

CCIB Report: Restoration Update

The masonry restoration is well underway on the church and bell tower. The cutting of the old mortar from the brick is complete, except for the gable area above the altar. The upper already is significant. Installation of cast iron dentils on the church front gable area is 90% complete. Round cast iron pieces are ready to be installed. Gaps between dentils will be filled in and painted. The only caps not removed for powder coating at this time are those located in the memorial garden area.


Most of the bell tower that requires the scaffolding has been re-pointed. Damaged wood and brick will soon be repaired on the bell tower. The masonry can then be cleaned with an acid and buffed. Then the bell tower dentils can be installed. The louver frames have been sanded and painted. About 95% of

the oak louvers have been cut to length. Priority is given to the bell tower project so the scaffolding can be removed.

For safety reasons the bell tower exterior door will remain closed. Please observe and obey barricades and detours. Should you notice anything that appears a safety hazard, north wall of the church has been re-pointed, pressure please inform Loch, Skipper, or John Buyse. If you have any washed, cleaned with an acid and buffed. The improvement questions, do not hesitate to give Skipper Colin or Loch Neely a call.

> On October 1st the National Park Service approved Noblin & Associates as our consulting engineering firm. This approval was necessary to start the roof procurement. Several bidders have received the bid-packages. A pre-bidders conference for the roof replacement was conducted on October 20th. The bids are due November 2nd. A request will then be submitted to the NPS for their approval of the selected contractor.

The History of Nativity's Bell

This is the second in a series of stories about Nativity's bell. This article tells about the origins of our bell (or rather bells, because there were two). To find the story, we have to go back to the years leading up to the American Civil War.

In my search for the origin of Nativity's bell, I got into the original minutes of the vestry meetings from 1858 to 1878. Bobbie Graham, the church archivist, and I opened the two-hour-fire-rated safe in the basement under Ridley Hall, and we looked through the original hand-written minutes of the Vestry meetings from the middle nineteenth century. It was an emotional time holding those documents in our hands.

We found beautiful handwriting, but no mention of a bell. We found vestry elections and a resolution that two dollars would be assessed against any vestry member who missed a meeting without a good excuse, but no mention of a bell.

The vestry minutes of 1859 have an exhaustive listing of all of the costs required to complete the 1859 church, including re-plastering a part of the building where the plaster fell off. No expenditure for a bell was listed.

The original church building was built in 1847 on the same property as the current nave. We couldn't find records that far back, but we know that the older structure was taken apart brick for brick in 1878, sold to a congregation two blocks north for \$700, and rebuilt. No mention of a bell. Bobbie recently visited the congregation that bought the building. The old building has long since been destroyed and a new building built, but a few artifacts remain from the original building. No bell was among them. We went from the basement to the church archives room in the office building and found an entry in the church history records where a "bell had been hung in the belfry on January 18th, 1850, weighing 575 pounds and costing \$200". Pay dirt! So now we know that the original building, built in 1847 and dismantled in 1878, had a bell.

Next we went to the history book of our parish that was written by Frances Roberts, and voila! She mentions that our bell was taken to a foundry in Mississippi to be melted down and recast into cannon. So we immediately jumped on the internet for further research on The American Civil War. It turns out that in 1862 General Beauregard issued an appeal for churches to donate their bells.

Our church, the Episcopal Church of the Nativity, Huntsville, Alabama, was specifically listed in a document of major events of 1862 as one of the churches across the South who donated their bell. (DONATED, as in voluntarily gave the bell to the Confederate war effort.) What I am saying is that the communicants of Nativity parish took the bell out of the bell tower, probably at great effort, loaded it onto a horse-drawn carriage, took it to the local train station bound for Mississippi, and waved bon voyage

It seems that the alloy that was used for church bells had abundant Tin, an element necessary for cannon but in short supply in the Confederate Army. A church bell could be used with additional copper, and the total amount of metal could be doubled when used for casting cannons, and copper was available to the Confederate foundries. So church bells and farm bells and doorknobs and anything bronze was in great demand.

So it seems that General Beauregard appealed, Nativity (an a whole bunch of other churches) responded, and bells went to a cannon foundry (in Mississippi, we think), and the "Bell Batteries" were born. Six cannons constitute a Battery of Artillery, and twelve cannons were made from the bells donated from Huntsville churches. Those two batteries of artillery were dubbed the "Huntsville Bell Batteries". Later on, however, when they fired those cannons during combat operations, I don't think anybody was thinking about the Call To Worship that the metal in those cannons once sounded.

Beauregard said that he would repay the churches after the war was over. Yeah. Right.

There is a Twelve-Pounder cannon somewhere in some Civil War park, turning green in the acid rain. That cannon was made from a bell that once was mounted in the first bell tower of Nativity Parish, Huntsville. The metal in that cannon once rang the Call To Worship for the faithful, later rang the booms of artillery in warfare, and is now silent.

To complete the story, sometime after 1865, Nativity bought a steel bell from Naylor Vickers in Sheffield, England, and that bell still rings in our bell tower. It sounds like a steel bell now rather than a bronze bell, but use your imagination. The soul of the old bell is still there.

Swords to plowshares? Bells to Cannons? I hope God understands. My theology says he does.

Next Issue: The changeover from swinging the bell to striking the bell with an automatically-actuated bronze hammer.

Grateful Giving Thoughts

While I have always considered Nativity to be my spiritual home and a holy place – a place to come and worship God, I don't think I came to appreciate it for what it really is, a place to experience and share God's love until a few years ago.

Stewardship for my church, that sense of ownership and responsibility, was also slow to dawn on me. I'm afraid that the church accountant would have a hard time finding "joy" in the pen strokes of the weekly checks we write to the Nativity. As we write these checks to the church, I have been guilty of giving out of a sense of obligation – my thinking is often "I owe God at least this small measure of my earthly treasure." But more recently, I have come to realize that it is both my responsibility and my *privilege* to help keep Nativity vibrant and to share the

incredible blessings that God has given me through my support of the church.

Reflecting on this year's stewardship theme of grateful giving, I'm reminded that God made us to work and He gave us certain talents that He intends for us to use in our work. We didn't ask for these capacities and we certainly have no say in how society values these talents. He simply gave these gifts to us. For many of us at Nativity, those God-given talents have helped to bring us an excellent quality of life.

All that I have and all that I am really did come from God. And when the opportunity to share those blessings comes around during our stewardship campaign, I need to let my appreciation for all that God have given to me and my family show. I need to give enough that it has an impact on how I live – that there is a feeling of sacrifice. Only then will my heart and my treasure be where "rust and moth cannot destroy."

The true joy of giving comes in the confirmation that we have been blessed and for recognizing, as St. Francis is credited with saying, "it is in giving that we receive."
