ROSENBERG was interrogated principally with regard to an alleged thirty-point program he had published in October 1941 for the National Reich Church (a church to be set up by the German State). ROSENBERG could not recall having published any such program nor could he recall any of the points therein as presented to him. He stated that he had been opposed to what he called "confessional churches" for many years and had included a chapter in his book "The Myth of the 20th Century". He further stated, however, that he had done nothing to implement his opposition to churches nor had he made any recommendations for legislation which adversely affected churches. ROSENBERG stated that he had two conferences with Reichbishop MUILER who had been commissioned to form some sort of German church that would not be in opposition to the ideology of the Nazi Party but disclaimed any formal connection with MULLER's activities.

Part of the interrogation period was devoted to asking ROSENBERG about his acquaintanceship with HESS and the reactions of HESS to ROSENBERG (1) before HESS's departure for England and (2) on the occasions when ROSENBERG had seen HESS at the jail in Nurnberg during their exercise periods. This line of questioning was for the benefit of the French psychiatrists examining HESS and had no other relation to the case.
