Date Night important in Long Term Relationship **Pentecost Celebration May 31**

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in us the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and we shall be created, and you shall renew the face of the earth.

O God, who by the light of the Holy Spirit did instruct the hearts of the faithful, grant that, by that same Spirit, we may be truly wise and ever enjoy His consolations; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

For many years, people have talked about keeping up the romance and intimacy in long term relationships. Couples who date for long periods of time, people who are engaged for a long time, and people who are married for several years or decades often come to me and bemoan their boredom. *What can we do to renew our relationship? I want to feel like I used to feel. I want sparks. This isn't much fun anymore. I guess I've fallen out of love. What can I do?*

It's not unusual to listen and question and recognize one or more systemic problems. Usually some focused conversation with the couple can help open them to think of possibilities for dealing with those deep issues which can close us off from each other. Sometimes this is casual, and some times intense and requiring in-depth therapeutic help. Generally, one very important, common practice of mine, regardless of the casualness or seriousness of the conversation with the couple, is to recommend **Date Night**. What sort of activities did you like to do when you first met? What was fun and made you laugh or "sweet" and touched your heart? Sometimes people can't even remember or agree on what they used to do.

Have **Date Night** at least once every other week if not every week. No money? *No excuse!* No time? *Make time!* No ideas? *So, you have internet!* Getting together intentionally for the sole purpose of being together intentionally heals wounds and opens hearts. Laughter and touching are healing agents.

Feeling estranged from God? Wishing you could have those highs you had when you just got back from *Cursillo* or *Faith Alive* or *Alpha again*? *A Brotherhood* or *Daughters of the King* retreat? Have **Date Night!** **Date Night** with God.

I offer three ideas that might not be found on the internet. One, invite one to three other humans who also believe over for an evening. Break bread together. Nothing fancy - just a simple meal. After dinner, find a quiet place inside or outside and talk about Jesus. (Best conversation I've ever had with God...; last time I really felt close to Jesus was ...; one really cool story I love in the Bible is ...)

Take a blanket or chair out on one of these incredible spring nights (with or without religious music) and sit for half an hour and talk to God - out loud.) By yourself or with a friend, light one candle in your completely dark house. Sit and pray. Think of this as renewing your relationship with God!!

How Do We Teach About Sin

I have had several quiet “sub rosa” conversations with few of you during the past weeks about a subject that makes me squirm - sin. My wife Judy brought this rather uncomfortable topic to my attention during Lent. Being raised a good Catholic, Judy felt strongly that each of us needs to recognize sin for what it is – something that separates us from God. Maybe we could have a Sunday school class on the topic.

One origin of the word *sin* (in Greek) refers to an archery term: to miss the mark. Therefore, at its most basic meaning, sin is anything that keeps us from hitting the target - living the life that Christ would have us live. This probably has something to do with living on the “straight and narrow”.

At one time, the church tried to help us get a clear focus about sin by identifying the “seven deadly sins”. They are lust, gluttony, greed, sloth, wrath, envy and pride. Fr. John Bolton, a former interim Rector at Christ Church, once told me that in Scotland plaques picturing the Seven Deadly Sins were often displayed over the front door of a church (on the inside). This was so that “our sins” were the last thing seen by congregants as they left the worship service. Just a friendly reminder to stay focused until the next gathering.

Kathi Johnson – a repentant former Baptist – tells me that she is reminded everyday that we are all sinners. But for the grace of God, none of us could ever be admitted to Christ’s kingdom. Her willingness to bring sin up close and personal reminds me of how I have been willing to keep sin at arms length. As I repeated the *Decalogue* during Lent, did I ever really consider that the Prayer Book was speaking to me personally?

The standard question put to old time Southern preachers was simply this: Sin – are you for it or against it? Most of us might want to construct an answer that allowed for some wiggle room. This would include what the meaning of “is” is. We have blurred the line between illegal and immoral behavior. If it were legal, it must be all right – right? So how are we going to be reminded about sin – to know it when we see it? Maybe we could hold up some actual examples (always dangerous in the best of times).

Alan Allison and I were discussing this very thing. Maybe a power point presentation would do the trick. We finally agreed that we had heard of some actual sinners just down the road. Nobody that we knew personally, of course. You see, sin is hard to see up close, but much easier to spot at a distance. I guess this is the reason that classes on sin are just not as popular as I had thought they would be.

The Discernment Process—Part II

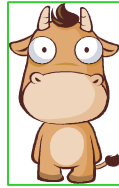
In last month's newsletter, I shared highlights of the Atlanta Diocese's process for Vocational Discernment. I wrote an overview of the years that have brought me to this point; since I did not have enough space to share more recent factors relevant to my VDP decision making, I'm writing that part this month.

I did give some vain-glorious thought to being *the one* who could initiate a change in the Southern Baptist Convention. I am not so brave. Besides, the focus would have been on me and not on God. What I mean by this is that the Bible clearly teaches us that God uses the things of this world to confound the wise. I am often confounded that God has called me to His Work. I have told God that I am not fit for the job. He has told me two things. One, that while it is true I am not fit for the job on my own, He has already made me fit and has promised to make right my way (Joshua 1:8-9). Two, that I am not the central character here, others are; others who need to hear the *Word* that God has given me for a hurting and lost world; others who need to hear a voice of enthusiasm about the Church and about the Bible and about what Jesus Christ can overcome when we allow Him to do so. Mostly, I feel that God has given me a voice to offer a Word of hope and encouragement that in one corner will fall on deaf ears and in another will land upon ears just aching to hear.

After graduating from Shorter College in 2007, I faced a roller coaster couple of years with regard to jobs found and lost. Then just last July I came into a position that challenges me as a leader and requires all of my business acumen, skills and talent. To top it off, with so much of our economy in distress, I find myself in a company that is flourishing, hiring, and steeped in growth. Yet the calling I have felt to something else would not leave me alone. I have outdone Moses with reasons why I should not go forward. I even borrowed a line from Sarah: "I'm too old," but the urge I have and the affirmations I have received served only to confirm the time to be now. So, Kim and I no longer look around or back, we look up and forward with expectancy to receive wisdom and guidance.

With each passing day I become more aware of what it means to serve as a Priest in our church. The questions that challenged me previously now pale in comparison. As I consider celebrating the Holy Eucharist and the other Sacraments, I am struck with fear at the enormity of accountability and am persuaded that discernment is the right place for me. I am a student of the Word and continue to be led of the Spirit and renewed every time I pick up a Bible or Book of Common Prayer. The skills that make me a strong leader in the business world will serve me well in teaching and proclaiming the gospel, in developing teachers for children, youth, and adult programs, and in supporting the spiritual growth and development of church leaders so that they are well-equipped for ministry to the community.

I am not afraid of the outcome of this process. I have a genuine peace and joy. I only tremble at the thought of my own frailty. Yet as I begin the Parish Lay Committee part of the discernment process, with the support of Pastor Doris, the committee, the vestry and the parish, I know that we will reach the place that God has ordained and find ourselves within His Will. Amen.

ALTAR GUILD NEEDS A FEW GOOD WOMEN (AND MEN)!

The Altar Guild is the ministry of preparing and maintaining the altar, sacred vessels and vestments for our worship services. Members of the Altar Guild perform a silent or hidden ministry to our Parish so that we may worship and glorify Christ. Members are trained and assigned in a cycle to be responsible for the services during a given week. Preparations for weddings, funerals, and baptisms are also the responsibility of the Altar Guild.

The Altar Guild cares for the linens, communion silver, liturgical hangings, candles, and vases which are used in the various services. The changing vestments and altar hangings remind us of the progression of seasons in the Christian calendar, and they accent special services throughout the year. The Altar Guild works closely with the Rector, complementing the ministry of the Word and sacraments. If you feel called to serve our Lord, you may find the Altar Guild to be a place where you can serve and grow spiritually. Membership in the Altar Guild is open to men, women and couples of any age. New Lay Readers Needed To Assist With Services

Lay readers play an important part of our public worship at Christ Church, lending voice to many parts of our liturgical experience. **We are in particular need of readers for the 8 am services.**

The Lay Readers of Christ Episcopal Church are a dedicated group of men and women who volunteer to assist in our worship service. They are lay persons licensed by the bishop to lead public worship under the direction of the member of the clergy in charge of the congregation. This ministry is licensed under the provisions of the canon for licensed lay persons.

The lay reader must be a confirmed adult communicant in good standing and recommended by the member of the clergy in charge of the congregation. Guidelines for training and licensing of lay readers are established by the bishop. Licensed lay readers may be commissioned for this ministry with a form provided by the Book of Occasional Services. Lay readers have traditionally held an important place in the American church, dating from colonial times when clergy were scarce.

There are three orders of lay reader: Lector, who reads the lessons and prayers; Eucharistic Minister, who reads the lessons and prayers and assists at the Eucharist; and Eucharistic Visitor, who reads the lessons and prayers, assists at the Eucharist, and takes communion to the ill, using the reserved Sacrament.

Joanne's husband's mother grew up in the household of the grandfather who came to America from France. The grandfather brought with him his French cook who was known for good food and special treats and they named her, "Cookie" This is one of her recipes. Enjoy !!

Servings: 12

Serving size: 1 piece

Preparation time: 30 minutes

8 ounces Chocolate, semi-sweet

6 fluid ounces corn Syrup

4 fluid ounces Cream, heavy whipping

8 Cracker graham, plain

1 cup Walnuts

12 fluid ounces Cream, heavy whipping

Line 12 muffin cups with liners.

Divide heavy cream according to recipe.

Coarsely chop walnuts.

Break graham crackers into small pieces. Can use any crisp cookie.

Stir chocolate and corn syrup over low heat until chocolate melts. Remove from heat; stir in 1/2 cup of heavy cream until blended.

Refrigerate for 15 minutes or until cool.

Beat remaining cream until soft peaks form: gently stir in cookies, nuts and cream, spoon into muffin cups.

Freeze 4-6 hours or until firm.

Garnish as desired. Let stand a few minutes before serving.

Can store in freezer up to 1 month.

Do you think you are having a Heart Attack

I just came home from teaching a CPR class with the hospital which includes signs and symptoms of someone having a heart attack and I thought I would share with you some of the important details. Having a heart attack, requiring CPR can happen to anyone, young and old alike. Recognizing that someone is having a heart attack and getting them to the hospital in time will help to reduce the need for CPR and could save someone's life. A Heart Attack occurs when an area of the heart muscle is blocked from proper blood flow for a sufficient period of time and the muscle begins to die. Irregular heart rhythms occur usually within the first hour after the symptoms occur, so it is so important that you call 911 to get help as soon as possible.

Warning Signs of a Heart Attack

The most common sign that you are having a Heart Attack is chest discomfort. It can be described as an "intense or heavy weight on my chest". It can radiate to the neck and jaw, down the arms, to the shoulders, and around to the upper back. Any discomfort lasting more than 15-20 minutes and is not relieved or is only partially relieved by sitting or lying down, then you must call for help. If you have a heart condition that your doctor has prescribed medication to alleviate your chest pain, and after taking the medication the discomfort does not go away, then you must call for help as well!

- Other Signs may include: Sweating, nausea, vomiting, or shortness of breath.
- A feeling of being dizzy or of weakness may accompany the chest discomfort
- Be alert to the fact that the discomfort may not be severe and the person may only complain of shortness of breath or weakness

One important note to know ... women, people with Diabetes, or seniors are more likely to have atypical symptoms (not common signs) or "Silent Heart Attacks." They may only feel dizzy or weak, or have shortness of breath. Women have also been known to feel an intense pain over the left breast and arm, with or without back pain. If you or the person you are with have any of these symptoms, you should take them seriously, no matter what age they are.

Action Plan

If you observe someone experiencing the signs of a Heart Attack you **must do** the following:

- Have them sit or lie down
- If the signs persist, call **911**
- The number one response from the person having the symptoms will be DENIAL!
- Get them help right away- they will rationalize that it can't be happening to them.
- Last but not least.... NEVER, NEVER try to drive them to the hospital yourself!

Hopefully you will never have to call **911** for an emergency, but it is always better to be ready. 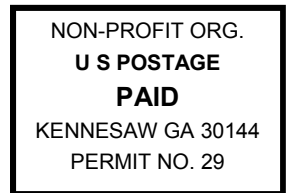
Donations Needed
