

Dear OHFA Client,

On April 22, 2009, an Oklahoma Housing Finance Agency (OHFA) laptop computer was stolen. Contained on the computer was personal data for some of our clients participating in the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program. The data included names, Social Security numbers, Tax Identification Numbers, addresses, dates of birth and telephone numbers. An investigation into the theft is being conducted by the Oklahoma City Police Department.

Because the computer was password and log-in protected and the file on the computer containing the above information was separately password and log-in protected, we believe that it is unlikely that the information can be retrieved from the stolen equipment. At this time, we have no evidence that the personal information has been accessed or used for illegal purposes.

OHFA is taking precautionary steps by informing and advising all affected clients about safeguard measures dealing with privacy protection. You may contact the credit reporting agencies listed below and request a free fraud alert on your credit files. You may also request that a statement be added to your files requiring creditors to get your permission before any new accounts are opened in your name.
