

Nativity Parishioner to be Member of Haiti Mission Team June 6-10

Will Taylor, Nativity parishioner who is active on the Outreach Committee and with Young Adult Ministry, heads to Haiti Monday June 6. He is part of a Diocesan Team that includes Bishop Kee Sloan and Dave Drachlis, Diocesan Communications Director. The purpose of the mission is two-fold: Medical and Fact-finding. The group of eight will be involved in various tasks through the week. Their intent is to return with information of what is needed at this time and how diocesan parishes can respond. Will represents the entire parish but specifically the Young Adults who have raised funds for Haiti and are hopeful to be integral in a building project. Please keep the Mission Team in your prayers during their travels.

Stormy Day Fund for Tornado Adopted Family

The Lockhart-Yarborough Road area of Harvest experienced complete devastation during the April tornados. Through the Harvest Youth Center forty-one families will be adopted by churches. Each family completely lost their home and all belongings. The Call for Help is that we will partner with a family for three months: July, August and September – assisting them in many ways through the initial months of recovery. The basic commitment of \$3600 for one family will be made and covered by the Nativity Outreach 2011 Contingency Fund. Past this point we need each of you to help in various ways. When we receive details about the family's specific needs, we will inform you through The Steeple, our website and word of mouth. And, we can consider extending the partnership another three months if we receive contributions that would cover \$1200 per month.

To prepare for this special relationship we are beginning a "Stormy Day Fund." This Fund will allow us to have monies on hand to purchase necessary big need items and put some aside for back-to-school needs. Perhaps we could treat the family to a day at Point Mallard so that the children (and mother!) can have a needed change of scenery and be treated to a fun time.


Even though it is summer we have many requests for volunteers from our community agents so please continue to JUST DO IT over the summer!

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION TIP

Dealing with your technotrash and e-waste

Recycling paper, plastic and glass keeps getting easier, but technotrash – all the odds and ends and detritus of our electronic age—that's more difficult. I always seemed to have a box of random cords and cables, old VHS tapes, and broken MP3 players that I knew didn't belong in a landfill, but I couldn't put them in the recycling bin, either. So, the box just lived in my garage, trapped in recycling limbo.

So, what to do with the technotrash?

You can, of course, donate working technology to charities or sell it through a yard sale or online. There are plenty of programs that will find a home for functional – if no longer top-of-the-line – electronics like cell phones or monitors. But what if it's broken or obsolete?

- Return outdated/broken technology to the place you bought it. If you're replacing something, ask the store you're purchasing from if they'll take the old one. Staples, Radio Shack, Office Depot, and Best Buy all run recycling programs for everything from cell phones to printers. Some stores will charge a small fee for recycling, but other places will do it for free, or even better! reward you with gift cards or cash.
- Get a TechnoTrash Can. For \$36, GreenDisk.com will send you a
 cardboard "can" that will take up to 35 pounds of your technotrash:
 cables, printer cartridges, VCR and cassette tapes, CDs and jewel cases,
 floppy disks, and small electronics like MP3 players, PDAs, cell phones,
 and digital cameras. (Laptops, towers, monitors, and printers are
 recycled through a different GreenDisk program.) When the "can" is full,
 print a pre-paid label and call FedEx to pick it up. They recycle all the ewaste and even destroy any data that's still stored on it.
- Check some of the following sites for other ideas and solutions to your e-waste issues: DigitalTips.org, Gazelle.com, NextWorth.com, Earth911.com, BestBuyTradeln.com. These sites will help you find responsible ways to recycle your technotrash (and maybe make a little money too!).

It takes a few extra minutes to find the right place to recycle your e-waste, but it's worth it.
