




Median Personal Income among Immigrants in Southwestern Missouri



Median Income among Immigrant Households in Barry, McDonald, Stone, and Taney Counties



The map on the left presents the median personal income among immigrants in Census tracts of southwestern Missouri. Barry, McDonald, Stone, and Taney counties are highlighted because they belong to one "Public Use Microdata Area" (PUMA). Estimates in tables and charts throughout this fact sheet were produced using this public use geography. Immigrants in Census tracts of southwestern Missouri are characterized by relative small median personal incomes.

Overall, immigrants in Barry, McDonald, Stone, and Taney counties are characterized by smaller household incomes when compared to immigrants throughout Missouri.

Almost half of the immigrants in Barry, McDonald, Stone, and Taney counties were born in Mexico.



Most Common World Region of Birth among Immigrants in Census Tracts of Southwestern Missouri




The map on the left presents the most common world region of birth among immigrants in Census tracts of southwestern Missouri. Barry, McDonald, Stone, and Taney counties are highlighted here. In many Census tracts, the most common world region of birth among immigrants is Central America and Mexico. This is indicated by a lime green color.

Across Barry, McDonald, Taney, and Stone counties, the largest proportion of immigrants identify as White Hispanic. Note that almost 1 in 5 immigrants prefer not to identify their race or ethnicity.

The largest proportion of immigrant households across Barry, McDonald, Taney, and Stone counties contain zero children. When compared with the population across Missouri, the immigrants in these select counties have fewer children on average, except for families with four or more children.
