We should advise  
that a topographical map  
on a scale of 150 feet to  
an inch has been prepared, cov-  
ering all the ground  
which is likely to be open  
to improvement in connec-  
tion with the University.  
Contour lines each showing  
ten feet of elevation should

be extended over the whole  
map and in that portion of  
it which would include  
the College buildings and  
your private grounds, there  
should be intermediate lines  
showing five feet of elevation.  
These may be dotted or  
colored differently from the  
regular 10 feet contours.

Roads, buildings, fences,  
springs, the outlines of woods  
and ledges, and important  
isolated rocks and trees  
should be indicated.

Dear Sir,

I have just seen  
Senator Sharp. he called at my office  
& showed me a letter he had just recd  
from Baldwin (the Contractor of our  
Fornub & St Croix RR) Baldwin writes  
that he expects some New Yorkers  
& an Eminent Engineer will be at  
Emu Cluin next week & go over the  
line of our R. R. to look it over  
with a view of taking hold with  
Baldwin & helping him build the  
Road. he asks Mr Sharp & myself  
& go on with them from here  
show them the Country, Line &c.  
The prospects for the Road being built is  
good now, about 5 miles of the South  
end is now graded at Fornub & they  
are working up toward Black River  
Falls. This will be a great thing for

Your Lands. There are a lot of very  
fine Lands along north of the line  
of the Road from 15 to 20 miles from  
the Locust line. Lands are mostly  
Finger, Maple Oak, Elm Bays & Butternut  
with interspersed all through it some  
very fine 1<sup>st</sup> quality of Pine there will  
be on each 1/4 section from 250,000  
to 500,000 ft of Pine 1<sup>st</sup> surface is  
level & gently rolling, Soil 1<sup>st</sup> rate and  
all well watered & will make good farms  
while there is Pine enough on it & make  
it sought after before Long-  
Chapman & Sharp have taken up some  
15,000 acres of the same land, further Pine  
there is probably 25 to 50,000 acres of this  
that could be located & good advantage  
now. It is in T 29. 3, 28. 3, 27. 3  
29. 4 28. 4 & 27. 4 on the Eau Claire  
River. I don't wish Sharp & Knows  
we intend or think of taking any of  
this land as they might go in them-  
selves first. It is very much such land  
as we walked over when we went to the

woods, just before we got to Stevens,  
full as good as that, same quality of  
Pine, speaking of Stevens, all the land in  
East of him & around your 160 acres  
is now taken under Homestead &  
new entries have been made there  
since winter. What entries we make  
have got to be made quickly, the  
Maximum or 1,000,000 of the State  
will be reached I think in Sept.  
Some 70,000. Entered at this office in  
June, about 800,000 acres are now entered  
in the State, so you see two or three months  
may use up our privilege & then land  
can only be bought with cash at  
\$1.25 per acre. I have written this to  
Mr Woodward & speak of it in detail  
-tally to you.

I am very well satisfied thus far with  
the lands we have got. we get occasionally  
about that is not so good. where we get  
into a body of pine in a few instances  
we have gone one or two pieces beyond  
the grow, in T 36, 3 this was done & was

ortwo Lots in T 40 R. 10. W. but as a  
general thing we have got good pairs  
This is the case with others, one of my  
men was on one section that Robert  
Hubert & Co of Chipewin Falls have, he  
said that one half of it was not good,  
In the Payfield District in Towns 41, & 42

I have got the Crown, only last week

the Lands & said they had it all right,  
I told them I thought Cornell of My had

would go up & see if there was any left.  
I saw another Seal hunter from Stevens

It is a terrible season & select Land  
it has been so wet that the Swamps  
are wet, & the flies & mosquitoes almost  
kill a man, we could not stand it  
one day, their bite is so bad that a thin  
skinned Span man will become sick  
actually sick with the amount of poison  
Some few men have some of the symptoms  
of rattlesnake poison just from mosquitoes  
bites. Several men have gone home  
3 Michigan men came in today. They  
were out 10 days, they are at work for  
men in Michigan & have 1/3 of the Land  
for selecting. They say they cant stand  
& start for Michigan in the morning.  
My wife is very anxious to go East, her mother  
is very low & probably will not live though

the summer, I think she will go next month,  
she is anxious I should go with her  
& I shall if possible in Sept. Still I shall  
make the securing of this land my first  
business, I shall leave & stick close at  
it until the 1000,000 acres is reached,  
I don't know but you or Mr W, were thinking  
of coming out this summer, I would say  
that we would not have much time  
& look at anything, still I should  
be glad to see you of course, but I feel  
that the first thing is to secure all the  
Cure of this Pine Land,

Michigan is full down, & Minnesota  
nearly so, so that Wisconsin is over-  
looked for the present, & the difference in  
cost of 100 acres now & 3 months  
hence is nearly 100% you see,

My family are pretty well, C. G. is with  
me working like a good fellow, Mary  
is in good health.

Dear Sir; - I took the liberty to write  
last winter  
to you, in regard to the S. (Southern) C. (Confederacy) Rail Road  
which they propose to build thro' the town of Berkshire in  
Tioga County, where I own a small amount of real estate  
upon which my father resides and where I have lived  
heretofore tho' my <sup>business</sup> has been in this village for some time  
when I wrote to you last winter from East-Berkshire  
I, indirectly, if not directly, informed you that the S. <sup>out</sup>  
C. (Carolina) R.R. was a measure, we were opposed to  
first & last, but more especially on account of the  
Bonding scheme, for that is the only way in which the Road  
could be built thro' the valley of the East-Owego Creek.

At the time I wrote to you I suggested to you the unit-  
ing of this Road with the Ithaca & Towanda R.R. and the  
consolidation of the two Companies - and to compensate Osgood  
for the loss of the Road to push thro' the extension of the  
"Chemung Canal" altho' I have not heard from you di-  
rectly I suppose you could not if you desired effect  
that object and as matters are turning as they are I heartily

Endorse your action on the "Chemung Canal Extension" &  
<sup>several</sup> the Rail Road projects. I am glad you are at work  
with the Towanda Road, via Waverly; and my brother  
Living in the town of Dryden (your County) informed me  
a day or two since that the "Snake Shore Road" - which has  
been surveyed, was not abandoned yet, but instead of  
following the Snake, can't the "Towanda" (or the "Cayuga Susq")  
Road at Attaca be extended, via, the Outlet, or head of the lake  
<sup>and Salmon Creek;</sup>  
or, upon the hill south-east of Attaca, to the old survey<sup>ed</sup>  
and partly graded route of the Snake Ontario, (Schuyl-  
New York, N.Y.), once upon this route from Attaca, by  
either of the proposed ways, a Rail-Road could be built  
easily thro' Auburn, down the Owasco outlet, to Port Byron,  
thence thro' Congruest (Center) & Victory, and down the Little  
Sodus Creek (crossing the S. C. Road at Heartville) and  
continuing thro' Stirling, Center to Oswego.

And would not this Route be preferable to the  
Snake-Shore? Oswego would have an important interest  
in this, <sup>road,</sup> as would also Port Byron a rival place of Warehouse  
Auburn tho' not so largely interested would no doubt  
be favorable towards it, but as the most important  
to Attaca, and she with Oswego could well afford to resist

the Road, with the aid of the towns on the line, viz:  
Lansing, Seneca, Venie, - Throop, Montz, Congruest,  
Victory & Stirling, in order to avert the loss that will be  
inevitably, <sup>to the true places & to Pt. Byron</sup> if the S. C. is built, with no competing line will  
prove the greatest injury to Attaca's prosperity as well  
as to Oswego, and the smaller places, along the route  
I have here indicated, that the S. Central will not touch

You will see the importance of following  
the route of the "S. C., & N. Y. Co." of touching at Auburn  
also of going thro' Pt. Byron Congruest & Victory & Stirling,  
and crossing the S. C. at Heartville (the first station from  
Fair Haven) in this way - a Road from Oswego to Attaca  
would get its just proportion of business with the S. C.  
which could not, <sup>be done</sup> by a road along the Snake Shore -  
but if the towns of Sedgwick, Springport & Arden  
wanted a Rail-Road via Snake-Ridge, Aurora, Union Sp,  
to Cayuga - (which could be extended thro' Montezuma to  
Snake Ontario, perhaps Basin Haven Bay) this might  
in a few years give Attaca another Road, but the one  
to Oswego (via Auburn) is of the greatest importance  
So the S. C. (or the N. Y. R. R. Co. dead! or can't  
be revived! but there would, <sup>be</sup> nothing to be gained perhaps

to revive it in getting a Road to Oswego and if  
the S. C. <sup>has</sup> the right to their old road from Sodus Bay to Aitha  
or should be built there, Athaca must be awake to getting  
a Road, else Oswego will connect with the S. C. at the  
"Bay" by a Road along the lake from Oswego to Fair Haven.

It would be to the interest of Oswego to do so but  
can be easily bro't over in favor of the Athaca Road.

You have doubtless learned the S. C. R. R. Co. are alleging  
that their Road is under contract, while I do not presume  
to question the fact, one thing is a query <sup>with me,</sup> why <sup>ask</sup> the R. R. Co.  
in Berkshire still getting signatures to the assent to have the  
town bonded, for the original 15 per cent, also for the ad-  
ditional 10 per cent? It is claimed that the Contractor  
Mr. Robertson builds the road \$250,000 less than the Engineer's  
estimate also takes \$250,000 stock in the road, and upon  
his own hook builds three steamers upon Lake Ontario  
run from Sodus Bay to Toronto. Will you at Athaca  
do anything about your ~~the~~ ship canal?

Hoping you will be returned to Albany this  
Fall for another two years I subscribe myself.

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
