

Country of Birth

Foreign-born household heads living in Buffalo, NY and the select counties come from a variety of countries (see Figure 3). There are greater percentages of immigrants from Burma and Bangladesh living in Buffalo, NY compared to immigrants in the U.S. Additionally, due to the close proximity of Buffalo, NY and the select counties to Canada, there are higher percentages of immigrant household heads from Canada living in these areas compared to immigrants in the U.S.

As of 2015, an estimated 4,443,274 individuals living in New York were foreignborn,* or roughly 23 percent of the state's population. In Buffalo, NY, approximately 22,600 individuals were foreign-born (9 percent). Nationally, immigrants comprise 13 percent of the U.S. population. New York ranks 2nd among the 50 states and Washington, DC in terms of immigrant population. The cities located in and around Queens, Kings, and Bronx County reported higher than average percentages of immigrants. The eastern and central part of the state as well as the city of Oswego reported lower percentages of immigrants.

Household Family Size

Figure 2 shows the number of family members per immigrant and native-born household in Buffalo, NY, select counties in New York, and the U.S. Across these geographic areas, a majority of households a have one or two family members. In the U.S., foreign-born households (55 percent) are more likely to have larger families with three of four family members present. Similarly, foreign-born households in Buffalo, NY (45 percent) and Erie County (39 percent) were more likely than native-born households to have three or four family members.

*Foreign-born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other US territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign-born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native-born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen. Please note that the terms "foreign-born" and "immigrant" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet.

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Immigrant Household Heads in Buffalo, NY and Select Counties

Educational Attainment


Figure 4. Educational Attainment among Immigrant Household Heads in Buffalo, NY and Select Counties (Ages 25+)

Figure 4 shows the educational attainment among foreign-born and native-born household heads 25 years of age and older living in Buffalo, NY, select counties in New York, and across the U.S. Slightly less than half (42 percent) of immigrant household heads living in Erie County earned a bachelor's degree of higher. This is significantly higher compared to foreign-born (33 percent) and native-born household heads in the U.S. (33 percent), native-born household heads in Erie County (31 percent), foreign-born household heads in Chautauqua County (31 percent), and foreign-born household heads in Niagara County (28 percent). It is also important to note that compared to foreign-born (15 percent) and native-born (13 percent) household heads in the U.S., immigrant household heads in Erie County (27 percent) reported higher rates of individuals with a graduate, professional or doctoral degree.

Employment

Overall, foreign-born household heads in the U.S. (70 percent) and native-born household heads in the U.S. (62 percent) reported higher employment rates compared to foreign-born and native-born household heads in Buffalo, NY and the select New York counties (see Figure 5). Additionally, native-born household heads living in Erie, Niagara, and Chautauqua County reported slightly higher employment rates compared to foreign-born households living within the same area. However, immigrant household heads living in Buffalo, NY (60 percent) reported higher employment rates compared to native-born household heads living in Buffalo, NY (54 percent); foreign-born household heads living in Erie (58 percent), Niagara (54 percent), and Chautauqua County (47 percent); and nativeborn household heads living in Niagara (59 percent) and Chautaugua County (58 percent).


Occupation

Figure 6 highlights the top five occupational groups among employed immigrants living in in Buffalo, NY, select counties in New York, and the U.S. Overall, foreign-born and native-born household heads living in these geographic areas were employed in a variety of occupational groups. It is important to note that employment patterns among foreign-born household heads living in Buffalo, NY and Erie, Niagara, and Chautauqua counties are similar to employment patterns of foreign-born household heads within the U.S. A majority of occupational groups held by foreign-born workers tend to be more labor intensive and involve production occupations while native-born household heads were employed in office and management occupations; however there are a few exceptions. While in Buffalo, NY more than one-third (37 percent) of foreign-born household heads were employed in production, sales, or building and grounds cleaning and maintenance occupations, in Erie, Niagara, and Chautauqua County there are similar proportions of foreign-born workers and native-born workers employed in office and management occupations. In Erie County while 12 percent foreign-born household heads were employed in production occupations the subsequent top four occupational groups among foreign-born household heads in Erie County include educational, health, management, and office occupations. Similarly, while 9 percent of household heads in Niagara County reported working in building and grounds cleaning and maintenance occupations, 40 percent of foreign-born household heads and 40 percent of native-born household heads in Niagara County were employed in office and administrative support occupations, sales, production, or healthcare practitioners and technical occupations. Lastly, in Chautauqua County, foreign-born and native-born household heads were employed in both labor intensive/production occupations as well as office and management occupations at similar rates.

Household Income

Figure 7 highlights the household income among immigrant households living in Buffalo, NY, select counties in New York, and the U.S. Overall, compared to native-born households, foreign-born households in the U.S. and in Erie, Niagara, and Chautauqua County earn less income (under \$40,000). Additionally, native-born households in the U.S. reported the highest median household income (\$50,500) followed by native-born households in Erie County (\$47,635), native-born households in Chautauqua county (\$46,476), and native-born households in Niagara County (\$46,253). However, foreign-born households living in Buffalo, NY (\$26,931) and native-born households living in Buffalo, NY (\$28,455) reported the lowest median household income when compared to foreign-born and native-born households in the U.S. and across the select New York counties.
