Wellness program motivates the participants to succeed

Around the holidays many may find themselves picking up a few extra pounds or begin thinking about resolutions for a healthier new year. Those who intend to seriously combat the holiday bulge may find help in classes offered by Trinity Hospital Twin City.

The hospital is accepting reservations for the winter 2023 Fit for Life class, which will begin Jan. 10 for three months. The classes, which seek to help participants make lifestyle changes for greater overall health, are offered twice each year. Both virtual and in-person versions are available.

Fit for Life is the creation of Dr. Timothy McKnight of the hospital system. The most recent Fit for Life classes, which began in October, saw more than 70 participants, both locally and from around the country, thanks to the addition of online participation.

Fit for Life is a 12-week, individualized program emphasizing realistic lifestyle changes resulting in enhanced levels of health and fitness. The program is led by McKnight, a physician.

"As a practicing primary-care provider," McKnight said, "my day-to-day interactions with health and disease bring relevant, timely and crucial information about the latest disease states and healing opportunities. People love the fact that this program is physician-led and physician-inspired."

Participation in the classes is presented by Trinity Hospital Twin City as requiring a doable time commitment for busy families. Before the classes begin, a private Facebook page is set up specifically for the current class.

Three to four lessons are posted to that page with each of these lessons approximately 25-30 minutes. The class members read the Chapter of the Week and watch the lessons as their schedule allows. The total weekly time commitment with watching the videos, reading the assigned material and attending the weekly meeting is approximately 3 to 3 1/2 hours per week.

The Fit for Life Facebook page also offers support, encouragement, recipes, exercises and demonstration videos from McKnight and other members of the class. Participants, due to the shared Facebook page, get to know each other over time. The participants then meet every Tuesday at 5:30 p.m. for approximately one hour.

Kelly Bowe is project coordinator for the program and works closely with McKnight on the classes. "I meet with the in-person participants at the Dover Library in Dover," Bowe said. "I weigh everyone weekly and counsel them wellness. I love hope. It's not eno feel it is my responsible inspire the soul."

According to Trinity Health System, the goal of the Fit for Life program is to provide an innovative, multi-agency means to reduce the number of overweight and obese men and women of all ages in Tuscarawas County and the surrounding counties of Carroll, Guernsey and Harrison.

Bowe said Fit for Life is not only geared toward fitness, weight loss and wellness, but also is an overall lifestyle-changing program.

"Once you have learned the tools that Dr. McKnight gives you, it is easy to live the program for the rest of your life. Dr. McKnight teaches the program in such a way that every learning style is covered. Some people learn best by reading, some by listening to or watching a video, and others need to hear the information in person. All learning styles are included in the program," Bowe said.

McKnight plans to conduct the 60-minute in-person classes every Tuesday from 5:30-6:30 p.m. in the community room at the Dover Public Library. The course will begin Jan. 10 and run through March 28.

McKnight said conducting the classes is personally satisfying. "I love to teach," he said. "I love to make it simple and pertinent. I love to model correct principles and serve as a role model for health and wellness. I love to inspire and instill hope. It's not enough to just educate. I feel it is my responsibility to touch and inspire the soul."

Answering The Call

Ordinary people doing extraordinary things

Teterans were honored at the City of Dover Veterans Monument dedication held Nov. 19 on the square of Dover. The new monument was made possible by donations from organizations, businesses and the public to honor past, current and future military personnel.

There are eight insignias on the monument for the United States Army, Air Force, Marine Corps, POW-MIA, Navy, Coast Guard, Merchant Marine and Space Force. The monument features a collage of images of the U.S. flag, the Constitution and a bald eagle. It reads, "Dedicated to those who answered our nation's call in the pursuit of freedom."

Retired Col. Rex Ray, a former Dover High School graduate, was the guest speaker. He thanked the crowd for joining him in honoring veterans for their service and

defense of the nation and spoke of his 30-year service to the country in the Air Force, where he had the opportunity to meet members of the Women Air Force Service Pilots, members of the Tuskegee Airman and even a colonel who survived the Bataan Death March.

Ray then told the story of another person he met during his

"One of the highlights of my career was presenting the Silver Star Medal to a World War II vet - his name, Master Sgt. Clifford E. Hotchkiss. At the very beginning of World War II on Dec. 8, 1941, the day after the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, Hotchkiss was a member of a small garrison of Americans at Wake Island that held the Japanese off as they intended to do a land assault, Ray said.

The Japanese bombing continued on a daily basis. After the initial bombing, Hotchkiss and his

crew kept the lines of communication open for 15 days by moving the radio transmitter and receiver by hand to different locations away from enemy fire.

"He told us at the ceremony, and I'm quoting him, 'It's a good thing we got it away from the airfield and into the brush because minutes later they turned the communications truck into a heap of molten metal. The only thing I could think about was where can I hide," Ray said.

Hotchkiss hid from the Japanese in an underground ammunition storage area, where he served as the focal point for all transmissions in and out during the fight. He was eventually captured two days before Christmas in 1941 and taken to Japan as a prisoner

There he worked for a ship yard. And he took parts from the ship yard and built a radio so he could communicate with anyone he could contact with American forces," Ray said.

Hotchkiss' activities were found out, and he was beaten severely and tortured. He was to be executed, but a local Japanese person came to his defense and got him pardoned. When the war ended, Hotchkiss came home in September 1945, having spent mostly all of the four years of the war as a prisoner of war.

"His is one of many stories of ordinary people achieving extraordinary results in the service of our nation," Ray said. "I encourage all

veterans every day. You can identify us by our caps, our shirts, our jackets and lapel pins. It does lift my spirits when I get a smile and a thank you for your service."

The members of the veterans monument committee are co-chairs councilman Greg Bair and councilman Kevin Korns, interim Mayor Shane Gunnoe. Service Director Dave Douglas, Superintendent Scott Harmon, Pat Antonelli, and Ray Ulrich.

Members of the committee said they never had to ask anyone for donations. As soon as the project was announced in the local media, the donations started to come in. The suggestion for the memorial came from a citizen of Dover.

In addition to many individuals, the committee also thanked the Vietnam Veterans of America. Dover Post #3463 VFW Auxiliary, Dover VFW, Gor-Con Construction, O'Donnell Family Charitable Foundation, Metal Masters Inc., the Reeves Foundation and the Freeport Press for their donations.

"Dover is grateful to be able to honor all of our veterans from our community who have given so much in service to this great country," Gunnoe said. "I hope today's dedication and monument will serve to honor all of our Dover veterans, and while we cannot thank each of you enough for your service, it is our hope that this will serve as a display of Dover's enduring gratitude to our community's veterans."




Waltz said the drawings, while featuring local guests, are accomplished quickly each day. "We try not to draw that out at all."



Historical photos tell stories of the city of Dover's past

If you'd like to see what the Dover area looked like in the past and be transported back in time, your wish has come true with a new project by the Canal Dover Association.

The Canal Dover Association is a civic organization focused on improving the downtown area, and it participates in most activities in Dover.

A bed tax grant from the City of Dover to the CDA provided the funding for the project, which came about after new traffic lights were installed, leaving in their

wake some rather large and unsightly control boxes.

The CDA has added historic images to traffic boxes along Wooster Avenue from the Tuscarawas County Fairgrounds to near the Drug Mart Plaza on the north end. Each image is related to the location where it is posted.

Volkert said the idea came up about four years ago, and after the organization was awarded the grant, there were a few delays. The company they were going to work with was sold, and then the COVID-19 pandemic caused more

problems, but they were able to get the project back on track this year.

"We were able to put up a total of 11 images, and we tried as much as possible to relate them to their locations, and in most cases they're directly at, near or across from where they were taken," Volkert said. "For instance, down at the fairgrounds, there's a very good picture of flat track race with motorcyclists."

The photo is near the main entrance to the fairgrounds. All of the photos

in the project are located on light boxes on or directly off Wooster Avenue.

Going north on Wooster, the next image is at West Broadway.

"It depicts a flood scene from 1910. Most of the houses that are shown in the picture exist and are easily seen," Volkert said.

Another photo is located at Front Street just off Wooster Avenue. The photograph is of a steel bridge that existed around the turn of the century.

"It shows the scene of the bridge and a little boy sitting on a piece of sandstone off to the side," Volkert said.

The next light box is at Second Street by Benson's Market and Catering.

"It shows Weaver's Used Cars in the late 1950s, which was across the street on the south (corner.) They occupied a couple of lots, more or less, where Elite Tire is now," Volkert said.

At the square where the LifeBridge Community Church now stands is a photo of the Reeves Military Band taken in about 1910.

"If you look to the right of where the image is, you'll see the exact location where the picture was taken," Volkert said.

The same is true for the photo located at Fourth Street and Wooster in front of the Fourth and Faith Building of the St. John's Church, which used to be the Fred P. Potschner Ford dealership.

"There's a photograph that was taken in 1937, and the reason I know that is in looking closely at the picture, you see a '37 Ford in the showroom and you see the back of a '36 Ford parked outside," Volkert said

At West Slingluff just off Wooster Avenue, the photo featured is a small distance from where it was taken.

"It shows some workers from the Northern Ohio Traction and Light, which was a trolley company," Volkert said.

The company operated electric interurban rail lines. The photo is a view of the front of a trolley car, and a child of one of the workers is sitting on the headlight. "The car barn where this would have been taken was actually where the Subway Plaza is, so it's not very far from where it was taken," Volkert said.

A photo at 13th Street and Wooster depicts a 1953 class photo from the Dover Avenue School.

The photo at 21st Street is an aerial view of a test track at the Toomey Farm, which extended from the west side of 17th Street to 21st Street. The Toomey company and the Toomey family were very important in early Dover.

"On the one side of the box is a copy of an ad for the Toomey Sulky," Volkert said. "On East Second Street, more or less, behind the fire station is where the Toomey company manufactured wagons."

At the time sulky racing was huge, and Sam Toomey,

the patriarch of the family, devised a super lightweight sulky with a patented trust rear axle.

"They were shipped all over the country and into Europe. It was a very successful company," Volkert said. "One of them was put on display in the Henry Ford Museum."

A member of the Toomey family was friends with Henry Ford, who came to Dover personally to pick up the sulky. This would have happened sometime in the

1920s or 1930s.

Sam Toomey also was Dover's first volunteer fire chief in 1873.

The light box at the entrance to the park of 23rd Street has a photo taken the day the Dover City Park pool opened in 1971.

The last photo has been placed near the Drug Mart Plaza

"It depicts the bridge, which was on Schneider's Crossing over the Sugar Creek, and it was the last covered bridge in Tuscarawas. County," Volkert said. "The photo was taken in 1939, just before it was replaced with a steel bridge."

The project cost just over \$5,000, and the material the photos are made of is the same material that is used to wrap vehicles.

"They should have a pretty long life. It's intended to be weather resistant and not fade," Volkert said. "At some point they'll need replaced and may be replaced with a different image."

The City of Dover has been awarded a grant to replace some other traffic lights in town, and when that happens, Volkert would like to see more photos added to any new light boxes.

The images wrap around one corner of the light boxes.

"They're intended both for pedestrians and people driving by," Volkert said. "We want to take away some of the ugly of the big boxes."

Storybook Lane remains a tradition

As New Philadelphia's Storybook Lane display enters the 2022 Christmas season, condolences are in order to recognize the passing of New Philadelphia's Mark Watson, who died Oct. 26 at age 75.

Watson was an artist who came from a family of artisans. His dad, Walt, was a well-known home builder, woodworker and cabinet maker responsible for most of the development on New Philadelphia's south side in the 1960s and 1970s. Other members of the Watson family including son Jeff, who specialized in wall-paper and painting, worked in the family business.

Watson specialized in air-brushing technique, glass etching and stained glass. He was drafted by younger brother Kent Watson, who operates Watson Painting and Watson & Burkey LCC today — both based in New Philadelphia in 2001 — to help restore the original Storybook Lane panels to their original glory. Kent Watson co-chaired the original restoration campaign, a project of the New Philadelphia Rotary, with the help of the late Dick Stewart to assist him, as described in the 2022 update of the Storybook Lane project.

Storybook Lane begins in 1956 on East High Avenue

It was Vic Marsh, one of the founders of Marsh Wall Products Company, along with other neighbors in New Philadelphia's East High Avenue neighborhood, who launched the Storybook Lane project.

Founded in 1930 by Alvin and Victor Marsh, Marsh Wall Products Co. was noted for its decorative, functional and durable Marsh Tile for bathrooms and kitchens, which became popular during the Great Depression and following World War II.

The product, with grooves resembling tile, was made of hardboard and finished with a tough scratch and moisture-resistant topcoat melamine coating. This created a high-quality surface that could be colorized and textured.

In 1948 Marsh Wall Products Company became a subsidiary of the Masonite Corporation, the supplier of the hardboard substrate used in the panel's production. Marsh Tile was rebranded to be known as Marlite or Masonite, both locally and nationally, in corporate advertising.

Vic Marsh used Marlite to create 21 original storybook characters beginning in 1955, designed to mimic colorful Christmas department store window displays. Neighbors Herb Bischel, who offered use of his barn, and artist William "Goose" Kniesner,

formerly associated with Walt Disney Studios, joined others to build the Storybook Lane panels in the evenings. The construction became a community event on New Philadelphia's east end with Vic Marsh supervising the work, and his wife, the former Pearl Gladys Snyder, provided refreshments for the crew.

During the 1956 Christmas season, Storybook Lane was launched with lighting for each display, and some displays featured moving animation along the stretch of homes that still line a section of East High Avenue beginning at Beaver Avenue moving eastward.

The event became a success with an estimated 200,000 people viewing Storybook Lane that year, creating traffic jams that would be commonplace in future years.

Storybook Lane on East High Avenue would continue until the early 1970s when the display was discontinued. In 1980 it would be resurrected and moved to New Philadelphia's Tuscora Park to alleviate the earlier traffic tie-ups.

The New Philadelphia Rotary becomes the Storybook Lane caretaker

It was the City of New Philadelphia that assumed the role of managing and storing the Storybook Lane panels after it moved to Tuscora Park. This was successful for a number of years. However, in the 1990s, age and other priorities led the Storybook Lane panels to fall into disrepair.

In 2001 Vic Marsh's daughter, the late Ellie Kirk, joined her husband Brenton Kirk to ask the New Philadelphia Rotary to take on restoration of Storybook Lane as a club project. Ellie Kirk married Brenton in 1948. After attending college, both prior to and after WWII and working with his father at the Belmont Copper Enamel-

ing Plant from 1949-55, Brenton Kirk started working at Marlite in 1956. Thus, he had an appreciation for the history of the Storybook Lane panels and the Marlite material from which they were made. Brenton Kirk also was a 50-year member of the New Philadelphia Rotary.

Through Mark Watson's restoration of the images — along with repairing broken or missing pieces, fixing scratches, filling holes and adding new text panels for the nursery rhymes at Ellie Kirk's suggestion — Storybook Lane was relaunched in Tuscora Park on Dec. 14, 2002.

The work of Mark Watson and others continues to be enjoyed by families and older folks who remembered the original display from decades before.

The New Philadelphia Rotary continues to accept sponsorship donations for the Storybook Lane project. Individuals and businesses may donate as a sponsor for \$300 or as a friend for \$100

Sponsors will receive two lines on one of the character verse boards, and friends will be recognized with a line on one of the friends boards. These donations cover a three-year period and are renewable.







Make sure gifts arrive on time



Reasons to shop small this season

The importance of small businesses to the economy cannot be overstated. Though national chains often garner publicity, local businesses are equally, if not exceedingly, worthy of

Small businesses may be more inclined to hire residents they know and keep hiring centralized to the local area — something that keeps more resources and money in the community.

3. Adaptability and change

Local businesses can move more quickly to respond to economic factors that require change. It also means fresh businesses will come in and replace the old, driving new growth, opportunity and competition that keeps prices competitive.



Toys for Tots collection and distribution now underway

Toys for Tots has begun distributing toys to area families from a warehouse in Sherrodsville. A charity started by the United States Marine Corps after World War II, Toys for Tots delivers new, unwrapped toys as Christmas gifts to families who might otherwise have empty space under the tree.

"We are distributing toys now from the warehouse," said area Toys for Tots coordinator Bob Stratton, a retired marine. "Families can pick up toys Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m."

Stratton said more than 100 families have come to the warehouse for toys so far. Distribution continues through Dec. 20. The warehouse is located at 6034 Dana Road NW in Sherrodsville.

Meanwhile, toys are being collected at locations around the area. Look for merchants with a Toys for Tots sign and you'll find a collection box inside. There are 50 collection boxes available to gather donated toys.

"All of the toys we collect go to area families," Stratton said. "Monetary donations we receive all go to buy toys. Our team is made up of all volunteers, and they're a good crew. It takes a lot of help from a lot of people to do this every year."

It is the reaction of the children, in large part, that keeps Stratton going each year. "The faces of those kids when they get their present—they just light up. That's what makes all the work worth doing."

Stratton began his efforts within his own church more than 30 years ago and has been overseeing the local Toys for Tots annual effort for the past five. His efforts have survived natural disasters, a warehouse fire and a delivery vehicle that had seen better days.

Undaunted, Stratton continues to do the work of getting toys into the hands of children. "Many of those kids might not have any-

thing otherwise," he said.

No application process is necessary to receive a toy. "Any kid who needs a toy is welcome. There is no application necessary," Stratton said.

The U.S. Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots program collects new, unwrapped toys throughout the months of October, November and December and distributes them to less fortunate children during the Christmas holiday sea-

The toys are meant to be a symbol of hope. The program had its official origins in the mid-1990s as an outreach program of the Marine Corps. It was initially founded in response to helping soldiers' families who were hit by defense cutbacks.

The Toys for Tots program has grown since its beginning in 1947 and has delivered more than 620 million toys to 281 million children. The Marine Toys for Tots Foundation raises funds, purchases toys, provides promotional and support materials, manages all funds raised and donated, solicits corporate support,

educates the public, and handles day-to-day operations nationally.

"It seems like every year there are more and more families who need help at Christmastime," Stratton said. "We have seen a lot of families already this year, more than last year and the year before that."

A single New York City restaurant started it all

We take going out to a restaurant for granted. There are places to eat scattered everywhere, all over the world. The way they handle our food and serve us is pretty standard, but it wasn't always so.

There was a single New York City restaurant that started it all, and it's still there today, at least using the same name and updated recipes until running aground on the COVID rocks.

The restaurant is Delmonico's, and I'm pretty sure you've heard of it. It started as a Frenchy pastry shop on William Street in 1837, and we owe many firsts to the place.

Delmonico's was the first such establishment



in America to apply the French word "restaurant" in describing itself. It was the first to hand diners a printed menu from which they could make a selection.

Before Delmonico's, people sat at long, shared tables. They were the first to offer private table seating. They introduced table cloths, the wine list, eggs Benedict and lobster Newburg.

They provided space for large galas, which were usu-

ally held in the ballrooms of the rich. They allowed women to gather in groups unsupervised by men and were the first to hire women as cashiers.

It was and is a fancy place and is mentioned in many novels, autobiographies, movies and television shows. Delmonico's probably was the first restaurant in America at which eating there was a very special occasion.

Delmonico's has not been open continuously since its founding. It passed from the family in the 1920s as Prohibition did its work of killing everything fun. After many changes of hands and reinventions, the place closed "temporarily" in 2020 due to the pandemic and has not reopened. Wikipedia says the landlord has been trying to boot them out.

Perhaps the most famous dish to come out of this famous location is the Delmonico steak, served with equally famous baked potatoes stuffed with, well, other baked potatoes.

There have been so many iterations of the steak dish that even the most recent owners aren't sure what was used in the beginning. Today, it's a 1.5-pound ribeye, meaning you should double date with another sensible couple and get it to share for four.

Delmonico steak is on the menu of many unrelated restaurants in the world, and you'll likely just be served whatever steak they have in the walk-in, prepared however their cook does it.

Now that we are solidly into the holiday season, this may be the special occasion menu you're looking for. I claim authenticity, as the recipes come from the book, "Dining at Delmonico's," which is part cookbook, part history, and put out by the people who operated it at the time of publication in 2008. Choose your own size of steak; you don't need the over 20-ounce monster the recipe calls for.

2 boneless, aged ribeye steaks. Delmonico's specifies 6 weeks aging or longer. Sea salt and freshly ground pepper

3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil.

Herbed butter:

3 fresh bay leaves

1 tablespoon fresh thyme 2 tablespoons sea salt 4 sticks unsalted butter, at room temperature

Make the butter ahead of time. Place the bay leaves, thyme and salt in a spice grinder and grind to a powder. Add this mixture to the butter and mix with a handheld mixer. When combined, place the butter in the center of a sheet of plastic wrap. Bring the nearest side up over the butter and form it into a log with your hands. Wrap it tightly and refrigerate. It will keep as long as butter would.

Preheat a grill, grill pan or cast iron skillet. Pat the steaks dry and season with the salt and pepper on both sides. When the cooking surface is hot, sear the steaks carefully on both sides for a few minutes each. Remove from the heat and brush with the olive oil. Return the steaks to the grill and cook until the desired internal temperature is reached, about 135 F for medium rare. Serve each steak with a knob of the herbed butter.

Leg pains could be sign of heart attack or stroke

Dear Savvy Senior,

I started a walking program a few months ago to help me lose weight, but I've been having problems with my legs and hips hurting during my walk, although they feel better hip, thigh or calf muscles, once I stop. I thought it was just because I'm getting old, but my neighbor was telling me about a leg vein disease she has called PAD and thinks I may have something similar. What can you tell me about this?

Limping Linda Dear Linda,

The health condition your neighbor is telling you about is known as peripheral arterial disease, which is an under-the-radar disease that affects approximately 8-12 million Americans.

It happens when the arteries that carry blood to the legs and feet become narrowed or clogged over the years with fatty deposits or plaque, causing poor circulation.

But you also need to be aware that because PAD is a systemic disease, people who have it also are much more likely to have clogged arteries in other areas of the body like the heart, neck and brain, which greatly increases the risks of heart attack or stroke.

Few symptoms

Unfortunately, PAD goes undiagnosed and untreated way too often because most people who have it experience few, if any symptoms. The most common symptom, however, is similar to what you're experiencing: pain and cramping in the

especially when walking or exercising but usually disappears after resting for a few minutes.

Another reason PAD is under-diagnosed is because many people assume aches and pains go along with aging and simply live with it instead of reporting it to their doctor.

Other possible symptoms to be aware of include leg numbness or weakness, coldness or skin-color changes in the lower legs and feet, or ulcers or sores on the legs or feet that don't heal.

Are you at risk?

Like most other health conditions, the risk of developing PAD increases with age. Those most vulnerable are people over the age of 50 who smoke or used to smoke, have elevated cholesterol, high blood pressure, diabetes, are overweight, or have a family

history of PAD, heart attack or stroke. African Americans also are twice as likely to have PAD as Caucasians.

If you're experiencing any symptoms or if you're at increased risk of PAD, vou need to be tested by your doctor or a vascular specialist. He or she will probably perform a quick and painless ankle-brachial index test, which is done by measuring your blood

pressure in your ankle and your arm and comparing the two numbers. Your doctor also may do imaging tests such as ultrasound, magnetic resonance angiography and computed tomographic angiography.

With early detection, many cases of PAD can be treated with lifestyle modifications including an improved diet, increased physical activity and smoking cessation.

If lifestyle changes aren't enough, your doctor may prescribe medicine to prevent blood clots, lower blood pressure and cholesterol, and control pain and other symptoms. And for severe PAD, the treatment options are angioplasty inflating a tiny balloon in the artery to restore blood flow and then removed the insertion of a stent to

reopen the artery or a graft bypass to reroute blood around the blockage.
