The Men of Science who have by their Discoveries become identified with the History of the Magnetic Telegraph.

"No man is ever any thing but the product of his age; and if any man tower high among his fellows, it is because the great throng and press of generations before, of associates at his side, and of successors behind, have forced him to his eminence."—Rev. Dr. Samson.

It is proposed to erect at the National Capital of the United States a Memorial Monument in honor of Professor Morse to symbolize the History of the Electro-Magnetic Telegraph; and it is designed that this Monument shall do justice alike to the Inventor as well as to his early associates, who aided him in the development and extension of his great invention; while the men of science whose discoveries indicated and were subsequently applied to the invention of the Electric Telegraph will adorn the Monument.

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

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
