Y Innocency in all and every part of the Treasons which was so desperately, maliciously, and talsely sworn against me, by those wretched and mercinary Men, Dugdale, Turbervil, Smith, and Hains; for I profess, as in the presence of the Living God, I am so far from being guilty of what they swore against me, that to the best of my knowledge, Inever spoke so much as one single word of those Treasons, to them, or either of them in my Life, or ever heard them spoke, till they themselves swore them against me in the Court; and do take it upon my Death, I never was engaged in any manner of Plot or Conspiracy what soever in my Life, against the Kings Person, Laws, or Government, or know of any that is or was, the Papists only excepted: And had it been true, as it is utterly false, that I were to have seized the King, either at White-Hall, or at Oxon, (for my Enemies first swore it at White-Hall, and afterwards at Oxon, when the Bill was found Ignoramus at London, which I desire may be observed, Turbervil being brought in for that purpose,) I do here solemnly declare, I knew not of so much as one single Person on Gods Earth, that was or would have stood by me in that Attempt. And how likely I was to have done it my felf, or that I should have trusted such profligated and necessitous wretches as Papists, Priests, and Irish-men, no way able to assist me; and those that had discovered the Treasons of their own Party, in which they were engaged (if they have sworn truth,) notwithstanding they were obliged under the severest Oaths of Secrecy, and pains of Damnation, and had broke them, where could be my hopes they would conceal mine, had I trusted them, being a Protestant, and detesting all such Doctrine which obliged men to conceal Treasons, and cut the Throats of Innocents? I say, all this considered, let all men of common sence, or honesty be my Judges. As to what Mr. Masters swore, he was unjust to me, in omitting the material part of our discourse concerning the Parliament in Forty; for when he curst them and the last Parliament at Westminster also, and said they were alike, and charged them in Forty with beginning the War, and cutting off the Kings Head, I denied both, and said it was the Papists that begun that War, and the Death of the King was the fatal consequence of it; which Mr. Charleton the Draper in Pauls Church-yard can testify, the discourse being at the farther end of his Shop, and he present; into which Masters seeing me go in, came apace from towards his own Shop, and as I believe on purpose to quarrel with me, for which God forgive him; he also well knows he had often in derision called me Col-Ionel before that in Guild-Hall, and I made him some such answer accordingly: Sir William Jennings also did me wrong, for he swore salse both as to the words and place, for I do not remember I saw him in the Court at all; but in the Coffee house; my words were, I had lost the first blood for the Parliament, I wish it be the last. I am confident that was my words; but its a wonder he mistook me no more, since he is of W—— C—— D—— and S—— &c. Club, at the Feathers Tavern by Fleet-Bridge; and Mr. C-the Coffee man himself told me, who also kept them company at that place but the Wednelday Night before I was taken.

As to the Printed Papers which Dugdale produced in the Court, I do declare I never faw them, called the Raree Show and Intercepted Letter, in his hand before that time, and therefore could not, and did not decypher any of the Pictures to him, it's utterly false. I was not the Author of those Verses called the Raree Show, neither do I know who was, or the Printer; or ever owned my self the Author of either of them Papers to him in my Life. I am reported to be a Papist, I declare I was bred a Protestant, such have I lived, and such I dye. I never saw or heard,

or was at any of their Devotions or Worship, except once at St. Jameses, about 17 or 18 years since, though about that time, and since, before the Plot was dif-

covered, I worked for several of them at their Houses.

It's reported I should be the occasion of perverting the Lady Rochester, and brought a Priest to her, one Tomson, alias, Conyers; I deny it, all I did was at the request of the Earl of Rochester, who gave me a Letter to deliver to him, which I did; but knew not the Contents, neither did that Lady report any such thing of me at her Death; I'ts said I harboured Priests and Jesuits, and they instance in one Serjeant who lay at my House in Carter-Lane, Nine years since, by the name of Dr. Smith, a Dr. of Physick, brought to me by one Monlesse an Apothecary in the Old-Baily, and one Mr. Feild a Woollen Draper within Ludgate, and was there as a Dr. of Physick, and I knew for no other.

It's said sals also, I Married my Wifes own Mother, which is notorious salse. There be some other Scandalous and Malicious Reports thrown upon me, as that I should own all that was sworn against me, except Haines Evidence, and the like, to all which I have been Examined by Dr. Marshal, whom the Bithop of Oxon did voluntarily fend to me the day after I was Condemned, and that Worthy and Pious Dr. Hall who came to me, and from whom I received the Blessed Sacrament on Sunday last, to whom I did make the same Confession and acknowledgement as I have here Incerted; particularly the which I do again affirm is truth as I shall Answer it to God Almighty, only I did acknowledge as my fault, I did believe I might have been Guilty on lome occasions, and in heat of talk, to have uttered some words of Indecency, not becoming my duty, concerning the King or his Council, and it to I do beg their Pardon; Illurther declare that Secretary Jenkins, Lord Killingsworth, and Mr. Seymer, when they Committed me, Interrogated me to many things, that I should be Privy to against the King, Mr. Seymer laying I did know the Lord Shaftsbury, Lord Howard, Mr. Fergisen were ingaged also; to all which I answered, were it to save my Life I could not accuse a man of them, or any other Person whatsoever: This day also, Inesday the 23 of August, the Messenger who brought me a Message of my Death, told me I might save my Life, would I contess who was the cause of my coming to Oxon, and upon what Account. I Anfwered him, I was glad the Confessing the truth of that would do it, and said, I came voluntarily of my felf. I rode my own Horle, spent my own Money, and neither was invited or had dependency upon any Person whatsoever; and had only one Case of Pistols and my Sword, and had the Papists, or their Party, offered to have destroyed the Parliament, as was sworn and seared they would, I was there to have lived and dyed with them. And I thought in this I had ferved the King also. But when I had said this (although the very truth) I found it was not that he wanted, and so with a Curse he left me. To what I have faid, I shall only add, for my time is short and precious, that what I have here declared is the very truth of my Case, which I shall by the help of my God Confirm with my last Breath, and Seal with my dearest Blood. I due by the hands of the Enemies of the Great God, his Christ, his Servants, his Gospel, and my Country, too which I willingly submit, and earnestly pray mine may be the last Protestants Blood that Murdering Church of Rome may shed in Christendom; And othat my Death may be a far greater blow to their bloody Cause. than I either have or could have been by my Life. The Lord God Almighty, fave England from Popery and Slavery, Bless the City of London, and Unite all good Protestants in the Nation, from one End of the Land to the other. As to the Printed Papers which the produced in the Court, I donamk and K-
