Great hospitality can be defined in different ways. For some it's white gloved and discreet. For others it's a casual "make yourself at home" attitude. In the mountains the foundation of true hospitality is taking care of others.

I first came to appreciate this early in my mountaineering career. In 1980 I was invited to join some very good friends on an expedition to the Cassin Ridge on Denali in Alaska. I was tempted but in the end decided in favour of a month of rock climbing in Yosemite Valley and the mountains of British Columbia.

It's not uncommon for climbers to get delayed by the notorious storms on North America's highest peak, so we were unconcerned at first when we hadn't heard from our friends. But as days passed we became increasingly worried. My climbing partner and I were in the Bugaboos so we made a trip down the road to a phone in Radium, only to learn that an extensive aerial search had been unable to find any trace of our friends and that they were presumed buried by an ice avalanche on the Kahiltna Glacier.

We headed back up Bugaboo Creek road well after dark, grieving for our friends and shell-shocked by the realization

that we'd come so close to sharing their fate. By the time we got to the fork in the road by the Bugaboo Lodge we knew we couldn't go any further. It was after midnight and we were physically and psychologically spent. We snuck into the lodge and crashed in a corner, hoping to escape unnoticed at first light.

My next memory is being woken by a woman calmly asking us what we were doing there. We sheepishly blurted out our story, expecting to get booted out. Instead, Lynne Grillmair told us that we were welcome to have some breakfast before we hiked up to the climbers' hut to collect our belongings, and that if we ever found ourselves in a similar situation we should knock on her door and she'd find us a bed. We realized gratefully that there was something different about this place.

That something different is the authentic mountain hospitality that sets CMH apart from other world class vacation options. And it has its roots in the experience of Hans Gmoser, who as a young newcomer to Canada worked for Elizabeth Rummel at Sunburst Lodge near Mt. Assiniboine.

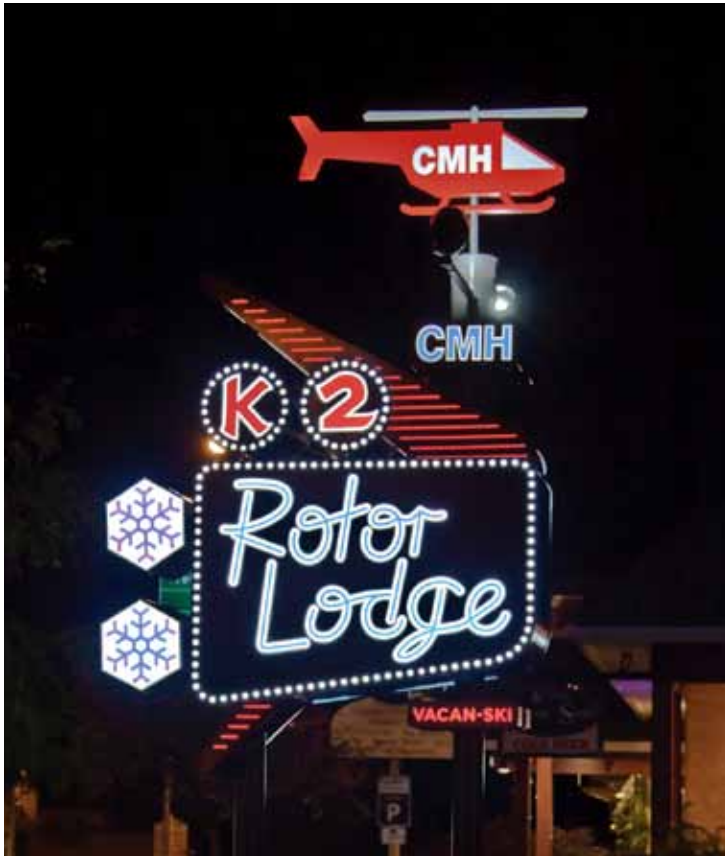
There was nothing fancy about Lizzy's operation. The main lodge was a simple one room building set on an emerald-colored lake below one of Canada's most picturesque peaks. It attracted a diverse clientele to ski tour in winter, and hike and climb in summer. Guests and staff lived together, sharing meals and chores.

Hans marveled at the camaraderie that developed with a Harvard professor, an electrician from Calgary and a Wall Street banker. In this environment the distinctions that seemed so important in the outside world melted into irrelevance like a late summer snowfall. Here they were all fellow adventurers sharing a common passion, eagerly allowing themselves to fall under the spell of that magical place.

This is the philosophy of hospitality that Hans brought to CMH and that we carry on today. There's a German word for it - *hutzenzauber*, or hut magic. Our lodges have grown and the amenities are fancier, but the spirit remains the same. Every week we welcome people from around the world as guests into our home. We share our passion for the mountains, skiing and hiking, in remote and beautiful locations, away from the busy-ness of everyday life. We provide comfortable yet unpretentious accommodation, and informal yet personally authentic and professionally attentive service. Then we let the magic happen.

Expect the K2 Sasquatch to make an appearance, too, leading pub crawls and impromptu plunges into crystal-clear Upper Arrow Lake.

Not that this deal needs sweetening, but Mike also revealed one tangible bonus for every single rider who books a session at CMH K2. "You'll get a free pair of next year's K2 skis of your choice the following autumn."

Private programs in Revelstoke and the Monashees, at a price that is often only about 10 per cent more than Signature Heli-Skiing with extra vertical, are filling up quickly.

We also have the Nomads program with access to multiple legendary Heli-Ski areas. The Nomads North is based out of the Gothics Lodge with access to the Monashees and Gothics terrain. With the advantages of a single group, Nomads are able to ski runs such as Run of the Century with greater frequency than our regular groups.

The Nomads South is yet another game-changer. Private chalets, an award-winning chef, and a base at the Halcyon Hot Springs Spa. Access to the Bugaboos, Galena, Kootenay and Revelstoke terrain for a near-mythical skiing experience.

Harnessing up for another,
even wilder high

ADVENTURE

I never dreamed I'd be back. Yet here I am, slipping into my climbing harness again, three summers after scaling CMH's original "sphincter-tightening" Mount Nimbus Via Ferrata. That's how I described reaching the needlelike summit in my original story for the *Toronto Star*. Now I'm eager to be among the first to try their latest ground breaking creation. Dubbed the wildest new adventure in North America, the Conrad Glacier Adventure Hike promises to be a thrilling, adrenaline filled day of high alpine hiking and climbing.

Conrad Glacier Extreme would be closer to the truth.

According to Bobbie Burns area manager Bruce Howatt, his team's latest creation isn't a via ferrata, nor is it anything remotely like a traditional hike. It's eight exhilarating hours of hiking, navigating wild canyons using bridges and rungs, ascending colourful rock slabs alongside serious waterfalls, ziplining over whitewater streams, traversing rock walls next to a massive glacier, and scaling dizzying patches of near vertical rock. By the time my companions and I reach our waiting chopper and set off back to the lodge for cocktails and conversation in the hot tub, we're grinning from sweat soaked ear to ear.

"This course certainly challenges you and takes you to places you never thought you could go," says Bill Nevill, a dentist from the outskirts of Toronto here with his teenage son, Andrew. "There were plenty of times where I thought 'crap, I didn't think I could do that'. But you just focus on the next rung and where you're going."



Of course it can be hard to focus on that next rung when you're constantly distracted by some of the most scenic wild mountain scenery imaginable. Blue glaciers, burnt orange rock and emerald ponds are everywhere, like the one I plunged into for a bracing lunchtime dip.

"This experience is far beyond my imagination," says Simon Gan Teow Hooi, an interior designer from Malaysia. "It's one of those things that you just have to do at least once in your lifetime. It wasn't easy but I always felt safe. As long as there is a clip and wire, you can take me as high as you want and it feels damn good."

Conrad Kain, the legendary mountain guide who shares a name with the crevasse strewn glacier at the centre of today's adventure, would have undoubtedly echoed Simon's sentiment. In the spirit of this fearless innovator who injected such passion and imagination into the sport of mountaineering, the Bobbie Burns team has created a unique, intense and inspiring alpine experience. Some might even call it extreme.

National Geographic Explorer-in-Residence Wade Davis COMES HOME WITH CMH

In the 1970s, a young British Columbia-born boy became a seasonal park ranger in Bugaboo Provincial Park. It was one of many early experiences that led him on a global odyssey of exploration and adventure, eventually earning him a PhD in ethnobotany from Harvard University and the status of Explorer-in-Residence at the National Geographic Society. He has been described as “a real-life Indiana Jones” and has been the focus of Hollywood and IMAX movies. But when Wade Davis and his wife Gail joined CMH for a Heli-Hiking trip in the Bugaboos last July, as part of our annual Speaker Series, it was like he was coming home.

Wade is author of more than a dozen books and 180 scientific and popular articles, and his cultural research has taken him to all corners of the globe. He uncovered the drug which plays a role in creating zombies in voodoo practice, he researched the use of coca leaves at high altitudes in South America and he wandered rain-forests in the Amazon basin for months at a time.

On the first evening of our trip, after warm-up hikes in Chalice Creek, Easy Roll and Groovy, we were treated to a presentation that was a summary of Wade's 2009 Massey Lecture: “The Wayfinders.” For all of us, it was a stirring introduction to his deep background in anthropology, culture and languages. We also experienced the poetry of his ideas, a trait long-known to those who have heard Wade lecture around the world.



On the second evening, fresh from a full day in the mountains, we listened to Wade describe the results of his decade-long research into the links between the British expeditions to Mount Everest in the early 1920's and that country's shattering experiences in World War I.

Finally, on the third evening, Wade shared his perspectives with us on the Sacred Headwaters project. This, his current labour of love, is an initiative to save an area at the headwaters of the Stikine, Nass and Skeena Rivers of B.C. from a major proposal for a coal-bed methane development and a separate open pit mine. His words and images quickly transported us to this magical part of northern B.C., where Wade and Gail make their home for part of each year. It was such a compelling story, and some guests immediately asked: "How can we help?" (visit www.sacredheadwaters.com for more information).

Some of our guests on this special trip chose to join us because of Wade's presence. For others, the ability to walk ridge-tops and alpine basins with him and to hear his stories was simply luck and good timing. For all, it was an honour and a privilege to share mountain-time with Wade Davis.

Great news: Wade and Gail have agreed to join CMH again in the Bugaboos July 21 - 24, 2013. You too can meet and hike with this fascinating researcher, author and explorer.
