## Interim Rector's Report

Dear Brothers and Sisters of St. Andrew's,

Advent is a time of looking; looking back to Christ's birth and the beginning of the Kingdom of God, and looking forward to its fullest expression at the eschaton. While looking in both directions, we must also think of the Kingdom of God as being alive, present, and among us today. It is present, but that does not negate the fullness of the Kingdom of God is not yet fully revealed.

Living in the present means doing the work that is at hand. Christians do this by living as Christ lived, by thinking as Christ thought, and by promoting peace and justice. We live in the present with our daily round of work, but not being so absorbed we lose sight of the concerns of others.

For many of us, looking ahead also includes anticipation of the church's celebration of Christmas, the birth of Christ. For us at St. Andrew's, this is a major feast, one at which we pull out all our finest in liturgy and music, not for its own sake, but for Christ's. This is one of the high points of the church year. And the blue and rose of Advent only points to the white of Christmas.

It is not so for all southern Christians. I was discussing the frantic binge of shopping beginning on black Friday with a friend and both of us were bemoaning such ideas as "Christmas costs less . . ." She then dismissed the entire affair with the words, "Well, Christmas isn't so important after all. Easter is really the day." I disagreed quietly. "Some of us think it is very important." Her response told it all, "Oh, yes, I forgot; the incarnation."

Oh, yes indeed. Without the incarnation and birth there could be no Easter and no Pentecost. Christ's birth is a critical piece of the story of salvation and celebration of it is "very meet and right so to do."

Even as we live in the world, Advent is a time to refuse to be caught up in the marketing excesses of the world. Advent is a time for reflection and anticipation, a time of joy.

May God bless each of you during this season.

## Senior Warden's Report

From **Meanings of Christmas** by Fr. Andrew Greeley, Woman's Day, December 22, 1981

*"It might be easy to run away to a monastery, away from the commercialization, the hectic hustle, the demanding family responsibilities of Christmas-time. Then we would have a holy Christmas. But we would forget the lesson of the Incarnation, of the enfleshing of God—the lesson that we who are followers of Jesus do not run from the secular; rather we try to transform it. It is our mission to make holy the secular aspects of Christmas just as the early Christians baptized the Christmas tree. And we do this by being holy people—kind, patient, generous, loving, laughing people—no matter how maddening is the Christmas rush..."*

For the church, Advent marks the beginning of a new year in the liturgical calendar. "Advent" comes from the Latin word *adventus*, meaning "arrival," "visit" or "coming." While the secular world fills with traffic, shoppers, reindeer songs, and shiny baubles, Christians are called to get ready for the two "visits" of Christ: His first coming through the Incarnation, and His second coming as the reigning Lord.

Advent is a season of waiting, hoping, and realizing our need for a Savior. As Lent helps us look toward Easter, Advent prepares us for Christmas, and, in fact, in some Christian churches, Advent is a time of fasting and repentance.

A pull between secular and spiritual always starts around St. Andrew's Day -- and, for me, I don't mind the tug of war. Ever since the early church substituted the celebration of Christ's birth in late December for the extremely popular Roman Satunalia festival, there have been temporal aspects to Christmas and Advent alongside the eternal, religious ones (except maybe for the brief Puritan rule).

So, while part of me would really like to wait (to decorate, to turn on Christmas lights, to wrap, to cook) another part of me enjoys the bustle, shopping in large crowds, and my neighbor's Griswold-like overly lighted yard, trees, bushes, and roof.

So, I have learned to do both: slow down, read special spiritual pieces, meditate, tune out some of the worldly noise, and clear out a place in my heart for new birth. And to also

relish the sights, sounds, smells, feelings, colors, music, movies, and scramble of the secular celebration, transforming the secular into the sacred.

I am not a particularly patient person, but each year about this time, I receive a gift that helps me hone my self-restraint and calls me to pause in yearning anticipation. Last Advent, I learned that my daughter Elin was pregnant with my first grandchild -- an event for which we all pined in excited expectation. New life! This year, I wait with my son Seth as he looks forward to a seminary he has yet to discover. More new life!

And, with all of you, I also long and dream for the time (hopefully early in the new year) when we can begin to earnestly search for a new rector, when our finances are secure, and when we can recruit our consultants and name a discernment team. We have gone through a little anxiety as we entered an interim space where we had to steady our church and ourselves. Let us use this Advent time to pray that, as Christ is again made incarnate in this world, we can prepare ourselves as a congregation for new birth (new life!) here.

# Cursillo



The first Cursillos developed in the Roman Catholic Church in Mallorca, Spain, in the late 1940s. Under the leadership of their bishop, several laymen began to formulate a way to draw active laymen into the work of "Christianizing" the everyday life settings where they lived.

Eventually, the Cursillo Method found interested parties in the United States. The first Cursillo Three-Day Weekend in the United States was held in Waco, Texas, in 1957. At first, these were still held in the Spanish language, and were available only to Roman Catholics. The first English speaking weekend was in 1961 in San Angelo, Texas. In time a few Episcopalian were invited to participate in the weekends.

Alabama's first Cursillo weekend was in the 1970s, and Bishop Stough was a part of bringing the movement to Alabama. In fact, all of our bishops have been and are very supportive of Alabama Cursillo.

Today, Cursillo is emerging as a mature instrument in the hands of committed clergy and lay Christians to empower the "ministry of the laity."

## DEACON'S DESK



### St. Andrew's Parish Retreat February 19 - 21, 2010

St. Andrew's Parish Retreat - February 19 - 21, 2010 We are having our annual Parish Retreat at Camp McDowell February 19 - 21. We will be staying in Stough Lodge again. If you stay both nights and eat most meals, the weekend costs around \$100. Children under age 6 are free Children ages 6 - 10 get free lodging if they are the 3rd or 4th person in the room. 

## Jail Ministry

Deidra Daniel, the social worker at the City Jail met recently with the Wednesday Bible Study luncheon. Present were Barbara Smith, Deborah van Zalingen, Janet Griffin, Tom Fields, Lee Welden, Elizabeth Anderson, Stanley Rich, Parrish Nored, Katie Dean, Rick Noblitt, and Rick Sidwell.

She gave us an update on conditions at the jail and her need for various items. We are sending back with her today men and women's underwear, men and women's socks, pads and pens, flipflops, combs, eye glasses, shampoo, soap, toothbrush and toothpaste, men's undershirts. We are not putting them in bags this time. She will distribute as needed. We sent about fifty of each this time.

We have prepared and given to the jail before today 262 care kits, each filled with prestamped post cards, deodorants, shower shoes, toothpaste and toothbrushes, soaps, shampoo, notebooks, pens, socks, playing cards and various other items. We have also been enclosing prayer cards telling about our church and the free lunches that are provided to the underprivileged.

Some inmates are there for many months with no families to provide extras and sometimes even essentials. We will start providing on a regular basis soft cover books, magazines, playing cards, puzzles and possibly basketballs. Clear deodorants and soaps are especially needed as essential items.

Elizabeth will investigate getting bus tokens to be given as men and women are released from jail. Tommie Watkins continues to do group aids education and monitors AIDS testing on a continuing basis. Deidra will continue to let us know if there are special needs.

We will be taking a trip to the city jail and also the court house this year. We still have about a thousand dollars to continue this ongoing ministry.

Take a paperback and put \$2 bills in one of the envelopes on the bottom shelf and give it to Lisa or an office volunteer, or, if no one is in the office, slip the envelope under the door, marked "Book Exchange." Keep the book forever, give it away, or read it and bring it back.

If you bring in a paperback to add to our collection, you can take a book for \$1! Hard to beat, even at a used bookstore.

This operation will be on the Honor System.



## Annual Blanket Drive

Integrity Alabama's Ninth Annual Winter Blanket Drive Service Project. For the past eight years, Integrity Alabama has conducted a

holiday fund raiser from which the money raised is used to buy blankets for the poor.

In 2008, the annual project celebrated its biggest ingathering to date. We distributed 763 blankets to Birmingham-area homeless, working poor and people affected by AIDS last year. And, to date this ministry has now provided more than 3,300 blankets! Help make this year another success.


