

WESTFED FOOD PANTRY



The Westfed Pantry is located at Grace Lutheran School at the corner of Boudinot and Verdin Avenues. The pantry will open its doors on the LAST TWO THURSDAYS OF JANUARY, January 21 and 28, from 1:30 to 2:30 P.M. We served 96 families on December 17. Parishioners at St. James are asked to bring the following items: CEREAL, TUNA, OR CRACK-**ERS.** Place all donations in the Narthex on January 3, 10, 17 or 24th.

Other Outreach Opportunities

- We are still collecting for the 2 Cents a Meal program. Half of the money collected goes to area food pantries and the other half goes to the Ohio Network for Hunger in Columbus. If you eat three meals a day, that only costs you six cents a day or 42 cents per week. If you only eat two meals a day, it costs you four cents a day or 28 cents per week. A can for your donations is on a small table in the Narthex.
- Our Administrative Assistant handles diaper requests when families call looking for assistance, as well as the distribution of bus tokens.

Interfaith Hospitality Network

Help is needed and opportunities are available to address homelessness in Greater Cincinnati on Saturday, February 13th. Christ Church Glendale is the week's host church for this program and St. James, along with six other churches, serve as support congregations.

Dinner Hosts, Children's Hosts, Overnight Hosts as well as persons to cook are all needed for a successful evening. Car pooling from St. James is available and job descriptions are available as well on the bulletin board.

Recycling a Workshop

It was a workshop re-run. We had presented the same workshop on women's health a week earlier, but six health promoters in the community missed it. A house had burned to the ground just hours before the original workshop; comforting the family that had lost their home and possessions and relocating it to temporary quarters in the village had occupied these six health promoters that day. So, we were presenting the topic again a week later for those six promoters. The dynamics are different with just six people; it is a small group rather than a class setting. It is much more interactive. Everyone can share their ideas and ask questions. Even the timid participate. It was a much more personal workshop than the week before; each woman had stories about people in this community who had cervical or breast cancers found too late.

These stories of the unfortunate experiences of women in their village created an eagerness by these women to learn all they could about prevention, and how to overcome fears, taboos, and misinformation prevalent in their community. The ambience reminded me of the same attitude and spirit that characterized small meetings with residents when I was on the Family Medicine faculty before becoming a missionary.

I like being a physician. I like teaching. I like working with enthusiastic students - whether family medicine residents or community health promoters. I like being a missionary, knowing that I am where I am called to be and doing what I am called to do: sharing the Good News in a very tangible and incarnational way with a people in a community that can really use it. News from your Health Ministry From Marian Riestenberg BEAT THOSE WINTER BLUES

- Talk to a professional. The "winter blues" can be a symptom of a bigger problem, such as depression. Don't be afraid or embarrassed to seek counseling help.
