



Shoemaker Custom Apparel making an impact

The Holmes County Chamber of Commerce and Tourism Bureau's annual awards were handed out at the end of the year, and as always, the decision to narrow it down to one business was difficult for the selection committee.

This year's Small Business of the Year went to Shoemaker Custom Apparel in Berlin.

Presenter Vic Weaver of Killbuck Savings Bank said this venture was an opportunity for owner Tyler Shoemaker to find a balance between career and community.

With the support of his wife Tabitha, who also serves an important role in the community as a teacher at Killbuck Elementary, Shoemaker grew the business into a thriving enterprise that has served the region faithfully and supported many fundraising efforts.

Weaver said the business has prospered to the point that it has outgrown two locations before settling in at its current location on state Route 62 in Berlin.

"Their vision was to build a better business that

positively impacts their customers, employees and local economy," Weaver said. "That is evident in their day-to-day operation, where customer service and creating a positive working environment are key."

He said the growth of the company has been explosive, with a 300% growth in its first year. That has led to additional expansion and output while reducing lead time and increasing efficiency.

Weaver also said the Shoemakers have thrown themselves into supporting local schools and other nonprofit organizations through their work, where they have fostered successful fundraising.

Weaver said their nominator said of the Shoemakers, "They are longtime supporters of youth pursuing higher education, by investing in the mission of the Holmes County Education and Community Foundation."

Tyler Shoemaker said his first passion was for accounting, where he planned to make his mark.

"I was always going to go into accounting, and this was a side project," Shoemaker said. "It has slowly grown from where we started, and I've transitioned to this."

The Shoemakers purchased the business Berlin

Embroidery & Screen Printing in 2012. They saw the company as a good opportunity to invest in the community and have been growing the business ever since.

"I think for this area, customer service is an overall theme, and when people walk into the door here, they know we are going to take care of them," Shoemaker said. "We don't always get everything right, but when we do make mistakes, we always fix it, and that's part of what keeps people coming back."

He said they put an emphasis on supporting local businesses, schools and organizations and noted doing things the right way is critical because they live, work and play among the people who keep coming through their doors to support them.

"I want to be proud of the products and the business we are providing," Shoemaker said. "It's about providing something the community needs, and we want to do that really well well enough that people will come back again and again."

In accepting the award, Shoemaker said the family was honored and humbled, and they appreciate the community in which they live and work for being a terrific place to raise a family.

"First, I thank my wife for supporting my dream to own a business," Shoemaker said. "She is always there to listen or offer encouragement, and there is no way I could do this without her."


When they purchased the business, there were three employees, and they were printing everything manually, doing around 100 pieces per hour. Today they have seven employees and have the capability of printing up to 900 T-shirts per hour on an automated press. In addition, they have grown the company to nearly five times its size when they purchased it.

He thanked the many people and area businesses and organizations that have put trust in them to provide an important service.

Holmes commissioners discuss new windows and more

The Holmes County commissioners had a busy morning during their weekly meeting on Monday, Jan. 29 at the Old Jail in Millersburg.

The commissioners passed a resolution authorizing the addition of Hannah Forster as a new member of the Holmes County Local Emergency Planning Commission.

According to Jason Troyer, Holmes County Emergency Management Agency director and member of the Holmes LEPC, Forster, the chief compliance officer for Pomerene Hospital, will assume a role formerly held by former LEPC representative Don Jones, who has retired.

Troyer said once the committee receives the blessing of the commissioners, the proposal to add Forster to the committee will move to the state LEPC,

which will approve her to assume that role.

Troyer said the LEPC will conduct a full-scale hazmat exercise on May 11, with the activity taking place at Harvest Ridge Fairgrounds. The exercise will include Holmes Fire District #1, Western Holmes Fire District, and the hazmat team from East Holmes Fire and EMS

In addition, part of the activity will be to transport two injured to Pomerene Hospital, which will implement its hazmat response team. Other participants will include the Millersburg Police Department and Holmes County Sheriff's Office.

"The purpose is to evaluate the EMS process en route, and the other is to evaluate Pomerene's response to that hazmat situation," Troyer said.

In other county news, Susan Schie, Holmes County commissioner clerk, has

developed, written and submitted a grant to Ohio State Rep. Darrell Kick and Ohio Sen. Andrew Brenner requesting funds that would help pay off new windows and doors for the preservation of the historic Old Jail commissioner building in Historic Downtown Millersburg.

"This old building gets

pretty drafty and cold," Schie said. "It's something that is very much needed."

The grant was for \$100,000 with a 25% matching grant coming from the county.

Schie said the grant request would be known sometime in April.

Kick was on hand at the recent meeting to discuss several items, among them the grant request.

Aside from discussing the grant, Kick said Columbus lawmakers are currently not meeting, with many of his compatriots campaigning for reelection at this

Kick himself has termed out and can't run for reelec-

"We will be back in session in early February," Kick said. "We did do an override of the governor's veto of Ohio House Bill 68, which was a transgender, child protection and parents bill, along with saving women's sports."

Both the Ohio House and Senate had previously passed the bill, which Gov. Mike DeWine vetoed.

the bill was centered on the passing of an override for sales of flavored tobacco products.

"A lot of the smaller mom and pop shops across the state were complaining that you could be in a certain municipality and they were passing laws stating you couldn't sell it," Kick said. "Even though there is a law against selling it to minors, they were saying you can't sell it at all. We thought that was wrong."

He said the state is currently looking at creating legislation beefing up the enforcement and ensuing penalties of selling tobacco products to minors.

Another area of discussion was the county's acceptance of a new proposal in the county's personnel policy that will allow county employees to take vacation time in 15-minute increments.

According to Misty He said another part of Burns, Holmes County director of human resources, the objective is to allow county employees to feel more comfortable in taking

minimal time off for a variety of reasons without being penalized.

'If an individual needs to leave 15 minutes early for let's say a doctor's appointment and they want to be paid for their entire time, they can request 15 minutes of their vacation time," Burns said. "It still has to be agreed upon by their elected official or their department head."

Burns said this recommendation came courtesy of Holmes County auditor Jackie McKey.

Burns said the last time the county updated the CORSA personnel manual was in 2019, and several other general updates also were adopted that were minor to the manual. The policy updates were approved by Holmes County prosecutor Matt Muzik prior to the adoption from the commissioners.

Resolution #01-29-24-4 authorized continued funding for OneEighty with domestic violence funds pursuant to the Ohio Revised Code.

OneEighty, a domestic violence shelter in Holmes and Wayne counties,

sioners agreed.

According to the resolution, domestic violence funds will be obtained from a surcharge on marriage license fees from the Holmes County Probate Court and a surcharge on each divorce, dissolution and annulment in the county that is filed with the clerk of courts.

PRODUCING PRODUCE

Adonai Acres keeps area residents supplied with farm fresh produce and more

Northeast Ohio is home to many small farms supplying the area with a diverse assortment of produce, meats, dairy products, and items such as jams, jellies, syrups, nuts and more.

For those who attend area downtown farmers markets, many of these farmers have become familiar faces and friends. Mary and Joe Gnizak of Adonai Acres are among the market regulars who keep area residents supplied with farm fresh produce and more.

Mary Gnizak is the farmer of the couple's 18-acre farm in Holmes County.

"Joe is my main builder and handyman," she said. "I do the bulk of the growing and harvesting. He does the building and fixing. He is my biggest blessing, all-around good guy hero."

The Gnizaks journey toward creating Adonai Acres began 39 years ago when they purchased the farmland. "We basically started out as homesteaders raising our own meat, eggs and food," Mary Gnizak said.

The garden kept expanding, and Gnizak began to freeze or give away the excess. Without computers or social media, it was a challenge to find a farmers market. When she finally located one in Millersburg in 1994, it cost \$3 to get in. "I wasn't sure we could afford that," she said.

Finally, she did attend the market, bringing produce and her four children who ranged in age from 3-8. "From there I was hooked," she said. That first year brought in \$500.

Along with tending the animals and gardens, Gnizak home educated their children. What started as a homestead slowly became her full-time job.

The Gnizaks now grow primarily produce — specializing in greens and garlics. Mary Gnizak has always grown organically, though the farm is not certified organic. The largest growing areas are under cover, using raised beds in tunnels.

"I like the variety of growing different produce, herbs and fruits my family uses and introducing people to produce they may not have ever tried or known about," Gnizak said. "The greens are lovely since there are so many varieties and ways to use them. They are also so healthy for you. The garlics roped me in with their variety of flavor choices. I love trying new and unusual things.'

Adonai Acres sells at the Downtown Wooster Farmers Market May through October and year round at Local Roots Market and Cafe, also in Wooster. The farm also offers a community supported agriculture program. A CSA connects a farm to a consumer through a subscription process. A fee is paid at the start of the growing season, allowing members of the community to support the farm and share the risks and benefits of food production. The consumer then receives a share of the farm crops during the duration of the subscription, reaping the benefit in a bountiful growing season and sharing the loss if there should be a lean week or season.

Gnizak explained how mak-

ing purchases from small farms is what keeps them in business. She said there also is a social, interactive, community piece to shopping local.

Small businesses and local markets are a great place to meet like-minded people and find connections and interests that intersect to grow into relationships that make us happy to see familiar faces when our paths cross," she said. "That is something you just can't put a price on, but it means a lot to me.

She also shared how raising a family on the farm taught many life lessons to her children such as how to work in the gardens and with animals, learning math, interacting with people of all ages, and learning the value of helping others and the value of followthrough and having a good work

Gnizak described a long, arduous journey with the hard work of farming.

"I think each farm faces challenges every year," she said. "There are weeds, deer and other wildlife, and growing challenges of the weather, problems finding labor and things in need of repair.

Starting from scratch with no farming background meant learning along the way and very slowly adding equipment to make the jobs easier.

"We grew as we could afford it," Gnizak said. "My first fruit trees were put in before we had running water. I had to carry it uphill from the creek across the street. It would have been great to start where we are now, but it was

a good journey and we learned a lot along the way."

Adonai Acres offers CSA shares in an early, main and late season offering with both full and half shares available. CSA pickup is offered at Local Roots Market and Cafe on Tuesdays, at the farm, or at the Downtown Wooster Farmers Market during the main season on Saturday mornings. Email Gnizak for more information or to subscribe at praisetohimgnizak@gmail.com. There are no direct sales or dropins at the farm itself.

Gnizak explained how things have changed over the years for those getting started in farming.

"When I started, there was only the Organic Gardening and Farming magazine," she said. there is a local bounty available.

"Now there is a great network of farmers, books, podcasts, You-Tube videos and more. When I got my first tunnel, I had to quit doing winter growing since there was no one interested in buying anything grown local. What a change.

"I like the aspect of when you buy local you get to know the faces of the farmers you deal with and build a real connection. (That's) not something that you can do on social media. I think more people are interested in eating healthier and actively look for markets and freshness and come back noticing the difference in flavor and keeping quality of their purchases.'

Thanks to farms like Adonai Acres and farmers like Gnizak,

Wooster Township students learn, share about bugs

When Andy Hosfeld saw a mosquito walking through the hallway outside of his fifth-grade classroom, he was a bit startled, but he knew practice was about to begin.

Hosfeld, a science teacher at Wooster Township Elementary School, wrote skits for the school's leadership team to perform at Bugapalooza, an event the school is staging with help from the Ohio State University United Titanium Bug Zoo. He said the students designed their costumes for their performances to act out conservation issues related to the insect world.

Students also have been working on researching a bug assigned to them after a visit to the Bug Zoo on the OSU Wooster campus, according to team co-adviser Kristie Shoulders. They will share their findings through Google slides, drawings/ sketches in bug jar sheets, clay models and posters they

designed during a show-andtell event at the school. They will repeat their one-minute talks at their exhibits for each grade level, kindergarten through sixth grade.

'You're definitely going to be experts on your bugs, adviser Annie McDowell said to the students.

On hand to assist them will be Carrie Elvey, the Bug Zoo's community outreach specialist; Jeni Filbrun, zookeeper and program manager; and some entomology students from the campus.

Among the 12 bugs assigned to students are the Madagascar hissing cockroach, blue death feigning beetle, Australian walking stick, taxi cab beetle, horsehead grasshopper, tarantula and scorpion. The latter two are insects only Bug Zoo staff may handle.

Harper Mays said her assigned bug — the blue death feigning beetle looks like a little blueberry. "He's so cute," she said.

She said it's named feign-

She likes researching the bugs because it helps her understand them. "Once we've researched them, we can share what's good about them and what's bad about them," she said. "A lot of people feel like bugs are

Both students hope sharing their knowledge of bugs will help people feel more comfortable around them.

Bugapalooza was an idea hatched from a oneyear partnership between the Wooster Township Student Leadership Team and the Bug Zoo. When the team visited the zoo in October, students learned about zoo residents, insect conservation and ecology. They also discussed ways they could help support the Bug Zoo.

The Bug Zoo staff learned about the students and leadership program and discussed the kinds of programs the Bug Zoo could offer. Together they are offering Bugapalooza. In return students will provide the zoo with community service.

Shoulders said the team will provide the zoo with the students' artistic endeavors including the posters and five skits that will be recorded and shown to students to build anticipation for Bugapalooza.

One of the skits will be performed at Titan Talk, the school's live version of announcements on the first Friday of the month. The skit will help kick off Bugapalooza.

Hosfeld used these mot-

tos from the Bug Zoo to write the skits:

-Caterpillars feed the world; a chickadee needs almost 6,000 caterpillars to raise a nest of chicks.

Leave the leaves in the fall; a lot of insects overwin-

Be a lazy gardener: leave flower stalks, grass high, no mulch.

-Turn off the lights for insects; insects need dark skies to navigate, and bright lights can cause their death.

—Insects do a lot of jobs: remove dung, eat dead animals, turn the soil, pollinate.

Hosfeld said the students are doing an amazing job with the skits, and he can't wait to see them all come together.

"It's really inspiring to see young people interested in entomology," Filbrun said. 'Insects play such a vital role in our world, but they are often overlooked. Getting kids interested in entomology is opening a whole new world for them.'

Holmes County Rebellion is topic of CRF speaker event

The Cleo Redd Fisher Museum will welcome back historian Patrick Drouhard for its next speaker series event, Fort Fizzle: The Holmes County Rebellion.

This program is slated for Monday, Feb. 12 and will be held in the lecture hall of the Cleo Redd Fisher Museum at 203 E. Main St. in Loudonville. The event is free and open to the public, with doors opening at 6:30 p.m.


No history of the Mohican area is complete without mention of the rebellion, known locally as Fort Fizzle. Over 400 Union soldiers with two cannons were ordered to the small village of Napoleon, now called Glenmont, to put down what was believed to be a rebellion against the federal draft laws during the Civil War. The incident even commanded the attention of President Lincoln and members of his cabinet, with Loudonville also playing a key role in the affair.

From almost the time of its occurrence in June 1863, a raging debate arose as to just what happened up on French Ridge, just south of the village. Fortifications, charges with fixed bayonets, breastworks, underground tunnels, arms shipments, cannons,



stored foodstuffs, secret societies, draft resistance and rebellion were the subjects of the many written accounts to circulate over the years. At center focus was a stone building on the property of a French-speaking Swiss immigrant named Laurent Blanchat (Blanchard). It was about seven-tenths of a mile east of the intersection of Holmes County Roads 25 and 6, just off County Road 6. While the stone building was Blanchat's home, it became known as Fort Fizzle, where a purported 600-900 men had gathered to stop U.S. authorities from drafting men for the Union Army during the Civil War.

Drouhard, the foremost expert on the matter, will explain the details of the event using National Archival records and research to dispel the many inaccurate accounts that have appeared over the years. Drouhard was born and raised near Loud-

onville before beginning a career in public education as a history teacher and later as a principal and superintendent. He is the author of "It Don't Look Right for the Times: The Factual History of the Holmes County Rebellion," which will be available for sale following the program.



WAYNE COUNTY TO THE WORLD

Wooster native Arthur H. Compton won the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1927

On The College of Wooster's Wikipedia page, its list of notable people begins with Arthur Holly Compton. It's merely coincidence that Compton falls first alphabetically. It's hard to imagine him not topping the chart, regardless of how people are ranked.

Having a Nobel Prize will do that. So will taking part in the Manhattan Project.

The former came about in 1927 when Compton earned the Nobel Prize for Physics, one of two honorees that year, along with Charles Thomson Reese Wilson of the United Kingdom. Compton was only the third American winner of the Nobel Prize in Physics.

Compton won for his discovery of the effect named after himself. The Compton Effect, also known as Compton Scattering, was first discovered in 1923 and explained the interaction between charged particles and high-frequency protons.

Compton's research led to advances in radiology, which allowed the medical field to move forward in ways not previously available. His research paved the way to much of radiobiology, a field that includes MRIs, ultrasound and X-rays.

The Compton Effect ultimately was proved by Harvard scientist William Duane, who had set out to show Compton's research was wrong. After a couple years of trying, Duane had to concede that Compton was in fact correct, and the Nobel followed.

For his efforts, Compton received a share of a prize of approximately \$15,500, roughly \$212,000 in today's dollars. Modern-day winners take home more than \$1 million.

That may have only been Compton's second-most valuable contribution, depending on the outlook. In the early-1940s, he was head of the Metallurgical Laboratory, which produced nuclear reactors that converted uranium into plutonium and found ways to separate plutonium from uranium, all of which helped in the design of the first atomic bombs.

Under Compton's watch, the world's first nuclear reactor, known

National Defense Research Committee, formed a special committee to report on the NDRC's uranium program. Compton was head of that committee.

All of this started in 1941,

Compton later was part of the Scientific Panel of the Interim Committee, which recommended using the atomic bomb against Japan. Also on that committee were Robert Oppenheimer and Fermi.

"The secretary of war should be advised that, while recognizing that the final selection of the target was essentially a military decision, the present view of the committee was that the bomb should be used against Japan as soon as possible, that it be used on a war plant surrounded by workers' homes and that it be used without prior warning," the committee wrote after a June 1, 1945 meeting.

The bombs were subsequently dropped two months later in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and World War II came to a close.

Much of this was tap-danced around recently in the hit movie "Oppenheimer," in which Compton is nowhere to be found among many others with whom he was directly involved.

For instance, Bush is portrayed by Matthew Modine, Tom Conti is Albert Einstein and Danny Defarrari plays Fermi, all of whom shared time and space with Compton during the Manhattan Project's conduction.

Compton was born in Wooster on Sept. 10, 1892, to Elias and Otelia Compton, the latter being whom Compton Hall at The College of Wooster is named after. He was one of three brothers in his family, all of whom earned a PhD.

Compton got his undergraduate degree, a Bachelor of Science, at Wooster. From there he moved to Princeton, where he earned both his master's degree and doctorate. He went on to be a physics professor at the University of Minnesota before spending time as a research engineer.

He ultimately landed at Wash-

ington University in St. Louis, where in 1946 he became chancellor. While there he was criticized for the university being the last one in St. Louis to allow black students, perhaps the only blight on his lifetime record. The school only became fully racially desegregated near the end of his eight years as chancellor.


He married Betty Charity McCloskey in 1916. Betty Compton died in 1980 at the age of 88.

The couple had two children: John Joseph and Arthur Alan. Each graduated from The College of Wooster.


In between his Nobel Prizewinning research and his work on the Manhattan Project, Compton did a great deal of research on cosmic rays, which landed him on the cover of Time in 1936. The accompanying article noted that Compton, in addition to his scientific contributions, never drank, rarely smoked but always offered a cigarette to women visitors, and was a lights-out tennis player who often had difficulty finding a suitable playing partner. He played a mean mandolin and would treat his graduate students to dinner and movies when the work was done.

While Compton headed up perhaps more historically significant committees, he also was president of the American Physical Society in 1934, the American Association of Scientific Workers from 1939-40 and the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 1942. He collected many honorary degrees and distinctions along the

Compton was a professor-atlarge at the University of California at Berkeley in 1962, when he died on March 15 of a brain hemorrhage six months shy of his 70th birthday. He is buried in the Wooster Cemetery.







"Most terminally ill patients spent their final days in the hospital when their families were overwhelmed trying to care for their loved ones at home," Stallings said. "Wayne County Hospice, now Ohio's Hospice, had just been established in 1982. The organization provided families with the assistance they needed to care for a loved one in the home setting."

Stallings saw firsthand how the local hospice provider allowed patients the ability to receive the comfort care — physical, emotional and spiritual — that allowed them to die with dignity in the home setting with family or close friends nearby.

"So I know personally how important Ohio's Hospice has been to our area," he said. "My volunteer participation in the in Millersburg at 7 a.m. hospice team meetings gives me a chance to share my knowledge regarding patient care with the team. It also leaves me with the feeling that I am supporting an organization that did so much for my patients in my medical practice before I retired."

Night hunting continues to see its popularity grow

Ohio continues to be living quarters to thousands of predators like coyotes and foxes that tend to prey on smaller farm animals and domesticated animals like dogs and cats, making them a menace to farmers and pet owners.

Because of the frequency of attacks and abundance of coyotes in particular, which that illuminates a predatory

are prone to hunt in small packs, night hunting for these predators has become a more popular hunting sport.

The challenges of night hunting vary greatly from a daytime hunt, and that alone has prompted many hunters to try their skills at night hunting.

One popular option when it comes to hunting at night is the use of a thermal scope animal through its body heat.

Duane Mast of J&L Sports in Berlin said night hunting is a growing sport among hunters because of the challenges it presents.

He said thermal hunting for coyotes in the local counties continues to be pursued because of the growing population of coyotes.

Thermal hunting is among the most highly anticipated forms of night hunting, and because it presents a heat signature rather than sighting through a rifle scope, the animals are much easier to spot

Mast said they carry monoculars, binoculars and scopes in the thermal equipment realm, along with range finders. He said some of the thermal equipment comes equipped with range finders.

He said from beginner to expert, there are three different levels of thermal equipment that dictate the clarity and distance to which it is useful.

"People might be sur-

prised with the clarity of some of the higher end equipment," Mast said. "You get what you pay for, but I will say that the lower end product is getting better."

While hunting for many types of animals in this area has been a popular hobby for many hunters over the decades, this fairly new option of hunting predatory animals at night continues to

gain popularity.

Mast said rather than hunting the animals, it is best to draw the predators to the hunt, meaning an animal call or deer carcass bait.

"Calling is the most effective way, and there is an art to that," Mast said. "It's all part of the challenge of night hunting that hunters need to learn and grow into."

Like any hunt, thermal

hunting takes time and practice and plenty of patience to perfect, but Mast said the learning curve is a fun part of the process.

For those seeking to make a lesser but equally impressive investment into night hunting, Night Eyes provides a solid entry into the night hunting realm.

Night Eyes is the invention of Joe Zaffuto, who created the LED predator hunting lights products that utilize a red light in tandem with both a headlamp and a rifle.

The idea behind Night Eyes is the implementation of a red light that allows hunters to first spot the eyes of a coyote or fox, lure it through a call such as a rabbit or another coyote, and then make the kill.

'This is not night vision hunting," Zaffuto said. "You can turn any rifle into a night hunting weapon in 15 seconds. You don't have to buy anything special. Just take

your deer gun, hook this system up, and you're ready to shoot coyotes and foxes. This makes it very simple."

Zaffuto said he designed this system in 2012 because he felt there was a glaring need for a more successful system in the industry.

The headlamp and gun light are lightweight and easy to pack, carry and assemble quickly, making this night hunting excursion fairly inexpensive and compact.

Zaffuto said predatory night hunting is an activity that is on the rise, not only because hunters enjoy the challenges that accompany the hunt, but also because fox and covote kills among domesticated animals are becoming common in Ohio and surrounding states.

In utilizing the two components of Night Eyes, the red light of the head lamp is set at 30%, and the hunter lures a coyote in with a small animal or coyote call. The coyote isn't concerned about the dim light and begins to creep closer to what it believes is another animal.

Zaffuto said the red light illuminates everything in front of the light while camouflaging everything behind it in a sea of darkness.

He said this process is needed when hunting in a wide-open field with no concealment or blind.

"Everything immediately behind the light is bathed in total darkness, so the animal doesn't see anything behind the light," Zaffuto said. "My face is 2 inches behind it, and the coyote can't even see that. The light is your concealment. As long as the light is fixated on the eyes of the approaching animal, you are invisible. I could stand behind you doing jumping jacks and the predator wouldn't see me."

The next step is to take the rifle gun light and turn it on the animal, this one at 100%. Zaffuto said the approaching animal becomes conditioned to the low glow of the head lamp, and the gun light at 100% doesn't scare off the animal because of that.

Now with the coyote bathed in light, a hunter can easily identify exactly what animal is approaching.

'Oftentimes with thermal hunting, all hunters see is the glow of the eyes and a heat signature, and you can't tell if it's a coyote or a dog or some other animal," Zaffuto said. "With this system there is no doubt."

One key to the process is keeping the red light's diffused beam on the animal at

all times until the rifle light can be placed on the animal. One glance away or looking down at your rifle will allow the animal to see behind the light.

Both units can be operated courtesy of a remote control through Bluetooth technology, making it easier to operate without losing sight of the predator.

He said the system is not for use for deer hunting, but for predatory hunting only.

Anglers help boost Ohio's economy through fishing

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources Division of Wildlife stocked 40.8 million fish of 11 species in Ohio waters in 2023. Fish were stocked during spring, summer and fall at 239 locations statewide. These annual fish stockings help provide fishing for Ohio's 1.7 million anglers.

The division of wildlife operates six state fish hatcheries that raise sport fish for stocking in Ohio waters, enhancing recreational opportunities for anglers. Ohio's hatcheries raise saugeye, walleye, yellow perch, rainbow trout, steelhead trout, brown trout, muskellunge, hybridstriped bass, blue catfish, channel catfish and bluegill.

The majority of Ohio's fish populations are sustained through natural reproduction; however, stocking expands and diversifies fishing opportuni-


School Safety Summit held in Columbus.

She also received a commendation from the Ohio House of Representatives and was nominated for the Legacy of Honor Award for going above and beyond the call of duty.



stocked in Ohio last year were of five life stages: 29.6 million fry, 10.3 million fingerlings, 237,740 advanced fingerlings, 131,178 catchable fish and 483,597 yearling fish. These life stages included the following sport fish:

-Fry (less than 1 inch long): saugeye (11.5 million), walleye (12.5 million), yellow perch (3 million) and hybridstriped bass (2.6 million).

Fingerling (1-2 inches long): saugeye (5.5 million), walleye (1.6 million), yellow perch (2.3 million), bluegill (6,890) and hybrid-striped bass (954,260).

-Advanced fingerling (6-12 inches long): blue catfish (130,153), channel catfish (88,264) and muskellunge (19,323).

-Yearling fish (7-12 inches long): brown trout (18,699) and steelhead trout (464,898).

-Catchable fish (6 inches or longer): channel catfish (12,748), bluegill (9,273), brown trout (421) and rainbow trout (108,736).

ODNR Division of Wildlife's current and historical fish stocking records can be viewed via the DataOhio portal in the Fish Stocking Database. Use the data set to explore stocking locations and plan your next outing. Anglers age 16 and older are required to hold a valid Ohio fishing license on all public

fishing regulations booklet before your next trip.

Ohio's state fish hatcheries are open to the public and offer activities such as birding, hiking and archery. Each fish hatchery will host an open house this spring. Dates for the open houses are March 23 at St. Marys, April 6 at Hebron and Senecaville, April 13 at Castalia and Kincaid, and May 4 at London.

In 2022 anglers generated \$5.5 billion in economic spending in Ohio, according to a recent report released by the Wildlife Management Institute, Responsive Management and Southwick Associates. The research found 18% of Ohio's adults,



Holmes Falls Prevention Program expanding to Wayne Co.

The Holmes County General Health District has been awarded the Injury-Falls grant from the Ohio Department of Health for a third time. The Holmes County Falls Prevention Program led by the Holmes County General Health District aims to reduce the burden of falls among adults age 60 or older living in Holmes, Wayne and Ashland counties.

A regional approach was selected to enhance and expand the existing structure of falls prevention among adults age 60 and over, due to its effectiveness in Holmes County. The Falls Prevention Program will now be known as Falls Prevention Program of Holmes, Wayne & Ashland. The five-year grant cycle began Oct. 1, 2023, and will run through Sept. 30, 2028.

Kerry MacQueen, health educator/injury prevention coordinator of the HCGHD, will lead the HCFPP with assistance from current and new stakeholders/partners within the HCFPP region.

The HCFPP aims to make a difference in falls prevention within the newly established regional approach by completing these objectives:

—Enhancing the Standing Against Falls Coalition through increased involvement of current stakeholders with added partners from Wayne and Ashland counties.

—Educating and then implementing components of Stopping Elderly Accidents, Deaths & Injuries in primary care settings in the region with enhancement of falls education to already established primary care partners and healthcare providers in Holmes County.

—Identifying, implementing and enhancing a home-safety assessment and modification program with current and new fire/ EMS partners, where these partners would provide a brief home-safety assessment during a free smoke detector installation, as well as provide home-safety self-assessment tools as requested by individuals with follow-up from the HCGHD and health department partners.

Continued from 46 within the HCFPP region. including special events. All partners of the FPP have the opportunity to refer individuals to the FPP.

These objectives were chosen because falls have reached epidemic proportions within the 60 and over population. Data compiled by the Ohio Department of Health Bureau of Vital Statistics from 2016-21 found Wayne County is in the top 10 of unintentional fallrelated deaths within the 60 and over population out of the 88 counties in Ohio. Also, fall-related emergency department visits for 65 and over residents were greatest in Wayne County in 2022, with 6.6% occurrence.

These percentages were reportedly lowest in 2018 and 2020 at 4.9%, which constitutes a 26% increase in the occurrence of older adult falls over the last three years. Finally, Holmes number of fall-related inju-

ries in 2019, at 5.1%, which will expand the Standing has steadily decreased to 4.5% in 2022.

Data was further gathered by Jill Decker, epidemiologist of the HCGHD, and found from 2018-22 that there was a total of 11,301 ED visits within the HCFPP region with the highest ED visits in the 65-74 age range. Women accounted for more fallrelated ED visits than men. Health Improvement Zones that have the highest ED falls rates will be targeted for evidence-based falls prevention programs. These zones are located in Millersburg, Wooster and Loudonville/Mohicanville/Ash-

As the FPP moves toward a regional approach, Holmes, Wayne and Ashland counties will provide evidence-based falls prevention programs that can help individuals to develop the tools needed to prevent falls from occurring for themselves and others. County had the highest All programs are offered at no charge. The FPP also

The history behind Valentine's Day

Everybody knows Valentine's Day is a great time to remember those we love with cards, flowers, candy and those chocolate-dipped strawberries at Buehler's.

But it's not just another Hallmark play for business or the worst night to go out for dinner. The happy hearts day has quite a history.

First off, for anybody who forgot, Valentine's Day is always Feb. 14. The date was established at the end of the fifth century by Pope Gelasius, who declared the day St. Valentine's Day. Holidays were often lumped together, so the new Valentine's Day was placed on the calendar right next to Lupercalia, which was celebrated Feb. 15.

Lupercalia was a fertility celebration, and this is one theory why Valentine's Day ended up being about love.

There were at least three different saints called Valentine recognized by the

Catholic Church (and some say a lot more), but little was known about them, and there were conflicting reports. In 1969 the day was removed from the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar because of this.

There are several legends around the Saint Valentines; however, the one that persisted and became the holiday celebrated today may have come from Saint Valentine, a Roman priest who performed weddings for soldiers even though they were forbidden to marry. He wore a ring with a Cupid on it, and back before greetings cards, he shared paper hearts to remind people of their love of God.

According to Real Simple, "Because of this legend, Saint Valentine became

known as the patron saint of love. The Saint Valentine prayer asks Saint Valentine to connect lovers together so that two become one and the couple remembers their devotion to God."



Movement 'snacks' — they fill each day a healthy way

Remember as a kid sitting "crisscross applesauce" — legs crossed yoga-style — on the floor? According to movement specialists, it might be a good idea to start doing that again.

"The comforts of modern living are great, but we need to know when they are reducing or taking away essential movements from our daily lives that our bodies need to be healthy and stay mobile and strong, particularly as we age," explained Wendy Welpton, founder of Reclaim Movement, who teaches natural movement from her residence in England through online live and on-demand classes and videos, private coaching, and social media.

Winter is the perfect time to practice adding little extra bits of movement or "movement snacks" as Welpton likes to call snippets of exercise interspersed through the day. She said bodies adapt to the positions they're in most often, so the idea is to incorporate different practical movements into the day to vary and increase mobility and strength.

These bits of movement spread out over the course of an otherwise sedentary day can make a huge difference in maintaining mobility. They aren't meant to be a substitute for regular workouts; it's an addition to the day anyone can find time for.

Small movement breaks can be added into activities that are already part of a daily routine such as brewing coffee, making phone calls, brushing teeth, folding laundry, washing dishes and even watching TV.

"Movement snacks are also about stacking movements onto daily tasks," Welpton said, "such as choosing to always squat when you empty the washing machine, always sorting washing into piles whilst on the ground, always standing on a single leg to put on socks, trousers and shoes. This way we move more, improve



County hopes to join new coop for salt purchasing

When wicked weather rears its ugly head in Holmes County every winter, it is up to the Holmes County Engineer's Office to provide the salt for the county and make hazardous roadways a little easier to traverse.

Purchasing that salt takes a commitment, and during the department's recent presentation at the weekly Holmes County commissioner's meeting, salt was the center of discussion.

The commissioners adopted a resolution authorizing the Holmes County Engineer's Office to join the Community University Education Purchasing Council of Governments.

The commissioners listened to a report from Steve Sommers, Holmes County Engineer's Office engineer technician, who was working on the grant. It is Sommers who does all of the county's purchasing of salt.

Sommers said the grant centers around the county's salt-purchasing capabilities.

The new cooperative group referred to as CUE is a purchasing group that will allow the Holmes County Engineer's Office to purchase salt for its roadways, in addition to fuel and other vehicles or goods determined by the CUE board.

Holmes County had formerly been a part of a cooperative with Stark and Carroll counties and several other municipalities, which also will dissolve and join the CUE, which includes many municipalities in Stark and Summit counties, Copley, and several school districts.

Through the Stark County cooperative, the county annually bids out 40,000-45,000 tons of salt each year, and Sommers said the hope is this new cooperative effort will allow the

county to increase its annual purchase of salt, which was 4,000 tons last year.

Sommers said the CUE cooperative's annual salt tonnage is more than 80,000 tons.

"We're hoping that with the addition of the extra 40,000 tons, it will give us a better base and offer us a better price on purchasing salt," Sommers said.

He said because of the variance in winter weather over the years, with some ranging from little salt usage to years of heavy usage, the county has run into issues procuring salt in the years with heavy snowfall.

The hope is this eliminates that.

"The salt would end up going to different places around Ohio and surrounding states when the weather got really nasty, and they can only pull so much salt out of the ground," Sommers said.

Sommers said with the proposal submission, the county must now await the CUE

'Most special day' for Scots basketball and Steve Moore

There have been countless memorable moments in The College of Wooster's Timken Gymnasium, but the formal dedication of Steve Moore Court following the Fighting Scots' 87-86 win over DePauw on Jan. 27 will always rank near the top of the list.

In fact, Scots head coach Doug Cline called it the "most special day" in Wooster basketball history as he spoke during the ceremony, with his longtime mentor and friend Moore seated a few feet away.

A crowd of 1,866 watched Wooster's win over visiting DePauw, and nearly all of the Scots' faithful stayed for the 51-minute postgame ceremony.

During Moore's 39-year coaching career, he compiled a record of 867-253 before retiring after the 2019-20 season, and he still ranks No. 2 all-time in Division III wins. Moore had a 780-188 mark in 33 seasons leading the Scots' program, guiding them to 28 appearances in the NCAA Div. III Tourna-

ment and three Final Fours (2011-second, 2003, 2007).

Moore said during his speech that the court dedication is not about him. "It is about our players, and it's great that so many of them are here today," he said.

The Scots' legendary former coach, who's a member of the Ohio Basketball Hall of Fame, spent nearly his entire speech thanking others, from the players to past assistant coaches, administrators, fans, coaches he played for and coached under, and his family and God.

"It still hasn't sunk in," Moore said afterward. "This is as big of an honor as I've ever received. It's tremendous. To see a crowd here like this and all the former players who came back, that was really special. It was really nice to see the Scots win the game and stay in first place. It wouldn't have been nearly as much fun if they hadn't."

Cline, who was a standout player and then coached under Moore for 23 seasons, elaborated afterward on why he called it the "most special day" in the

Scots' storied basketball history.

"There's been a lot of great days in Wooster basketball history, and in my opinion, this is the greatest because we're honoring a guy who's so deserving," Cline said. "Wooster basketball has a great tradition with guys like coach Al Van Wie and Mose Hole. Don't get me wrong, but Steve Moore is Wooster basketball. For the guys who played for coach Moore and

have been around and coached with him, this is a great day for us all. He's a great coach, but he's a better man."

Moore mixed serious messages with humor during his speech, but above all else, he

came off as incredibly humble and grateful.

The retired coach joked that his family told him they'd leave if his speech got too long by naming all his former players. Moore managed to find time to specifically name several players and tell stories about other "unnamed" alums, who many in the crowd could identify.

Just as Cline had predicted before introducing him, Moore deflected nearly all of the credit for Wooster's incredible success to others.

"Any time a coach is honored, it is because of what players have done," Moore said. "I used to think I was the luckiest coach ever. Better said than that, we were the luckiest basketball program ever, because what I want to say today and the day itself, it is not about me. It is about our players, and it is great that so many of them are here today.

"We were very fortunate that there were some players in the program who were quality men and outstanding leaders,

"We only had a few applicants, and Jacki was the best fit," Honza said. "I knew of her body of work here at Triway. She was very successful, and she handles parents with respect and class. She goes all in coaching the girls."

Zody, a 1982 Triway grad, is hoping her second run leading the Titans is special. She will replace London Gilbert, who stepped down as head coach after two years and followed an outstanding stretch under John Finn from 2013-21.

"I love game day. I always love game day," Zody said. "All the work is all the other days, but game day is always very fun."

When asked to describe her coaching philosophy,

Knights wrestling has strong showing at home invite

West Holmes varsity wrestling coach Scott Vaughn was a very happy coach after his wrestlers earned two individual championships, placed four others on the top six podium and snared a third-place team finish at the Knights Invitational held inside The Dungeon at West Holmes High School on Jan. 27.

Earning their first Knights Invite titles were Cole Porter (junior, 175 pounds) and Grant Miller (senior, 215). Scoring runner-up finishes were Louden Dixon (sophomore, 144) and Hunter McCluggage (junior, 150) while Peyton Martin (sophomore, 113) and Grady Toye (senior, 126) both scored third-place finishes.

Buckeye (295.5 points) easily won its second straight team title, outpacing Carrollton (202.5) and the Knights (177.5).

"The competition was awesome today," Vaughn said of the tournament, which featured two returning state champions, a plethora of returning state placers and qualifiers, and nearly 40 state-ranked wrestlers. "We had high-level



wrestling all over the place. I was really happy with the way our wrestlers came out and competed. Win or lose, we are competing out there. I like that we are cleaning up a lot of our techniques every time we step out on the mat. That shows me that they are working hard and learning in the practice room."

Porter (5-0, four falls) went undefeated in his pool rounds, then scored a 6-2 decision win in the championship semifinals to earn a shot at gold. Porter made quick work of it, pinning Gibson Swartz (Philo) in 43 seconds for the championship.

Miller went 5-0 with three falls, was undefeated in his pool and scored a 4-2 decision win in the championship semifinals. Facing Division III state-ranked Jordan Folmer (Keystone) for the title, Miller and Folmer were dead even until Miller got a reversal and

near fall points late in the third period for a 9-4 victory.

Sometimes, the best stories have unspoken words

For me, it was always about the pictures. Sitting on my carpet square in Mrs. Denholm's second-grade classroom as she read E.B. White's classic, "Charlotte's Web," I would anxiously await her oscillating fanning of the book to her 7-year-old audience, displaying Garth Williams' long-celebrated artwork.

For whatever reason, the initial drawing of Fern in a battled tug-of-war with her father over an axe, to be used to kill the "runt" of the litter, made its way into my longterm memory banks. Not so much because of the violence depicted in the penciled artwork, but rather the look of both confusion and shock on Mr. Arable's face that his daughter would come at him in such a manner.

Along with Mrs. Denholm's calm, narrative voice, those pictures brought Wilbur's story to imaginative life — no easy task for a classroom of over 25 kids whose minds were recently awakened by the visual sto-



rytelling splendor of "Star Wars" on the silver screen.

Looking back, I think Fern and Charlotte and all their barnyard friends may have been the antecedent to my love of visual storytelling — a life filled with thousands of comic books mostly inhabited by the goings on in Gotham City.

But then that is what the best pictures, whether hand drawn or actual photographs, have always done: tell the emotion of the story.

As queasy as one might feel while looking at the iconic photograph of the 11 steelworkers on their lunch break — perched 850 feet off the ground atop a steel beam while constructing the Rockefeller Center — do yourself a favor and Google the long-speculated image

of the photographer Charles Ebbets taking the actual picture. Whether factual or not, in terms of what he is actually photographing, it is even more harrowing and emotion-filled than his famous picture. One slip of the right heel on his brogue shoe, and that picture becomes even more famous for all the wrong reasons.

Or with a millisecond click of the shutter on May 4, 1970, how memorably John Filo captured the tragedy of the Kent State shootings. The raw grief on 14-year-old Mary Ann Vecchio's face shocked a collective conscience — forcing participants and the world as a whole to look. The Kent State photojournalism major would win a Pulitzer Prize for the picture at the age of 23. In both photographs the case for a picture being worth a thousand words is strongly made.

This also was the case a few years back when, in the midst of the 2022 World Cup, a social media post went viral. The picture, third and final rectangle, filled with three rectangular images, shows a loving elderly couple rooting for their favorite soccer team, Fenerbahçe, a Turkish professional soccer club. The top picture, dated 2014, shows the man's focused concentration on the game, with his right hand in what looks like a bag of popcorn. The woman sits to his left, with an intrigued expression on her face as if a shirtless Paul Newman from "Cool Hand Luke" just walked into the room.

The second pictured rectangle, directly underneath and dated 2015, again shows the couple in the exact same spot but with seats reversed. This time his hands are up in celebration, and she is looking at him with a smile filled with all the ups and downs of life that only an elderly couple would understand, saying, "Here we are ... exactly where we want to be."

The one time the woman is not smiling comes in the

dated 2016. Again, she is in the same location, but this time she sits alone. One can surmise why her husband is no longer in the photo, and her expression shows a stoicism in the game she is watching because, for her, the soccer games clearly had so much more to do with the man sitting beside her than the game itself. She is a woman and widower filled with knowledge, compassion, sorrow and loving memories.

This picture was brought back to my consciousness because of another recent photo, again involving a sports team.

The picture came across my Instagram news feed of a Detroit Lions fan in a full-on blubber. I mean this guy is shedding the heavy tears of a long-suffering fan base, three decades removed from being even remotely relevant in professional football. Underneath the picture came the flood of comments and judgments for

which social media, and the anonymity it protects its users from, has become famous.

"Imagine caring this much about a football game!" one commenter said.

"He's from Michigan this is what these people always look like!" and "I mean the (idiot) has sunglasses on his head ... in a dome!" read a few others, and those are just the ones I can share.

In this case, however, motivated mostly by the rudeness of the comments, I had to discover the story behind the picture.

Turns out the young man shown sobbing in the photo is Aaron Wikaryasz, a 35-year-old Lions fan who attended every home game with his father Joseph until his dad was killed in a car accident when Aaron was 14. Prior to his death, Joseph was an iron worker who helped build the very stadium in which Aaron was sitting and crying as the

Some ways to fight back against age discrimination

Dear Savvy Senior,

What are the steps to take to fight against age discrimination in the workplace, and where can I turn to for help if I think I've got a case?

Dear Paul,

If you believe your age has cost you in the workplace — whether it's a job, a promotion or a raise — you have options for fighting back. Here's what you should know along with some steps to take against this illegal workplace activity.

ADEA protection

The Age Discrimination in Employment Act is your first defense against age discrimination. This is a federal law or treat you differently than other employees because of your age.

Some examples of age discrimination include the

If your workplace has fewer than 20 employees, you may still be protected under your state's antiage discrimination law.

Steps to take

If you think you are a victim of employment age discrimination, you may first want to talk to your supervisor informally or file a formal complaint with your company's human resources department.

If that doesn't resolve the problem, you should then file a charge with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission within 180 days from the date of the alleged violation, but it may be extended to 300 days. You can do this online, nearest EEOC office (see www.EEOC.gov/fieldoffice) or call 800-669-4000. They will help you through the filing process and let you know if you also should file a charge with your state anti-discrimination agency.



If you lose your job in a group termination or layoff, you should consider joining forces with other colleagues. There are advantages to proceeding as a group including sharing costs of the litigation and strengthening your negotiating position.

Another option you may want to consider is mediation, which is a fair and efficient way to help you resolve your employment disputes and reach an agreement. The EEOC offers mediation at no cost if your current or former employer agrees to participate. At mediation you show up with your evidence, your employer presents theirs and the mediator makes a determination within a day or less.

2 wheels and occasionally treacherous conditions

There was a time not too awfully long ago when I often felt I was the only bicycle on the road when the temperature dipped below freezing. The times have changed.

Anyone traveling the byways of Amish Country can now pretty much count on seeing a two-wheeled contraption of one sort or another on nearly any day of the year. If I was a betting man, it would be a fair wager to claim the e-bike has been more heavily adopted here in our area than anywhere else in the nation. And when you pay a whole lot of money for a vehicle and count on it to get you places, you're not likely to let cold hands aand a frozen nose slow you down.

There are plenty of strategies to prevent the freezing of important body parts, beginning with handlebar mittens and woolen scarves and perhaps ending with batteryheated socks, gloves, vests and even balaclavas — those pull-over "bank robber" style masks that cover your head



and face, save for the eyes.

Personally, the only battery-powered items in my setup are my headlights and taillights. I'm still pushing the pedals the old-fashioned way, burning lots of calories and generating a lot of body heat in the process. That's always been a part of my mission, but I definitely don't disrespect the folks who are out there with me on battery-powered bikes — especially those who are using them as a primary mode of transportation. Any mile traveled by bicycle – whether pedal-powered or electrified — is a much more environmentally friendly mile than one traveled in a car or truck.

Folks often ask what sort of conditions will force me to call off a wintertime ride, and the answer often surprises

them. It's not the cold in and the roads are clear, bridges of itself; it's the road conditions. I've ridden to work in temperatures as cold as 5 F (a borderline painful practice I wouldn't necessarily recommend), but the conditions — clean, moisture-free roads and zero wind - made it doable. No, the stopper for me is the possibility of ice on the pavement.

Snow across the landscape doesn't necessarily mean the roads are unsafe. The salt spread on the roadway naturally works its way to the gutter line as the snow melts, and a wide berm is often fine to ride, especially in temperatures upward of 30 F. Furthermore, the wider tires found on e-bikes are a little more forgiving of the occasional slick spots than the "skinnies" I run on my rig for most of the year.


What I've found to be downright dangerous, however, are temperatures in the 20s with deceivingly clear roads. Bridge decks are the biggest peril. It's easy to forget, when do not benefit from the same "warm mattress" that insulates the underside of the rest of roadway. A bridge deck is the very same temperature as the air outside, and because of that, it can draw a thin layer of ice even when the rest of the road is fully ridable. Throw in the added water vapor coming off the creek, stream or river that might be running beneath the bridge and you've got a recipe for disaster.

For those of you joining me out on the road on two wheels at this time of year and also those of you who may be passing by in more traditional forms of wintertime transportation, please be especially careful — and watch those bridges!

"A Long December" Counting Crows (1996) Dad died 25 years ago

today ... hard to believe it's been that long.

The phone rang quite early that Saturday morning, and I knew without giving it a second thought what it portended and the chain reaction of ritualistic, necessary events it would set in motion.

It had only been 18 years since Mom passed away on New Year's Day, so it wasn't my first experience with January's dark sadness.

Death comes to collect everyone, eventually, and we all understand there's a debt to be paid ... call it the cost of living expense.

The church where both of my parents' funeral masses were held has long been torn down, demolished, existing only in memories.

A new, much more modern edifice has been erected in its place, practically in the same location, and I'm sure it's a fine building.

But I have no history there, nothing that pulls at my heartstrings, reminding me of who I once was and what I've become.



As a recovering Catholic plagued with self doubts, I'm prone to bouts of melancholy, especially at this time of year when, as you might well imagine, loss and uncertainty are difficult to mitigate.

When it gets too bleak, I seek refuge in my recollections, knowing that with any luck, the residual blessings of my checkered theological past might just provide the proverbial bucket of life-affirming sustenance lowered into the well of my unhappiness.

Herewith, then, in lieu of the Commandments, I offer my Top 10 memories of that little church and why they remain important.

10. That time I fainted

It was required that school children in fourth grade through eighth attend Mass every morning, Monday through Friday. The littlest kids were excused from this duty, presumably because they were, well, too little. Not being a fan of breakfast — a trait that lingers to this day — I often

shuffled into the pew on an empty stomach. I remember staring at the candles on the altar and the way the flames seemed to expand and contract and then ... nothing. When I awoke, the nun who was my teacher was leaning over me, asking me if I knew where I was. The next time it happened was in health class, when I was a senior in high school during a particularly graphic movie about contracting VD. Strange.

9. My father's second wedding

was in keeping with Canon Law, a tradition that indicated that now I was a soldier for Christ, willing to suffer for my faith. OK, then.

7. Impressing the prettiest girl

In the late '60s, sex was everywhere, except (apparently) in Catholic classrooms, where social skills were not only untaught, but discouraged. Something as innocent as giving a girl your ID bracelet — trust me, it was a thing back then — was cause for reprimand and scolding.

Trying to work up the nerve to talk to the girl who had been so nice to me ever since the fourth grade proved to be a nonstarter, so (as an eighth-grader) I began walking to church early Sunday mornings because I knew her family faithfully attended 7 a.m. service. I sat where I had an unobtrusive view of her, and well, I was in heaven. I thought about casually joining her as she walked to the family car afterward,

seeing her. Besides, what was I going to say? "Great sermon, wasn't it?"

6. Volunteering for funerals

As an altar boy, there were opportunities to earn a few extra bucks when the call went out to take part in weddings, and as you might guess, there was no shortage of guys willing to give up part of the their Saturdays to pocket a \$10 bill for an hour's work. I'll admit I did that a lot, but the weird thing that set me apart from the other Knights of the Altar - no kidding, that's what were we called - was stepping forward to serve during funerals. No one wanted that duty. Not only were there no crisp bills handed over in brightly colored envelopes, but also there was that pervasive sense of sadness that occluded even the brightest, sunniest days outside the little church.

Naturally, I suppose, I never missed a chance to play

but I was happy enough just my part in that drama, whether it was lighting the candles on either side of the casket or assisting the priest as he walked around it, incense floating from the burner, a moment that still stays with ... such solemnity. There was no predicting when an altar boy's services might be required, death arriving on its own good time, so I was always vigilant, ready to step into the breach when the time arrived and the family in need would expect a proper send-off to a parishioner. Sometimes, I was even driven to the cemetery for a final graveside farewell.



Sowing away winter blues: Seed starting fundamentals

Lately, I find myself frequently wondering, "When's the last time we've had a sunny day?" I do my best to appreciate each Ohio season for its unique characteristics, but this time of year is always a struggle for me—when the blue skies are covered in a blanket of thick, gray clouds and recurring rounds of precipitation.

Thankfully, there are many indoor activities to help overcome the winter blues. One popular activity is getting a jump-start on the outdoor garden by making plans for and starting seeds.

As with many other hobbies and projects, this venture can be done on a slim budget with resourceful creativity or can manifest into a more expensive venture depending on a person's preferences and selections. The most important outcome remains to find enjoyment in the process and escape from the dreary days leading up to spring.



So if you are new to seed starting, here are the basics. If you're seasoned in seed starting, let this serve as a reminder of the essential elements in the process, and I hope the prospect of trying a new seed variety or growing method keeps the process interesting and enjoyable for you until the warmth of the sun shines brightly through our windows once more (for longer than a few hours per week).

The basics of starting seeds are choosing your varieties and getting the seeds, awareness of growing periods and frost-free dates, containers, potting mix, light, water, adjustments after germination, and acclimating seedlings to their intended garden area. Here is a closer look at

each topic to better prepare for a thriving outcome. carrots and corn prefer to be directly sown into their

Seed selection

When making a list of seeds to start, consider where seedlings will eventually be planted outdoors. The final location for the seedlings/plants will guide the varieties you decide to grow. Will seedlings be planted in full sun or shade or a mix of both? What will the soil moisture be like? Research your selections and consider their preferences for light, moisture, days to maturity, spacing, et cetera.

Also bear in mind some plant varieties tolerate transplanting better than others. You may see the phrase direct sown vs. indirect sown. Examples of plant varieties that benefit from starting seed indoors (indirect sown) include broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, kale, lettuce, peppers and tomatoes. Whereas radishes, peas, beans, beets,

carrots and corn prefer to be directly sown into their intended location to avoid root disturbance that can occur during transplanting. Direct-sown varieties prefer their seeds planted directly into the garden soil once the soil temperature is conducive and the threat of frost has passed.

Flower varieties to consider starting indoors might include marigolds, sunflowers, zinnias, sweet peas, celosia, nasturtium, phlox varieties and Angelonia.

When to start seedlings

Starting seeds indoors can give gardeners a jump-start on the season or a particular crop that has extended maturity rates. Charts are available online and in seed catalogs to take the guesswork/calculations out of when to start specific varieties indoors until it is time to plant seedlings. One great resource is the "Old Farmer's Almanac Seed Starting and Planting Date Calculator."

Containers

Choose from purchasing premade trays with covers - these can be used year after year with proper sanitizing - or use your imagination and repurpose something you may already have on hand: egg cartons, eggshells, paper towel and toilet paper tubes, yogurt cups, solo cups. Individual cells are best for plants to minimize root injury during transplant. Just be sure to add drainage to your upcycled creation. Adding a cover of Saran Wrap will retain humidity and temperature. Plastic domes or the top of a milk jug work as well. Remove plastic as soon as sprouts appear.

Potting medium

Seed starting mixes are available for purchase. This medium is well aerated, loosely packed, free of disease and contaminates, and supports seedlings in the early stages. It is not recommended to use old potting soil. Moisten the soil in containers before planting. Refer to seed packets for proper planting depth. Don't forget to label what you plant.


Light

A sunny, south-facing window is the best indoor location for seed starting without intervention. If that isn't available, consider growing lights (fluorescent) and/or a heating mat to produce healthy seedlings and prevent "leggy stems" that will develop from stretching toward a light source. Setups and costs will vary. Take the time to investigate different options, from both operational and financial standpoints. Plants need 12-16 hours of light every day. A timer on a light source helps to ensure the requirement is met. Lights should be a few inches above seedlings and adjusted as growth progresses.

Water

Seedlings should be kept moist but not waterlogged. The type of container you use will affect moisture retention and water frequency. Remember drainage is an absolute necessity. Do not let cells dry out but don't keep them soaked for long periods. Watering from the bottom (soaked in a tray or pan of water) or with a mister are recommended methods.

Adjustments after germination

Seedlings also will appre-

ciate a water-soluble fertilizer mixed at one-quarter strength once per week. As seedlings grow and their roots fill their containers, they may need transplanting to larger containers in potting soil.

Hardening

As outdoor planting time approaches, seedlings need an acclimation period. Move seedlings outdoors to a shaded area for a few hours each day. Bring them back in before the temperatures drop at night if needed. After a few days, expose plants a little longer to direct sunshine, and by the end of the two weeks, the plants should be ready for a sunny area in the garden.

More information

Starting seeds can give you more freedom in plant variety, flexibility with your budget and offer a nice distraction from the winter blues. Let this article guide you but just have fun and remember it is always a learning process. For more information visit holmes. osu.edu/seed-starting.
