Inaugural CERT class ready, willing to help

In times of crisis and emergencies, having a wellprepared and coordinated response team is crucial for the safety and well-being of a community. Helping that effort is Community Emergency Response Team. CERT is a program that trains volunteers to become an essential part of the emergency response system.

CERT teams are comprised of everyday individuals passionate about making a difference and ensuring the resilience of their neighborhood. The concept was born out of the recognition that during a major disaster, first responders might be overwhelmed by the sheer scale of the situation. By having trained community members ready to assist, the burden on emergency services is lightened, and critical help can be promptly provided to those in need.

According to local CERT founder, retired Wayne County Sheriff's Office Capt. Doug Hunter, the training is rigorous because the volunteers may be called into action at any

sheriff's office," Hunter issues while full-time first said. "It took a while to get the moving parts into place."

According to Hunter, volunteers must pass a 12-hour online course administered by the University of Utah before participating in the hands-on ortion of the training. Hunter recommends even private individuals take the training. He said you never know when you might be the first responder.

In addition to possibly saving a life someday, volunteers play a critical role in emergency response by taking care of minor responders focus on critical

"There is a shortage of first responders right now; being involved with CERT allows me to help the community in situations where first responders are needed," Alex Angus of Green Fox Plastics said. "My role would be to help free them up so they can respond to more severe needs.

Angus also plans to put his CERT training to use at his job if the need arises.

"We work with heavy machinery, so (accidents) could be an issue," he said about his training. "This training is very valuable; it is a little different from what you read in the book when you perform some handson tasks. For example, the book doesn't tell vou to be prepared for the recoil from the fire extinguisher, but now that is committed to memory.

The Wayne County Sheriff's Office is poised to benefit from the all-volunteer squad.

"This will help take a large load off our backs," Sheriff Travis Hutchinson said. "They are receiving training in every aspect of an emergency situation and can help with things like traffic control and medical care at the scenes. They will be a big asset to the community.

Ready, willing and able

"The people taking part in this training become familiar with our policy, procedures and structure, Hutchinson said. "Some are veterans, some are amateur radio operators. and they are very familiar with the hierarchy. I am very proud, and it is an honor to work with them. There are not a lot of people who volunteer anymore to help the community."

Ballet Wooster's 'Nutcracker' returns to enchant audiences

On Dec. 9 and 10, a biennial holiday tradition will return to Wayne County as Ballet Wooster will present "The Nutcracker."

This year the production will be held at the OARDC's Fisher Auditorium and will include three shows: Dec. 9 at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. and Dec. 10 at 2 p.m.

The story for "The Nutcracker" ballet was adapted from a book written by E.T.A. Hoffman called "The Nutcracker and the Mouse King." Pyotr Tchaikovsky composed the score for the ballet, with the first production taking place in December 1892 in Russia. The story is about a young girl named Clara who receives a nutcracker for Christmas. The nutcracker comes to life as a prince, and after Prince battles with the Mouse Queen, Prince and Clara travel to the Land of Sweets, where the Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy takes place.

Because the ballet takes place on Christmas Eve and made its debut in December, "The Nutcracker" has become synonymous with the Christmas holiday season and often is a family tradition to attend the ballet to celebrate the season. Ballet Wooster's production of "The Nutcracker" includes 95 dancers who study ballet at the studio and who range in age from 5-18.

The four most senior dancers at Ballet Wooster hold key roles within the production. This year Clara is played by Brianna Lengyel, who is a junior at Norwayne High School. Lengyel said she enjoys dancing in "The Nutcracker."

"My favorite part is how much opportunity there is to grow as a dancer and as a person," she said.

The Mouse Queen is portrayed by Annie McLain, who has been dancing for 13 years and is a homeschooled senior. "I enjoy performing on stage and watching everyone's hard work to create something beautiful," she said.

Ryleigh Perrine, a junior at Wooster High School, plays the Chinese lead in the Land of Sweets. She said she enjoys dancing with her friends as part of "The Nutcracker" cast.

Nadia Franks is a junior at Wooster High School who dances several roles in the show including the Snow Queen and the Arabian lead. "The best part of 'The Nutcracker' is getting a chance to dance with my friends," she said. "The whole show is just amazing."

The cast also includes guest artist Tim Pritchard as Nutcracker Prince and a few community members including Max Miyashita, a senior at Orrville High School, who plays Herr Drosselmyer, the magician, toymaker and godfather to Clara who gives her the gift of the nutcracker.

For Artistic Director Zelie McLain, directing, choreographing and planning "The Nutcracker" takes her back to when she danced in "The Nutcracker" ballet. McLain is originally from Wayne County and spent her youth dancing ballet. Over the course of her years as a dancer, she played the Mouse Queen, just like her younger sister Annie McLain, who plays that role this year.

"My last 'Nutcracker' that I danced was in 2014," Zelie McLain said. "I performed in six different 'Nutcracker' ballets and have had 12 different roles across those six productions."

McLain has been teaching at Ballet Wooster for several years and became artistic director in 2022.

In addition to McLain, the teaching faculty at Ballet Wooster, located at 5246 Cleveland Road, Suite E, Wooster, includes veteran teacher and former co-artistic director Brenda Schwinn, who is now emeritus artistic director, as well as instructor Samantha Servais Canfield, who plays Mrs. Stahlbaum in the production. Evelyn Pritchard, another instructor at the studio, has a connection

to the production and not just as a teacher. Her son Tim plays Nutcracker Prince.

Ballet Wooster is a nonprofit, noncompetitive ballet school and youth company. The studio offers classes in ballet, tap, jazz and creative movement to students ranging in age from 18 months to adult. Ballet Wooster also is a preprofessional company for intermediate and advanced dancers. Dance levels are determined by faculty evaluations each year.

Company dancers attend ballet classes two to three times weekly, increasing in frequency and duration as their level increases. In addition to Ballet Wooster's biennial production of "The Nutcrack-

er," the studio also puts on a spring ballet production each year. Last spring Ballet Wooster presented "Cinderella." This year's spring production will be announced after the holidays. The studio's spring classes will begin in January.

Tickets also will be available at the door, but it is advised not to wait as tickets are selling quickly. Ballet Wooster's 2021 "Nutcracker" had three completely sold out shows, so it is best to purchase ahead instead of waiting to try and purchase at the door.

Village Network cuts ribbon on Residential Treatment Center

The Village Network recently held a ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the opening of its new Residential Treatment Center on its Wooster residential

The Village Network employees, donors and community members were invited to share the excitement of the new facility. The Residential Treatment Center is a 16-bed, seven-bath, 13,716-squarefoot facility that is fully self-contained with all the services needed for clients contained within it.

This includes three sensory integration rooms, two education spaces, a full kitchen and dining space, a dedicated intake area with a medical exam room, three activity spaces, two therapy and visitation rooms, and a gym and staff offices. Outside, the facility has three outdoor play areas with basketball, swings, green space, and parking for staff and visitors.

The building will help youth who are facing serious psychological and behavioral issues and who require intensive treatment in a short-term residential setting including individual, group and family therapy; psychiatric treatment; rates among teens have

nursing care; and expressive therapies. It also will provide education through onsite schooling or tutoring, encouraging children to learn daily skills and thrive in a healthy social setting.

Not only in Ohio but across the country, there is a crisis in child welfare and children's mental health. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, mental health disorders are surging among adolescents. In recent years the number of teens reported having a major depressive episode has increased by 60%. Similarly, suicide

jumped by nearly 60%. The child welfare and mental health systems are overwhelmed.

Across the state there are stories of children suffering from mental illness having to spend days in emergency rooms or children's services offices. The Village Network, in fulfilling its mission, is partnering with local and state officials to be a part of the solution.

"At The Village Network, we are resolutely pursuing our mission and collaborating with local and state authorities to combat this crisis effectively," said Rich Graziano, president

and CEO of The Village Network.

Many of the children who will be served in this new program will be experiencing developmental trauma, which is trauma that begins at a very young age while the child's brain is still developing and which is perpetrated by someone the child is living with. Conare becoming adolescents with minimal capacity to self-regulate, control their impulses, delay gratification, manage their emotions and even be in safe, trusting relationships. They are easily overwhelmed, sometimes by the most routine tasks and interventions.

In response to this, The Village Network has adopted clinical models that help these children develop the capacity to self-regulate, control their impulses, selfsoothe and manage their emotions: the Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics and the Collaborative Problem Solving Approach.

"In Ohio and across the United States, there is an alarming rise in mental health issues among children. Sadly, approximately 140 young people with complex behavioral health requirements in Ohio alone are currently placed in outof-state treatment facilities," Graziano said. "To

sequently, these children address this issue, we are constructing a unique facility in Wayne and Holmes counties that will offer round-the-clock psychiatric care. This will be the first of its kind in the area, and we hope it will positively impact the community."





Not listed among Orrville's three dozen wrestlers is Jack Waldron, who won the 175-pound championship at the PAC-7 tourney a year ago.

Junior Seth Kinser (third) and sophomore Landon Grimes, seniors Conner Chereson and Drew Caskey, and junior Brahm Hostetler (all fourth) were conference placers last season. They return along with senior Skyler Veemara; juniors Brenden Betts, Tyler Farrell and Vincent Parego; and sophomores Jaycee Bailey, Caleb Carter, Connor Endley, Cameron Gillis, Lincoln Klutz, Caden Race and Bronson Rogers.






helps ensure Amish and Plain church patients are able to receive care offered through Ohio's Hospice LifeCare.

Now's the time to quit smoking, vaping

ma. Each year in the United States, 41,000 adults die from lung cancer and heart disease caused by secondhand smoke exposure.

In 2006 the Ohio Smoke Free Workplace Act was enacted to protect individuals from exposure to cigarette smoke inside public places and places of work. This ensured employees and other community members experienced less exposure to secondhand smoke. In the years since this went into effect, e-cigarettes have risen in popularity, once potential exposure.

In Ohio approximately 6% of adults, 12% of middle school students and 29% of high school students use e-cigarettes. An e-cigarette's aerosol is not a harmless water vapor, as it holds many of the same cancercausing chemicals cigarette smoke has, as well as other heavy metals and toxins. Like cigarette smoke, exposure to e-cigarette aerosol may increase your risk of health harms.

In 2021 the Ohio Smoke Free Workplace Act was expanded to include e-cigarettes, requiring current e-cigarette users to also go outside to smoke. While the act was expanded with the intention of fully protecting the community from the harms of smoking and vaping, smoke-free policies also often result in reduced tobacco use, increased smoking cessation and decreased youth initiation.

If you smoke cigarettes

again increasing the rates of or vape, you are exposing yourself and potentially others to health risks. Quitting is the best way to protect not only yourself, but also those around you. It's never too late to quit smoking. Your Medicare plan may cover up to two cessation attempts per year — up to eight visits with your primary care provider — at no cost to you. 

When mines are abandoned, roof-support timbers and other mine structures can deteriorate over time, increasing the risk of collapse.

Wayne County is unassuming on the surface, with its rolling hills, charming towns and tranquil landscapes; however, in some areas, underneath this picturesque exterior lies a hidden danger many residents may not even be aware of — abandoned mines.

These mines, a remnant of Ohio's rich history, may threaten the safety of some landowners.

Over time sinkholes may form on the surface and wreak havoc on homes

products available at

or other structures located above the empty mine. Many of these mine locations in Wayne County are known, and most are concentrated in Chippewa and Sugar Creek townships. However, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources website, several thousand may exist that are unknown.

Ohio has a long and storied history of coal mining, with countless mines dotting the landscape. Over the years the coal industry declined, and many of these mines were hastily aban-

doned. Often concealed beneath residential areas, these forgotten mines pose significant risks to homes and communities.

Recognizing the importance of addressing these risks, Ohio has implemented regulations and guidelines to mitigate the dangers of abandoned mines. One of those measures is the Mine Subsidence Insurance Coverage program.



Wayne County administrator Patrick Herron said. "Although it is optional, it would be a good idea for landowners to spend some time researching their property to see if they are situated above an aban-

getting coverage."

Property damage coverage typically provides financial protection if various factors including mine subsidence, collapse or other related issues cause damage to the owners' property. This coverage can help cover the costs of repairing or replacing doned mine and consider damaged structures, foundations, utilities and other property elements affected by the abandoned mine.

Abandoned mines have been located in nearly half of Ohio's 88 counties. The first commercial extraction of coal was recorded in 1800, but many mines existed prior to mining reporting laws being enacted.

Other types of mines

include clay, limestone, salt, shale, gypsum, iron ore and sandstone.



Dalton fulfills goal of reaching championship game

A few thoughts from the week in sports ...

The ride of a lifetime for the 13-1 Dalton football team has one final stop: the Division VII state championship game against topranked Marion Local (15-0) at Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium in Canton on Saturday.

Seventh-year Dalton coach Broc Dial used one word to describe how his team became the first in school history and just the fourth in Wayne County to reach a title game: "Expectations."

"We've had teams in the regional finals twice before this — in 2017 and 2021 — and it raised the expectations for the program," Dial said. "The kids have really embraced that.

"Our community has always been really good about backing our football program. We've had some really good teams in the past, two coaches in the (Ohio High School Football health.



Coaches Association and Wayne County Sports) Hall of Fame (Billie J. McFarren and Bob Ramsay). We reported (to training camp) this year to make a run and be in this position."

Dalton joins Orrville (1983, 1985, 1994, 1998, 2018), Norwayne (2011) and Smithville (2002) as the only Wayne County schools to play for a state football title. The Red Riders' 1998 and 2018 teams and the 2011 Bobcats won championships.

For a mid-sized or small public school to reach a state championship game, it takes several factors working together. Obviously, a team needs a great deal of talent and chemistry, along with good coaches and good

A little bit of luck also can go a long way - on and off the field, a bounce of the football here or a fortuitous enrollment count there. There have been some pretty good Wayne County teams that had the misfortune of having a state powerhouse in their region or a private school loaded with Div. I college recruits.

Dalton got a break last May when the OHSAA announced the Bulldogs would drop to Div. VII and away from Div. VI regional juggernaut Kirtland.

As soon as the 2023 regional assignments were released, many of us who follow high school football closely commented that a Dalton team loaded with returnees could make a serious run to the state title game.

That's exactly what happened. The Bulldogs have won 13 straight after a season-opening, 14-7 loss to the aforementioned Hornets (14-1), who will meet Ver-

VI title game on Friday at 10:30 a.m.

Dalton caught the attention last year of Marion Local coach Tim Goodwin, whose Flyers will enter the title game with 47 straight wins, back-to-back titles and shooting for a record 14th championship.

"Dalton moved the ball more against Kirtland (in a 33-0 playoff loss) last year than anyone else we had on film," Goodwin said. "Then they had a strong opener against Kirtland in a 14-7 game and were throwing the ball on them. They have good kids doing some highlevel stuff, so it's gonna be a challenge."

Dalton will certainly be a big underdog against the Flyers, but the Bulldogs' depth is the biggest reason for optimism. Following Dalton this season, it's been really impressive to see how many playmakers they have on both sides of the ball and the team-first attitude.

Senior running back Greyson Siders was the Div. VII Associated Press Northeast Inland District Offensive Player of the Year and led the Dalton offense into the title game. The 5-foot-11, 190-pound player had 1,875 yards rushing and 29 TDs on 111 carries while also catching 17 passes for 217 yards and two scores.

Fellow first-team alldistrict running back Sammy Tomlinson carried the ball 111 times for 934 yards and 18 TDs, includ-

sailles (13-2) in the Div. ing three scores in a 55-7 rout of Caldwell in the state semifinals.

Quarterback Colin Pearson was 106 for 166 passing for 1,734 yards, 18 TDs and just five interceptions while carrying the ball 56 times for 240 yards and one score. Brady Hignight led a balanced receiving corps with 28 catches for 428 yards and three TDs.

Jaxon Ryder, Coy Wenger and Cade Mullet also have stepped up at times as playmakers.

"We've been fortunate to have some good talent, a lot of kids that can handle the ball and do things with it," Dial said. "That's something we try to do every year and really develop."

Grayson Lehman (6-foot-4, 285) and Collin Jones (6-0, 225) are senior two-way starters who provide leadership and muscle up front while junior linebacker Alex Hess (teamhigh 82 tackles) and senior defensive back Mullet (eight interceptions) also earned first-team all-district

Dial and his coaching staff also deserve a lot of credit for molding talented teams year after year. The Bulldogs' 39-year-old head coach has a 69-17 record at the helm, good for an outstanding .802 winning percentage. Dial appreciates reaching this milestone as much as any coach after growing up accompanying his dad, the late Gary Dial, to championship games as

"Personally, it's a great opportunity," Dial said. "My dad was a longtime assistant and had been a head football coach for seven years. He was in the finals a couple times as an assistant coach.

"I remember going back and forth every year between Massillon and Fawcett Stadium when they rotated the championship games. I have great memories of going to a lot of those games with my dad in the past.'

For coaches and players alike on Dalton's team, even when they're much older, they'll still be remembered for being part of a state finals team. It will, of course, be infinitely sweeter if the Bulldogs can pull off the upset and call themselves champions.

"The key for us is just to handle the week and handle what we need to do to be successful," Dial said. "(Marion Local's tradition and status as the favorite) are things that we can't control. We need to focus on what we can control, which is preparing and playing our best on Saturday.

Parting shots

There have been a lot of great weekends for the Ohio State and Cleveland Browns football teams. Last weekend was one of the worst.

The Buckeyes' 30-24 loss at Michigan really hurt, but I don't think coach Ryan Day should be fired. Day is still 56-7, even though three of those losses are against the Wolverines. The grass isn't always greener. I'd vote to give Day one more year — a last chance for him to realize he needs to coach more creatively in "The Game."

-The Browns were beat up on the scoreboard and on the field in a 29-12 beatdown in Denver while suffering another rash of key injuries. The FOX TV cameras kept showing newly acquired quarterback Joe Flacco watching on the sidelines in street clothes. I kept wondering if Flacco thought, "Why did I come back?"

In memory of Benny, who is gone but not forgotten

I've owned only four cars in my life, and there won't be another.

The last one was hauled away on a dreary November morning and is probably now just a crushed cube of metal in some awful land-

I should have done more to save Benny — that was his name — but there just wasn't enough time, and now he's gone and I feel so sad.

Like so much that's happened lately, surrendering Benny felt like an inevitable final act in a tragedy, sort of like Hamlet being poisoned or the Titanic sinking in the icy North Atlantic waters.

Benny only had about 180,000 miles on his odometer, which made him middle-aged for a 1991 Honda Civic, but he hadn't run since summer 2012 after I'd spent a considerable sum to get him the repairs he needed. That was an expense I couldn't repeat these days since working a part-time job doesn't generate a great deal of discretionary income. I could have tried harder to fix him, but you've heard the expression about throwing good money after bad.

So that's that.

A car has always represented personal independence, a peculiarly American sense of having one's future under control, a fierce unwillingness to allow others to hold the keys to a better tomorrow.

As I mentioned, Benny was the last entry on a very short list that began with a 1969 Chevy Impala, which came into my possession during my senior year in college. My Aunt Clem-

mie — the most generous and thoughtful of all my relatives — signed the Gold Goose over to me in a \$1 title transfer transaction.

"You can't be riding that bike of yours in the winter," she said, and being a native of South Bend, she knew what she was talking about. "Just let me do this for you. It'll make me feel a whole lot better.'

That was the kind of woman my aunt was, always looking out for someone else, and I was beyond fortunate to have her on my side.

That gold Impala, with a righteous 327 engine under the hood, served me well during winter 1976-77, one that saw South Bend's alltime snowfall record get

Notre Dame, for the first time in her history — dating back to pre-Civil War days - closed and canceled all classes, and it wasn't just the days and days of snow that caused the decision to shut down

There also was the matter of sub-freezing temperatures including a spate of zero and under days that made all travel quite hazardous. I was living off campus that winter in a rental house shared by five (or six, depending) guys, a house that had a very balky gas furnace.

It, of course, failed miserably, so we called the landlord, who said, in effect, that we college boys could afford a nice hotel suite, so we had just better pack up some clothes and get out while we could.

That was my introduction to the mindset of those in the landlord class, a species of human beings closely mirrored by gulag

I exaggerate, but you get much I didn't want to go the picture.

I killed the Gold Goose a few years later when, after sleeping for a few hours on my office floor, I fell asleep at the wheel while driving to cover a baseball game 50 miles to the east. Luckily, no one was hurt, including my best friend who, with his left arm in a cast, tried to steer the car as it careened across three lanes of traffic.

So I bought a metallic blue 1973 Buick Centurian that encountered so many mechanical problems I hadn't even paid it off before it died on me as I made my way to get a needed haircut.

That was in what I liked to call "In Cold Blood" country, a remote expanse of rural nothingness reminiscent of the Clutter home-

By then I'd been seeing a woman for several years, an older and smarter person than me, and it was her opinion that, no matter how

"Get something sporty," she said, "something that goes real fast."

I should have been more vigilant with the servicing of the car since it didn't even make 100,000 miles and kept stranding me in places I never wanted to be.

And that brings us back to Benny, the best (and last) car I'll ever own. He was as stripped-down and basic a ride as I could find, listing for just over nine grand in fall 1991, a time when the dealership was eager to liquidate before the new models arrived.

A short list of things he didn't have would include power windows, power steering, air-conditioning, air bags and a CD player, though there was a spare tire and a jack I never figured out how to use.

Benny got me everywhere I wanted to go including North Carolina after I left home in late 2000, not knowing what my future held but sure in the knowledge I had a dependable car.

And now he's gone. The tow truck driver and I had to push him out of the garage, out to the street, where I watched as Benny got hooked up and taken away, one of the saddest days of my life, the kind that makes you wish you'd done more and failed less. I've been nothing but depressed since I saw him disappear around the curve in the road, realizing that from now on, I'm on my own.

Bountiful acorns, late-season greens a great start to winter

November and the green pulse of my garden have slowly spiraled down to a halt. Whatever life it was still capable of living has

now been extinguished.

Having gone light this year on the collards, my typical cold-season champion, I was left with a spread

I'd plucked each of


of salad greens I'd limped along all the way up to a hard, post-Thanksgiving cold snap. It had been a labor of love that found me covering the shiny green chard and tender secondcrop lettuce plants each night with a pair of plastic kiddie pools.

the 4-foot-diameter splash pools from the curbside on trash nights over the course of the summer, envisioning them more as doggy bathtubs than surrogate greenhouses, but necessity is the mother of invention. As I'd struggled to drape a tarp over the delicate plants as a clearing October sky threatened the first frost, I spotted the nested pair of pools leaning against the fence and a brainstorm ensued. As a consequence we've eaten fresh greens right into the holiday season. I'll be watching the curb for more little plastic greenhouses



Gratefully, the same chill that drains the life from the garden also does a number on the bugs as well. The outdoors are apt to be a mosquito-free paradise for the next couple of months, and I can confidently bomb down hills on my bicycle without risking an insect to the eye for at least a bit. Better news still is that even though most ticks will survive the winter by either lying dormant in the forest duff or finding shelter in the fur of a warmblooded host, their activity is greatly diminished below 35 F. Be vigilant as always, but you're likely to find fewer of the savage bloodsuckers out and about right now.

I'm not sure of an official word on all available foodstuffs for wildlife over the winter, but the Ohio Division of Wildlife's annual Acorn Survey held some promising news. In the Eastern U.S., few plant species approach the positive impact of oak trees on their native environment,



While the fruit of the crabapple tree is every bit as edible as that of its close relative the apple tree, you might find yourself puckered up a bit at the tart finish. The small size and persistence - or tendency for the tree to hold onto fruit throughout the winter - make the crabapple a favorite choice for overwintering or early returning migratory birds along with other wintering wildlife.

and the DOW looks upon the survey as a key indicator in predicting favorable conditions for overwintering wildlife.

Acorn production in white oaks was up slightly from last year, and that of red oaks was up an impressive 16% from the previous year to match the long-term average. That's great news for a huge number of wildlife species that depend at least in part on the availability of acorns to make it through the winter months. Squirrel, deer, wild turkey and a whole host of other species, 90 in all, will benefit from the bumper crop.

Anecdotally, I've observed strong stands of berries, seeds, nuts and crab apples in the woods and fields this year. As long as extended snow cover doesn't prevent the foragers from finding their food, there should be plenty for everyone throughout the winter. Here's to a prosperous and kind season for wildlife!
