

# HAITI MEDICAL TEAM RETURNS

Two days before the first anniversary of the Jan. 12, 2010 earthquake that devastated vast portions of Haiti, young children were making music in the ruins of the Holy Trinity Cathedral in the capital of Port-au-Prince.

The sight and sound of students of the <u>Diocese of Haiti</u>'s Holy Trinity Music School practicing under the open-air shelter that now serves as the cathedral nave was "very encouraging," the Rev. Deacon Dave Drachlis of the <u>Diocese of Alabama</u> told Episcopal News Service in a telephone interview Jan. 10.

The effort is part of Alabama's five-year companion-diocese relationship with the Diocese of Haiti. The relationship is focused on St. Simeon parish. The Diocese of Alabama sent six medical mission teams to Haiti during 2010 along with relief funds and supplies.

Drachlis recalled that he, Dr. Robert Serio and Dr. Don Evans were last in Haiti this past February when a strong aftershock severely damaged what then remained of the cathedral school complex.

There are encouraging signs at the diocese's secondary school, College St. Pierre, as well, said Drachlis, who visited the school Jan. 10. The College St. Pierre grounds quickly became a survivors camp after the quake, despite the fact that the buildings were severely damaged or destroyed and entombed the bodies of students and teachers. Today, the rubble is gone, Drachlis said, and students are studying in wooden classroom buildings. He added that no more than 50 tents remain in an area that once sheltered close to 3.000 survivors.

Drachlis and Serio told ENS that the physical and psychological damage caused by the quake is still evident, but they say that they are also seeing signs of hope and resiliency.

"I get a sense that the Haitian people are trying to get their lives back together," said Serio. "There's still a very long way to go."

Drachlis called this visit "bittersweet" because a year after the quake "there's still a lot of suffering going on and that's heartbreaking."



"While what I saw in one sense was discouraging, it's also hopeful because ... you see some patching of buildings going on and you see some places that the rubble has been cleared away," he said.

"People are going on with their lives; they haven't given up," Drachlis added. "They're resilient and that resilience is an amazing thing and it's very, very hopeful and encouraging. But there are a lot of structures that look just the way they did when we were here in February."

On Jan. 10 the team saw patients ranging in age from one month to 70 years and older at Lespwa Timoun ("Hope of the Children") medical and nutrition clinic in Croix des Bouquets. A number of people came with common complaints such as ear infections, headaches, colds and sore backs.

"It was a broad spectrum of patients with a broad spectrum of complaints," Serio said, adding that the team saw some people with more serious concerns such as a young injured pregnant woman.

"We're still seeing a lot of the psychological trauma from the quake...problems related to stress and depression as a consequence of the quake," he said.

Drachlis said the team has not yet encountered evidence of cholera, but predicted that they may yet see the disease during their week in Haiti, especially as the members head into more rural areas.

Drachlis, Evans and Serio and the four other members of the medical team arrived in Haiti Jan. 8. Team members are provided medical care through mobile clinics in three rural communities and Croix des Bouquets, a suburb of Port-au-Prince. On Jan 11, the team conducted a clinic in the village of Thomazeau in the Plaine du Cul-de-Sac east of the capital and on Jan. 13 traveled to Gorman in the same area. On Jan. 14, the group entered the remote mountain village of Crochu.

Jan. 12 was declared a national holiday and day of prayer, and the team were elated to be a part of this celebration.

Team members are camped in a churchyard in Croix des Bouquets. The Rev. Fritz Valdema, and his wife, Carmel, a Haitian public-health nurse, serve St. Simeon parish, which is comprised of six geographically separate churches. The Valdemas are helping the medical team with logistics.



The rest of the team was made up of Marilyn Evans, pharmacist Deborah Collette, the Rev. Deacon Mary Groff and Sharon Drachlis. Serio, the Evanses, Collette and Groff are all from Church of the Nativity in Huntsville, which sponsored this trip.

Deacon Drachlis is a member of the diocesan staff and serves at <u>St. Thomas Episcopal Church</u> in Huntsville. This was Serio's third Haiti mission trip, Groff's second, Deacon Drachlis' seventh, and Ms. Drachlis' fourth trip.

# Stephen King praises Huntsville band "Microwave Dave & the Nukes



Published: Saturday, January 01, 2011 By **Lee Roop, The Huntsville Times** HUNTSVILLE, AL - One of America's favorite authors ended the year and a long-standing gig with a national shout-out to one of Huntsville's favorite bands: Microwave Dave & the Nukes.

Stephen King, of "The Shining" and "The Stand" fame, capped a seven-year streak of columns on pop culture in the magazine *Entertainment Weekly* with a few things he'd still like to praise.

"I want to beg you to go to YouTube and check out Microwave Dave & the Nukes," King wrote, "blasting 'Highway 49' at St. Stephens Episcopal Church in Huntsville, Ala. That electric slide guitar will change

your way of life." (video may be viewed on You Tube Highway 49 (042107)

"I'm kind of stunned," electric slide guitarist Dave Gallaher said Friday. "I don't know what to say." Gallaher said the band first recorded the song "Highway 49" in 2003 on its album "Atomic Electric."

"It was our concert closer," Gallaher said. "Something we played a lot, and people have always liked it." Gallaher said "it's really nice for somebody way up in the world of entertainment to find the value in our work. That's gratifying."

King's final "The Pop of King" column appears in the Jan. 7 issue of *Entertainment Weekly*. After praising Microwave Dave, Texas singer-songwriter James McMurtry and Scott Spencer's new novel "Man in the Woods," among other things, King signed off with this admonition.

"Be good to yourself and remember that pop culture is part of the circulation that keeps a culture alive and growing. Circulate with it, and spread the word: You're never too old to put on a pair of 3-D glasses or dancing shoes."

# STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION TIP for January 5, 2011 Green Your Kitchen:

The kitchen is at the heart of many American households, but, waste there can be a real problem. <u>Kitchen appliances</u> typically make up around <u>30 percent of a home's total energy consumption</u>. Any energy savings you can make in the kitchen are going to have an impact on your overall home's energy usage. This week's tip is the SECOND in a series on how to green your food-prep space.

# Tip #2: Compost Biodegradable Waste

Many people just let the in-sink garbage disposal take care of their food waste. Convenient though that may be, the practice <u>overburdens water-treatment facilities</u> with viscous sludge, <u>which in turn requires additional water to treat</u>. Instead, do your own treatment: Collect your organic kitchen waste in a bin or bucket which has a tight-fitting lid. When it's full, take it to your backyard compost bin: or here are some other ideas:


"I save my best organic vegetable scraps in a bag in the freezer. When I have enough, I boil them for soup stock, THEN I put them in the compost." "We collect our scraps in a dirty dish in one side of the sink throughout the day, and in the evening my husband throws it into our compost bin. Our compost bin is very simple- 4 wooden pallets (that we got for free) attached to form a square, with the 4th one with hinges & a latch. The bottom half is lined with chicken wire, and around the outside we have rocks to deter our dogs from digging. We throw all of our food scraps in there, and we don't turn it, but it does stay wet, and whenever we find stray earthworms, we add them to the bin too. It doesn't stink, and it breaks down ok."

Composting is a natural and easy way to lessen your water bill and your impact on the water treatment process in our town.

Info on the process that takes place when you compost: Decomposition occurs naturally anywhere plants grow. When a plant dies, its remains are attacked by microorganisms and invertebrates in the soil, and it is decomposed to humus. This is how nutrients are recycled in an ecosystem. This natural decomposition can be encouraged by creating ideal conditions. The microorganisms and invertebrates fundamental to the composting process require oxygen and water to successfully decompose the material. The end products of the process are soil-enriching compost, carbon dioxide, water, and heat.

So, though in-sink garbage disposals can be a great convenience, be aware that using them too much stresses your septic system or municipal water treatment facility. Most require about two gallons of water per minute, and they add organic matter, in the form of tough-to-process sludge, into the public sewer system, which requires increased amounts of water, chemicals and energy to treat. If it is going into a septic system, the organics cause a more rapid buildup of scum and sludge layers, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Much of the organic waste that would ordinarily go down the disposal can be added to <u>your compost</u>, greatly reducing both the amount of trash that goes to the landfill and the amount of water you have to pour down the disposal. So when it comes time to flip the switch, think twice before turning on the churning garbage disposal.


