

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION TIP

Going through this record-setting hot summer, when we've had extended periods without rain, has again made us very aware of water as a necessasary **and sometimes scarce** resource. Here are some interesting and valuable water-saving facts:

Toilets, Taps, Showers, and Laundry

- 1994 was the year that federally mandated low-flow showerheads, faucets, and toilets started to appear on the scene in significant numbers.
- On average, 10 gallons per day of your water footprint (or 14% of your indoor use) is lost to leaks. Short of installing new water-efficient fixtures, one of the easiest, most effective ways to cut your footprint is by repairing leaky faucets and toilets.
- If you use a low-flow showerhead, you can save up to 15 gallons of water during a 10-minute shower.
- Every time you shave minutes off your use of hot water, you also save energy and keep dollars in your pocket.
- It takes about 70 gallons of water to fill a bathtub, so showers are generally the more water-efficient way to bathe.
- All of those flushes can add up to nearly 20 gallons a day down the toilet. If you still have a standard toilet, which uses close to 3.5 gallons a flush, , you can reduce your water usage by addding something to your tank that will displace some of that water, such as a brick. Better yet, you can save even more by updating with a new low-flow toilet.
- Nearly 22% of indoor home water use comes from doing laundry. Save water by making sure to adjust the settings on your machine to the proper load size.
- Nearly 60% of a person's household water footprint can go toward lawn and garden maintenance. Be smart about your outdoor water use -1) don't water in the heat of the day; 2) watch the placement of sprinklers/hoses to be sure you are not watering the driveway or street; 3) plant native plants around your home to reduce the amount of water and chemicals needed to maintain your landscaping many native plants are drought and insect tolerant.

Be mindful of the use of God's gracious gifts to us.

<u>Update on Haiti Mission Trip October 1, 2010</u> The Nativity sponsored medical mission to Haiti is scheduled for January 8-15, 2011. This coincides with the anniversary of the earthquake that brought so much destruction to this already impoverished country (January 12, 2010). This will be a joint mission trip with representatives from the Diocese of Alabama with an emphasis to remind everyone that the situation there still remains desperate and the people of our companion Diocese of Haiti need our assistance.

The team members from Nativity include Debbie Collette, Don and Marilyn Evans, Deacon Mary Groff and Bob Serio. We were not able to send the supplies generously donated by the Nativity parishioners last year and they have been in storage in anticipation of this year's trip. We are going to inventory the supplies and may need to issue an appeal for additional items to complete the inventory.


We were unsure what happened to the French Books of Common Prayer that were donated by our parish but they were found in a storage facility in Haiti that was not damaged and 92 books are now being used for the services. An additional 12 books were back ordered last year and we will be delivering these in January.



The Language of Loss: Putting Grief into Words

"I believe it is the sharing of our stories that saves us. And in no area do I feel this more strongly than I do with regard to grief."-Amy Lyles Wilson

Burying a loved one, being downsized at work, growing old, feeling abandoned by God, letting go of a dream...any one of life's losses can leave us speechless. All of a sudden, the language we've relied on for years no longer has the power to get us through the day, much less express our anger and confusion about our circumstances. In this retreat participants will be invited to share their own experiences of grief while engaging with writing prompts and readings designed to translate longing into literature. You need not consider yourself a "writer" to join us. This hands-on workshop will be conducted within the principles of Amherst Writers and Artists, which fosters a safe space for the writing and telling of our stories.

"Tell me about despair, yours," says the poet Mary Oliver, "and I will tell you mine." Come to the mountain and we'll talk about loss, and language, and the grace that must surely come in-between. Together we'll find the words for those times when mere words just won't do.

Presenter: Amy Lyles Wilson is a professional writer and editor. She has combined her passion for writing with her academic degrees in English, journalism, and theology to encourage an equip others to write their hearts out.

No one is required to read his or her work aloud, and criticism is not part of the process. While this is not a therapy group, often when we begin to "give sorrow words" we enhance our healing.

There shall be for you and the resident alien a single statute, a perpetual statute throughout your generations; you and the alien shall be alike before the Lord. You and the alien who resides with you shall have the same law and the same ordinance (Numbers 15:15-16).

So [Christ] came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God (Ephesians 2:17-19).

Dear People of God,

Throughout our meeting in Phoenix, Arizona, we have reflected on the immigration crisis facing our host state, the United States, and all nations globally. A number of us visited the United States-Mexico border and saw first hand the many troubling and complex issues that face migrants, immigrants, the border patrol, local ranchers, and Christian communities seeking to minister to all of these groups. We are also mindful that similar border issues confront other nations represented in The Episcopal Church, especially countries in Europe, the Dominican Republic and Haiti, and Colombia and Ecuador. Holy Scripture teaches us that all human beings are made in the image of God, and that Jesus Christ gave his life for all people. Furthermore, both the Old and New Testaments declare the importance of hospitality to resident alien and strangers, a hospitality that rests on our common humanity. All human beings are therefore deserving of dignity and respect, as we affirm in our Baptismal Covenant (Book of Common Prayer, p.305). So our gracious welcome of immigrants, documented or undocumented, is a reflection of God's grace poured out on us and on all. In this light:

- (1) Ours is a migratory world in which many people move across borders to escape poverty, hunger, injustice and violence. We categorically reject efforts to criminalize undocumented migrants and immigrants, and deplore the separation of families and the unnecessary incarceration of undocumented workers. Since, as we are convinced, it is natural to seek gainful employment to sustain oneself and one's family, we cannot agree that the efforts of undocumented workers to feed and shelter their households through honest labor are criminal.
- (2) We profess that inhumane policies directed against undocumented persons (raids, separation of families, denial of health services) are intolerable on religious and humanitarian grounds, as is attested by the consensus of a wide range of religious bodies on this matter.
- (3) We call on the government of the United States and all governments to create fair and humane immigration policies that honor the dignity of people on all sides of this issue. In the United States, we seek a reasonable path to citizenship for undocumented workers; a plan to reunite families; and a viable system for receiving temporary or seasonal guest-workers, with clearly identified points of entry. These measures would free the United States border patrol to concentrate its efforts on the apprehension of drug traffickers, terrorists, and other criminals, and not on ordinary people who are simply seeking a better life for themselves and their children.
- (4) We acknowledge the duty of governments to protect their people, including the securing of borders. The church has always respected this duty, which is grounded in government's God-given duty to protect innocent people and punish wrongdoers (Romans 13:1-7; 1 Peter 2:13-17).
- (5) We recognize that racism and bigotry impact debates over migration and immigration. The Episcopal Church is committed to the eradication of all forms of racism, and decries the use of racial profiling in the arrest of persons suspected of being undocumented.
- (6) We confess our own complicit sinfulness as people who benefit from the labor of undocumented workers without recognizing our responsibility to them. We passively tolerate an economic and political system that accepts this labor from millions of undocumented workers, and which has received approximately \$520 billion in social security revenue from them—revenue from which they will never benefit. Yet at the same time we treat them as a threat.
- (7) We do not discount the concerns of our fellow citizens regarding the danger uncontrolled immigration poses to our safety and economic well-being. We insist, however, that these concerns be approached within the broader context of a national commitment and covenant to inclusion and fellowship across all lines for the sake of the common good.
- (8) We take seriously our commitment to and responsibility for our fellow citizens, as we strive to face the spiritual, moral and economic challenges of life in all sixteen nations represented in The Episcopal Church. We call on our fellow citizens to remember that the good of a nation lies beyond its own self-interest, toward a vision of a humanity restored in Jesus Christ, for in him "you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ" (Ephesians 2:13).

The Story of Nativity's Bell

This is the first in a series of stories about the bell that rings in Nativity's Steeple. We thought that the congregation should know more about its history and some of its stories.

Church bells across America have traditionally been rung by people standing on the ground pulling on a rope. That was true at Nativity Parish for over a century until one day....

Elaine and I were assigned the bell-ringing duty on a fateful day in early 1992. We were watching for Prentice's direction to start ringing the bell as the choir and clergy and acolytes made their profound and distinguished way up the aisle toward the chancel. Prentice silently pointed to us, and "us" were intent on making Huntsville know that Nativity was about to invoke the Holy Sprit of God once again. We were going to carry out our bell-ringing duties with gusto. Elaine and I grabbed the bell rope, yanked on it with all our might, and

Oops!

We yanked a little too hard. The 150-year-old wooden bell wheel, having served its time, finally gave up the ghost and free-wheeled on the bell shaft. Nativity's bell stood silent on that early March Sunday morning in 1992. The bell didn't move. No sound came from the bell tower.

Rod Murray, the rector at the time, looked at me with that "you broke it, you fix it" kind of glare, and I looked back with that "please don't throw me in the briar patch" kind of grin, because I knew that I was in for a fun time with a major project that would involve electromechanical devices and lots of work 40 feet off the ground. That work eventually led to a new kind of bell striking system.

That unintentional bell wheel destruction occurred in early Lent, just after Ash Wednesday, in 1992. Rod asked us to please make the bell ring to a new sound by Easter. On Maundy Thursday, late at night, after a horrendous thunderstorm that caught us working up in the steeple at bell level, we called Rod and reported success. Rod came back to town, and we walked the wet streets of Eustis Avenue, under the light of a nearly full moon, listening to Nativity's bell tolling the sounds of the decades of history, now being struck in a new way.
