

Summer Schedules Bring a Season for Renewal

This Sunday we move to our summer worship schedule when we have our annual Episcopal Visit for Confirmation. At the 10:00 a.m. service, Bishop Suffragan Kee Sloan will preach, celebrate, baptize, confirm and receive. We will all renew our baptismal covenants, a timely thing to do as we move into summer!

This schedule change serendipitously happens on the day we celebrate the Feast of Pentecost (**wear red**). Pentecost, the feast of the fire and wind of the Holy Spirit, arrives just as schools let out. Summer vacation signals a time of rest and re-creation, not only for our students and their families, but for all of us. Most would agree that after ten months of the school year routine, our pattern of living and experiencing the world, needs reshuffling.

It is easy to get into a rut. It is easy for life to be bound by patterns that can sometimes seem constrictive. This summer many of us will take off with the wind to parts unknown. Seeing life from the perspective of being in a different location physically or mentally is refreshing. The wind and fire of the Holy Spirit celebrated at Pentecost break down constrictive boundaries and ruts that can develop in our faith. Routines are healthy and helpful. But we regularly need fresh perspectives.

Although we joke about how God trusts Episcopalians to take the summers off, we know that our faith cannot take the summer off. Although things slow down at Nativity, we all need our abiding connection to Christ's presence and the Holy Spirit in Word, Sacrament and this community of faith. So here is what you can do:

Attend Sundays on Thursdays at 6 p.m. in the Chapel—especially for all you folks who get to the lake or the mountains or the beach regularly on weekends. Many have asked for this service, which is not only for Young Adults, but all ages.

Permission is granted to come casually to Nativity on Sundays! Sign up to help Blue Apron Ministry host "Lemonade in the Shade."

When travelling out of town, do your best to get to church. Bring the service leaflets back and we'll post them so all can see "where we've been."

Please keep your stewardship gifts current. Your clergy and staff and the utilities all keep on doing what they have been doing all year. Pastoral care, worship, outreach, and capital campaign construction don't take the summer off!

Experiment with a new spiritual discipline for 10-20 minutes a day. Light a candle, pray in silence, read the daily office, read the Psalms or section of scripture.

Rest, enjoy life, be grateful, accept God's blessings and peace.

May we all have a blessed summer. Much love, grace and peace in Christ to all.


CHILDREN'S NEWS

Restoration Update

Bibb Chapel now has a new roof system, and none too soon. The old metal shingles were in very poor condition and were allowing water to penetrate into the building. Remaining to be installed is a special metal cover for the stone caps that cover the tops of the walls. This covering should ensure that moisture will no longer enter the walls through the stone caps. Once that is complete, the scaffolding will be removed from the chapel.

The remaining task is to clean the interior of the chapel - no small job! The reroofing work disturbed 125 years worth of dust and soot which must be carefully cleaned up.

The masonry restoration on the church has begun with the removal of the cast iron dentil molding located below the gutters. Our contractor should be arriving on site soon with a full crew ready to go to work on the masonry restoration.

Plant Right For Your Site

Where is it sunny or shady? What is the pH of your soil? What type of soil (e.g. sandy, clay) do you have in your yard? Look around—are there plants with problems? Where do you want play areas, vegetables, color, views or privacy? How much lawn do you need or want to maintain?

Choose the right plant for the right place.

Select plants that grow well in your area of the country and fit the amount of sun, type of soil and water available in your yard. (In general, it makes sense to use low-water plants to save yourself the time and expense of watering). Think about how big a tree or shrub will be when mature (especially next to your house or driveway and near power lines).

Pick plants that resist pests.

Many garden centers and nurseries offer information about pest- and disease-resistant plant varieties. After they're established, they'll save you time and money on pest control.

Give plants a good start.


Prepare the soil by mixing one to three inches of compost into soil in planting beds. For trees and shrubs, mix compost into the whole planting bed, or just plant in existing soil and mulch thoroughly. Set plants at the correct soil level, following instructions provided with your plant. Mulch new plantings and be sure to water even drought-tolerant plants during their first few years especially in the summer and fall until they build deep roots.

Bonus Tip:

Make Space for Wildlife

You can invite birds, butterflies and other wildlife into your yard, protect streams and fish, and make a more attractive landscape.

- Consider planting native trees and plants, especially ones with berries, fruit and flowers.
- Plant in layers (ground cover, shrubs, and trees) so your landscape is like the forest.
- Don't plant invasive species—check with your local Cooperative Extension Office for a list of invasive "noxious weeds."



- Provide a bird bath or other small water source. Make sure you change the water every couple of days so your bird bath doesn't become a mosquito breeding ground.
- Leave wild "buffer" areas of native plants along ravines, streams, shorelines and fence lines.
