One form of poetry is called an acrostic, in which the first, last or other particular letters in a series of lines spell out a word or phrase. Find weather coverage or forecasts in The Oklahoman and create an acrostic based on information it includes. Example:

Humidity makes it Worse

Exceeding records All month

A broiling summer Vacation

Temperatures too Extreme

Select a photo in this edition of The Oklahoman that catches your eye. First write a five-syllable caption. Then expand your caption into a haiku - a three-line poem with five syllables in the first and last lines, and seven syllables in the middle line. Example (based on a sports photo published March 8):

About to dunk ball Body reaching, muscles flexed Crowd is on their feet

Choose a news story in The Okahoman and rewrite it as a poem. Afterward, trade poems with a classmate who used a different story. Now, without referring back to the original in the newspaper, reverse the process and write a news story based on your classmate's poem. How close to the actual stories did you each get? Would another type of poem have been more useful to your classmate?

Cut out 15 to 20 words from headlines. Focus on clipping nouns, verbs, adjectives and adverbs. When you are done, rearrange the words to craft a poem, and then paste your poem onto paper or posterboard.

BONUS: Hold a "poetry slam" in your classroom to perform your poems aloud. You can read an article and watch a news video about a recent poetry slam for high school students at newsok.com/article/3444983.

Tear out one page of this newspaper. With a thick black marker, create a poem by blacking out words and letters. The words and letters that are left will form your poem. The example to the right won The Oklahoman's Blackout Poetry Contest youth category last year.
