

Peace by Piece

The Christmas nativity scene elicits many emotions

What do you think of when you view a Christmas nativity scene?

The Christ Child in the manger, Mary and Joseph, the magi, and shepherds and angels gathering around the stable often means something different to each individual.

During the recent Nativity Walk at Presbyterian Church in Millersburg, dozens of nativities from around the world gave pause for people to experience whatever emotion the nativity elicits in them.

The many nativities inside the church ranged in size and color. None were the same, but each focused on Christ in the manger, and those who brought nativities in wrote about why that particular nativity was so special to them.

One small nativity was the first thing Chuck and Debbie Chase purchased together.

There was a copper nativity from Chile. Another one from Kenya was made from dried banana peels. Debbie Jewell's special nativity came from the Holy Land and was made from olive wood, purchased a half-century ago on a trip to Bethlehem by her parents, who passed it along to her.

Others were cherished gifts from family and friends, some were hand-crafted, and yet others were purchased because of the meaning behind the nativity for a special occasion.

One of the most viewed nativities came from Randy and Debbie Ruhl, a traditional German Weihnacten Pyramid nativity that included candles that provided heat to turn a paddle on top of the merry-go-round scene.

Each nativity had its own personal meaning, and that is the wonderful thing about nativity scenes. They have the ability to evoke fond memories through the history of each piece and elicit a variety of emotions that come from the age-old story of the birth of the Savior born in a manger.

For those viewing the nativity scenes, and there were many of

them to view, the sincerity, peacefulness and purpose behind the nativity was everywhere.

For many people the two themes of faith and family are central to the nativity.

"The story and faith and everything that accompanies the nativity story is very important to our family," Treva Sprang said. "This is the holiday to celebrate our Christ, but it is also something that really brings love in our family together."

Lori Priebe from Nashville said the nativity is special because it has had meaning to her for many years and tells the story of the birth of Christ.

She said witnessing so many nativity scenes was inspirational, especially because some of them came from all around the globe and depicted the scene in ways that allowed each of the nations to share a bit of their culture with the world.

"The nativity is the real meaning of Christmas, and it always brings the message of Christmas back amid all of the hustle and bustle of the season," Priebe said.

Joe Edinger said while faith is central, there is much more to the nativity, and that has been something he and his wife Susan have worked hard to pass along to their children

"It always reminds me of our kids and teaching them about the Christmas story," Edinger said.

The Edinger nativity has seen many years in the family, and he said he remembers when he and his siblings were young and how they would play with the figures and act out the Christmas story.

"Every time I see it, it takes me back to my childhood and the way we played out the story over and over to ingrain it in us," Edinger said. "It is a lot of joy in those memories, and I watched our kids do the same thing, although they'd sneak their superheroes and Barbie Dolls into the story from time to time."

He also said they have a special nativity his mother gave to them before her passing, a willow tree scene he holds dear to his heart in her memory.

Millersburg Presbyterian Rev. Rami Almaqdasi hails from Iraq, and he said regardless of where the nativity is from, it always evokes a peace that comes from God.

Almaqdasi said it is an inner peace and a peace among a community that celebrates love, sharing and tolerance.

"This always reminds me that we all come from different places, different backgrounds, but we are one in faith and in Christ," he said.

Almaqdasi owns the small bell nativity from the Holy Land, as well as one given to him by a friend from Syria that resides on the family's porch.

To him and his family, both elicit the faith, hope and love of the nativity and the Christmas story.

"This time of the year especially, we turn to faith and to this incredible story of Christ," Almaqdasi said. "Much like each of these nativities are personal to those who own them, each person's faith is a personal story too, which is why the meaning behind the nativity means something unique to each person."

Debbie Ruhl was instrumental in hosting the event.

"It's the reason for the season, and it's such a neat, personal experience that we can share together, that allows us to refocus our faith and put our faith and family in the forefront of the season," Ruhl said.



Hand-crank radios for Amish community

According to Jason Troyer, Holmes County Emergency Management Agency director, Ohio experiences approximately 21 tornadoes each year.

However, 2023 was anything but typical, and a former disaster helped pave the way for the county to explore the possibility of aiding area Amish families in dealing with catastrophic weather conditions.

Troyer recently reported to the Holmes County commissioners that 2023 saw a monumental leap in reported tornadoes, with the state experiencing 60 tornadoes this past year.

"I found it very interesting that we had such a huge jump that almost tripled the average number of annual tornadoes," Troyer said.

He went on to discuss the possibility of creating a program in conjunction with Midland Radio to promote the implementation of Weather Awareness for a Rural Nation monitors, which focuses heavily on aiding the Amish population when notifying them about impending weather disasters.

"(Midland Radio) is in contract right now to develop

a weather radio specifically designed for the Amish population," Troyer said.

The radio does not have AM and FM capability, nor will it have a USB port. What it does have is a small solar-powered screen with a hand crank and battery backup that will allow the Amish community members and other groups like outdoorsmen and campers to successfully receive important weather bulletins.

"It's a very unique opportunity, and there are some grant opportunities out there that may allow us to purchase the radios and get them out to the Amish population," Troyer said.

Troyer said the idea was born many years ago when an Amish family in Kentucky was swept away by flooding waters that took the lives of four children.

A Kentucky regional EMA director was instrumental in developing the radio program following the deadly incident that saw a mother with four children trying to cross a low-lying bridge.

When the buggy was tossed into the flooding waters, all of the children perished.

That tragedy pushed along the need for ways to reach the Amish community that didn't interfere with their faith values, and the handcrank radio project was put in motion.

"Because Holmes County's Amish population is around 49% of our county, this presentation really hit home for us," Troyer said.

Jordan Tschiegg, Holmes EMA assistant director, said these radios have been available for some years, and it is done in conjunction with the National Weather Service.

"They already make these radios, but one of the Amish population's concerns was that the solar panel in the back wasn't big enough," Tschiegg said. "So they've been changing that."

In addition, Midland Radio has been improving the radio's ability to zero in on specific areas of a county when an alert bulletin is sent out.

Troyer said that is a huge selling point because it will allow the county to share critical weather information with certain populations around the county without constantly bothering the entirety of the Amish population every time a bulletin is sent out.

"Weather radios are designed to manually go off per county," Troyer said, noting that in discussion with local members of the Amish community, the alerts would go out countywide and the messages would become stagnant and less adhered to because of how widespread the bulletins would be.

With the ability to zero in on one specific area, the radios would paint a much more impactful message to those in danger.

"Not having to send it out to the entire county is a real benefit," Troyer said.

The radios will be a onetime cost from \$40-\$60 and should provide quality pro-

tection for anyone using it.

While purposefully designed for the Amish community, these radios will be available for anyone who desires the added protection should the area suffer electrical issues or if they are out in an area camping or hunting.

Troyer said the NWS has already notified him that there is a real possibility for grant funding for purchase of the radios, and he said he is excited about seeking that funding.

Holmes EMA will provide further details about the radio program as it becomes available.







WHHS Positive Digital Imprint Seminar designed to educate

Social media has opened up a whole new world to today's young people, and with that ability to share their lives with one another in new ways comes a host of new responsibilities and dangers.

Bullying, threatening and harassment have evolved from social media, along with the sharing of illicit photographs that have landed many teens in hot water.

As a way to promote smarter, more sensible social media responsibility to its students, West Holmes High School presented a Positive Digital Imprint Seminar with all of its students on Wednesday, Dec. 6.

"In an era where the digital landscape is an integral part of our lives, we must equip ourselves with the means to navigate this space responsibly and with kindness," West Holmes High School Principal Scott Pringle said to the students. "This event is helping us promote a safe and respectful environment within our school community."

The trio of speakers included Julie Dreher, magistrate in the Holmes County Juvenile Court; Matthew Muzik, Holmes County prosecutor; and Rachel Cornell, probation officer with the Holmes County Juvenile Court, and they touched on topics including bullying, harassment, disrespect and building a positive online presence. Helping students better understand the consequences of their actions was a top priority for the trio, who have plenty of experience dealing with teens who have come through the juvenile system from problems via social media.

The three presenters did loads of research and put

in many hours preparing to share the message they presented, and Muzik said they all believe this is such a critical topic that it was well to say

preparing the message.

them and provide a warning to what can happen when they make poor decisions," Muzik said. "We don't want to see people dealing with the consequences and hurting because of poor decisions they made. I hope this shows the people here at school and in our community how important this topic is."

Whether it is disseminating inappropriate photographs on Snapchat, bullying a schoolmate via social media outlets or any number of ways teens can find trouble through social media, the message was there are consequences to every action, and there are no excuses.

"It doesn't matter if everyone else is doing it," Muzik said. "It doesn't matter if the world tells you to do it or your boyfriend tells you he'll never share a picture with anyone else. It is illegal, and making the excuse 'I didn't know it was illegal' doesn't make it OK. Just don't do it, because whether you know it or not, these images and statements will last forever, and even on Snapchat, where you think the image is gone forever, law enforcement can retrieve it. This is their reputation at stake, and we

He said the court system continues to see these types of situations here in Holmes County, and the consequences can have ill effects for a lifetime.

Muzik said when issues

aware of, they need to share it with a trusted adult or teacher, and there are hotlines teens can call such as 988 or text the keyword "4hope" to 741 741.

While educating the students on the dangers and consequences of bad social media motives was paramount, the trio also discussed what good behavior on social media looks arise that teens become like, showcasing positive

posts from media stars and talking about building a positive personal online resume that would enhance their chances when seeking employment or trying to get into college.

"It's very important to share both sides of the coin to how we should and shouldn't behave on social media," Dreher said. "I think that positive behavior should be recognized and rewarded, and it's exciting to see that the school believes it is an important message. We are all saddened when we see kids coming into court who have made mistakes with charges related to these issues. We would much rather be proactive in teaching kids these important topics on how to do the right thing."

"We care about these kids," Muzik said. "They are part of our community, and we are all here together."

"This is about creating a safe and respectful online and school environment," Pringle said. "Both positive and negative things can take place on social media, and it plays a pivotal role for these young people. We as a school district are trying to create more conversations and partnerships to share this message."

Pringle said they are hoping for further student involvement in promoting positive messages like creating a leadership class designed to help teens promote positive messages within the schools.

The program served as a follow-up to the school's recent Digital Citizenship Week and Bully Prevention Month, and Pringle said helping students gain insight to help them wade through the many dangers and pitfalls of social media is something that is incredibly important in today's world.



Three honorees recognized for lifetime achievements

Three people who have left marks on the agriculture industry and Farm Bureau were honored by the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation. The 2023 Distinguished Service Award recipients are Bob Gibbs of Holmes County, Jerry Lahmers of Tuscarawas County and Virgil Strickler of Franklin County.

Honorees were recognized for lifetime achievements that benefited Ohio's farming community. The awards were presented Dec. 7 in Columbus at the 105th annual meeting of Ohio Farm Bureau.

Bob Gibbs

Bob Gibbs' career as a farmer, Farm Bureau leader and U.S. congressman has had an impact on agriculture in the state and throughout the country. During his career Gibbs has worked to address environmental, property rights and trade issues that impact production agriculture. He helped reform federal water resource policy, funded the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative and assisted small communities' access to affordable clean water utilities.

His career in public service representing Northeast Ohio included six years in the Ohio House of Representatives, two years in the Ohio Senate and 12 years in the U.S. House of Representatives.

The Gibbs family farm, Hidden Hollow Farms in Holmes County, led to his Farm Bureau involvement, where he served on

the state board of trustees from 1985-2001 and then as state president. He is the only former Farm Bureau president in the country to be elected to Congress.

Jerry Lahmers

Jerry Lahmers, a lifetime resident of Tuscarawas County, has had nearly 50 years of involvement with Farm Bureau and numerous other county and statewide boards and organizations.

He served at the county level as Tuscarawas County Farm Bureau president and public policy chairman and as a member of the membership committee. During Lahmers' county Farm Bureau involvement, the county launched several successful programs. He also served three terms as a trustee on the Ohio Farm Bureau Board of Trustees, representing the interests of members in Carroll, Harrison, Jefferson and Tuscarawas counties.

The Lahmers family raises cow-calf pairs, operates a feedlot, and raises grain, hay and pasture. Lahmers also was a food animal veterinarian for 29 years.

Virgil Strickler

A native of Fairfield County, Virgil Strickler began his professional career as an agricultural lender before becoming the livestock and agricultural director of the Ohio State Fair in 1993.

He took the role of Ohio State Fair general manager in 2003 and is retiring in February as the longest serving general manager ever at the Ohio State Fair.

One of his greatest accomplishments at the fair was establishing the Youth Reserve Program, which is funded directly from winning bids at the Sale of Champions that exceed the cap for each species. The funds are then distributed among scholarships, the Outstanding Exhibitor Programs, showmanship, skilla-thons, the state fair band and choir, 4-H, FFA, and other youth activities at the fair. Gov. Mike DeWine and the Ohio Expo Commission renamed the program for Strickler earlier this year.

Stickler has been inducted into the Ohio Fair Managers Association Hall of Fame and the Ohio Agricultural Hall of Fame, among many other industry honors.

Candidates for Distinguished Service Awards are nominated by Farm Bureau volunteers, county organizations and state leaders.



How the scam works

You order something online and pay for the product and shipping. However, before the item can be delivered, the vendor contacts you claiming you must pay an extra fee for "discreet shipping."

What is discreet shipping?

Well, it depends on the scam and the product purchased. BBB Scam Tracker has received multiple "discreet shipping" reports from consumers who purchased diet pills, vaping products, ammunition, CBD edibles or other similar products. Other times scammers charge a "discreet shipping" fee when a shopper marks their online purchase as a gift. In another twist scammers tell shoppers they must pay for "discreet package stamps" to prevent



their packages from passing through customs.

Scammers usually ask for payment through a digital payment app such as Zelle or CashApp. If you use an app to pay, it is unlikely you will be able to recover your funds if the business is a scam.

How to avoid shipping scams

Buy from reputable shops. If you purchase something online, research before giving the vendor your full trust. Ensuring a working phone number and address on a professionallooking website is a good place to start.

–Understand how different payment methods work. Each come with different rights and responsibilities. For example, you may be able to contest fraudulent charges on your credit card, but money sent through digital payment apps works more like cash. Once you have sent the funds, they are gone for good. Only use safe payment methods that come with protections when shopping online.

-Check the seller's reviews and ratings. These exist on various platforms, but authentic, verified reviews can be accessed from a company's BBB Profile. When reading reviews, look for positive or negative trends and note how the company responds.

Check for a secure website. Look for the "https://" URL structure in the company's web address and the padlock symbol in the address bar. These verify a secure connection and encryption of your data.

Toys

Every year there are always a few "must-have" toys on most kids' holiday wish lists. The hot toys sell out fast and become expensive and hard to find. In 2023 the hot toy lists from CNET and Today. com include Furby, Barbie Dreamhouse, Fingerlings, Bitzee, Lego, Elmo Slide, Dog-E, Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles: Mayhem Pizza Fire Delivery Van, Beast Lab and many others.

If you are shopping for a child this holiday season, do not let scammers trick you into accidentally buying a fake or nonexistent version of a popular toy. Watch out for these tricks.

How the scam works

You are looking for this season's hot toy, but it is sold out at every store you visit. You decide to do a quick online search or spot an ad in your social media feed. This takes you to a

Millersburg Council meets

During the Nov. 13 Millersburg Village Council meeting, the topic of the passage of legalization of recreational marijuana in Ohio and whether Millersburg could be a potential location for a dispensary was broached. The topic was revisited during the Nov. 27 council meeting.

Village solicitor Bob Hines said Ordinance 2017-102, passed Feb. 13, 2017,



prohibits medical marijuana cultivators, processors or retail dispensaries within Millersburg. He said the ordinance technically refers to only medical marijuana, so it does not prohibit recreational marijuana dispensaries. Hines said it would make the most sense to repeal that ordinance if at some point Millersburg wants to pursue having a dispensary.

Hines said the monetary benefit to municipalities with dispensaries is not yet known, as Ohio has not released how tax revenue will be distributed.

website that miraculously has the toy in stock. The site may look professional and have original images of the product. It may even offer the product at discounted prices, claiming a "lastminute deal" or "flash sale."

Unfortunately, many such offers are fake. In many cases reported to BBB Scam Tracker, buyers thought they were ordering a high-quality toy. Instead, they received a cheap counterfeit version. In other cases the products never shipped, and the websites vanished. In either case, when the dissatisfied customers tried to follow up with the company, they found the staff either did

provide a refund.

—Only buy toys from reputable stores and websites. The best way to avoid scams when purchasing toys is to buy them directly from a seller you know and trust. Avoid making a purchase from a retailer you are not familiar with.

-Do not be fooled by extra low prices. Unreasonably low prices are a red flag for a scam. If the price sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

-Research before you buy. If a company seems legitimate but you are not familiar with it, be extra careful with your personal information. Before providing your name, address and credit card information, not respond or refused to make sure the company has

a working customer service number.

New home owners can get a leg up on their finances

Owning a home for the first time is exciting.

It also can be a time of anxiety because everything is new, and one of the main pitfalls for many homeowners is dealing with finances and money situations that arise when owning a home.

Steps to Home Ownership classes are designed to educate new homeowners in the financial aspect of their new venture.

Melinda Hill, area leader and educator of family and consumer sciences for Ohio State Extension Wayne County, has been instrumental in providing classes that help new homeowners gain understanding into the requirements and responsibilities of owning a new home.

The Steps to Home Ownership class takes place in Wayne County and is open to anyone who would like to gain firsthand knowl-

edge about the financial responsibilities that come with owning a new home.

"The idea is to give people an idea as to what home ownership roles and responsibilities are," Hill said. "We do a lot on budget, setting goals, credit and all of the financial responsibilities that come with owning a home for the first time. How are you going to make your money work for you and how will you budget and set financial goals? If you don't prepare and set goals, money slips through your fingers, and at the end of the month or year, families wonder where their money went."

The class has been going on for many years, and Hill has helped many families get a grasp on financial issues those who have never owned a home will face as they move into a new facet of life.

Hill said the class is a collaboration of professionals who provide insight to

financial literacy including Emily Marrison from Coshocton County Extension, who is an HUD-certified counselor. In addition, they bring in realtors,

home inspectors, a financial lender and more to help paint an overall picture of the financial landscape of owning a home.

"What are lenders look-

ing for when applying for a loan? What kind of a credit score is required? What are lenders looking for and what are some of the monthly and yearly finances new homeowners will face? These are some of the questions we discuss," Hill said. "I love this class. It's one of my favorite parts of my job."

While the program is open to anyone, one area where the class has invested heavily is working with Habitat for Humanity homeowners. While working mainly in Wayne County, the class does extend into Holmes County, where recently Mike and Jen Whitman went through the class.

"I thought in the first hour of the class I had learned more than I ever expected to learn," Jen Whitman said. "It was really great and very valuable, and I'd encourage anyone hoping to own a home for the first time to get in contact and take the class. It's extremely valuable."

In working with Habitat for Humanity, the Steps to Home Ownership class has become an integral part of the home-building process, one that can't be overlooked and is every bit as important as the building process itself. Hill said the home is only built once, but the financial burdens are an ongoing part of life for every new homeowner.

"This is a very good program, and it is a requirement for all of our Habitat owners to go through the process," said Mary Neutzling, Holmes County Habitat for Humanity executive director. "Learning to better understand the everyday expenses and the many financial obligations involved with owning a home is as important as the actual building of the home because those are responsibilities that will be ongoing that many new homeowners don't have a good grasp on."

Hill said anyone wishing to learn more is invited to attend the class, noting learning about the financial part of becoming a homeowner never ends. Steps to Home Ownership classes are a series of four classes that take place twice a year from 5:30-8 p.m.

Master planning for the Wayne Co. Airport begins

Having a well-defined master plan is crucial to ensure the effective management and development of the Wayne County Airport. The master plan will outline a phased development program that meets the airport's growth and operational needs in a safe, efficient, economical and environmentally sound manner.

Community engagement is essential, and the county has contracted with the Cleveland office of CHA Consulting to determine the airport's path forward. The firm recently held a public forum to gather the aviation community's and interested stakeholders' opinions.

"Based on aviation forecasts, we will look at demand capacity to determine the needs of the airport," said Mark Heckroth, senior project manager for CHA Consulting. "Then we will look at correcting nonstandard issues that the FAA (Federal Aviation Administration) might have. Hangar development has also received a lot of interest and will be a focus of the master plan."

The Wayne County Airport plays a pivotal role in connecting communities, driving economic growth and fostering area development. This local transportation hub, located at 6020 N. Honeytown Rd. in Smithville, provides:

- —An outlet for business travel.
- —Flight instruction opportunities.
- —Opportunities for leisure excursions.
- —A base for medical transport services.
- —Flight-related programs throughout the year, like visits with Tuskegee Airmen

and rides aboard a historic Ford TriMotor.

Having an airport enhances Wayne County's reputation, encourages tourism and boosts local industry. Additionally, visitors who arrive via the county airport often contribute to local businesses' growth and help generate community revenue.

According to Heckroth, the company has completed aerial photogrammetry and mapping of the airport and will soon begin analyzing data about the 41-hangar facility.

Airport manager Matt Long sees a growth opportunity in cargo transport for the 2020 Airport of the Year. The rise of e-commerce and the increasing demand for fast and efficient delivery have played a significant role in shaping the future of this sector.

"Numerous businesses frequently utilize the airport," Long said. "It is very popular in that area. We have people continually asking us about cargo operations, but we don't have the capability to do that right now. It is a possibility for us. We are also getting an increased amount of charter plane usage."

Long said the airport is also home to Metro Life Flight, a 24-hour, seven-dayper-week helicopter transport service.

"If we didn't have them here, it would certainly take longer for them to get to us," he said.

Blessed Through Sharing

A message of thanks for those who volunteer for Share-A-Christmas

Dec. 5, 6:25 p.m.

The Baker Building at Harvest Ridge is filled with volunteers placing items into boxes. The floor is covered with box after box of carefully placed gifts designed to go to the homes of local families who will be the recipients of the goodwill of the community through Holmes County Share-A-Christmas with D-Day — Delivery Day — set for Saturday morning, Dec. 9.

Dec. 5, 6:43 p.m.

Share-A-Christmas Director Bob Porter halts all progress for the evening as the volunteers prepare to shift to placing the multitude of toys into each family's designated square.

Porter and several other key members of the SAC organization carefully and thoughtfully describe exactly why these volunteers are here doing a good deed.

Porter talks about the inception of SAC and each step of the process, helping all of the volunteers gain a deeper insight into a time of giving that goes far beyond simply placing gifts into boxes.

For Porter, sharing the message of hope and love exhibited through this annual season of giving is an important step in making sure the message of SAC isn't lost.

"A lot of people volunteer to come in here and help, but they may not realize the entire story of why they are here and how we got to this point," Porter said. "Many of our volunteers don't fully understand all of the different stages and the hard work that goes into getting us to the point where our community volunteers can come in and help on this night. It's important for everyone to under-

stand the significance of what we're doing, and it is an overwhelming thing to undertake, but because we have so many incredible volunteers from start to finish, we are able to pull off something that we don't want to do, but we have to do. We'd rather every family didn't have any needs, but that isn't reality."

While the parents receive food and sundry products that would normally cost a fair amount of money to purchase, perhaps the ones who are most touched are the children who are presented with loads of presents, from toys to clothes, including a toy or two that is specifically on their wish list.

In the storage room at the back of the Baker Building is a mountain of toys, thousands of them, a good percentage of them toys that were special requests from each participating child.

Nikki Roach has helmed the Giving Tree project for SAC for 16 years. She has seen firsthand the joy that emanates from these children, some of whom might not get much for Christmas otherwise.

Roach spearheads the important task of setting up giving trees at Jitter's Café, German Village and Pomerene Hospital. Those trees are decorated with each child's personal wish list.

She has seen the impact these very special gifts can make on children.

"When you see a child's face light up, that's what makes it worth it all," Roach said.

Years ago when SAC head-

quarters was at the old fairgrounds, room was limited and the chance of flooding forced a unique spin on storing the gifts.

"There was no room and heat there, and I'd get all of these gifts back, so I ended up storing them in my basement," Roach said. "That was presents for 400 kids 9 and under, which is around how many we have now."

Whether it is a foster family with four kids, single parent with two children under 6 or a family with nine children, the presents just keep coming, thanks to donors hoping to make an impact on a child's life at Christmas.

Individuals pick a child or two from one of the trees. Businesses like Crow Works and church groups like that from Holmesville Church of Christ pick up many of the tags and buy presents.

In addition, Joel and Kristen Yoder, owners of Village Toy Shop in Millersburg, purchase additional gifts, so kids may end up with a multitude of gifts on SAC Delivery Day.

Oftentimes, there are enough toys that Roach can connect with area schools to present gifts to children teachers think would cherish a gift because they are facing a hardship.

How many toys come into the SAC program each year? Roach said it is thousands of gifts, and the community never bats an eye at delivering on the message of giving started more than three decades ago.

"It's a heartwarming thing to see this happen year after year, and it exemplifies the giving nature of our community here in Holmes

County," Roach said. "And this is only one part of a massive operation that includes so many wonderful people giving their time and money to make sure families are blessed each Christmas."

Porter said from the moment Share-A-Christmas begins, which he said only half-jokingly is the day after Delivery Day, to the day of delivery when volunteers load packages upon packages into vehicles from the Baker Building and then take a quick detour

to pick up the perishable goods at Holmes Fire District #1 before they go pick up a family's spirits, SAC has been an endearing organization that not only provides for families and especially kids, but also brings the community closer together through volunteerism.

"This entire undertaking is a tribute to the compassion of this community and the care we have for one another," Porter said. "It truly is a project that comes from the heart of the entire community, and I don't know of another like it that is this effective. I really think those who volunteer receive every bit as much of a blessing as those who receive the gifts. That is the message I hope to share with our volunteers."



Wayne County BOE completes recounts, post-election audit

The Wayne County Board of Elections announced the successful completion of four recounts and an audit of votes cast in the Nov. 7 general election.

The recounts, which took place Dec. 4-6, were held for races where the certified results were within a 0.5% margin.

The Dalton mayoral race remained tied after a hand count of every vote cast in the contest — affirming the declared winner as Blake Nussbaum as determined by lot at the board's Nov. 27 certification meeting.

Other recounts confirmed results in the City of Wooster Council At Large and for the second position in the Triway Local Schools Board of Education member race. In the City of Wooster Ward 1 contest, the results were amended to add one vote for Michael Todaro for a mis-scanned paper ballot. The amended

results did confirm that Lukas Gaffey was the successful candidate.

"The recounts, especially for the mayor of Dalton contest, confirm that every vote really does count," said Julie Leathers-Stahl, director of the Wayne County Board of Elections.

The audit, which took place Dec. 11, was reported to the Ohio Secretary of State

with 100% accuracy. The post-election audit was conducted by completing a hand count of 5% of the ballots cast in the general election for State Issue 1, State Issue 2 and the Wayne County Care Center tax levy, selected through a random draw at a public meeting. The hand count confirmed the official results as certified by the board of elections on Nov. 27.

"Post-election audits are important," Stahl said. "Verifying a random sample of ballots confirms the accuracy of certified election results and provides assurance to Wayne County voters that their elections are accurate and honest."

Eggnog is a rich and delicious beverage that has become synonymous with the most festive time of year. This milk- and eggbased concoction is tasty on its own, or it can be dressed up with other flavors and spiked with a favorite spirit when celebrating the holiday season with other adult partygoers.

December is National Eggnog Month, and Dec. 24 is National Eggnog Day. There is no more perfect time of year to learn everything you can about eggnog—all the while sipping a cup of this creamy concoction. Indulge in these festive facts about the beverage:

—Eggnog likely originated in the medieval period and was known as "posset," a hot, milk-based drink made of spices and wine. Even though posset could be a cocktail, it also was used as a remedy for colds and flu for its soothing properties.

—Milk, eggs and sherry

used in the early recipes were difficult to come by, so when eggnog first appeared it was a drink only the wealthy could enjoy. That changed when eggnog was popularized in the American colonies, where dairy products and liquor were more readily available.

—Entymologists believe "eggnog" stems from the word "noggin," which refers to small wooden mugs often used to serve strong ale, known by the slang word "nog."

—In the Medieval period, it was risky to drink milk straight because it wasn't pasteurized. Eggnog contained alcohol so that it would kill off any harmful bacteria in the milk.

—A typical homemade version of eggnog has roughly one egg per serving. However, commercial eggnog is regulated by the FDA and can only contain 1 percent of the product's final weight in egg yolk solids. That stems from fear of raw egg and salmonella.

—President George Washington apparently enjoyed serving eggnog at Christmas, and even had his own special recipe (see below), according to the Old Farmer's Almanac.

—There is no right or wrong alcohol to use when preparing eggnog. Distilled spirits like rum, sherry, cognac, and whiskey all have produced suitable eggnogs.

—Puerto Rican coquito is a traditional drink that is very similar to eggnog.

The United Kingdombased Perrywood floral company advises placing poinsettia plants near a bright windowsill but not in direct sunlight. Do not let a poinsettia touch cold window panes.

Avoid drafts

The plants are sensitive to drafts and changes in temperature. So it's best to keep poinsettias away from drafty doors, windows, radiators, or fireplaces.

Don't drown the roots

Wait until the surface of the compost dries out before watering the plant anew. Also, the decorative foil wrapper that covers pots can trap water and lead to root rot. Remove it or poke holes in the bottom to allow for drainage.

Cut back plants

Come mid-March, cut bloom again.

are they doing," Schlabach said. "Seger definitely pulled one over on me."

As Schlabach stood among his current players, he watched as one by one former players from both Hiland and Loudonville walked out on the floor to hug and congratulate the man all of them still refer to as Coach.

Bonifant actually had the Loudonville players and others hang out in the concession area before entering as to not give the head coach any possible warning of the surprise that was to come.

Bonifant said the idea started a year ago when he received an article from East Holmes Schools Superintendent Erik Beun that highlighted something Green High School had done. He began texting some people including Schlabach's former Redbirds player and Hiland assistant coach C.J. Spreng, who wrangled up all of the Loudonville players.

The two weeks prior to the event, he began contacting individual Hiland players with a simple message.

"I told each one of them, 'Here's what we're doing and don't tell a soul,'" Bonifant said. "And especially don't tell anyone who would tell Coach about it. I tried hard to keep it a secret, which isn't easy around here."

Bonifant, who starred on the 2011 and 2012 Hiland state championship teams, was so secretive he didn't even say anything to Schlabach's wife Amy until 4 p.m. on game night when he told her not to be late.

Bonifant had the game ball from the regional championship game and had it painted up for the special occasion. That ball was presented to Schlabach after he had greeted each of the nearly 50 players. Schlabach then posed in a group photo, which was filled with genuine smiles.

"It couldn't have turned out better," Bonifant said. "I think all of us being here shows people what Coach means to us. We've got great lives with families, and it's awesome to allow Coach to see that he was part of building something special in all of our lives."



Those are just a few of the reasons why this grotesque song will never escape my lips.





There are so many different types of poinsettias out there that can fit most décors. Have you ever wondered what it takes to get your poinsettia or euphorbia pulcherrima to come into bloom? Without these beautiful leaves, one would not have much of anything.

My folks raised these plants for a very long time. I remember the 24-foot-tall pyramid of red poinsettias we made for a winter program one year. Let me know if you remember the event.

There is magic to these plants on several levels. When you look at a poinsettia, the bloom is a leaf, not a petal.

The flowers on this plant are tiny yellow structures at the end of the stems. Would you have guessed the tiny yellow structure was the flower?

Poinsettias are a North American native. Joel Poinsett, the former ambassador to Mexico during the John Quincy Adams



administration, brought the poinsettia to the United States as cuttings to his greenhouse in South Carolina in the 1820s.

A friend of Poinsett. John Bartram, took this new plant and raised it in 1828. In June of the following year, Bartram exhibited this new euphorbia at the Philadelphia Flower Show, the first exhibition put on by the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society.

Since then we have adopted this plant as the best-known Christmas flower in the United States that growers have had a chance to modify and improve for color. The poinsettia also is the best-selling potted plant each year. Seventy million pots of poinsetsold during the six weeks before Christmas.

Knowing poinsettias are from Mexico will help us get these leaves to bloom again. You are going to need 12 hours of darkness starting Oct. 1. We need to keep this date in mind next year to get your poinsettia to come back into bloom. This will fool this photoperiodic-sensitive plant into thinking your plant is back in Mexico and will start preparing to come into bloom.

When I took the greenhouse management class at Ohio State University Agriculture and Technical Institute, Dr. McMahon taught us about the consequences of photoperiodism in the form of DIF, a simple term but complex in imple-

On a commercial basis, you have to be able to roll out a dark cover over the beds where you are growing the poinsettias and do

tia come into bloom and are all of this with a specific time in mind. In three weeks you will see color developing in the leaves. Those of us trying to do this at home must have a spot in their closets to get them to turn colors.

> Don't leave your poinsettia in drafts. Remember to water your poinsettia after you have taken it out of its sleeve and put it where you can allow the water to drain. Take normal care of your plant. Like my folks, you may be able to have your poinsettia for years.

> This Christmas season has been unusual in that I have felt extra cold and now maybe a green Christmas. One thing that does warm me up is I know tropical plants like the poinsettia can give me warm thoughts.



Hopefully, Flacco can 'manage' to carry the Browns to the playoffs

A few thoughts from the week in sports ...

Joe Flacco is making NFL front office executives and fans rethink what they thought they knew about having a successful offense in 2023.

Turns out all the Cleveland Browns needed to breathe new hope into an injury-riddled season was for a 38-year-old, pocket-passing father of five to get up off his couch and rejoin the NFL.

Flacco was unemployed all season until out of desperation the Browns signed him to their practice squad on Nov. 20.

And now he's passed for 565 yards and five touchdowns in two starts for Cleveland, which is 8-5 and has an 80% probability of qualifying for the playoffs. After a strong effort in a 29-19 loss at Denver, Flacco passed for 311 yards and three TDs in a thrilling 31-27 win over the playoffbound Jaguars.

Flacco played in the final game of the 2022 season for



the Jets but remained unsigned until the Browns called.

"I feel like a 10-year-old kid," Flacco told teammates in the locker room while holding the game ball tightly after beating the Jaguars (8-5).

Coming into the season, it seemed all NFL fans could talk about was the importance of having an athletic quarterback who could pass, scramble, run and make highlight-reel plays guys like Patrick Mahomes, Jalen Hurts, Lamar Jackson, Josh Allen and, yeah, the Browns highly controversial Deshaun Watson.

But players like the 49ers' Brock Purdy, the Broncos' Russell Wilson and last week Flacco have shown a quarterback who can manage a game intelligently from the defense and special teams, also can be a winner.

Look through the list of Super Bowl winning quarterbacks — even most recent ones — and you'll see a lot more pocket passers than "hero ball" scramblers.

Media members and fans alike were saying for two years that Deshaun Watson was "just rusty" and "needs time to figure it out" before he was lost for the season with an injury. Watson only looked comfortable in a couple games, and all of his running got him injured.

Flacco sat out the entire season, left his home workout room and, for the most part, made the game look easy the last two weeks.

The signature play so far was a 41-yard touchdown pass to David Bell on fourth-and-3 at the Jacksonville 41 with the Browns hanging onto a 21-14 lead with 12:42 left to play.

Flacco read the blitz perfectly and found a wide-open

pocket, coupled with good Bell, who broke free up the middle for the score.

> Browns coach Kevin Stefanski is 41, only three years older than Flacco, and looks like the slightly older brother. All-Pro defensive end Myles Garrett joked that they both have some grey in their beards.

> "That was outstanding, an unbelievable play by the quarterback," Stefanski told reporters when asked about the Flacco-to-Bell scoring play. "He's not hot; he's hotter than Hades on that play. We did not have that blitz picked up.'

> Cleveland has seemingly had a curse over its football team since returning to the NFL in 1999.

> Flacco is the 37th different quarterback since the return to start for the franchise. The list of names on that infamous "ouch" football jersey, with the C crossed out in Couch, is the most in the NFL since 1999.

Flacco is the fourth different starter for the Browns this season. If you count Joshua Dobbs, who the Browns traded to the Cardinals in the preseason and is now on the Vikings, Flacco is their fifth option at quarterback this season.

The Browns will enter their game against the Bears on Sunday with a really good shot to make the playoffs.

After taking on Justin Fields and the Bears, they'll tangle with another Ohio State alum in CJ Stroud and the Houston Texans on Dec. 24.

The New York Jets will visit Cleveland on Dec. 28 — it will be interesting to see if Aaron Rodgers is back — and then the Browns close the regular season at Cincinnati on Jan. 7.

Flacco doesn't have anywhere near the athletic ability of the younger quarterbacks in the league, but he clearly has the experience, smarts and arm strength to win some more games in the NFL.

Art Modell moved Cleveland's football team to Baltimore for the 1996 season and formed the Ravens. It's been pretty much all downhill for the Browns since returning to Cleveland as a new team in 1999.

It would be straight out of a Disney script if a supposedly over-the-hill former Ravens'

reverse the curse of Modell.

That's probably dreaming, and the Browns are dealing with injuries at many other positions, but at least "Joe Cool" gives us Browns fans a good guy to root for and a lot more optimism than we had a few weeks ago.

Big rule change for prep basketball

There are no more "oneand-one" free throws in high school or middle school basketball any more.

This is a pretty big change for how games are played, especially in the fourth quarter of tight contests.

The National Federation of State High School Associations changed the rules for free throws and fouls prior to this 2023-24 season.

Teams now shoot two free throws for common fouls when in the "bonus," where they would have shot one-andones in previous years.

The rule for when the bonus is awarded also has been changed. Previously, teams would be awarded a one-andone free throw when their opponent committed seven fouls in a half. Now the bonus will be in effect for five fouls in a quarter, and the fouls will reset at the end of each quarter.

"The rules committee studied data that showed higher injury rates on rebounding

Super Bowl MVP could situations and saw this as an opportunity to reduce opportunities for rough play during rebounds," Lindsey Atkinson of the NFHS said.

I talked to several area coaches, and none could ever recall seeing an injury on a "rebounding" situation during a foul shot. They're still trying to figure out how to deal with one of the biggest rule changes in several decades.

"I fortunately have not witnessed one of my players or an opponent's player get injured on a free throw box out before," Triway coach Ben Holt said. "With that being said, I always liked the one-and-one free throw because close games down the stretch should be about teams executing in order to win, and part of that is making pressure free throws. Some of that pressure is now gone due to having two shots.

"With the fouls resetting each quarter, there definitely is a strategy about fouling toward the end of a quarter to not let a team get a shot off, assuming you have fouls to give."

It will be harder to make big fourth-quarter comebacks after teams miss the front end of one-and-ones.

"The pressure of making the first of a one-andone is greatly reduced," Holt said. "With that being said, players still need to make plays to win, and part of that is making free throws."

So I was listening to the radio the other day, hardly paying attention, when a voice cut through the haze and asked me, "Can you afford to retire with only half a million dollars in savings?"

The key word being 'only."

George hates the house his family lives in, calls it an old, drafty barn, and even goes so far as to demand from his wife an answer to a question nearly every spouse has asked of the other at some point.

"Why do we have so many children, anyway?"

It's right up there with, "Are there no prisons? Are there no workhouses?" from the Dickens' classic, "A Christmas Carol."

This is the time of year that can cut to the bone, leaving scars, a reminder that — to quote Ebenezer Scrooge again — we're a year older and not a penny

richer, an annual illustration of abject failure.

Charlie Brown says it well when, upon seeing a mailbox devoid of Christmas cards, he bemoans the fact that he knows no one likes him, so having a holiday to emphasize that fact seems rather cruel. It's a wise, if hurtful, observation, one that has rung true ever since I saw the TV premiere of the cartoon, way back in winter 1964.

Two years later "How the Grinch Stole Christmas" debuted, introducing children to another animated outcast, one whose raison d'etre was to make those fun-loving denizens of Whoville suffer.

After pilfering all he believes makes the Whos happy, he pauses at the top of Mount Crumpit to savor their cries of misery.

But he discovers to his chagrin, "This sound wasn't sad ... this sound sounded glad." Thus chastened, he returns everything to Whoville where "He himself, the Grinch, carved the roast beast."

And ... roll credits.

I recently opened a meeting of our Extension Family and Consumer Sciences Advisory Committee by asking members to name their favorite holiday traditions, and I was fascinated to hear their responses.

One woman said she and her husband look forward to a night when they let their children stay up late and drive them around town in the family van looking at the Christmas lights dressed in pajamas and munching on favorite snacks.

Another family breaks bread together during a formal Christmas Eve dinner, and if they can't all be together in one place, they do it over Zoom.

One member talked about her family annually watching "A Christmas Story," and another mentioned that when her children were young, they colored pictures of Santa, so they still do it every year at Christmas — even

Also mentioned was an annual Christmas Day brunch with egg casserole and monkey bread.

Most of us, I'm sure, have a favorite tradition. The committee members were quick to respond, so I could tell how much their specially planned activities meant to them.

Alisa Grace, co-director of the Biola University Center for Marriage and Relationships, shared that traditions have important benefits for families.

"Research shows families that celebrate repeated traditions report stronger emotional connections and unity than families that don't," Grace said. "They also build intergenerational connections with extended family."

Traditions also ensure that people take time for emotional connection amid the busyness of holiday planning and programs. It's all too easy for holidays to slip by without really being "present" with your loved ones, she said. Additionally, as your children grow older, having lasting traditions is influential in maintaining emotional connections and closeness.

Here are other ways she said traditions benefit families:

-Traditions give children a sense of identity. Whether your traditions reinforce your family, your faith or even your culture, they help establish a sense of "This is us. This is what we do. This is who we are," Grace said.

-Traditions create lasting memories for children. Ellen Gralinsky, co-founder of the Families and Work Insti-

tute, described a survey in which she asked children what they would remember most about their childhood. Most of the children responded by talking about simple, everyday traditions like family dinners, holiday get-togethers and bedtime stories. "Traditions help create the warm, nostalgic

feelings we get when we think back to our childhood," Grace said.

-Traditions provide kids with security. The familiarity of regular rituals and traditions can provide children with

family's values. Try to personalize your traditions to your specific family members in creative ways. A great way to do this is by letting your children help determine what you do and how you do

comfort during turmoil. it. Ask them, "What do you remember most about last Christmas?" (or your holiday celebration).

When choosing to start traditions, make sure to keep them simple.

Find meaningful ways to make memories together as a family without added stress or planning that leaves you exhausted.

My favorite tradition is attending my church's Christmas Eve Service, which ends with the lighting of candles in the dark sanctuary with the congregation singing "Silent Night." My parents took my brother and me to Christmas Eve services as a child, so not only is it meaningful, but it's also nostalgic. I've done the same with my children. This is us.

The past several years, I've moved through my home silently, talking to her, letting her know we were readying to leave her. It sounds silly, sentimental even, but the happiness of those I love the most



are more important than anything I could feel for a small-framed home in the country, despite all the love we felt here.

So with bated breath and excitement coursing through us, we're moving! We've sold our home here in Holmes County to good folks and purchased a newto-us home (built in 1921) in a nearby city we love. She's solid and sturdy with all the curves I need in a house: good woodwork, a long-anticipated fireplace and a deep porch for sitting. She's not home yet, but she will be.

I've been taking down pictures off my walls and sorting through the paraphernalia that comes with longtime residency. I've been wrapping and toss-

ing and boxing and crying. They're cleansing tears, ones that let you know you're still alive, ones that let you know you are not dormant and are actively working to make decisions that will make your life better. After George experienced his heart attack, living to see many more days, we knew it was time to downsize and make life simpler. Our hours are not guaranteed, and we wanted to do this now while we could still do it together.

Right now our home is overflowing with the untidy boxes of life, the mementos we keep and hoard, so we don't forget. Much of it can be tossed, and I'm fervently working to be militant in what I take and what I give away. I have an entire section of the upstairs devoted to what my kids can go through and take when they arrive home for Christmas, the last one we will spend together in this home that raised them, heard their secrets, absorbed their tears. I've been sorting through boxes I brought home after Mom died, deciding that maybe the kids would want a few more pieces of her. I don't need them all.

I will continue to write this column because it brings me happiness. I love sharing about my life with chosen words and thoughts. And for the many of you that stop me in the store just to tell me you read my column every week, I'm continuing because of you. Knowing you're out there reading what I have to say, opening the pages of this newspaper every week, well, that keeps me going.

Maybe I won't run into you as often at the local markets and thrift stores or hear those beeps when many of you drive by our house, but I'll be back. I can't live without a Der Bake Oven cream stick for very long, nor our very well-stocked thrift stores, which are the best any-

where. Holmes County will always be home, and most of my family still lives here, especially my grandkids. But we won't be far away, just far enough for a new start — hopefully more frequent trips to Mexico to help his parents as they age and weather life's tribulations. There's so much more to do, and leaving this home of ours behind and heading to the next phase — is an important next step. We had reached the end of our time here, and we knew this.

I've been listening intently to this old home of ours, whispering softly to her as I work, each corner known to me like the creases in the corner of George's eyes. I remember the way my mom would go to Berlin after they sold their home just to drive slowly by and look at the old house. I believe her heart broke every time she did. I will know the feeling now, Mom, and I also know

why you had to sell and move on.

You couldn't take all the beautiful gardens you poured your entire soul into, the home you loved so much, but you did pass starts of those gardens on to me and so many others. I have now taken a start of each one of them, and as I type this, they are planted securely in pots and tucked into my car, ready to travel to new soil. We may leave beloved places behind, their echoes ringing in our ears far longer than they should, but we take a small part of them with us wherever we go.
