Advent Time

The First Sunday of Advent, this past Thanksgiving Weekend, heralds a new year for God's people in the Church. Our Christian Year begins anew each Advent, calling us to schedule our lives on God's time, not Central Standard Time. While the world fast forwards to Christmas, Advent calls us to a different pace and rhythm. We wait and expect for God's purposes and ways to be revealed in our lives and in the world.

Advent begins during this time of national thanksgiving. We find ourselves on God's time only as we can open our hearts to God in gratitude for all that has been and for all that will be. Each day comes to us as a gift. Life is a gift that calls us to respond in whatever way we can—no matter how small or large; no matter what our energy level; we respond. While the world has us scurrying around madly to find just the right gifts for others, may we remember that the greatest came gift came humbly from God 2000 years ago in in Bethlehem. Take time to be grateful for this gift and the gift of love each day.

The meaning of Advent is in the waiting. But our waiting is "not nothing," someone else wrote. Our waiting is not passive. We deliberately look for and expectantly prepare for Christ's return at the end of the ages, as well as his first coming in the Incarnation, Christmas. Our firm hope is for the time when God will be all in all. Christ's return at the consummation of history compels us to think about how our lives are measuring up to God's hopes for us. It is a new year and where we fall short, in repentance, we turn in a new direction and begin anew. And then for this day, God will be all in all, and Christ comes again.

In Advent, the world is dark and cold, yet we sing of the light. *I want to walk as a child of the light, I want to follow Jesus. In him there is no darkness at all. The night and the day are both alike...shine in my heart, Lord Jesus.* Listen to the words of the Advent hymns. Let them become your prayers. No matter how dark and cold it seems outside or in your life, Christ's light pierces the darkness. The Advent Wreath light increases as we move closer to Christmas. *For the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace.*

The color for Advent is blue—both for expectation and to remind us of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the God Bearer, whose openness and obedience to God's invitation is the model of faith. Take time to come to church early and sit in the quiet beauty of the nave. Look around and notice the many symbolic allusions to Mary in the *fleurs de lis* and lilies in the stained glass windows and the many pointed arches. How will you allow Christ to be born in you this Christmas and every day? Consider Mary's response. Consider your response.

Advent is about God's time. Give your life to this rhythm and pace. Slow down and be quiet. Claim the silence of prayer in the midst of all the noise of the world's time. *And the dawn from on high shall break upon you and guide your feet into the way of peace.*

Father Anderson Receives Louisville Institute Grant for Pastoral Leaders

Andy Anderson is a recipient of a Louisville Institute Sabbatical Grant for Pastoral Leaders. Father Anderson's project, "Building the Church: Laying Spiritual Foundations," is one of 39 awards selected from a field of over 400 applicants in North America for the 2010 competition. Rectors of parishes in Alabama are scheduled for a 12 week sabbatical after five years of service. Andy's sabbatical begins the end of May and continues through August of 2011, after eight years of service to Nativity and seventeen years of ordained ministry. The Episcopal Church embraces the spiritual, biblical, and intellectual benefit of Sabbath time for both the clergy and the parish, and the Vestry has endorsed Andy's plans. A sabbatical is a time of spiritual renewal and re-invigoration as new approaches to ministry are contemplated and developed. Sabbatical planning includes a combination of Spiritual renewal and rest, intellectual and parish ministry learning, and family renewal and personal interest pursuits (things often ignored with the heavy demands of ministry). Andy will be sharing his Sabbatical plans in more detail after the holiday season in the first of the New Year. Outreach Committee sponsors 2nd year of coffee sales to benefit "Krik? Krak" hot lunch program at an Episcopal school in Conchu, Haiti. The program was begun by spouses of clergy from our own Diocese of Alabama. Last year we were able to send \$702.40, thanks to your donations.

Coffee is from Kaffeeklatsch, who graciously gives us a good price! This year's selection will be offered in regular and in decaf. It is a Mexican blend, robust in flavor, and is fair trade, organic, and grown in the shade.

Half-pound bags (\$10) will be decorated with raffia and a tag stating the donation to the lunch program. Profit per bag is \$4.10 which goes to Haiti. We have received questions as to how the money reaches this school - our church sends it directly to our diocese office and they in turn wire it to the bishop's office in Haiti, where all of our donation is allocated for the school in Conchu.

The History of Nativity's Bell

This is fifth in a series of stories about Nativity's bell. This issue tells some stories that are verifiably true, some that are only legend, and one that is a purely blatant lie.

The True Stories

1. The tornado that hit the steeple in the 1950's.

Early in Emile's ministry, a tornado came through Huntsville and warped Nativity's steeple. The steeple had to be removed and repaired, and a steel structure was lowered into the tower for additional strength. The bell and the steeple are both now supported by that steel. A steel staircase was installed from the top of the bell tower vestibule up to bell level (the top of the brick part of the tower.) That steel ladder continues on up to the top of the steeple. Jim Pierce and I climbed that ladder, hoping to see Huntsville from above the clouds, but the windows at the top of the steeple were covered, and we couldn't see a thing.

2. Jim Pierce and the "virtual electrocution".

One Saturday morning we were working on the electrical system up next to the bell. Jim Pierce was the electrician that day, and he was wiring the electrical circuit that would provide a power outlet for lights and tools and vacuum cleaners, etc. up next to the bell. Elaine was there with her camera, always ready to chronicle the events of the new bell striker system.

Well, just as Jim touched the wire to the plug, and I mean at the exact nanosecond, Elaine took a flash picture of Jim. Jim almost jumped out of the bell tower, sure that he had just been electrocuted. We still talk about Jim's "virtual electrocution".

3. Paul Whitehouse and the restoration of the bell wheel.

Paul Whitehouse was a communicant of Nativity until he moved to Maryland. He is a woodworker and does demonstrations of hand tools and techniques used in times gone by. Paul built the two wooden hand rails that lead from the nave to the chancel (by hand! No power tools were used.) Notice those the next time you go to communion.

When we got the bell wheel down from the tower and made sure all the pieces were there, Paul took the wooden wheel and restored it. It now hangs in the bell tower, so notice the wheel and Paul's handiwork sometime when you are at the church.

The Legend: The Healing after the storm.

A few years after the bell striker was installed, a major thunderstorm came through Huntsville. A lightning strike somewhere very close to the church knocked out power all over the surrounding area. The bell seemed to have been fried. I got a call to come and check out the situation. My assessment was that we were in for major electrical repairs. We all went home in despair, resolving to meet and rebuild the bell striker's electrical system.

The next morning, the bell began to ring as usual! I think that one of Nativity's deceased communicants, probably the one who gave the original bell to the Confederate Army to be made into artillery, came back and repaired the bell's electrical system out of sheer guilt.

The Lie: This next story is NOT true. This is in the category of stories that start with, "I want to tell you a story. This is no lie." You know the kind.

Anyway, one day when we were all working on the bell up in the steeple, a guy walking by Nativity came into the church, climbed the steel ladder, and joined us on the bell platform. He said, "What are y'all doing?" We explained that we were installing a new bell striking system, and we showed him the big bronze hammer and the electrical system that actuated it.

He said, "I can show you another way to ring that bell." We all looked at each other and said, "What do you mean?"

The guy said, "Let me show you." He backed off a few feet, took off his hat, and ran at full speed toward the bell. Just when he got to the bell, he lowered his head and hit the bell with his forehead. The bell rang as it never had. A BONG resounded throughout the city. We were all amazed.

The guy got back on his feet, looked a little wobbly, and he passed out and fell all the way to the ground into the churchyard.

Well, we called 911, and while we were waiting for the ambulance a couple of guys walking along Eustis Avenue stopped and surveyed the situation. One of them looked at the guy lying on the ground and then looked at his friend and said, "You know that guy?" The companion said, "You know, I don't think I know him, but his face sure rings a bell!"

Ah, Yes. Bell jokes.

That was not a true story, but I wrote it to Rod Murray in hopes that he would have a heart attack. He never had the heart attack, but I almost got excommunicated.

Writing this series of articles has been fun. I hope reading it has been fun, too, and a little bit educational.




Just Stuff It #3

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION TIP for December 1, 2010

Green Holiday Tips - In this first week of Advent, as we prepare to celebrate the arrival of God's precious gift to us in the Christ Child, and as you make holiday plans for gifts and activities, here are some great ways to plan ahead to make your holidays greener:

Buy Energy-Saving Holiday Lights

Now you can decorate your house with **LED lights that use 90 percent less energy than conventional holiday lights**, and can save your family up to \$50 on your energy bills during the holiday season! LED lights are available at many major retailers, including CostCo, Walgreens and Ace Hardware.

Make Your Own Wrapping Paper

Most mass-produced wrapping paper you find in stores is not recyclable and ends up in landfills. Instead, here's a great chance to get creative! Wrap presents with old maps, the comics section of a newspaper, or children's artwork. Or use a scarf, attractive dish towel, bandana, or some other useful cloth item. If every family wrapped just three gifts this way, it would save enough paper to cover 45,000 football fields.

Add Organic and Local Foods to Your Holiday Feast

Support local family farmers who grow sustainable meat and produce. Not only does it taste better and is healthier for you and your family, you'll be doing your part for the planet too. Look for an organically-raised turkey or ham for Christmas dinner.

Stocking Stuffers: Test Your Eco-Knowledge
