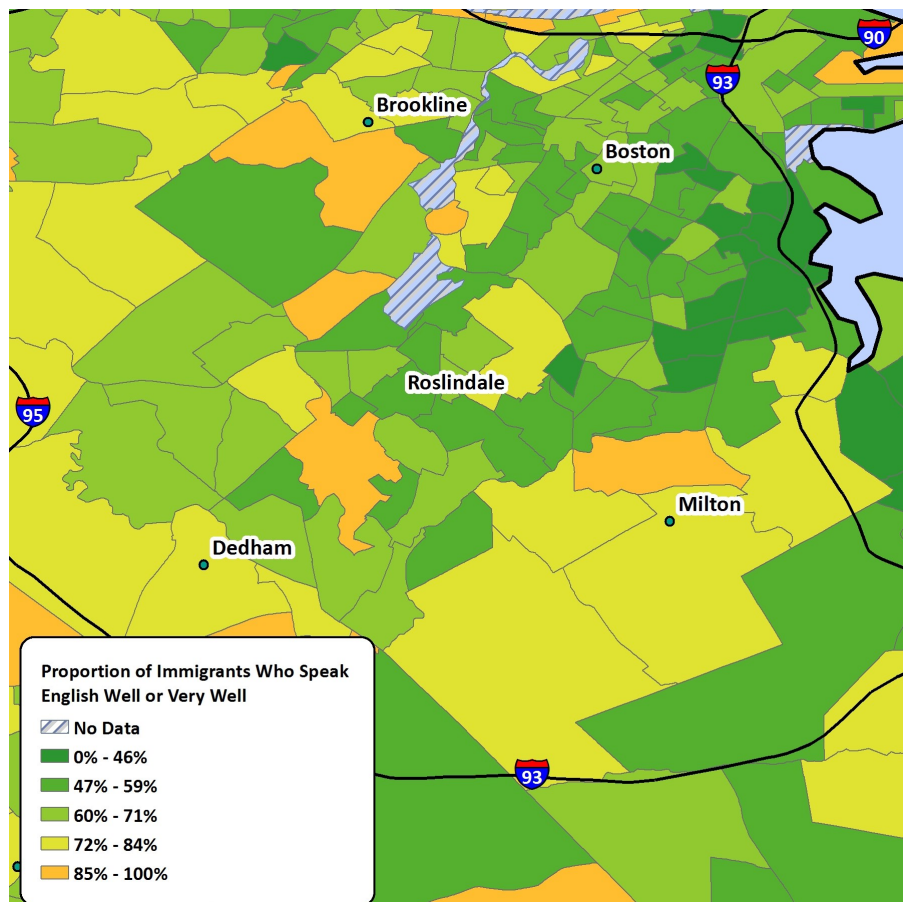

Rate of English Competency among Immigrants in Census Tracts of the City of Boston

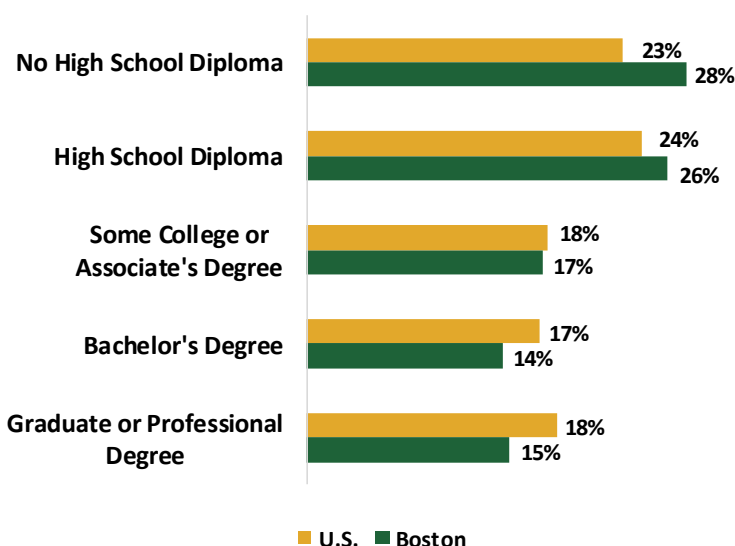


The map on the left presents the rate of English competency among immigrants in Census tracts of the City of Boston. Special attention is given to tracts in and near the neighborhood of Roslindale. In the Census tracts of this area, English competency among immigrants ranges from approximately 47 to 100 percent.

Note that immigrant adults in Boston are characterized by a lower level of educational attainment when compared to the national population of immigrant adults.

Spanish is the most common language spoken at home among immigrants in Boston. English is the second most common language spoken at home among immigrants in Boston. French or Haitian Creole is the third most common language spoken among immigrants in Boston. There are 71 additional languages spoken by the 17 percent of immigrants in the "All Other Languages" category.

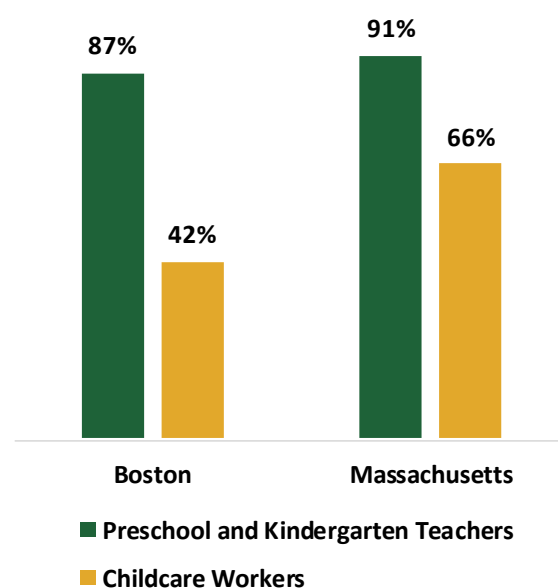

The table on the left presents the distribution and rate of English competency of employed immigrant workers across industrial groups in Boston. Roughly 32 percent of immigrant workers are employed in education, health and social services. The rate of English competency among these workers is approximately 83 percent.

The graph below presents the rate of English competency among immigrant preschool and Kindergarten teachers, and immigrant childcare workers in the city of Boston. Roughly 87 percent of immigrant preschool and kindergarten teachers in Boston speak English. Approximately 42 percent of immigrant childcare workers in Boston speak English.
