

Food that the World Cannot Give

In John's Gospel, Jesus tells the disciples who urge him to eat something after a long day's work, "I have food to eat that you do not know about....My food is to do the will of him who sent me..."A few moments earlier he told the Samaritan woman at the well, "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked you and he would have given you living water."

You and I are busy providing bread and drink for our lives. We work hard to have a good and comfortable life. We want for our children and for ourselves, healthy, nutritious, satisfying food on the table and purposeful, happy lives. So we provide good food and meaningful experiences that sustain and enrich us.

Most Episcopalians look for rewarding experiences-books to read, art and music, intellectual growth, purpose, physical activity, travel, leisure. We offer our children countless opportunities through sports, music, school activities, and clubs. One mother of a kindergartner was telling me her child is busy now from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. And it just gets busier as they get older! We prepare meals for our tired and hungry families. We strive to serve up a life that is cooked to our cultural recipes of perfection, but how often we fail to offer the sustaining nourishment of God's grace. In the midst of the smorgasbord of life's many offerings, are we getting up from the table hungry? Are we getting the nutrition that will sustain us when life gets tough; when we or those we love are suffering?

Jesus tells us, I have food to eat that you do not know about.... Nativity offers food for our souls and lives that the world cannot give. Jesus is the bread of life and living water, a never-failing spring that wells up to eternal life. Are you providing for your children and yourself this food that lasts? Nativity provides a healthy offering for the soul and heart. I hope that you are making this food a priority in your life and in the life of your children. God bids us through the prophet Isaiah, Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food. Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live.





Bishop Parsley's Page

COMMON PRAYER AND COMMON GOOD

As I pray the rich cadences of the Book of Common Prayer, I am challenged and sustained by the words "we" and "us" and "our." We pray in the plural. "Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts . . . we praise you, O God . . . we humbly beseech thee that we may always prove ourselves a people mindful of thy favor and glad to do thy will . . . take away the arrogance and hatred that infect our hearts, break down the walls that separate us . . . open our eyes . . . that we may learn to serve you with gladness." Such plural prayer is so not merely because much of the Prayer Book is designed for corporate worship. Whether prayed corporately or privately, nearly all its prayers are "we" prayers, addressing God not as separate individuals but as one commu-

In this simple fact of our Anglican spirituality lies a life-changing truth. We stand before God together. We need God together. We praise God as one. What matters is not just "me." What matters is "us" before God. God so loved the world we believe, and so we pray.

This flies sharply in the face of the narcissism of our age and, I dare say, the narcissism of too much contemporary religion. Self-concern is the devil's signature dish in our day. It tempts us to see even God and our spirituality as all about me—my needs, my concerns, my agenda.

Now do not misunderstand me. God cares about each of us personally. God desires for us to open our hearts to him at the deepest personal level and in our own words. God promises to be with each of us at the points of our greatest need. This has been my experience and is the witness of Jesus in his profoundly personal relationship with his abba, Father.

Yet none of us stands alone in our need before God. My yearning for mercy and forgiveness, for help, for peace and justice, for joy and renewal is also your longing—and the yearning of countless people the world over. The deep truth is that you are with me in my prayer, and I with you, and all humanity together. God's responses to our individual prayers, finally, do not minister fully to any one of us unless they minister to us corporately. As John Donne wrote, "no one is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main . . . I am involved in mankind."

This corporate wisdom of the Prayer Book means to form our minds and shape our lives. It would make us persons who seek the common good, not just our individual good. The common good is God's will for the world as a great, interconnected whole where all life can flourish. Our purpose in life is to do our part in and for this whole. Jesus knew this as he prayed at the end, "not my will but thine be done."

In our self-oriented society little seems more important than a new commitment to seek the common good. The global financial crisis, the catastrophic oil spill in the Gulf, the violence of the massive weapons industry—all show us the terrible danger of the individual profit and success motive, without a right concern for the commonweal. Special interest groups and individual agendas dominate our political scene and show very little concern for interests other than their own. As long as "I get mine" or "my group gets ours," what is best for the whole does not really matter.

As I see the heartrending images of oil-covered pelicans and dying dolphins and turtles in the Gulf, I cannot help but wonder who speaks for them in the face of powerful petrochemical and economic interests? Who will speak for the health of the earth as a community of life in which all living creatures matter and nothing is expendable? In our time we are learning dramatically that

all things are interrelated. We must learn anew to think and act systemically, not just individually. Does drilling for oil over 3 miles down, with its obvious catastrophic hazards, serve the common good? Do we have the right to risk accidents that pour hundreds of millions of gallons of oil into the delicate ecosystem of the sea without fail safe protections? Can we continue to allow special interests to trump our care for the environment on which all life depends? I know my answers to these questions . . . what are yours? These issues should remind us that if we live for ourselves we will die by ourselves. One of the Church's most important roles is to witness to the integrity of God's creation and to work passionately for the common good. As one of our prayers says, "Guide the people of this land, and of all the nations, in the ways of justice and peace; that we may honor one another and serve the common good." That is a prayer to contemplate—and aspire to live. As we share the deep wisdom of the Prayer Book's plural prayers may our hearts and minds be formed with love for the whole of God's beloved community. Father Zossima says to his students in The Brothers Karama-

Your work is for the whole, your deed is for the future. Never seek a reward, for grace is your reward on earth without that: your spiritual joy, which only the righteous obtain. . . . Kiss the earth and love it, timelessly, insatiably, love all men, love all things, seek this rapture and ecstasy. . . .

We pray common prayer. Let us live for the common good.

Is it stewardship time...again?

It's a trick question because it's *always* stewardship time! We practice stewardship every minute of every day of our lives. Stewardship is defined as "managing those things that have been entrusted to us by someone else." Of course in our lives, that "someone" is God and "those things" are everything that He has given us...namely our time, our talents, and our material possessions. God endows us and trusts us with 168 hours each week, numerous talents (both known and, as yet, undiscovered), and enough financial resources to get by. All He asks in return is that we use these gifts wisely and return a portion to Him for the building of His Kingdom.

I am sure that many people believe that the only thing the church really cares about when it comes to stewardship is our money. While adequate funding is vital to Nativity's mission and ministry, the Stewardship Committee wants to assure everyone that we are just as focused on gifts of time and talent as we are financial resources. The Committee has endorsed and supported a communications plan developed by Shirley Hale to match needs in our church and community with resources of time and talent among our members and organizations. You've already heard a little about the "Agents of Grace...Just Do It" campaign and you'll be hearing much more in the coming months. This will be a great mechanism by which Nativity parishioners can direct their time and talents to those in need.

The Stewardship Committee recognizes that we have many incredibly generous people in our congregation. To recognize this generosity, the Committee will once again be celebrating with a parish-wide event held at Early Works Museum on November 11 (you may remember the wonderful event we had at the Art Museum last year!). This event is being underwritten by generous parishioners, so no Nativity operating funds are being used for this celebration. We hope you will join us for our second annual Jubilee – "Nativity Fiesta" – and celebrate the grateful giving of so many generous people. Please mark your calendars for November 11th.

Stewardship is not about begging people to participate in church activities or to give more money. Rather, it is about giving people the *opportunity* to live into the fullness of their relationship with Christ by returning a portion of what they have been generously given for the building of His Kingdom. I urge you to take a moment to reflect on what has been entrusted to you and how you have used these resources, and then act where God is calling you.

Dear Friends, The Bishop Search/Nominating Committee recently issued the following announcement:

ALABAMA BISHOP SEARCH PROCESS UNDERWAY NOMINATION/APPLICATION DEADLINE IS OCT. 8

The Episcopal Diocese of Alabama has begun its search for a new diocesan bishop. The deadline for nominations and applications is Oct. 8. The eleventh bishop of Alabama will succeed the Right Reverend Henry N. Parsley, Jr., who is retiring as diocesan bishop effective Dec. 31, 2011.

"The eleventh bishop of Alabama will be a visionary who can lead, teach and inspire both lay persons and clergy to grow the church, to find creative ways to meet financial challenges, and to strengthen ties between parishes and the diocese," according to the diocesan profile, which can be viewed at http://bishopsearch.dioala.org. Guidelines for submitting nominations are included in the profile.

The committee has been charged by the Standing Committee to deliver a slate of nominees by April 25, 2011.
