The mission of the Episcopal Church of the Nativity, as part of the family of God, is to proclaim and spread the word and work of God through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, by Eucharistic worship and by ministry to the world.

A RENEWED ECW NEEDS YOUR HELP

Faithful women have nurtured the life, ministry, and witness of the Church from the beginning. Blessed Mary's calm assent to the Holy Spirit's action bringing the life of God through her womb enabled Christ's Incarnation. Through Mary, the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and she is evermore known as "the God Bearer." Throughout Jesus' ministry, faithful women were in the background supporting him. They were at the foot of the Cross when all of the disciples except for John fled. The women were the first witnesses to the Resurrection.

At Nativity, faithful women through the generations have enabled Christ's life and presence to continue to come into the world. There are many Mary's and Martha's offering invaluable gifts for ministry among us. Specifically, the Episcopal Church Women (ECW) has long been a focused means for women to support our ministry in special ways. The ECW raises our awareness of offering our lives to God in gratitude through the United Thank Offering. The ECW models hospitality by hosting elegant parish receptions. And of course, the best face of Nativity hospitality is offered to the wider community, for over a century now, through the ECW Nativity Bazaar.

Yet, changing times have resulted in the need for the ECW to change. With three weekly women's Bible Studies, the Daughters of the King gathering monthly, the Top of the Hill Senior Ministry offering monthly programs, and the on-going Mission Guild, the ECW does not need to meet monthly---women are already meeting regularly. New times call for a new vision and organization.

This vision is emerging through the faithful and devoted leadership of Renee Grelier Elliott who took over the helm of the ECW this past January. However, Renee was handed the wheel of an almost deserted ship. There was no board, no other officers, and only last year's Bazaar co-chairs, Amy Brooks and Minda Alexander, to help. Beth Chenoweth is graciously serving as Receptions Chair for another year. We are all grateful to these dedicated women.

After meeting with Vestry leadership, Renee and I called for a renewed ECW that serves as an umbrella organization for the numerous groups of women involved throughout the parish. Each group provides one representative to the ECW Board. The initial June meeting discussed these ideas:

- The Board will host a fall and spring luncheon with dynamic speakers appealing to women's spirituality and interests for ALL the women of the church.
- The meetings will take place during the day but be limited to one hour to accommodate working women's schedules.
- There will also be an evening holiday event and an October meeting for final Bazaar plans.
- The Bazaar's fund raising efforts will be directed toward outreach projects, especially the longstanding support of the Oscar Mason After-School Program, other pre-identified outreach ministries, and the work of the Mission Guild. <u>Decisions will be transparent</u>.
- United Thank Offering in-gatherings will be promoted (National ECW outreach effort).
- The ECW continues to host parish receptions (assisted by the Blue Apron ministry).

Every woman in the parish is a member of the ECW! So we need the help of every woman to enable the vision to grow. No co-chairs for the 2010 ECW Nativity Bazaar have yet to be identified. Can you imagine Nativity without a Bazaar? We are looking for co-chairs for this year's Bazaar. This is a well-oiled machine with many of the volunteers already in place (particularly the Kitchen chair!). Please call Renee, Amy, or Minda if you would like to serve. The Nativity Bazaar is one of the most fun, energetic, loving, welcoming, involved days at Nativity. People are already calling for tickets and looking expectantly toward that wonderful November Thursday. An idea is developing to include the Men of the Church in an effort to raise more funds through a turkey fry! Your Vestry and I are convinced that the faithful women of Nativity will continue to offer Christ's presence through a vibrant ECW. Thanks be to God for the ECW!

Nativity to host Bishop Search & Nominating Committee Listening Group to be held at Nativity, Sunday, July 25, 3:00 p.m.

As the search for the 11th Bishop of Alabama gets underway the Search and Nominating Committee has begun a listening process to gather input from across the diocese.

The committee will hold three "Listening Groups" Sunday, July 25th, to assist in compiling a profile of the diocese for the search process. The sessions will begin at 3 p.m. at The Church of the Nativity in Huntsville, St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Birmingham, and The Church of the Ascension in Montgomery. The guided sessions are open to everyone and the committee hopes that every parish will be represented at one of the sessions which should end about 4:30 p.m. No registration is required.

The committee will be listening to hear "who we are as the Episcopal Church in Alabama," and "what qualities we believe are important in our next diocesan bishop."

THE LANGUAE OF LOSS: Putting Grief into Words - St. Mary's Sewanee

"I believe it is the sharing of our stories that saves us. And in no area do I feel this more strongly than I do with regard to grief."-Amy Lyles Wilson

Burying a loved one, being downsized at work, growing old, feeling abandoned by God, letting go of a dream...any one of life's losses can leave us speechless. All of a sudden, the language we've relied on for years no longer has the power to get us through the day, much less express our anger and confusion about our circumstances.

"Tell me about despair, yours," says the poet Mary Oliver, "and I will tell you mine." Come to the mountain and we'll talk about loss, and language, and the grace that must surely come in-between. Together we'll find the words for those times when mere words just won't do.

Participants will be invited to share their own experiences of grief while engaging with writing prompts and readings designed to translate longing into literature. You need not consider yourself a "writer" to join us. This hands-on workshop will be conducted within the principles of Amherst Writers and Artists, which fosters a safe space for the writing and telling of our stories. No one is required to read his or her work aloud, and criticism is not part of the process. While this is not a therapy group, often when we begin to "give sorrow words" we enhance our healing. GreenScaping - Reminders: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rebuy

Article 1 - Reduce

Waste

- Select low maintenance/slow growing plants and grasses.
- Reduce or eliminate plastic silt fencing and substitute with blankets, berms, and filtersocks made of compost for erosion control.
- Switch from pressure-treated wood to plastic lumber for decks, benches, and signs.
- Return wooden pallets and other shipping materials to your supplier whenever possible.
- When replacing an existing hardscape or structure, deconstruct, reuse and recycle all possible materials such as metal, wood, shingles, concrete, and pavement.
- Minimize site and soil disruptions to the maximum extent possible.
- · Cluster structures to maximize open space.
- Minimize turf grass and paved areas keep as much natural area as possible.

Water

- Incorporate compost into the soil to help improve water absorption and retention.
- Top-dress your turf with compost.
- Reduce non-permeable hardscape wherever possible.
- Place mulch over a plant's root zone to reduce moisture evaporation and conserve water.
- Install drip irrigation systems.

Clean equipment with compressed air whenever possible.
 Grass clippings and debris should be collected and composted.

Air/Energy

- Strategically plant vegetation outside and around buildings to reduce indoor heating and cooling needs.
- Use hand or electric equipment where ever feasible to reduce emissions.
- Implement scheduled equipment maintenance program for increased efficiency & reduced emissions.

Fertilizers and Pesticides

- Use compost as a soil amendment to help reduce the need for chemical fertilizers or pesticides.
- Incorporate native plants in your landscape—they generally require less fertilizers and pesticides.
- Spot treat whenever possible.
- Set mower blades higher to fight weeds and diseases without pesticides.
- Grasscycle—leave grass clippings in place (don't bag) when mowing.
- Produce less green waste by limiting fertilizer and water use.
- Use mulch around trees and in flowering beds as weed prevention.
- Purchase only what you need and can use for a specific treatment.

Climate Change

- Plant trees to shade paved areas and help reduce the summer "heat-island" effect.
- Compost organic waste in lieu of burning or burying.
