

The mission of the Episcopal Church of the Nativity, as part of the family of God, is to proclaim and spread the word and work of God through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, by Eucharistic worship and by ministry to the world.

The Rich Dirt and Dust of Lent

The warmer weather these past ten days brings hopes of spring, especially with daffodils and flowering trees bursting in bloom. The gardeners among us are outside digging in the dirt, preparing the ground for later planting more flowers, vegetables and herbs, or just to maintain the landscape around.

I am reminded of the first gardener, God, preparing the garden of creation. In Genesis 2 we read, In the day that the Lord God made the earth and the heavens, when no plant of the field was yet in the earth and no herb of the field had yet sprung up—for the Lord God had not caused it to rain upon the earth, and there was no one to till the ground...then the Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being.

Take note that the phrase, "the Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground" gives us the name Adam, the Hebrew word for man. Perhaps more interesting is that the original Hebrew for this phrase is *adam adamah—adamah* the Hebrew word for dust of the ground. *The Lord God formed adam adamah*. But *adamah* is not just any old dust and dirt—the translation of this word refers to the finest arable soil—soil rich in nutrients and oxygen. The initial biblical word for human beings, adam, is interwoven with the word for rich and productive soil, *adamah*.

So, what's growing in the rich soil of your life? In one week, Lent begins. On Ash Wednesday we come to church and have ashes created from the palms of last Palm Sunday smeared on our foreheads with these words, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." We are dust. But not just any old dust and dirt. "God just don't make any junk," one southern preacher said once. We are the finest, richest arable soil there is.

Lent calls us to focus on our mortality, and on our sins and the call to repentance. This Lent, expand your concept of that dust placed upon you. Remember that God created you from the finest and richest matter of creation; you are the glory of God's master gardening skills. And although through our sins and selfishness and just plain lack of attention, our lives don't produce the lush growth and beautiful blossoms God hopes we will produce, at the beginning of Lent, we are reminded of who we really are. Our lives are rich and potent, fecund and generative. The foundation is present. Be who you are in creation and redeemed in Christ Jesus.

This Lent, may we remember this and allow God's garden to flourish and blossom in our lives. But just like the landscape of our lawns and gardens, it will take deliberate work. So in this last week of the longest season after the Epiphany our liturgical calendar gives, start digging in the soil of your lives. The Church invites you to a Holy Lent, a season of holy preparation of the rich soil that your life is. Nativity offers many ways for you to work in this soil. Clear your calendars, make God's garden blooming from the rich soil of your life a priority. *Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.*

Composting Part 2 A REVIEW OF COMPOSTING DETAILS: Composting turns household wastes into valuable fertilizer and soil organic matter.

This dark, crumbly, earthy-smelling stuff works wonders on all kinds of soil and provides vital nutrients to help plants grow and look better. If you have a garden, a lawn, trees, shrubs, or even planter boxes, or do container gardening, you have a use for compost.

Getting Started:

numerous others.

Decomposing organisms need four composting. key elements to thrive: nitrogen. carbon, moisture, and oxygen. For best the same type of ingredients as hot results, mix materials high in nitrogen composting and requires less effort (such as clover, fresh grass clippings, from the gardener. Moisture is provided by rain, but you may need to water or cover the waste as it accumulates. Shredding or pile provides oxygen. NOTE: Frequent mower over small piles of weeds and decompose. turning yields faster decomposition.

Many materials can be added to a sawdust. Do not use diseased plants, manure, which can carry disease.

Composting can be as simple or as depends on how much yard waste you have, how fast you want results, and the effort you are willing to invest.

Cold, or passive, composting uses

 With cold composting, you can just on the ground or in a bin. Add yard trimmings..

- · Also, you can collect your kitchen compost pile, including leaves, grass waste in a small container or bucket clippings, straw, woody brush, which has a tight-fitting lid - or put vegetable and fruit scraps, coffee vegetable scraps in a bag in the grounds, livestock manure, and freezer - and when you have enough, put them in the compost. Or, you can or meat scraps or dairy products which just collect scraps during the day and may attract animals, or dog or cat take them to the compost pile each evening.
- In addition to the ingredients involved as you would like, and mentioned above, any of these items may be added to a compost pile: tea bags, dry goods (crackers, flour, spices), eggshells, hair, nutshells, pasta (cooked or uncooked), seaweed, shredded paper/newspaper.



The Rev. Geoffrey Hoare is rector of All Saints' Episcopal Church in Atlanta, GA. A native of England, he came to America as a Morehead Scholar at the University of North Carolina in 1976. After taking an additional degree from Cambridge University, where he is a member of Magdalene College, he returned to the USA and to the Yale Divinity School together with its Episcopal component, the Berkeley Divinity School. Geoffrey has served church and community in a number of capacities ___ the Board of Berkeley Divinity School at Yale and he currently serves as an instructor in the contextual education program of the Candler School of Theology at Emory University.

March 23, The Rev. Betsy Jennings Powell

The Rev. Betsy Powell has served as Associate Rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Selma since January 2010, where she and her husband have the good fortune to serve as clergy on the same staff. Prior to coming to St. Paul's, Betsy served as curate at St. Simon's on the Sound Episcopal Church, Ft. Walton Beach, FL and rector of St. Augustine of Canterbury Episcopal Church, Navarre, FL. She received an M.D. degree in 1976 from Vanderbilt University School of Medicine, completing her pediatrics residency and fellowship training over the next five years. She practiced pediatrics for twenty years prior to attending seminary at The General Theological Seminary in NYC. March 30, The Rev. Ben King

The Rev. Dr. Benjamin King became Assistant Professor of Church History at the School of Theology, Sewanee in the fall of 2009 and Director of the School's Advanced Degrees Program in the fall of 2010.
