

Looking Ahead to Summer: Sabbath and Sabbatical Time

Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work. But the seventh day is a Sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and consecrated it. Exodus 20:8-11

Of all the Ten Commandments, we probably violate the 4th one more than any other. We don't do a good job of keeping the Sabbath in our busy lives and world today. Yet, observing the Sabbath is critical to our relationships with God, each other, and life itself. We learn right out of the chute in Genesis that the cessation of work on the Sabbath is part of the created order in which we proactively claim and rest in the goodness of creation, regularly renewing our commitment to God and life. We observe an intentional and proactive immersion in the life of the Spirit, not a fatigued response to life's busyness. If we do not observe the Sabbath we will grow weary spiritually and physically.

Growing from the deep roots of our faith tradition, Sabbath is a unique understanding of our relationship with God and creation. As a gift God offers and requires, Sabbath does not emerge from the natural rhythm of life: from the keeping of days and months and seasons and years. Sabbath encompasses the holy rhythm of God's very being, helping us see that God is our beginning and our end. In spite of these mortal coils we shuffle about on with their finite beginning and end, our lives in God are something much greater, something good and everlasting.

The commandment to observe the Sabbath has led the Church to embrace sabbaticals for clergy every 5 to 7 years. Corresponding to the ancient Levitical order that God's people grant their cropland—their source of sustenance—a full rest every seven years, a sabbatical is a gift of full, regular rest and renewal to those who nurture God's people. In the Gospels, we hear Jesus inviting his disciples to come away and rest for a while. In the Diocese of Alabama, clergy are offered a twelve week sabbatical after five years of service to their parish. I am most grateful to the Vestry for supporting this time for me this summer, beginning May30th through the end of August (after 8 years of service to Nativity and 17 years of ordained ministry). I am also humbled that the Louisville Institute has provided financial assistance for my sabbatical as one of 39 grant awardees of over 400 applicants.

I am excited about these possibilities and look forward to begin sharing my plans with you this Sunday at 10:00 a.m. in the parish hall. My sabbatical will be a time of spiritual renewal and re-invigoration as new approaches to ministry are contemplated and developed. It is also a time for rest, recreation and family renewal as we share invaluable and uninterrupted time together. It gives me the opportunity to pursue a few personal interests that I have mostly ignored due to ordained ministry's heavy demands.

During this three month period, I will "disconnect" from parish life and ministry. The Wardens' Council, the clergy, and I are working on a detailed plan of parish administration and pastoral care and worship implementation while I am gone. Although I will not be reachable through parish e-mails, my plans are to stay connected by sharing my sabbatical experiences through blogging, a new skill I hope to develop!

St. Francis's response to Christ's call to "rebuild my church" has inspired me throughout ordained ministry. After implementing new programming and capital projects at Nativity and my former two parishes, God is calling me to build upon the spiritual foundations. My sabbatical will renew my heart for ministry while preparing to strengthen Nativity's spiritual undergirding through the Catechumenate process of forming Christian disciples.

I begin my sabbatical with a 10-day centering prayer retreat at St. Mary's in Sewanee. Tippy and I will then travel to Assisi and the surrounding areas to visit the places St. Francis was inspired to "build Christ's church." Taking a Tuscan cooking class renews a passion and helps us stay well. Our children Case and Sally will visit in Italy for some focused family time. I will then travel to Armenia (Tippy returns home) for worship and deeper study and reflection within the beauty and mystery of the ancient Apostolic Armenian Church where Christian formation emerged in the fourth century and is experiencing a modern renaissance. Finally I return to The School of Theology at Sewanee for deliberate conversations with church leaders and scholars on the Catechumenate, giving time for further reflection and writing, reading, rest, hiking, golf, playing and yes, cooking!

Sabbaticals contain a balanced configuration of rest, renewal, learning, recreation, and devotion. The Louisville Institute hopes they enable clergy to "slow down to fall in love again." Sabbaticals reinforce the regular observance of Sabbath. These ideas are not only important to clergy, but for us all. We all somehow need to find extended Sabbath, sabbatical time, in our own lives and relationships. That is my prayer. The fruit of this sabbatical will bring positive benefits for our parish, too, enabling us to strengthen lay leadership skills and modeling a way of life God calls all of us to embrace. I am most grateful for this opportunity. *Thank you!*

If you call the Sabbath a delight and the holy day of the Lord honorable, if you honor it, not going your own ways, serving your own interests or pursuing your own affairs, then you shall take delight in the Lord and I will make you ride upon the heights of the earth. Isaiah 58:13-14

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION TIP

Part 3 of our series on Composting: Hot Composting

Hot composting requires more work than cold or passive composting, but with a few minutes a day and the right ingredients you can have finished compost in a few weeks, depending on weather conditions.

Hot composting piles do best when high-carbon material, for example, dry leaves and twigs, and high-nitrogen material, such as grass clippings, vegetable and fruit trimmings and peels, are mixed in a 1 to 1 ratio. A pile with the minimum dimensions of 3' x 3' x 3' is needed for efficient heating. For best heating, make a heap that is 4 or 5 feet in each dimension. As decomposition occurs, the pile will shrink. Hot composting piles reach 110 to 160 degrees Fahrenheit, killing most weed 4. seeds and plant diseases.

Steps:

- 1. Choose a level, well-drained site, preferably near your garden.
- There are numerous styles of compost bins available depending on your needs. These may be as simple as a moveable bin formed by wire mesh or a more substantial structure consisting of several compartments. There are many commercially available bins. While a bin will help contain the pile, it is not absolutely necessary. You can build your pile directly on the ground. If you do not use a bin, to help with aeration you may want to place some woody material on the ground

- where you will build your pile.
- To build your pile, either use alternating layers of high-carbon and high-nitrogen material or mix the two together and then heap into a pile. If 8. you alternate layers, make each layer 2 to 4 inches thick. Some composters find that mixing the two together is more effective than layering. Use approximately equal amounts of each. If you are low on high-nitrogen material, you can add a small amount of commercial fertilizer containing nitrogen. Apply at a rate 1/2 cup of fertilizer for each 10-inch layer of material. Adding a few shovels of soil will also help get the pile off to a good start; adds commonly found soil decomposing organisms.
- 4. Water periodically. The pile should be moist but not saturated. If conditions are too wet, anaerobic microorganisms (those that can live without oxygen) will continue the process. These are not as effective or as desirable as the aerobic organisms. Bad odors also are more likely if the pile is saturated.
- 5. Punch holes in the sides of the pile for aeration.
- 6. The pile will heat up and then begin to cool. Start turning when the pile's internal temperature peaks at about 130 to 140 degrees Fahrenheit. You can track this with a compost thermometer, or reach into the pile to determine if it is uncomfortably hot to the touch.

- Check your bin regularly to assure optimum moisture and aeration are present in the material being composted.
- 8. Move materials from the center to the outside and vice versa. Turn every day or two and you should get compost in less than 4 weeks. Turning every other week will make compost in 1 to 3 months. Finished compost will smell sweet and be cool and crumbly to the touch.

IMPORTANT NOTE: If you plan to build a wood composting unit, avoid using lumber treated with copper arsenate (CCA), creosote, and penta. (You should also avoid using these types of lumber around vegetable gardens.) compounds from the wood preservatives could leach into your compost. The compounds are harmful to humans and pets. They have been shown to cause cancer and skin and eye irritations. Instead, use wood that is naturally resistant to decay such as cedar or untreated pine. (Structures built from pine will probably have to be replaced within a few years, but by then you may be ready for a multiple bin unit or a new design!)

Using Compost

Compost can be used for all your planting needs. Compost is an excellent source of organic matter to add to your garden or potted plants. It helps improve soil structure which contributes to good aeration and moisture-holding capacity. Compost is also a source of plant nutrients.


Mark your calendars for Vacation Bible School TODAY!
