

The mission of the Episcopal Church of the Nativity, as part of the family of God, is to proclaim and spread the word and work of God through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, by Eucharistic worship and by ministry to the world.

Pursuing Happiness at Nativity: A Vestry Invitation

Nativity is blessed again with strong leadership on the vestry. Taking a volley from Sunday's homily on the pursuit of happiness and Jesus' prescription for the happiness of blessing discovered in the Beatitudes, we have a happy vestry. The recent vestry retreat at Camp McDowell attests to that! Our vestry leaders are extraordinarily committed God's deep purposes advanced through Nativity's life and ministry. They are committed to empowering a larger number of Christ's flock at Nativity to discover the joy and passion of service they know.

Paraphrasing former Harvard President Derek Bok, on the average, the happiest people are those who connect to others and sustain lasting relationships of love and friendship; they give their money to altruistic purposes, as well as give their time to help others in need; and they recognize and nurture spiritual values promoted through the regular practice of their faith tradition. In the Sermon on the Mount, beginning with the Beatitudes, Jesus tells us to pay attention to these matters of how we live our lives.

Our vestry leaders are people who have discovered through Nativity what Bok's research reveals about happiness. They connect the dots between these contemporary ideas and Jesus' timeless message of life. There is deep joy, blessedness, and yes, the possibility of this elusive hope for happiness when we know and share Christ's love through our parish family.

Nativity exudes a vibrancy, energy, and faithfulness at this time like no other time in our recent history. Outreach and inreach caring ministries continue to draw people in, but there are more and growing needs than the current response can meet. Thankfully, more people are faithful stewards of their time and talent through the Outreach Ministry's renewed approach as well as through the new stewardship of time and talent ministry, "Just Do It." Christ just needs more hands and feet.

We are growing larger numbers of financial stewards faithfully and generously giving their money as God calls us to give. Children, youth and family ministries, music, worship, education, and fellowship are thriving. But the reality is that the still sluggish economy resulted in a 10% attrition in pledges actually paid in 2010 instead of our historic 5% attrition. We were unable to fund outreach, our critical building reserve, and the diocese at the needed and planned levels for 2010. The Vestry has approved a conservative budget for 2011 that reluctantly underfunds these items in 2011, as well as underfunds our personnel expenses with no cost of living increase for the staff (hopefully inflation will remain at its low levels throughout the year).

As of this past Monday, we have received 389 pledges totaling \$1,187,000 toward a goal of 460 pledges and a dollar goal of \$1,300,000. We can do this! With over 850 households calling Nativity home, we have the generosity and faithfulness enabling more of us to live into God's purposes through financial stewardship. The vestry and stewardship team, all faithful and cheerful stewards, have made encouraging phone calls to about 125 households who have not pledged yet for 2011.

If you haven't discovered the joy, won't you join your vestry and other faithful parishioners in knowing the blessedness and yes, happiness so many know at Nativity? Pursue happiness! Share Christ's love by giving your time and pledging your money to God's abundant life through Nativity.

CCIB Report: Restoration Update




Scaffolding installation for the steeple and altar end of the church has started for the roofing project. The steeple scaffolding will rest on beams inserted through the steeple roof. These beams will rest on the steel structure internal to the bell tower/steeple. An elevator will be mounted on the Eustis Avenue side of the bell tower and stairs mounted on the Greene Street side of the bell tower. The goal is to complete the steeple project before Palm Sunday, April 17,2011. The roof above the altar area should be completed in March. The nave upper and lower roofs will start on May 23^{rd} and should be completed by the late summer.

Weather has delayed completion of the masonry project. The masonry restoration is near completion on the church and bell tower. Re-pointing of the brick is nearly complete. Installation of cast iron dentils and caps is complete. Gaps between dentils and round pieces will be filled in and painted. The buttress cap painting has started. Work has been temporarily suspended until weather allows painting and pointing to be continued.

Please observe and obey barricades and detours. Should you notice anything that appears to be a safety hazard, please inform Loch, Skipper, or John Buyse. If you have any questions, do not hesitate to give Skipper Colin or Loch Neely a call.

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION TIP for FEBRUARY 2, 2011

Green Your Kitchen: Third in the series

The kitchen is at the heart of many American households. But, as we stated in the last two Steeple tips, waste there can be a real problem. This week's tip is the third in a series on how to green your kitchen by reusing everyday items.

1st idea: Green Your Old Stuff: Glass Jars

Repurposing old household items is a good way to reduce waste and avoid making new purchases:

How to reuse glass jars With concerns over the levels of BPA in some plastics, storing leftovers in reused plastic containers is a concern.— In a study from Harvard School of Public Health (HSPH), researchers found that participants who drank for a week from polycarbonate bottles - the popular, hard-plastic drinking bottles and baby bottles -- showed a two-thirds increase in their urine of the chemical bisphenol A (BPA). Exposure to BPA, used in the manufacture of polycarbonate and other plastics, has been shown to interfere with reproductive development in animals and has been linked with cardiovascular disease and diabetes in humans. The study was the first to show that drinking from polycarbonate bottles increased the level of urinary BPA, and thus suggests that drinking containers made with BPA release the chemical into the liquid that people drink in sufficient amounts to increase the level of BPA excreted in human urine. Glass, on the other hand, is a safe, multifunctional, and reusable alternative. Good not only for storing last night's dinner, glass jars make excellent vases, storage containers for bulk ingredients, even to-go drinking cups if you add the lid. Smaller jars, like those for baby food, can help organize your toolbox; use 'em to store nuts, bolts, and nails. Empty jars can also become vessels for homemade gifts: Just layer with baking ingredients, sweets, or homemade treats.

2nd idea:Green Your Old Stuff: Egg Cartons

Another item in the kitchen that can be re-purposed is egg cartons. Why throw away a valuable resource? Here are some ideas for reusing egg cartons:

Paper egg cartons are already environmentally friendly. They are made from recycled materials, and they're processed minimally to have an even better impact on the planet (thus their grainy gray appearance.) But before you recycle them once again after the eggs are gone, try some other uses.

Organization

Use your egg cartons (paper, foam or plastic) for crafts. Those who enjoy bead crafts know that multiple products are sold for bead organization during stringing. Instead of these products that cost \$10 and upwards, **try an egg carton**. Sort the beads in order in each compartment of the egg container and close the lid. The cartons can be stacked with multiple projects easier than the bead trays that are sold in stores, and these are free. Kids can even paint the containers to make them look prettier or coat them with glue and roll them over seed beads to create a glitzy craft storage container.

Small Pet Feeders

Small pets like hamsters, mice, hermit crabs, and land turtles all require small food bowls. It's nice to have two bowls to offer a variety of foods. Yet, these pet bowls sell for several dollars each at pet stores. By cutting the individual egg holders from the cartons, you can create a small food container that can be quickly replaced. For pet hamsters, you can also try to offer the individual "cups" as beds, filling them with shredded paper or straw. The little guys will enjoy nesting in the space.

Seed Starters

There is no need to buy those expensive seed starter pots when you have egg cartons around. The carton, paper, plastic or foam, can be used to start seeds. The wells aren't very deep, so you have to keep that in mind when starting your seeds, but they work really well with small sunflowers, herbs, tomato seeds, etc. When you are ready to transplant your seedlings into the garden, it is easy to just peel away the carton, protecting the delicate seedlings from being yanked from a regular pot. You can also cut the paper egg carton into separate cups and just plant the seedling, **paper** cup and all.

One of the easiest uses for **paper** egg cartons, in particular, is that they can be used for compost for your garden. Don't try this with the foam or plastic cartons, of course. When you are composting, don't forget to throw in some egg shells, too. Roses love egg shells. Or shred the paper egg cartons and use them as an inexpensive mulch.

Egg cartons can also be used to store your bulbs over the winter until you are ready to plant them. This is an easy way to keep the bulbs organized and dry. The cartons can be stacked in your garden shred or wherever you keep your gardening supplies. The egg cartons can also be easily labeled, so there won't be any more "mystery bulbs."
