Today's speaker was Daryl Standafer, past Rotarian, introduced by Garth Christenson. Daryl gave a wonderful presentation on his tour of the Civil War Battlefields with his son and grandson. Daryl said it was a bonding trip filled with education and emotion. It was emotional in the fact that he gained perspective on the Civil War. The size and scope of what actually happened. Corinth, Mississippi is the place to visit the Shiloh Battlefield. There stands the only Confederate monument. It tells of 3 mass graves where 3400 soldiers are buried. Most battles were fought on farm land. Shiloh was named for the church that stood on the eight miles long and six mile wide field.

Daryl has photos of many monuments, some of which were in honor of the soldiers from Wisconsin that fought and died. Next on the trip was 150 miles across Tennessee to Chickamonga Battlefield. Here is where Daryl spoke mostly about how the battles were fought and the strategy that when into the planning of them.

Next was Stones River National Battlefield. It has the oldest original monument of the civil war.

Their final stop was at Fort Donelson National Battlefield which started in April 1862.

Daryl reflected on why the Civil War was fought. The South fought to preserve the plantation way of life. The North fought to preserve the Union and to end slavery. We need to study the Civil War to learn the lessons it taught us... and to never forget.




YH's father is an Eastern Doctor meaning he practices Eastern medicine like acupuncture.
