


The map above presents the most common year of entry among immigrants in Census tracts of Massachusetts. In dark green tracts, the largest proportion of immigrants arrived before 1990. In light green tracts, the largest proportion of immigrants arrive after 1990. In orange tracts, the largest proportion of immigrants arrived in 2010 or later.

Note that light green Census tracts are clustered around the city of Boston. There are also some orange tracts near the city. This indicates that immigrants who live near Boston arrived in relatively recent years, and may relate to recent growth of the urban and suburban areas.

The largest three communities of immigrants in Massachusetts speak Spanish, English, and Portuguese. There are also more than 91 languages spoken by immigrants in Massachusetts that represent the remaining 25% of speakers.

The map on the left presents the most common race among immigrants in Census tracts of Massachusetts. In green tracts, the largest proportion of immigrants are non-white. In orange tracts, the largest proportion of immigrants are white.


Note in the chart at the lower left, that the Dominican Republic is the most common country of birth among immigrants in Massachusetts.

Below data shows that roughly 55 percent of immigrants in MA entered the U.S. in 1990 or later years.
