## Pt. 2 of LWV's immigration series Sept. 12

On Sept. 12 the Wayne County League of Women Voters will hold part two of its three-part civil discourse series on the topic of immigration at 7 p.m. at Westminster Presbyterian Church, 353 E. Pine St., Wooster.

The LWV is a nonpartisan organization with the mission of both empowering voters and defending democracy. Mary Sue Kaliszewski is the program chair for the organization.

We work to encourage active and informed participation of local citizens; increase the understanding of major public policy issues; influence public policy through education and advocacy; foster civil dialogue about important community issues; and engage voters through voter registration events, candidate forums and voter education," Kaliszewski said.

"We chose immigration as a vehicle to practice civil discourse because it is a topic of national importance," Kaliszewski said. "It has relevance to our local community and is a multifaceted topic that touches people we know and care about, including family, friends and neighbors."

The event evolved as a debate in order to show how individuals can have a productive conversation about a topic that may elicit emotional and conflicting opinions. Kaliszewski explained that in order to have civil discourse, individuals need to be familiar with the facts of an issue, be willing to listen to different points of view, respectfully discuss differing opinions and identify common ground from which a solution can be built.

In order to present a debate, the league turned to the Wooster High School debate team.

"Lincoln Douglas Debate Team members Megan Kleinhenz, Addy Gerbick and Nathan Byrne graciously agreed to be our immigration and in having

debate topics; how they prepare to debate all sides of a topic, even ones they may not personally agree with; and give a demonstration of one of their debates," Kaliszewski said.

Justice Requires Open Borders for Human Immigration was one of the topics from the 2022-23 debate

Part three of the series, date and location still to be determined, will be small group discussions on selected immigration topics. There will be no guest speakers as community members will be invited to put civil discourse into practice to discuss immigration.

It is hoped the series will produce insight from the community on immigration issues that will be shared with state politicians.

Everyone interested in guest speakers to discuss conversations to find com-

mon ground within differing perspectives is encouraged to attend. The league invites the community to come together to learn about ways to research facts, respectfully learn from each other and move forward toward common goals.

At the event parking is available in the two lots directly across Pine Street from the church, along Pine and College streets adjacent to the church, one block north of the church on University Street in front of Taylor Hall, across the street from Freedlander Theatre, and in the lot behind Taylor Hall off Bever Street.

## **Wooster native, journalist** to give Mortensen lecture

Bina Venkataram. an, journalist and science policy expert, will give The College of Wooster's Peter Mortensen Lecture on Sept. 5 at 7 p.m. in the Gault Recreation Center inside the Scot Center, 1267 Beall Ave. The event is free and open to the public.

Venkataraman's book, "The Optimist's Telescope: Thinking Ahead in a Reckless Age," was selected as Wooster's summer reading book for the Class of 2027. The book tackles the problem of instant gratification and how failing to look toward the future has impacted humanity, with examples ranging from ancient Pompeii to modernday Fukushima.

Venkataraman wrote, "The future is an idea we have to conjure in our minds, not something that we perceive with our senses. What we want today, by contrast, we can often feel in our guts as a craving."

Venkataraman includes practical tips that both individuals and society at large can use to make long-term decisions.

A native of Wooster and an alumna of Brown University and the Harvard

raman is a journalist, author and science policy expert. She is currently a columnist at The Washington Post and a fellow at the Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs at Harvard University, along with teaching in the program on science, technology and society at MIT since 2011.

Previously, she was the editorial page editor of The Boston Globe from 2019-22, served as senior adviser for climate change innova-

Kennedy School, Venkata- tion in the Obama White House, and directed global policy initiatives at the Broad Institute of Harvard and MIT.



# FALL BEGINS At The Fair!

174th Wayne County Fair is Sept. 9-14

The rest of the world may say fall begins Sept. 23 this year, but Wayne County residents know better.

Fall will begin Sept. 9, of course — the start of the Wayne County Fair.

Celebrating 174 years overall and the 100th year of the Coliseum, the fair will run Sept. 9-14 and offer something for groups of all ages.

"Fairs are a fabric of a community," said Matt Martin, who serves as the manager, secretary and treasurer of the fair. "We remain a large agricultural influenced county, and it is evident to whoever walks through the gates.

"We are also busy planning next year's 175th anniversary with some special celebrations leading up to the fair as well as during the fair."

Mike Buchholz, president of the Wayne County Agricultural Society, said the week of the fair is worth the effort.

"The most exciting part of the fair for me is watching it all come

together after a year-plus of planning and lots of hard work by the fair board manager, committees, office staff, junior fair board, kids in 4-H, OSU Extension and the many volunteers so we can have the fair," he said.

Tom Stocksdale is in his 35th year as a fair board director and said there are numerous areas of which he is proud of being a part.

"To know you are a part of some of the changes that have been successful is very satisfying," he said. "We are one of Ohio's largest agricultural fairs and continue to have the largest junior fair in the state.

"It is also comforting to know our fair gate price to get in has remained low and actually remains the lowest in the entire state."

The week will begin Saturday at 8 a.m. with an Open Contest Horse Show in the riding arena and conclude Thursday with the Smash IT Demolition Derby at 7 p.m in the grandstand. In between there will be more than 60 activities, contests and shows scattered throughout the grounds.

Entries to the Wayne County Senior Fair are displayed all throughout the fairgrounds.

Grandstand events will include the OSTPA Truck/Tractor/Semi Pull on Saturday evening, a Tracy Lawrence concert at 8 p.m. on Sunday, and the tractor pull at noon and Casting Crowns at 8 p.m. on Monday.

Tuesday's grandstand events have harness racing at noon and Lou Gramm performing at 8 p.m. Three events are scheduled for Wednesday: harness racing at noon, mutton busting at 6 p.m. and the Buckeye Rodeo at 7 p.m. Northern Ohio Outlaws Cowboy Mounted Shooters will perform from noon to 2 p.m. on Thursday.

As well as working year round on scheduling these events, the upkeep of the buildings is a 365-day process. Martin said weekly attendance averages around 110,000 people with Saturday and Sunday bringing in 20,000-30,000 people each day.

"Fresh paint on the goat barn roof, painting the infield judges' stand and the round grange building helps protect them as well as makes everything look nice and clean," Martin said. "We have also gone through the grandstand seats and have made several repairs. We have put up metal siding on the ends of two horse barns and plan to do the sides this fall."

Work on the inside show ring and seating portion of the Coliseum is on the calendar for later this year.

"We have scheduled the Coliseum to be cleaned and repainted over the winter months," Martin said.

Steer, poultry, goats and other animals are at the heart of the week's activities and are fundamental to the community and children who participate.

"The junior fair is a vital part of why we do what we do," Martin said. "The lessons learned throughout the year in barns and homes are a culmination of a year's worth of hard work."

Martin said the carnival side — entertainment, food, rides and games — helps balance the costs associated with the junior fair.

"Whatever (money) is left is reinvested into the operations of the grounds, whether it is new projects or the upkeep of over 50 buildings and 42 acres," he said.

Admission is \$4 with children under 6 free. Veterans Day (free admission with ID) is Tuesday, and Senior Citizen Day (free admission) is Wednesday for those 65 and older.

Celebrating the Coliseum's 100th anniversary is at the top of the list for what is new in 2023, but Martin said there are other

things as well.

"We are going to make available to purchase some mementos to mark the occasion," he said about the Coliseum. "We have added Disney Princess for three days of the fair as well as bringing the Whiz Bang Show back to the local entertainment tent on Monday."

The Whiz Bang Science Show will feature Dr. Dave, whose 30-minute free show focuses on the physics behind the stunts performed by circus entertainers.

Also new, the fiddle contest has expanded to include banjos and Smash IT as the new Demolition Derby promoter.

The Antiques Dept. Competition also has changed for the first time in 30 years, dealing with specific time periods, items 50 years and older, and entrants being limited to 10 items total for the competition. Further rules can be viewed by looking at the Premium Fair Book.

# Veterans link up with providers at resource event

Approximately 24 service providers were on hand at the Wayne County Fairgrounds recently to assist veterans financially, emotionally and medically during the second Veterans Resource Fair.

"Right now there is a lack of in-home nursing care for local veterans," said Jeff Shull, Veterans Service Commission director. "Wayne County is sort of a black hole for that. If a company sends a nurse, they are coming from Akron or Canton. It is 45 minutes or an hour that they are paid for travel time, so it isn't very cost-effective for a certified Veterans Affairs contracted nurse to come here."

Shull said right now most of the 90-plus veterans that visited the event were able to get around, but to aging veterans, home healthcare is something that will be on their radar at some point.

"We have a large number of veterans here that cannot get in-home health-care through the VA because there are no local providers that are contracted," he said. "That is where Freedom Caregivers comes in. They provide basic care and can serve veterans that have pension aid and attendance benefits."

Shull said one local organization, Freedom Caregivers, is helping to fill the gap that currently exists in Wayne County for nursing care for veterans.

"We serve both veterans and nonveterans," said Rene Zamora, Freedom Caregivers director of marketing. "Unlike many other in-home care agencies, we are a VA-approved community care provider. For veterans with the aid and attendance benefit, we can go in and provide services at no cost to them."

Freedom Caregivers provides personal care, light housekeeping, companionship, nursing well checks, medication refills and meal preparation.

"We don't provide physical therapy or nursing services," Zamora said. "We provide homemaking services to those who cannot do those things themselves and face the choice of staying at home or moving into an assisted living facility. We are able to keep people at home with a customized plan of care."

## Showing animals at the fair is a months-long process

Every year hundreds of area kids participate in the junior fair at the Wayne County Fair, but it isn't just a matter of showing up to show their animals.

For Sarah Wellert, a sophomore at Orrville High and a member of the Bauman Guys and Gals 4-H Club who will show her dairy cows at the 174th edition of the fair, scheduled Sept. 9-14, the journey to the show ring began months ago.



Wellert lives on a diary farm and said she picks out her calf around March. In May she separates the chosen calf from the rest of the herd, and from that point on, she feeds and waters it twice a day and walks it several times a week. 12-year-old Laurie Bauman, a member of County Line Clovers 4-H Club and a seventh-grader at Northwestern Middle School, will be busy at this year's fair — she shows market goats, market lambs and market swine.

She arrives at the fairgrounds bright and early each day to take care of all of her animals

"I get to the fairgrounds around 8 a.m. every day," she said. "I check to make sure the

animals are fed and watered. Then I clean the pen and put down new shavings."

Her brother, fourth-grader Anthony Barr, will make his animal showing debut at this year's fair, showing the chickens he began caring for in mid-May. "I enjoy loving on them and walking them," he said.

In addition to preparing their animals and then showing at the fair, every exhibitor also has to participate in a Skillathon and other training and events depending on what animals they are showing. These activities help prepare exhibitors to comply with the rules and regulations that keep both them and their animals safe and healthy during the fair.

A skillathon is a series of learning stations that test the members' knowledge on their animal projects as well as interview skills. They can involve feed identification, medicine label identification, and animal parts identification, and this year in Wayne County, potential exhibitors identified parts of a thank you note to help them write thank you notes to buyers

and award donors. An interview with a judge is also part of it, and kids can't fail a skillathon, but they do get a score and it is required.

In preparation for showing their animals, the junior exhibitors have to wear special outfits, which vary depending on the animal they are showing. Exhibitors also have to wash and prepare each animal before they step into the show ring.

The hardest part for a lot of young exhibitors is saying

goodbye to their animals at the end of the fair. It's the reality for many junior fair exhibitors and is bittersweet, even if it is a good life lesson about raising animals.

If your child is interested in participating in next year's fair, go to the website for the Ohio State Extension Wayne County at https://wayne.osu.edu/program-areas/4-h-youth-development. The website has a list of clubs children can join. Next year's deadline to join 4-H is April 1.



## **Outlaws will demonstrate ridin' and shootin' abilities**

Kathy Zadra is a wanted "Outlaw," but she doesn't carry a gun.

In fact, she's often perched on the fence, cowboy hat in place, watching her fellow "Outlaws" shoot during one of their competitions. She is an avid promoter, fan and helper for the Northern Ohio Outlaws, an affiliate of the Cowboy Mounted Shooting Association based in Wooster.

Some of those "Outlaws"



will bring their horses to the Wayne County Fair for a two-hour demonstration starting at noon on Thursday, Sept. 14 in front of the grandstand.

"We love Kathy so much we made her an honorary lifetime member," said NOO member Lynn Busell of West Salem, who competes along with her husband Jim. "She's a great advocate and talks up (the association) all the time."

The association originally started in the basement of a small church in Uhrichsville but now is based in Wooster and holds all of its shoots at the Wayne County Fairgrounds.

The group has 139 riders and 17 wranglers age 12 and under. The wranglers don't compete but train to be a mounted shooter. They learn to shoot the balloons off a fence and how to properly use the gun. "It teaches them gun safety," Zadra said.

Mounted shooting combines the disciplines of riding and shooting into a fastpaced sport.

The riders are scored on time and accuracy. There is a five-second penalty for each missed balloon, a fivesecond penalty for dropping a gun and a 10-second penalty for not running the course correctly. Speed and accuracy are important. A typical pattern can be run in 15-35 seconds.

Each competition begins with a safety meeting, followed by the national anthem and the Cowboy Prayer, Zadra said. "Then we

start shooting."

At each event a person is assigned to load the riders' guns as he or she enters the arena, and a person is assigned to unload the guns after the rider is finished. The levels of competition range from novice levels to the seasoned professionals.

It doesn't matter at which

level a rider competes; everyone helps each other, Busell said. "We're like a great, big family."

In addition to Zadra's work with the Outlaws, she also volunteers for Boots, Paws and Troops, a group that assists military veterans and advises the Bounty Hunters 4-H Club.

## Award-winning project just the start for young 4-Her

An award-winning project on the solar system is just the beginning for Emory Sherrick, who has big dreams about becoming the first person to land on Mars.

Inspired by a school science lesson, Sherrick created a Self-Determined Project that won him an outstanding ribbon at the Wayne County 4-H Still and Family and Consumer Sciences Proj-



ect Judging and a trip to the Ohio State Fair.

His project will be one of 558 Still and Consumer Science projects on display in the Junior Fair Building during the Wayne County Fair Sept. 9-14.

"Last year in fifth grade," Sherrick said, "my teacher Mr. (Andy) Hosfeld was teaching about space, and I was learning a lot. It was really interesting."

The Wooster Township Elementary student wanted to learn more, so he chose a 4-H project category that allowed him to determine his own learning experiences and goals.

"I began visualizing what I was going to do for the project," he said, and his ideas took the form of two solar system models. One is a display of the eight planets along with facts about each. For a second display, he created a model of the planets on their orbit lines by cutting in half Styrofoam balls, painting them to match the colors of the planets and attaching them to the poster.

He also glued on small rocks of all shapes, sizes and colors to represent the asteroid belt, a region of space between the orbits of Mars and Jupiter where most of the asteroids in the solar system are found orbiting the sun. The asteroid belt may contain millions of asteroids, ranging in size from small planets to particles of dust, Sherrick said.

He said he also was fascinated to discover the sun's core is 27 million degrees.

In May, Saturn, the planet known for its rings, gained 62 more moons and now



Four individuals each with more than 25 years of volunteer service to the Wayne County Fair were honored by the Wayne County Agricultural Society (fair board) at its annual recognition banquet on Aug. 20.

The board presented Ruth Bishop, Jennifer Rhamy, and Frank and Cheryl Bishop with the Outstanding Volunteer Service Award.

Ruth Bishop's volunteer work began when she was a 4-H adviser. Currently, she is secretary/treasurer for the Valley College Grange and worked in the fair's dining hall when it was operated by the granges. She also volunteers in the fair's information booth and is an Ohio State University Extension master gardener, the group that maintains the flowers on the fairgrounds.

Ruth Bishop advocated for the new veterans memorial outside the Fair Event ogy, switching from manu-



Center. She is a member of the Tree City Quilters Guild and has contributed quilts for the Honoring Our Patriot's Service Program, which donates quilts and recognizes veterans. She also is a member of the Wayne County Stitchers and displays her work in Buss Hall during the fair.

"She is an inspiration to all master gardeners, volunteers and the community that know and work with her," the nomination form read.

Rhamy has clerked the

Wayne County Junior Fair Livestock Sale for 46 years. She has spent numerous hours at those auctions billing and collecting funds from all buyers and has transitioned with technolally typing 650-700 checks to computerized operations for sale totals of \$1 million.

Over the last 35 years, Rhamy has assumed more management and leadership roles at the livestock sales, board member Tom Stocksdale said in presenting the award. She will not leave the sale barn unless the entire sale is balanced.

A retired Wayne County National Bank branch assistant, Rhamy won an award for the longest perfect balancing record of all employees while she was in that position.

Stocksdale called Rhamy a great asset and supporter of the Wayne County Fair, Wayne County Junior Fair Sale, Friends of the Wayne County Fair and community.

## Hartzler's knitting formula has been a proven winner

Marcus Hartzler sees every knitting project as a math problem, so before he knits, he calculates.

It's proven to be a successful formula for the Wooster man who has been a Best of non Nazarene University. A Show winner in the Wayne County Fair Arts and Home Economics Department three of the four years he's exhibited. Last year he swept both hand knitting categories with Best of Show honors. Had it not been for a second-place ribbon on one of his 2022 entries, it would have been the pinnacle of his fair competition, said Hartzler, who has grown accustomed to the first-place ribbons.

He is preparing five submissions for this year's fair, which will open Sept. 9. They include clothing items for his wife Karma and daughters Eva and Claire, as well as for himself.

A software engineer and mathematician, Hartzler began knitting when he was a sophomore at Mount Ver-



high school friend taught him the craft, and he caught on quickly.

"I love math. I love problem-solving," Hartzler said.

Once he learned the knitting basics, he began searching online for ways to advance and challenge himself.

'You can just follow a pattern as it's written," he said, "but typically, I'll take a pattern and figure out what I like and don't like."

Then he starts his rede-

"It's all math and algebra at that point," Hartzler said. "You're essentially getting the dimensions of a single stitch so that you can say, 'I want it to be this wide with this many stitches, or I need this many rows.' If I want an

angle, I need to decrease the rate of this many stitches per row."

For one of this year's fair entries, he took a pullover men's sweater pattern and converted it to a cardigan with the Cleveland Cavaliers C logo.

Hartzler does most of his knitting between early fall and late spring. He is busiest in the months leading up to Christmas when he knits one gift item each for his wife and daughters.

The girls are particularly fond of the knitted stuffed animal. An octopus, a favorite of Eva's, presented some challenges with its eight tentacles and drew attention from the pattern's creator after he posted it on Ralvery, a community site for knitters and crocheters.

"A representative from the yarn company reached out to me and asked if I could post the octopus on Instagram," Hartzler said. When the pattern's creator contacted him to discuss the pattern, he

mentioned the tentacles were the most tedious part.

His daughters are beginning to have a greater appreciation for their knitted garments. For a time, daughter Eva wasn't keen on wearing the sweaters, but now her favorite outfit is a dress with one of the sweaters knitted by her dad.

Most of the time, Hartzler

can knit without looking.

"I can feel if I drop a stitch or pick up an extra one," he said.

He also knows how to fix mistakes. His wife told him a sweater he made for her was about an inch and a half too short, so Hartzler added the stitches in the middle of the sweater without a trace of what he'd done.

"I like to get things right," Hartzler said. "I'm more concerned with being happy with the final result than just getting things done. If a knitting project proves challenging, I'll put it in time-out and work on a different one."

That was the case for a light-weight blanket he recently knitted. He said the blanket's 150,000 stitches proved to be mind-numbing, so he turned his attention to some clothes or stuffed animals.

His calculations and designs are stored in a knitting notebook so he has a record of his projects.

He designed a knitted baseball and wrote the pattern for it. The inside of the ball is a ball of yarn.

'It's a lot like (computer) programming or solving a math equation," Hartzler said. "As long as you know what the rules are and what's possible, you should be able to solve it using the tools available. For me, knitting is just another problem to solve."

## Coliseum's 100th a chance to celebrate, remember

It was built in just two months, but the Wayne County Fair Coliseum has endured for 100 years, a reason to celebrate and remember.

The Wayne County Agricultural Society started the festivities at its Volunteer Recognition Banquet, where it auctioned off the first of 12 commemorative clocks honoring the Coliseum's 100th year. It also heard congratulatory remarks from the Wayne County commissioners and may have found the oldest male and female to have shown in the Coliseum, a search the Coliseum committee is conducting as part of the celebration.

Tom Wolf and Ruth Bishop, both 85 years old, were in the audience for the banquet, and both began showing dairy cattle in the Coliseum when they were young.

Wolf was recognized as an emeritus fair board member and part of a Coliseum committee

Bishop was honored with one of the fair board's Outstanding Volunteer Service Awards. She said her connection to the fair traces back to showing Guernseys from her family's dairy herd. "I really enjoyed it,"



she said. "I always had fun."

Wolf still likes to take a cow in the Coliseum show ring. At times he's had close to 20 head of cattle at the fair for children and grandchildren to show, but this year he will take just five. "I just love showing," he said.

His daughter Lisa and her husband Joe, a fair board member, made the commemorative clocks from the cypress trees that once stood where the Fair Event Center was built.

When the trees were harvested, Lisa Gress said, 'Joe and I couldn't stand to see all of those trees being chopped up, so we took some of them home, had them cut up, kiln-dried and

And when the fair board began talking about the 100th anniversary, she said, We decided to make some clocks.'

Amish craftsmen put finishing touches on the clocks and wrapped a steel band around each to hold the wood in place. The clocks

have a laser-engraved 100th Coliseum logo designed by the Gresses' daughter Eileen.

Jim and Sue Smail had the winning bid of \$2,000 to take home the first of the commemorative clocks. The remaining clocks will be sold at the fair prior to the junior fair auctions and a Junior Horse Show. Clocks also will be up for bid before the Ohio State Tractor Pullers Association Pull on opening night and the square dance in the Coliseum on Sunday evening.

County commissioner Sue Smail presented on behalf of the three commissioners a proclamation extending appreciation and congratulations to the Wayne County Fair Board on the 100th anniversary of the Coliseum and to anyone who had a part in making this possible.

The proclamation highlighted the Coliseum's his-

Originally known as the Live Stock Pavilion, it was approved for construction in August 1923. Local contractor Charles O. Langell was awarded the contract for \$25,445 with the stipulation that the stock barn part of the building be completed by Sept. 28, just 55

days later.

"It wound up coming in just over budget at \$26,000," Smail read in the proclamation. The new facility was needed to provide space for the growing dairy cow industry. Until that time dairy cows shared a space with the draft horses and were assigned to a single aisle in the draft horse

The 1923 fair was Oct. 2-5. That year a Wooster Daily Record newspaper advertisement touted the new \$25,000 Live Stock Pavilion and listed admission to the fair as 50 cents.

"Over the course of 100 years, the Coliseum has hosted many events," Smail read, "including horse, beef and dairy cattle shows; fiddling contests and square dances; church services; and most recently the Quilts of Honor presentations to veterans.'

Jim Marty, a retired

dairy farmer, remembers watching draft horse pulls in the Coliseum. "I was quite young, but I never wanted to miss them," he

The Wayne County Historical Society will present the board with a plaque distinguishing the Coliseum as a historical landmark during the fair's opening ceremonies at 9 a.m. in front of the Event Center.

Key chains, magnets and decks of cards with the Coliseum's 100th logo can be purchased at the fair with proceeds funding improvements to the landmark building. These include painting, installing new fans, LED lights and electrical wiring, cleaning and repairing the bleachers, and removing some bleachers for wheelchair seating.

"The fair is the fabric of our community," fair secretary Matt Martin said. "The fair board understands the treasures that we have and the need to preserve them."

## Sports streaks fun, can take on a life of their own

A few thoughts from the week in sports ...

Sports fans have loved following a winning streak for about as long as people have recorded scores and stats.

Whether it's a team winning streak, baseball hitting streak or consecutive games streak of reaching some statistic, the longer it goes, the more attention it gets.

How long will it last? Has it ever been done before? A streak can take on a life of its

That's why lots of people still talk about the undefeated 1972 Miami Dolphins, Bob Knight's unbeaten 1976 Indiana Hoosiers, Joe DiMaggio's 56-game hitting streak in 1941 and Cal Ripken's 2,632 consecutive games played for the Baltimore Orioles. More recently, the Cleveland Indians' 22-game winning streak in 2017 is something fans will long remember.

On a local level, the West Holmes football team is on a regular-season winning streak that puts it among the greatest

runs in Wayne-Holmes history.

The Knights rallied from a 10-point deficit early in the fourth quarter to pull out a heart-stopping 35-31 triumph over Orrville on Aug. 25 and push their winning streak to 23 straight games.

West Holmes is 2-0 entering its week three game at Licking Valley (0-2). The Knights broke the school record of 22 straight regular-season wins set by the 1981-83 WHHS teams.

Looking at the bigger picture. West Holmes has a chance to break the all-time Wayne-Holmes County record for longest regular-season winning streak. Doylestown won 24 straight games from 1954-

The 23 straight wins are tied with Orrville (1987-89) and Waynedale (1997-99). The Red Riders and Golden Bears putting together back-to-back 10-0 seasons and then lost week four games.

Knights coach Zach Gardner admitted when I talked to him on Tuesday that the Knights "felt the pressure of (the streak)" midway through the Orrville game.

However, West Holmes got the stops it needed on defense, and junior quarterback Morgan Smith threw for a 90-yard touchdown to Logan Zollars and then Smith ran for a 36-yard TD with 4:41 left to play.

"You want to have a problem like that," Gardner said of the streak and the pressure that comes with it. "You want to be in big games and positions like that as a program.

"I'm immensely proud of what these teams have been able to accomplish. It's taken a lot of very hard work from a lot of players and coaches. We're also fortunate to have parents who are very supportive and allow us to coach their kids hard and appropriately and a

tion and community. We've seen the results when all these factors are working together."

Gardner commended his team for setting the school record after Friday's game.

"Obviously, we took a moment to talk about it with our kids," Gardner said. 'They're aware of it.

With Kyle (Maltarich) out with an injury, nine of 11 kids who we were playing on offense were underclassmen. They were feeling the pressure but found a way to get it done."

If the Knights can get past Licking Valley, they'll tie Doylestown's Wayne-Holmes record and have a chance to break it in a matchup of the Ohio Cardinal Conference favorites against Mansfield Senior at Arlin Field on Sept

It should be noted Dovlestown also had a 29-game unbeaten streak from 1947-50 when a tie was mixed into a pair of long winning stretches.

#### Inside the streak

West Holmes' 23 straight regular-season wins have mostly come in lopsided fashion. The Knights have won by an average margin of 28.6 points, and 17 of the 23 wins have been by 21 or more points. More than half the wins (13) have been by 34 or more points.

Besides the close call against Orrville, only two opponents have kept the margin under 10 points. The Knights won 20-17 at Senior and rallied past visiting Wooster 41-37 during the 2021 season.

West Holmes has had a

both sides of the ball during the winning streak.

I've been especially impressed with the way the Knights continue to get solid play at quarterback after the torch has been passed. West Holmes has featured four different starting quarterbacks during the streak.

Peyton McKinney got it started by leading West Holmes past Ashland 35-14 in the regular-season finale of the COVID-shortened 2020 season. The Knights then rattled off Division III playoff wins over Madison, Cloverleaf and Padua before losing to Tiffin Columbian and finished 7-3.

Noah Clark was a senior quarterback for a 10-0 regular season in 2021. The Knights then won Div. III playoff games over Sylvania Southview, Tiffin Columbian, Rocky River and Holy Name before falling to eventual state champ Chardon.

Mason Wolfe, who performed well in the Rocky River game filling in for an injured Clark as a junior, took over as the signal-caller in 2022. He followed up Clark's All-Ohio season with an allstate performance of his own. The Knights had the highest scoring offense in the state during the regular season and won Div. "I'll believe it when I see it," she said.



## Patterson's latest tackles America's racial discord

A recent stroll through Barnes & Noble led me to stumbling upon Richard North Patterson's latest book, "Trial." I tend to stay pretty informed about when some of my favorite authors have their works landing on bookstore shelves, but Patterson has been off the literary radar for nine years, having turned his writing skills and focus to social commentary in publications like "The Wall Street Journal," "The Bulwark" and "The Atlantic."

For book nerds, seeing a favorite author's new book perched orderly amongst their alphabetized friends. especially on "book release day," is every bit as addictive as the kid clamoring for his favorite candy bar at the grocery store; it is the anticipation of something hopeful and great to come. So the book adrenaline was in high gear, simply because this book caught me unawares



the jacket cover synopsis, nor did I need to look up reviews. Some authors earn that trust with their readers, even if nine years is a long time to keep their fans waiting (George R.R. Martin fans know this better than anyone). So I grabbed the book and a copy of ESPN's Fantasy Football Magazine for some draft advice this is the year I win the family league, I'm sure of it — and headed to the café for a small, er, sorry ... "short" cup of coffee.

Thirteen pages in, I knew the book would consume most, if not all, of my available free moments.

Patterson has never been one to shy away from the moral imperatives of our time, usually mixing the I did not need to read world of politics and law

grounds in rich character development.

With "Trial" he tackles what he calls "America's accelerating racial discord." It is a story of black and white/right and wrong told mostly through the lens of Congressman Chase Brevard, who shares a biracial son with political activist Allie Hill. Their son Malcolm stands on trial for the shooting death of a white sheriff deputy. With that premise Patterson dissects race, the justice system, voter suppression and social activism through both the white and black experience and lens.

For some, therein lies the problem.

Prior to "Trial," 16 of Patterson's 22 novels had been New York Times' Best Sellers. He has sold over 25 million books, so one would understand his confidence when he typed his last period and turned his focus to a publisher. Yet by

with grandiose issues he his own admission, 19 publishers turned him and his book away, based mostly on the notion of their belief that white authors can no longer write about the black experience.

Some may recall, similarly, the negative outerv author Jeanine Cummins experienced back in 2020 when she wrote of Mexican migrants in "American Dirt." Cummins canceled her book tour over threats she and her publisher were

To be clear, I am in no way qualified to speak on the ins and outs of the publishing world, which, I would assume, contains enough marketing research on one subject/book to rival the total pages written by Dostoevsky.

But it begs the question: Are only those personally identifiable to an experience safely allowed to depict that experience through fictional characters?

Maybe better phrased by Patterson himself, "Should empathy and imagination be allowed to cross the lines of racial (or gender) identity?"

I tend to approach these questions both as a parent and as a professional whose world is inhabited by imagination on a daily basis. Most English teachers approach fiction, first, as a sense of discovery, knowing year after year, while the words on the page of a book remain the same, the experiences students bring to a piece of fiction change greatly.

It is through careful, planned-for inquiries that allows for nurtured understanding of worlds we may not experience. Whether that world is depicted by a white or black author or any other ethnicity, it is that author's imaginative vision of that world, but it is just that, a vision — not the vision or only vision. The danger, of course, is allowing for that singular lens to be our only understanding of lives we do not inhabit.

In middle school I had the pleasure of inhabiting the lives of Ponyboy and Sodapop, Johnny Cade and "Dally." If we wanted, we had the option to own a copy of "The Outsiders" through those Scholastic Book order forms — forms full of appealing colors, pictures and book descriptions that made you want them all.

My parents ordered one copy for my twin sister and me to share, and I remember arguing with her when the Scholastic box of books arrived and the teacher stood in the front of the room, calling out the names of book recipients, over who got to claim it first. She won, but I still eventually made my way to the world of "The Outsiders" and was riveted (not much has changed for students 40 vears later).

I also remember finding out the author, S.E. Hinton, is a female and was shocked, not in a ripped-off kind of way, but rather that a woman was so skilled in depicting one of the most

popular adolescent maledriven stories of all time.

The content and this reader's reaction to that content was not diminished because its author is a female. It was her imaginative storytelling of those boys' experiences that has led to over 15 million copies being sold.


Now, make no mistake, "Trial" is, at times, an uncomfortable read. It is much better suited to be read amongst adult book clubs or a college civics/ social justice class than a high school classroom. But Patterson's storytelling skills, subject sensitivities and meticulous research he spent significant time in Georgia and conducted over 50 interviews with a diverse cross-section of people immersed in its subject matter — are indisputable.


In an interview with LiveTalksLA, Patterson said, "If we choose to portray diverse characters, our singular obligation is to understand them as deeply as we try to understand ourselves, humbled by the awareness that the more their experiences transcend our own, the more work we must do."

This is what makes storytelling so essential, regardless of race or gender, to one's imaginative being.

## **Break the fast before school**

While navigating my way through the school supplies aisle at the big box store, I watched a parent juggling the list of must-have items for their students. Her kiddos were choosing the colors and kinds of school supplies to give them the best advantage in school. It looked fun, exhausting and expensive.

August is Kids Eat Right Month. Students need pencils, paper, backpacks and computers; they also need protein, carbohydrates, fats, vitamins and minerals.

The beginning of the school year is a perfect time to emphasize the importance of a healthy breakfast. Providing school supplies is vital, but it's the nutrients and energy from a healthy meal plan that will spell success in the classroom.

Studies have proven breakfast eaters have higher school attendance, less tardiness and



fewer hunger-related belly aches in the morning, thus fewer trips to the school nurse. Overall test scores are higher, kids concentrate better, solve problems quicker, and have better hand-to-eye and muscle coordination.

Time management is the biggest reason for the lack of breakfast. Planning and getting organized the night before can save a lot of time during a busy morning. Keeping the meal simple and taking food to go speeds up the process.

Protein and carbohydrate foods are important for brain function and energy. A glass of milk with peanut butter on toast packs plenty of both. The same

is true with cheese and crackers, which can be eaten on the go.

Sugar-laden cereals and packets of sweet instant oatmeal offer a lot of carbohydrates with very little protein. Steer clear of these common breakfast foods. If they must be part of the morning routine, add a hard-boiled egg or an ounce of cheese or an extra glass of milk or a large handful of nuts. Added protein to a sugary meal keeps stomachs full for longer.

People eat breakfast foods for dinner all the time. How about dinner foods for breakfast? My daughter loved frozen peas and cheese nachos before school. My son jumped at the chance to eat leftover meat lovers pizza. The two of them would compete to get dressed for the first choice of leftovers at breakfast time.

some cereals and imitation fruit drinks have little nutritional value. Serving them before school is like taking a test with a broken pencil or gym class with shoes tied together. Read nutrition labels to find items that do not list sugar as one of the first ingredients.

Instant breakfast powder mixed with milk is a quick meal replacement. When poured into a container with a lid, a few good shakes can provide nearly 15 grams of protein


