Wayne County recorder addresses title fraud

Can a home be stolen right out from under its owner? The answer is yes.

Should homeowners be concerned? Wayne County recorder Jane Carmichael said everyone including homeowners should stay vigilant and learn about the latest fraud schemes to help protect their assets. If something does not sound, look or feel right, investigate it.

"The recorder's office has had many inquiries about title fraud or if someone could obtain the title of your property and change ownership," Carmichael said. "There are so many scams out there, so my answer would be yes, it could. I believe that family members taking away property from a relative would be more common.'

In 2008 the Federal Bureau of Investigation reported a real estate business owner in Los Angeles pled guilty to leading a

scam that defrauded more than 100 homeowners and lenders out of approximately \$12 million. Since then the number of real estate scams has risen.

According to the FBI, there are a few variations to the swindle. However, they boil down to a fraudster ultimately stealing the homeowner's identity, transferring the property's deed using fake ID cards, forging signatures and filing paperwork with the proper authorities. A homeowner may continue paying the mortgage and living in the house only to find out later they no longer own the

Another type of scam involves homeowners who are struggling to pay their mortgages, according to the FBI. A crook promises to refinance the mortgage, but instead, they buy the house using a false identity. The homeowner loses the house, and the bank loses

The good news is that according to the FBI, because the paperwork is fraudulent, the house does not legally belong to the swindler

Office are public, but they are not online right now, she said. "But they will be in the future."

Carmichael offered the following tips and advice to help avoid being the victim of title theft:

-People most preyed upon include the elderly and those with more than one piece of property.

-Do not give out any personal information, do not sign anything you do not understand, do not sign anything from a stranger and question any mail regarding your property you are unsure about.

-Make sure you receive bills at your address, especially tax bills.

Watch for identity theft and check credit reports.

-Many people would have to be in on the scam: banks, notaries, appraisers, title companies, et cetera.

BMP Field Day is a full-day event to learn more about phosphorus usage, the environment and strategies to save on fertilizer.

BMP Field Day will be held in person on March 29 at the Secrest Welcome Center at the Ohio Agricultural Research & Development Center in Wooster. Sign-in will start at 8 a.m.,

Nutrient runoff and and the event will start at scientists with expertise 8:30 a.m. and end at 4 p.m.

This event is provided free for farmers, students and community members because of sponsorship from the USDA NIFA, and it is co-hosted by Virginia Tech and the Ohio State University. 


products. "We are solutions providers," Habeger said. Their goal is to accommodate service calls in a day or two. That is one key factor that sets Wayne apart from others in the industry.

Brett Hiner, Drama Club advisor/director, will be the first to tell you he has only read one of the Harry Potter books — a shock to many because people assume all English teachers have read the popular young adult series.

But that did not stop him from landing on the play, "Puffs or Seven Increasingly Eventful Years at a Certain School of Magic and Magic," for the Wooster High School Drama Club's spring produc-

The show will be produced March 24-25 at 7 p.m. and March 26 at 2 p.m. in the Wooster High School Performing Arts Center, all in conjunction with the Wooster City School's Fine Arts Festival.

"Ugh, I am judged all the time by students and colleagues because of my lack of Potter readings," Hiner said. "But what appealed to me regarding this show is the perspective/point of view; it is the story of another house of students, the 'Puffs,' who were not cool enough to be in Harry's circle when Harry was there but still faced all the challenges he did. They are the outcasts at a school for outcasts, and underdog stories always allow for wonderful theater."

"Puffs or Seven Increasingly Eventful Years at a Certain School of Magic and Magic" tells the story of a different trio of students — Wayne Hopkins, played by senior Ethan Keating; Oliver Rivers, played by senior Ishaan Gireesh: and Megan Jones, played by senior Hayley Sleek — as they journey through their own struggles and triumphs at magic

and insurmountable wizarding tasks are all par for the course in the play, but also the much more relatable teenage issues like peer pressure, the struggles of fitting in and tackling school dances provide for some of the truly hysterical moments in the

"This play is a little different than anything we have done before," said Kristi Hiner, assistant director. "There are a lot of belly laughs, and our students do such a wonderful job of conveying that hilarity, but the play itself is one connected piece. Matt Cox, the playwright, had to get through seven years of wizarding school quickly, so a lot of the show's progression is conveyed in character movement, not set/scene shifts or character entrances/exits like traditional shows. It is a challenge, but one the students have certainly accepted."

The cast agrees.

Senior and second-year member Olivia Hiner said, "It is a play with constant movement; there is no downtime, and that has really forced us to rely on each other. It is a reminder that friendships are so, so important — in character and out."

These challenges also allow for some wonderful moments to peak through.

'I think the audience will leave the theater assured that everyone has a story to tell, that sometimes we get lost in another's story, but 'Puffs' is a reminder that everyone is important and unique in their own way," said senior Stella Powers, who portrays the show's narrator.

The cast and production team said one does not have to be a Harry Potter expert to enjoy the show.

Board accepts resignation of Held, then rehires him

The board of directors of the Stark-Tuscarawas-Wayne Joint Solid Waste Management District passed a resolution to accept the retirement resignation, effective June 1, of David Held, executive director, during the Friday morning meeting.

The board then voted to offer him the same job, effective Aug. 1, at the same annual salary of \$111,844. Held has been executive director since 2004.

Held said resigning will make him eligible for Ohio Public Employee Retirement benefits. He must take a mandatory break in service for 60 days to avoid any penalties or other forfeitures.

Held said he decided to resign to explore his financial situation.

"I don't want to abandon the district and want to continue to train individuals and work hard to improve the process," Held said. "When you are working at a place like this for 19 years, you know when people leave and you have a small organization it can be devastating to the people that are left."

That was the reason behind his decision to return to the position on Aug. 1, after a 60-day hiatus.

Erica Wright, finance director, told the board the main savings would be Held would not receive his wages and benefits during his hiatus.

The board of directors consists of nine commissioners, three from each county.

Most of the commissioners spoke in favor and supported Held's decision to retire and then be rehired. Tuscarawas County commissioner Chris Abbuhl cast the lone no vote on the resolu-

Abbuhl said after the meeting, he was glad to have Held back on the job.

"I am glad he is staying. He does a fantastic job, has a good work ethic and great communication skills. He has built a great team in the district. My decision has absolutely nothing to do with his job performance, but it has just been a philosophical rational of mine that I am just not supportive of retire and rehire," Abbuhl said.

Other action

The board did the following:

—Approved \$5,110 for four damaged or missing gas probes to be repaired or replaced at the Newcomerstown Landfill. The district paid \$1.4 million for the landfill cap, which closed in 2006. In 2018 the OEPA required assessment and an updated compliance plan due to the explosive gas monitoring probe level exceeding acceptable limits.

—Approved the open dump, litter law enforcement budget plan for \$285,000. Each of the three counties will receive \$95,000 for their sheriff litter control deputy.

—Heard the outreach program's plan initiatives are outreach priority, e-newsletter, virtual engagement and special programs. The district's

focus is to inform residents about contamination and illegal dumping, promoting quality over quantity.

-Agreed to explore the **Drug Enforcement Agency** if they will be willing to incinerate drugs collected at drop-off boxes and those collected at the DEA collection events.

-Agreed to assist communities with dropoff sites that want to make site improvements beyond what can be funded through the district. They will be encouraged to apply directly to the OEPA.

-Gave approval to the 2023 yard waste collection total grant award for





COW's Hoover selected for NCAA Postgrad Scholarship

The College of Wooster's Isabelle Hoover is the latest Fighting Scot to be selected for the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship. The Fighting Scots' distance ace, who is the first Wooster cross country student-athlete to win the scholarship, was among the 21 female fall sports student-athletes chosen for the one-time, nonrenewable \$10,000 award.

"It is an incredible honor to receive this scholarship from the NCAA," Hoover said. "I am thoroughly indebted to the efforts of Dr. (Shelley) Judge, who aided in my nomination and the completion of my application, as well as to Dr. (Kara) Morrow and Dr. (Monica) Florence, who generously wrote me letters of recommendation. I am also extremely thankful for the support of coach (Dennis) Rice, with whom I have worked both on and off the track and cross country course for the past five years, and coach (Ellie) Jindra, whom I have loved getting to know these last few years.

"Finally, I would like to thank my family and teammates for their steadfast love and encouragement. This honor would certainly have been impossible without the help, sacrifices and guidance of those I mentioned."

In cross country Hoover repeated as a first-team All-NCAC performer this fall, finishing fourth at the NCAC Cross Country Championships. She was an all-region harrier at the 2019 NCAA Div. III Great Lakes Regional Championships, earned two All-Ohio awards in cross country and was a five-time NCAC Athlete of the Week.

Hoover's distinguished track and field portfolio is headlined by 2022 NCAC Indoor Track & Field Distance Athlete of the Year honors. She helped the Scots to a runner-up team finish at the 2022 NCAC Indoor Track & Field Championships, which marked the program's highest finish since 1997. Hoover swept the 3,000 (10:32.11)

and 5,000 meters (17:47.61) titles at the 2022 indoor meet, and she is a four-time conference champion and is the two-time reigning 10,000 meters outdoor champion.

Hoover has six All-NCAC and one All-Ohio honors in track and field and is a five-time NCAC Athlete of the Week for middle-distance and distance events.

Elsewhere, the art history and classical languages major was voted to the College Sports Communicators Academic All-District Team for the 2021-22 academic year, is a five-time U.S. Track & Field and Cross

Country Coaches Associa-

tion All-Academic qualifier,

and is a three-time member

of the NCAC Academic

Honor Roll.

The researcher's paper titled "Homer's Song of Sympathy: Andromache and Her Portrayal in the Iliad" was selected for the Eta Sigma Phi Convention in 2021 and was published in University of Chicago's Animus Classics Journal. She also had papers selected for the Eta Sigma Phi Undergraduate Research Conference and the Ohio Classical Conference.

Hoover spent last summer as an intern in the registrar's office at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. She helped with the filing and archiving of insurance paperwork, shipping paperwork, condition reports and other legal documents. Other key duties of Hoover's internship included budgeting, planning, installation and deinstallation of special exhibitions and uploading information into systems for the museum.

Hoover also held a summer-long internship with the Toledo Museum of Art, where she helped with a full collection inventory, implemented a new barcoding system and digitized museum files.

On campus Hoover is a peer tutor, working with Greek and Latin courses. She previously served as a research assistant, departmental assistant and teaching assistant within the classical studies department; was a research assistant to an art history professor; was a health coach in the community with the college's Wooster Community Care Network; and was a violinist with the Wooster Symphony Orchestra. She has been a member of Eta Sigma Phi since 2019, holding officer positions for two academic

Hoover is planning to pursue a Master of Philosophy in Art History and Architecture at the University of Cambridge.

Wooster now has 27 alltime NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients, with 14 of them coming in the last 10 academic years.



Snowbarger resigns as Wooster boys basketball coach

Michael Snowbarger has been doing a juggling act for 18 years, trying to balance his time between family, work and coaching.

With life busier than ever, Snowbarger decided something had to give. He alerted Wooster athletic director Alex Mallue that he was stepping down as the Generals' head boys basketball coach on Thursday.

Snowbarger compiled an outstanding 116-63 record in eight seasons at Wooster and, counting his time at Smithville, won more than 200 career games. His Generals teams won three Ohio Cardinal Conference titles.

'Coaching is tough and it's a year-round thing that takes up a lot of time," said Snowbarger, who's the e-commerce manager for Goodyear. "It takes a lot of time away from family. Not being a teacher, I work 45 minutes away in Akron so there's a lot of challenges with it.

"After coaching the last eight years at Wooster and 18 overall, it's just one of those things where I'd like to sit back and watch my kids play, get involved with different things. I want to have more flexibility and freedom, while still maintaining a professional work

The Generals won outright OCC championships in 2016-17, 2019-20 and 2020-21, but slipped to 12-11 in 2021-22 and 9-12 this season.

Mallue said he was initially surprised by Snowbarger's decision, but after considering how active the Snowbarger family is, he understands.

"We're obviously sad to see Michael go, but I fully support his decision," Mallue said. "Michael and Jen have three kids, who are all very involved in a variety of activities.

"Jen coaches our varsity volleyball team and also coaches JO volleyball. Michael works 45 minutes away. When you look at the overall family dynamic that's a lot."

The Snowbarger's oldest kid, junior Luke, plays football and basketball for Wooster. Freshman Sara was a third-team All-Ohio volleyball player.

With Luke being a junior, why wouldn't Michael stay on for one more year to coach him as

"That's a valid question and something we've been asked," Michael said. "Being able to sit back and truly watch your kid his senior year is rewarding.

The basketball grind isn't just a November to February type job. It's an all-year job, with offseason workouts, preseason workouts and then during the season there's a lot more that goes into it than people realize. There's a great deal of film work, practice preparation and different things like that. I thought, alright, let me just enjoy my kids more and take a step back."

Although Snowbarger had an outstanding .648 winning percentage, the relationships built with players is what matters

"The administrations I've worked with at Wooster and Smithville have been amazing,' he said. "They've been very supportive.

"We've had a lot of success with wins and losses three or four per class.

and people look at that, but we also had a very tough schedule, playing teams like Jackson, Solon and Akron St. Vincent-St. Mary. When you get into the college ranks, you focus on wins and losses as a coach because you have a mortgage payment. At the high school level, it's more about the relationships with the kids and being a positive influence."

Snowbarger and longterm assistants Todd Terakedis and Drew Durbin pride themselves on how many former players return to play in open gyms during winter break, or stay in touch through text messages or phone calls.

"Last year, we had eight seniors, this year we had seven seniors," Snowbarger said. "That means a lot when you have that many seniors wanting to come back and stay involved in the program.

Most programs have

We've had the benefit of having some great relationships with the kids and that's what high school sports is all about."

Mallue said the district is accepting applications until April 1. He plans to work with fellow school administrators to set up a search committee.

The sensational divorce trial of Elmore and Grace Taggart

Elmore Findlay Taggart was born Oct. 5, 1858, to Morrow and Sarah Slusser-Taggart. His father was a farmer in Wavne County's Baughman Township. Young Elmore attended Baughman Township schools and helped on his family farm. Eventually, he attended preparatory school at Wooster University between 1876 and 1878.

In 1879 he was nominated for West Point Military Academy. He entered the academy in 1880 and graduated in 1883 with a commission in the United States Army as a second lieutenant.

Grace Culver was born Oct. 27, 1871, to Mr. and Mrs. John Manville in Chicago. The Manvilles found themselves unable to raise the large family they had. Mr. Manville persuaded his sister Viola, who was married to a wealthy Chicago businessman, Charles Culver, to raise Grace and her sister Nellie as their own.

In 1890 Grace Viola Culver attended a social event near Fort Sheridan, north of Chicago. There she met Elmore Taggart. The two dated briefly, fell in love and decided to wed. They were married Dec. 30, 1890, at the Culver home.

From Fort Sheridan. Elmore was transferred to Fort Thomas in Kentucky. The Taggarts set up household there. Living with them was Howard Taggart, Elmore's brother. It was there their two sons, Charles and Elmore II, were born.

When the Spanish-American War broke out, Elmore would be required to spend long periods of



time away from his family. Grace would develop friendships that were innocent at first but became more and more scandalous.

Elmore, once established at a new base, would send for his family. But things kept getting worse.

In February 1899 Elmore was promoted to captain. By April 1900, he and his family had moved to the Philippine Islands. Accusations of Grace's infidelity continued. Elmore decided to intervene

In June 1900 Elmore brought his family to Orrville, left them with his parents and returned to the war. In the Philippines he was again promoted.

When the war ended, Elmore was assigned to Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and the tension between he and his wife reached its peak. One night in a drunken rage, Elmore confronted Grace. struck her, ripped her clothing off and sent her into the street. Grace stayed with neighbors that night. The following day she sought help from the base commander. Shortly after, she left with the children, and Elmore was ordered to have no contact with Grace or the children for four months.

In May 1904 Elmore took the two boys on an outing, ostensibly to tour the hospital ship he commanded. Instead, he brought them back to Orrville. On June 2, 1904, he filed a petition for divorce in Wooster, charging Grace with neglect and willful absence.

Grace followed her husband and children back to Wooster and, learning of the suit for divorce, filed a cross petition charging cruelty and neglect.

Grace filed a petition to regain custody of the boys, which she was granted on the condition she would not leave the jurisdiction of the

The divorce trial began on Aug. 2, 1905. For the next eight days, Elmore Taggart would present his case. Damning testimony tried to paint Grace as a harddrinking harlot who, while living in Orrville, carried on an adulterous affair with William "Billy" Taggart, a distant cousin of Elmore's. Further testimony involved allegations of infidelity at the various Army bases they had lived at. Names of prominent Army officers were given as co-defendants.

Grace's testimony began in late August. A witness testified knowledge of an affair Elmore had with a servant in the Philippines. An Army officer said he saw Grace battered and bruised.

In the end on Oct. 13, 1905, Elmore Taggart was granted a divorce from Grace, and the judge awarded custody of the two boys to him.

Shortly after the decision, Grace and her two boys vanished. A search began immediately. Every effort to locate them proved futile. For a couple of years, it made the news, but interest slowly waned.

In April 1913 Grace applied for a passport to visit Europe. Once there, in November of the same year, she married Dominic Peronti, a merchant of

12 years her junior. That is where the boys grew to adulthood.

In January 1922 Grace was granted a divorce in Virginia from Dominic Peronti on the grounds of desertion.

Grace died in April 1929 in New York City. She is National Cemetery. Charles


Chicago.

Elmore died in the Philippines in September 1935 and is buried in Orrville.

Elmore Taggart, Jr.'s name was changed to Robert Culver. He died in 1961 and is buried at Arlington

Berne, Switzerland who was buried next to her parents in Taggart's name was changed to Charles Culver. He died in 1971 and is buried in Virginia.

One voice: Festival of Choirs holds 50th annual concert

Across Wayne County, sports competitiveness between the high schools can be fierce. But this year marked the 50th year of choirs across the county gathering in Smithville to sing separately and then together as a mass choir, joining together schools and students that usually work against each other.

On March 6 in Smithville High's Berkey Fieldhouse, over 300 students were directed first as individual choirs by their directors and then by Dr. Scott MacPherson, the professor of music and director of choral studies at Kent State University.

Michelle Muro, Ed.D, Tri-County fine arts consultant and organizer of the event, said she contacted MacPherson in spring 2022 to see if he would be interested in leading the choirs. On a fine arts teacher in-service day in October 2022, they held a choral director

workshop.

"This professional development provides time for teachers to learn from the guest conductor and find out what the conductor intends to do with the music — for example, accentuate a crescendo in measure 27 or slow down a tempo," Muro said. "Then it's up to the choral directors to purchase the music and prepare the choir students.

All winter choir directors worked with their students to learn and perfect the music. A few days before the concert, the school choirs met together to practice.

'The choral directors are key to the success of the mass choir because of the music preparation required before the mass rehearsal,' Muro said. "We are blessed to have such a great group of choral directors. Everyone works together and does their part.'

tion for Music Education also included a proclamahas designated March as Music in Our Schools Month for more than 30 vears.

In 2020 when "essential" things were being highlighted, arts and education organizations including NAfME joined to call arts such as music essential.

This year the program

tion signed by Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine. Muro said as president of the Ohio Alliance for Arts Education, she wrote to DeWine to request statewide support and recognition for arts education during the month of March.

According to John Hopkins University, more than the students involved in the

performance were positively affected by music.

Lowell Frantz, who had been the music teacher at Green Local Schools, understood the importance of music in schools and started the festival in 1974. Frantz was invited to the anniversary concert and was able to say a few words.

Another man from Wayne County who passed away in 2022, David J. Westfall, was recognized. Westfall, an American composer who made his permanent home in Wooster, was asked to compose a short choral piece for the 50th anniversary of the Festival of Choirs. The piece, called "A Land for Patriots," was performed for the first time with a mass choir at the festival.

His son Rich Westfall ended the performance with some words of encouragement.

"Although my dad couldn't be here tonight, I know he would have been

very pleased with what they did this evening. They sounded angelic, and perhaps he heard from heaven. So great job," Westfall said. "I have to say I'm so impressed with what it takes to put together an event like this. These choirs play competitive sports, right, and yet they've come together today in unity. And they made the community a better place. They've encouraged us.

"And it takes the support of parents to make this happen, all the hard work of the students and of course the teachers who've invested their lifeblood in their music education to pass it on. I know if my dad were here this evening, he would say that the God-given talent that each of these students has, he would hope that you will use it for the rest of your life to make the world a better place and to bring peace to our world. Thanks for the job you've done and continue to use that gift."

ing a school-record 16 feet, to perform at the national height of 14 feet, 11 inches, then got over the crossbar on the first try at 15 feet, 5 inches. The music education major needed two tries once the bar was raised to 15 feet, 11 inches, and then he mustered up enough to get over 16 feet, 0.75 inches on his final try, which secured the All-America honors as just

six competitors remained after that progression. Garretson had one more clearance in him, getting over 16 feet, 2.75 inches on his second try.

The University of Southern Maine's Ben Drummey was the national champion at 16 feet, 6.75 inches.

On Saturday Wooster senior Claudia Partridge logged a career-best ninthplace finish in the high

Partridge, who has qualified for the last three NCAA Div. III track and field championships, had no problem with the opening height, clearing 5 feet, 1.25 inches on her first try. The first-try success carried over to 5 feet, 3.25 inches, after which just 14 of the 20 competitors remained.

Eight of the 14 cleared 5 feet, 5.25 inches on their first try, the mark Partridge was unsuccessful in clearing. Thanks to her unblemished performance in the opening two heights, that

resume-like tool to help people connect with you. In some industries you need a portfolio or work samples to highlight what you can

A cover letter has an entirely different job telling stories and giving examples that draw a direct line between you and the job opening at hand. If it's a copy-and-paste rewrite of your resume, then you're doing it wrong.

They are extremely valuable tools for careerchangers, people returning to the workforce or jobseekers with resume gaps because you can explain those circumstances while highlighting what makes

you an excellent candidate.

Here's a five-step framework to writing a solid cover

- 1. Lead with a story that showcases your strongest accomplishment or achievement relevant to the job at hand. Just one to three sentences is all you need keep it simple.
- 2. Formally state you're interested in the position including the job title and mentioning the employer's
- 3. If you were referred to the position, mention your referrer by name.

sentences to outline your approach to or philosophy of the work. Then use that as a framing device to mention other central accomplishments in your career. Connect those results to something positive about the job or the employer.

5. End with a statement about your availability for an interview, mentioning your resume is enclosed or attached, and thank them for their time and consideration.

Once written, use a traditional marketing approach to make sure you've covered

4. Use one to three all your bases: AIDA, which stands for attention, interest, desire and action. That's the path you want to move your reader along in those few hundred words. Capture their attention, spark their interest, ignite their desire and lead them to taking an action — calling, emailing or otherwise connecting with you for an interview.

Figuring out phlegm —ways to deal with your stuffy nose

Phlegm is a strangely spelled word for an equally strange substance made by the body. The "Ph" is pronounced as an "F," and the "g" is silent. This thick, goopy secretion is the body's counterattack against foreign bodies that invade it from time to time.


Mix about 2 tablespoons of lemon juice with a tablespoon of honey in a glass of warm water. Drinking this mixture three times daily will loosen phlegm and uid state, which is easier reduce phlegm production.

Making a watery mixture of turmeric, ginger or cayenne pepper clears congestion by breaking up the phlegm, making it easier to be blown into a tissue. Fresh spices work the best. Apple cider vinegar also has been known for the breakdown of phlegm when mixed with warm water.

On a roll — Leiendecker carrying on family tradition

A few thoughts from the week in sports ...

The accomplishments of area athletes and teams never cease to amaze me, and the OHSAA postseason is the biggest stage to display their talents.

Wooster bowler Abbie Leiendecker has been as impressive as just about any local this winter — on and off the lanes.

For starters, she began the 2022-23 school year as a junior and will end it as a senior. She will have enough credits to graduate this spring.

Leiendecker made an official visit to Div. I Louisiana Tech in December and signed a letter of intent. She will graduate a year early in order to bowl with her sister Allie, who will be a fifthyear senior in 2023-24.

Abbie, who started taking a larger class load in the fall, has a full athletic scholarship. She put the exclamation point on an outstanding career for Wooster by placing ninth out of 96 bowlers at the Div. I state tournament to earn second-team All-Ohio honors on March

"This year really shows that hard work pays off," said Abbie, who was a sectional and district champion, two-time Ohio Cardinal Conference Player of the Year and had a 215 average as a senior. "People don't know how much work I put in behind the scenes.

"I announced my signing on New Year's Day, but I'd met with my guidance counselor (Cordell Smith) in November to change my schedule to make sure I can graduate early and be NCAA eligible."

Abbie was only in classes at Wooster High School for 3 1/2 hours a day to start the fall but increased her class load to all seven periods. In addition to bowling 10-15 games six days a week, she did CrossFit five times a week leading up to the season and also lifts weights.

Abbie is carrying on a family tradition. The Leiendeckers could be called



the first family of Wooster bowling.

Al Leiendecker is partowner of Wayne Lanes and coaches his daughters in their non-OHSAA tournaments. Tracie Leiendecker is the Generals varsity coach and founded the program as a club team in 2009. In addition to having her daughters bowl at the state tournament, she helped coach senior Dawson Gaynor to a state trip this season.

"Some people might think 'it's just bowling,' but to be really good, you have to put in lots of extra work like in any sport," Tracie said. "I actually have mixed feelings about Abbie starting college early, but how can I not be proud to see how hard she's worked?"

None of this seemed possible during Abbie's freshman year when the COVID pandemic forced schools to shut down and turn to remote learning. Being stuck at home was the worst thing for an energetic, highly social girl.

"When Abbie was an eighth-grader, she was near the top of her class," Tracie said. "Having to learn online was the worst possible thing for her, and we heard of other families who had kids really struggle. She became distant, detached. We butted heads. It didn't look like a bright future for her."

Abbie said, "I tried finding the easy way out with school work, and I wasn't putting as much work into bowling as I should have."

Al Leiendecker said his daughter has made a complete 180 in the last two

"We're very proud of her," said Al, a Waynedale graduate who was the center on the Golden Bears' 1985 Final Four football team. "We missed out on a lot of valuable training time when

she was a freshman and sophomore, yet I think she is ready to step in and make an immediate impact on the collegiate level.

'Abbie has made impressive improvements on the lanes over the last year. She's always had a big-time physical game. It just took a while for the focus and mentality to catch

Many in the bowling community call the OHSAA state tournament a "threegame crapshoot" because it takes as much luck as skill in such a limited format.

Colleges and other states use a five-game qualifying series, followed by bracket match play. Abbie's career highlights are much bigger than just the OHSAA

Abbie shot 621 to finish ninth out of 96 bowlers at the Div. I tournament on March 10 to earn second-team All-Ohio honors (Allie's best finish was 10th). Abbie was the individual sectional and district champion this season.


Nationally, Abbie has two top-10 finishes at the National Teen Masters and three match play appearances at Junior Golds (youth bowling's U.S. Open) with a high finish of 13th. She has seven Ohio Junior Tournament Bowlers Association championships and is a four-time Ohio State Pepsi champion.

Abbie's career-high game is 300, and her high three-game series is 798.

Louisiana Tech is ranked No. 12 in Div. I, and older sister Allie, who received an extra year of eligibility due to COVID, is their cleanup bowler and a four-time All-American.

"I wouldn't be where I am without my family," Abbie said. "My dad owns a pro shop and is a partner in the bowling alley, so I get a lot more opportunities than other kids. My dad is my competition and physical coach, and my mom is my high school coach and my mental coach. They definitely help me a lot.

"My sister is a huge part
