The attached outline sets forth the subjects which are of primary interest to the Office of the U. S. Chief of Counsel. While it is most unlikely that any one witness will have knowledge of all the matters referred to in the outline, the entire outline is included for the general information of the interrogators.

It is extremely important that each witness be questioned on any subjects within his knowledge in sufficient detail to establish the responsibility of as many government or party officials as is possible regarding the particular unlawful activities, war crimes, or atrocities disclosed by the witness. In establishing the responsibility and the complicity of high government officials in the illegalities disclosed, documents, orders and directives are of particular importance.

Triplicate copies of any documents obtained should be forwarded to the Office of the U. S. Chief of Counsel, 7 Rue de Presbourg, APO 887, U. S. Army, together with triplicate copies of all interrogations.
