Dana Meyer, an international concert violinist and violist, established the Music City Strings in Franklin. Her dream was to create a program that would help children become confident and accomplished artists. As demands on her studio and time increased, she invited Frank Auer, a violinist and teacher from Franklin, to become co-director.

Today that program consists of 45 students in violin and viola, ranging from beginner to advanced. Ages range from four years of age to eighteen, with many siblings, parents, and grandparents participating in various everyday events. Central to the program of Music City Strings is the belief founded by Dr. Suzuki: Music has the ability to improve the human spirit, open the heart, and make finer human



beings of all that it touches. Music City Strings strives to enrich the community by bringing music and culture to various venues throughout the state.

Students of Music City Strings have traveled all over Tennessee, and many have traveled extensively in the US. Since its inception, students of Music City Strings have been recipients of Young Artists Achievement Award winners throughout the Association of Music Teachers competitions, winners of the Nashville Symphony's Thor Scholarship, Middle Tennessee Suzuki Association scholarship recipients, and first place winners in the Tennessee Music Teachers Association.


