pending divorce hurts everyone.

Ted and Joanna, played by Dustin Hoffman and Meryl Streep, have split, leaving him to take the lead in raising their son, Billy.

When I saw it in 1979, I was impressed with the writing and the way the script left lots of room for nonverbal communication, the kind that translates emotion into a wordless look, a quick glance that challenges the viewer to fill in the blanks, to complete the connection, to — in a phrase — make the silence speak volumes.

It's a trait shared among

some of the finest films ever released, from Bogart's nod, which unleashes "La Marseillaise" in "Casablanca," to the way Clyde and Bonnie look into each other's souls, seconds before a fusillade of bullets brutally ends their lives.

There's a similar moment in "Kramer vs. Kramer" when, as Ted's lawyer mercilessly questions Joanna on the witness stand, he shakes his head, almost imperceptibly, as if to tell her that this wasn't his idea and that she shouldn't consider herself a failure.

It's not a scene that's much fun to watch but divorces aren't either.

Earlier in the film, we

advertising for which he's obviously over qualified but, needing employment before the judge considers his custody claim, he has to lower himself, if only for a chance to keep his son under his roof.

What makes the scene so effective and so memorable is that it takes place during the company's Christmas party, an event that isolates him even more than he already feels, a man all alone.

As the festive frivolity swirls all around him, Ted sits in a chair outside an office where his future and his son's — is being decided. It's a disarming juxtaposition, one that stresses the oblivious caterwauling of his would-be colleagues with his particular situation, one that has him feeling more than desperate.

"It's the worst time of see Ted applying for a job in year to look for a job," his agent has already told him, referring to Christmas and the way lots of businesses all but shut down during the holidays, but Ted knows what he must do.

The scene is brilliantly composed and shot from a perspective that accentuates Ted's stranded-on-an-island body language, one that always puts me in mind of a similar moment in one of Hoffman's best movies. As Benjamin in "The Graduate," he is filmed at the bottom of his parents' in-ground pool, wearing a ridiculous scuba-diving suit and there is no sound but his bored breathing, which causes bubbles to rise to the surface, proof of his existence.

His alienation is rooted in aimlessness, purposelessness with which he is ill-equipped to handle, all



An NCAA playoff nightmare scenario disses Florida St.

If ever there was a poster child of a season for the NCAA football playoff system, this may well be the year.

The front end of the chart-toppers was loaded with strong but not great caliber teams.

Top-seed Michigan was about as strong from start to finish as any team out there this year, but the Wolverines' strength of schedule wasn't anything to write home about.

A one-loss Texas team finished second and whipped up on an Alabama team that snuck into the No. 4 seed by taking down previously undefeated Georgia, which was ranked number one the entire season until the loss, the Crimson Tide squeaking past the Bulldogs 27-24.

Washington, the playoff's No. 2 seed, cruised through the regular season and boasts a 20-game winning streak.

When the smoke had cleared and the NCAA playoff selection committee had boiled down all the numbers, it pitted No. 1 Michigan versus No. 4 Alabama and No. 2 Washington versus No. 3 Texas.

Are those teams worthy of playoff spots?

They sure are.

However, the process leaves out some other teams who have proven they could just as well compete for a crown.

We can start with Florida State University.

FSU was posting monster offensive numbers early on, including thrashing LSU, but the Seminoles are now on their third-string quarterback, and a lackluster 16-6 win over No. 13 Louisville in the Atlantic Coast Conference championship game that wasn't pretty to watch was enough to persuade the committee members that FSU wasn't Final Four material.

Never mind that FSU was perfect on the season.

This begs the question, should the committee reward a team for getting the job done, or should its

members throw their own opinions into the mix and decide that nobody would want to watch FSU play in a playoff game because a) they're not sexy; b) they're not watchable without a top-notch quarterback; and c) they would be death for ratings and TV income.

Let me pose this question: If FSU had done what it did with its starting first-string quarterback at the helm, would the committee have gone a different direction?

My guess to that question is, yes.

So, what's the difference?

FSU did everything it should do to capture a spot in the Final Four, and most importantly, the team found a way to overcome a major obstacle to beat the nation's 13th-ranked team in their conference title game.

Next up is Georgia, which will now face the aforementioned Florida State in the Orange Bowl.

Georgia was considered the cream of the crop all season long as the Bulldogs chased a third consecutive national championship.

That three-point loss at the end of the year dropped the Bulldogs out of the playoffs. Should the twotime defending champions get a shot at retaining their title? Like Alabama, they had one loss.

However, several things played against Georgia.

Strike two, it lost at the wrong time. Had it lost its season opener or in week three and then run the table, I think the Bulldogs would be in.

Strike three, they were two-time defending national champions.

Ohio State University had one blemish, a tight loss to top-seed Michigan in the final week of the regular season. That game came down to one play on the Buckeyes' final drive.

OK, so you just fell to the top seed in all of football on a last-second drive. When a team proves it can go toe-to-toe with the top team in the nation, doesn't that warrant an invitation to the playoffs to prove its worth?

The Oregon Ducks and their 52 different uniforms fell to No. 2 Washington by a field goal, not once this season but twice. Other than that, they were dominant. Does that not merit a chance to play for a title?

Sadly, those teams on the outside looking in will have to wait until next season when the NCAA goes to a 12-team playoff format in which the top four seeds receive byes.

The question this year? Is the best team staying at home come playoff time?

We will never know for sure.

Living it up across the pond

Several years ago, Taller Half and I decided to visit England. We had a grand time and learned a lot about English houses.

Our first night there was spent in a bed-and-breakfast that had been lived in continually for 500 years. She was a tall, skinny old lady, built to protect from the elements and frequent marauders — not for comfort.

Despite her age, that old girl had been given bathrooms, real bathrooms. Up a steep staircase at the end of a narrow hall was a clean little room fitted with a comfortable bed and a miniature bathroom, which was a small sink and a narrow but deep tub. Next to that little room was another little room, called the water closet, that held the toilet.

Many old houses in England have very interesting plumbing. Very few



houses have showers, perhaps because of the lack of hot water pressure. For some strange reason, no English house, either old or young, seems to have effective hot water pressure. In England, showers come with the weather, not the bathroom.

British houses and American houses are very similar in two ways; they are both expensive and demanding.

There are some more interesting differences. For instance, the Brits do not put screens in their windows. They are firmly convinced that no bug would dare enter without permission.

Sadly, that attitude does not allow for the occasional illmannered bug which does not give a hoot about proper behavior. Every country has a few of those.

The most startling difference between British and American houses is longevity. A great number of inhabited houses over there live an amazingly long time. Few houses here in the States have such long life spans.

Do the Brits know something we don't? Is high hot water pressure to blame for not allowing so many of our houses to age gracefully? How many places do you know of that are over several hundred years old and are still being inhabited?

We knew of one such place, but it collapsed before it reached the age of 200. Fortunately, its occupants had just moved out.




