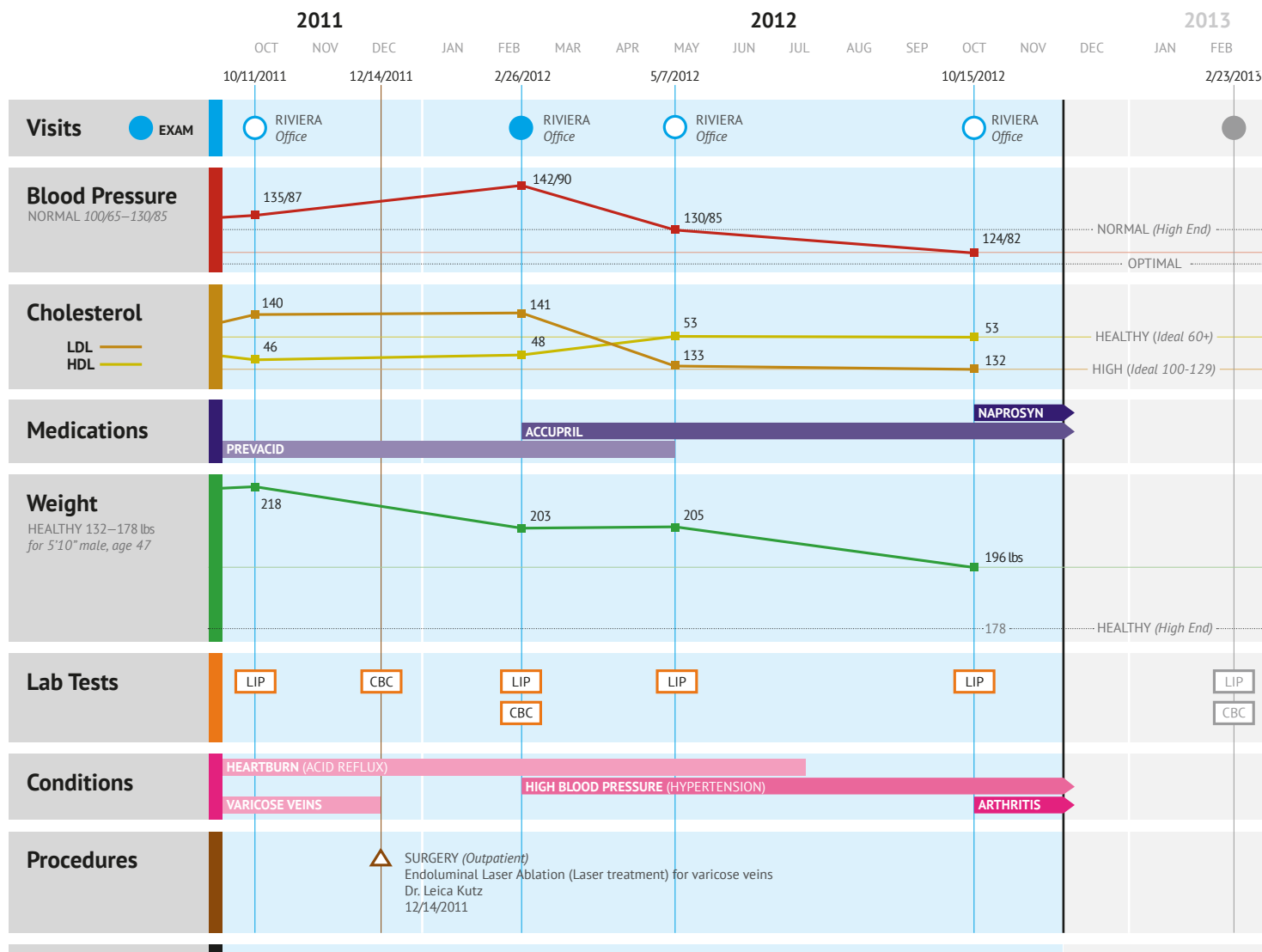

CURRENT CONDITIONS

ARTHRITIS (OSTEOARTHRISIS)

STATUS: Chronic
AGE AT ONSET: 47
FIRST DIAGNOSED: 10/15/2012

John has intermittent severe pain in the left wrist and right foot. The pain tends to resolve in the morning, then increase as the day progresses.

PLAN OF CARE

ACTION: Try elastic hand gloves for arthritis. Found in craft shops.

MEDICATION: Naprosyn -- Take one 250mg pill, twice a day. If pain persists, may increase to two 250 pills twice a day. Take with food.

FOLLOWUP: Schedule a followup visit in 6 weeks. If pain does not lessen, call sooner.

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE (HYPERTENSION)

STATUS: Moderate
AGE AT ONSET: 46
FIRST DIAGNOSED: 2/26/2012

Discovered at annual physical checkup.

PLAN OF CARE

ACTION: Reduce salt in diet, lose weight and increase exercise.

MEDICATION: Simvastatin: 100 mg once daily

FOLLOWUP: Schedule followup appointment in 8 weeks

UPDATES: Blood pressure was lower at recheck on May 7, 2012. Continue medication and begin weight loss regimen.

HEARTBURN (ACID REFLUX)

STATUS: Potentially chronic
AGE AT ONSET: 40
FIRST DIAGNOSED: 2/20/2010

Patient complained of chest pain after eating and when lying down. Was taking 12 Tums daily.

PLAN OF CARE

ACTION: Eat smaller meals and stop eating 4 hours before bedtime. Lose weight.

MEDICATION: Prevacid, one 15mg Pill once daily

FOLLOWUP: Schedule recheck visit in 2 weeks.

UPDATES: Recheck 3/10/2010 showed some symptom relief

PAST CONDITIONS

VARICOSE VEINS

STATUS: Resolved
AGE AT ONSET: 44
FIRST DIAGNOSED: 12/4/2009

Patient limped into office complaining of severe leg pain and leg itching. A skin ulcer was developing on the surface.

PLAN OF CARE

ACTION: Elevate feet and legs in the evening and during sleep.

FOLLOWUP: Referred to Dr. Leica Kutz for analysis. Surgery was performed on 12/14/2011.

When viewing electronically, patients will be able to click on a diagnosis and pull up NIH information on the condition.

The patient electronic version will have the capability to track actions and conditions to help patient memory and chronic condition management. The system will automatically timestamp when the data was input for each day. Actions will include: Medications taken, exercise, food eaten, pain level, symptoms, and "How I feel today." The patient can select for the physician to see the data, or print it out for a visit.

LIPID PANEL (LIP)

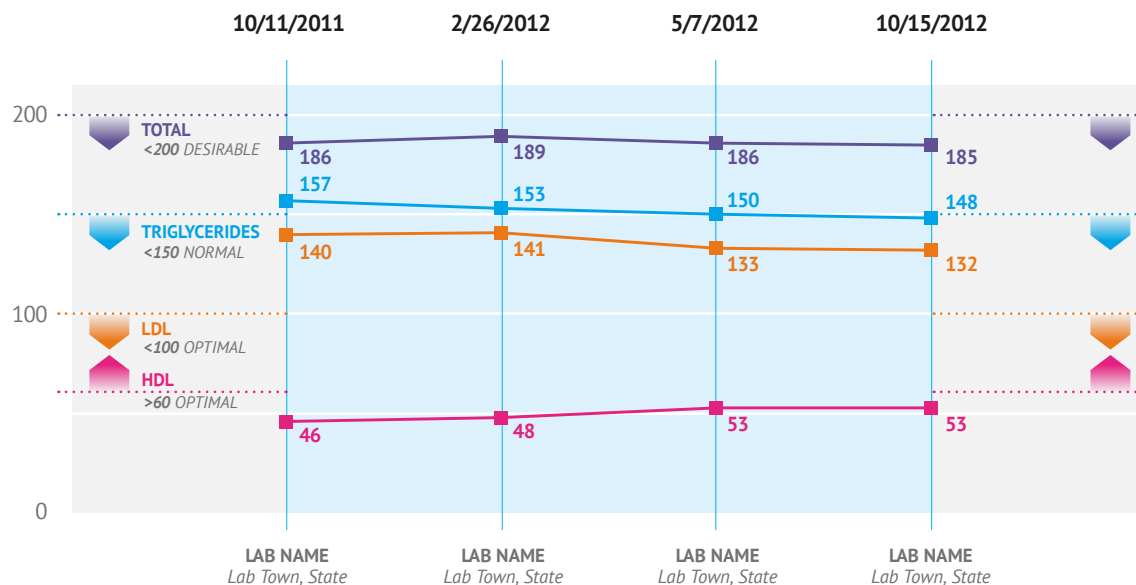
METRICS:

LDL (low-density lipoprotein cholesterol, also called "bad" cholesterol)

HDL (high-density lipoprotein cholesterol, also called "good" cholesterol)

Triglycerides (fats carried in the blood from the food we eat. Excess calories, alcohol, or sugar in the body are converted into triglycerides and stored in fat cells throughout the body)

TOTAL (LDL+HDL)
