

#### Nativity Grace in Fall's Comings and Goings

Enthusiasm and energy surround us at Nativity these past few weeks. Our return to the school year schedule bringing people to church school, Bible studies, EFM, choir rehearsals, and focused attention to our many ministries reveals much grace. We all share God's love greeting old friends and new ones this Fall in this holy place.

Even though the natural world begins to show colors of aging in the Fall, even though the tree leaves will blaze orange and red over the next month and disappear, the Fall season in the church is different. In the Church, Fall always represents new life and new faces. At Nativity, we have welcomed many new members this fall. Parishioners, with and without school-age children re-commit to church life and ministry at this time of year. We return to our routines of regularly seeing each other on Sundays. And Nativity's gratitude and generosity was evident in the bounty of the purse we gave Mary. After three months of sabbatical from all ordained diaconal duties, Mary will explore new expressions of ordained ministry in other parishes and around the diocese, but she will remain a part of our Haiti medical mission and we will see her around Nativity from time to time

As we say good-bye to Mary, we welcome newly ordained Deacon Jeannie Robison. The Holy Spirit's timing of grace is always on the mark! Most of us have known Jeannie through her service in many of Nativity's ministries, including her serving as a lector, intercessor, Lay Eucharistic Minister, EFM Mentor, and with our Reconciliation Ministries. In the wider Huntsville community, she volunteers with local tornado relief efforts and works as Director of the Interfaith Mission Service. We welcome Jeannie's warm, gracious, and loving presence



The program is considered a wonderful asset in the town – preparing children for learning in early grades. It was named an Episcopal Jubilee Center for Ministry several years ago.

#### STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION TIP for October 5, 2011

What organic material is full of nutrients - essential for the natural processes of soil rejuvenation - and arrives absolutely free of cost to millions of homeowners every autumn? You guessed it—the colorful liberated leaves of deciduous trees. Recycling leaves and turning them into mulch or compost offers a great alternative to removing this resource from your property.

#### **Leaf Mulch How-To**

#### WHAT TO GATHER:

Fallen leaves, pine needles, spent blooms.

#### WHAT TO DO:

- To speed up the composting process, mow over the big leaves. You can use a bag on your mower and just mow them up.
- You can also rake them into low piles and just mow those piles.
- You can put the leaves into a metal trash can and use a weed eater to chop them.
- Most sustainable would be rake them by hand and use a battery or electric mower to reduce their size. OR just rake them and leave them full size for no carbon footprint.
- Make low piles somewhere in your yard to decompose. I put them on the property line by the wooded area. If you put them near a fence, leave a bit of space

so they don't rot a wood fence.

 In late spring, you can use them to mulch in your beds. You can put a thin layer of leaves and then, if desired, can use a prettier mulch on top. This will reduce the amount of bought mulch you will need. You can mulch your vegetables to help conserve water.

#### LEAF LITTER:

If you are going to buy some new trees for your yard, think about the leaf litter. Big leaves take a lot longer to break down. Some great trees that have small leaves are:

Chinese Elm
Chinese Pistache
Willow Oak
Shumard Oak.
Japanese Maples are good toobut expensive!
Bald Cypress tree: will give you
gorgeous fall color and when the
needles fall, you can just leave
them.

Some of the benefits of recycling leaves:

- Reduces waste going to landfills
- Encourages improvement of soil through natural processes
- Reduces need for fertilizer, which saves money, and also reduces the environmental impacts of fertilizer use


## PRAYERS & COOKIES FOR KAIROS #53
