3. BACKGROUND:

4. DETAILS OF ARREST:

EIDENSCHINK, charged with being an Abwehr agent, was arrested by 307 th Munich Det.CIC at Munich on 30. May 1945 and was received at Internment Camp No. 6 on 24 June 1945.

5. FINDINGS:

EIDENSCHINK managed his own bank in Munich from 1932-1945. Subject was also a member of the Stock Exchange in Munich, the Bavarian Hypotheken und Wechselbank, the German Allgemeine Treuhand AG Munich, the Austria Tobacco Plants AG, Vienna, Machine Tool Factory, Gumbinnen, and the Gemeinschaftswerke of the DAF. In addition to this he was on the administration board of the Tobacco Concerne Autro Bulgar Sofia, Austro Hellenique Saloniki, CONFIDENTIAL



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and Austro Turque Istambul. Subject conductedmost of his busines: with firms in foreign countried.

During 1942-45 EIDENSCHINK made trips to France, Switze Turkey, and Bulgaria. While in France in 1943, subject was negoti with Banker Arthur Schauvliege, Merrnplatz Paris, in regard to a patent for a small generator (Kleingenerator) for tanks. He also negotiated with a French Airforce Captain to gain a patent for Gefpr the production of a cartridge-case made out of plastic. Subject had further connection with Dr.Jul Krachling, Paris, Gebr.Lercy Daduriei, Fa. Worms and Co. Paris, and Dr. Streichenberg, Paris.

In December 1944 Gauleiter Koch (Königsberg) stated to so that numerous Gauleiters were going to Switzerland to buy arms from the English and Americans in exchange for foreign currency and gold, to enable the Volkssturm to fight the Russians. In agreement with State Secretary Hayler (Reichwirtschaftsministerium), who was also furnishing the foreign currency, subject was supposed to buy and from the kernish and kernish and kernish and kernish and kernish and the guarantee that they would only be used against the Russians. Subject declared that this seemed impossible, but stat that he would try to get some information to this this effect. Durin his stay in Switzerland in February 1945 he inquired of arms of any sort had been bought; the results were negative.

EIDEN SCHINK claims to have had close connection with Hans Thierfelder, presumably a Swiss representative of the American CIC, r siding at Grand-Hotel Dolder in Zurich. In February 1945, subject win claims to have submitted a report about Messerschmidt Airplanes to 'r. Thierfelder.

EIDENSCHINK's reports to the Abwehr were few in number. Though he joined the party in 1931, he never became anything more than a paying member, and was active in anti-Nazi activities, including helping the Freiheitsaktion Bayern (Bavarian Freedom Movements). 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EIDENSCHINK was not an actual member of the Abwehr, having no pass or papers and receiving no pay. He mades a general impression of sincerity and reliability, and it is in no way felt that he is a security threat.

6. RECOMMENDATIONS:

In view of the subject's minor connection with the Abwehr, and in view of his apparent services to the Allied Forces, it is recommended that he be released of if thought advisable, that he be released with provision that he report weekly to the local Military Government.
